COVID VACCINATIONS BEGIN, FIRST DELIVERY OF SINOVAC ARRIVES WITH 4,000 DOSES

he first injections of the Sinovac COVID-19 vaccine in Phuket began at Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town on Monday (Mar 1), with medical personnel the first to receive the injections.

Making history was Vachira Hospital Ear, Nose, Throat specialist Dr Sawatchai Nawakitrangsan, becoming the first person on Phuket to be vaccinated.

Hospital Director Dr Chalermpong Sukontapol confirmed that 4,000 doses of the vaccine arrived at about 9am, the first delivery of any COVID-19 vaccine to Phuket.

Among the first to be vaccinated will be 1,500 medical staff on the island, followed by 500 local officers, and set up an area to conduct the Dr Chalermpong explained.

The vaccine requires two injections, he noted.

A total of 1,800 doses will be used to vaccinate 900 medical personnel at Phuket's five government hospitals: Vachira Phuket Hospital, Thalang Hospital, Patong Hospital, Chalong Hospital, and the Phuket Provincial Hospital, Dr Chalermpong said.

A further 1,200 doses will be distributed to vaccinate 600 staff at four private hospitals on the island: Bangkok Hospital Phuket, Bangkok

Hospital Siriroj, Dibuk Hospital and Mission Hospital.

"We have already arranged staff eight steps for the vaccination process. Today, we will start injecting the vaccine to our 50 medical staff who already registered to be the first group," Dr Chalermpong said.

"Vachira Phuket Hospital has the capacity to inject the vaccine to only 400 people per day. However, we will send the vaccine to the other hospitals across the island so that the total rate of vaccination [for Phuket] can be about 1,500 people per day," he said.

"In the next delivery, we will

receive 16,000 doses of vaccine, and another 48,000 doses will come in May. In total, for the first three months, we will receive 68,000 doses of vaccine," he added.

"In total, the vaccine will be provided to our target groups, comprising those who have high-risk contact with infected patients, those who have chronic diseases, workers in the tourism industry, and elders more than 60 years old," Dr Chalermpong said.

...held a practice session for vaccinating the public for COVID-19.

The rehearsal was held late afternoon on Feb 25 at the Lan Muang Khao open area at Vachira hospital, which has been set up specifically for the vaccine rollout.

Present to oversee the procedures to be observed while administering vaccines was Dr Pitakpol Bunyamalik, an Inspector General from the Ministry of Public Health Region 11 office, which is responsible for the seven Upper Southern Thailand provinces, including Phuket.

Joining him from the Region 11 office was Dr Apichat Romsom.

Closely observing the procedures was Phuket Vice Governor Pichet Panapong.

"The government recognises the importance of the affected areas of the economy where the epidemic situation of COVID-19 must be stopped and has allocated the COVID-19 vaccine to Phuket Province to build herd immunity, restore the economy, return a smile to Thailand," Vice Governor Pichet said.

"We are preparing to COVID-19 mass vaccination to build confidence among the people that they will receive a quality, safe vaccine and to receive follow-up care after it has been administered," he said.

Vice Governor Pichet said the first to receive the vaccine in Phuket will be specific target groups. As shown on Monday, medical personnel and public health personnel will receive the vaccine first, followed by those who have frontline interaction with the general public.

After that will be workers aged 18-59 years, and people with underlying diseases including chronic respiratory disease, cardiovascular disease, chronic kidney disease, cerebrovascular disease, cancer, diabetes and obesity. The candidates will be selected by doctors by using the hospital databases, Vice Governor Pichet explained.

Among those targetted to not receive the vaccine are patients with "uncontrollable" chronic diseases,

"People with severe neurological conditions and pregnant women should be wary of taking the vaccine, as well as women who are breastfeeding and people with immunodeficiency," he said.

As practiced procedure by medical personnel who will administer the vaccine at the rehearsal last week, after being screening by having their body temperature taken, cleaning their hands with sanitiser and entering the service area, people receiving the vaccine are to follow the following steps:

Step 1 Register

Step 2 Have their weight and blood pressure recorded

Step 3 Pass the screening process: have their history and risk assessment recorded and sign a consent to receive the vaccine

Step 4 Wait for vaccination Step 5 Vaccination

Step 6 Take a break and observe symptoms for 30 minutes. Scan the official Line account "หมอพร้อม" ("Doctor Ready")

Step 7 Pass a final check before receiving a document confirming

Follow-ups to determine and confirm whether people have experienced adverse reactions to the vaccine will be carried out after one day, seven days and 30 days after vaccination, Vice Governor Pichet said.

Appointments will be set for people to receive their second shot of the vaccine, with those receiving the Sinovac vaccine receiving their second shot 2-4 weeks after their first injection, and those receiving the AstraZeneca vaccine receiving their second shot 10-12 weeks after their first injection, he added.

"At this time, we have no information on any other types of vaccine to arrive, so the vaccines administered should be only these two," he said.

Road collapses into Chalong reservoir

LOCAL RESIDENTS HAVE been warned to beware travelling on the road around the Khlong Krata reservoir in Chalong after a large section of road collapsed into the water.

Chalong Municipality has installed a sign warning motorists of one section 35 metres long that has collapsed into the water, some 10 metres below.

The danger area has been marked off with traffic cones and old tyres, for safety.

Local residents pointed out that many sections of the road that circles the reservoir, located behind Luang Pu Supha Temple, have already

fallen into the water, which has not risen.

Some sections of the road show cracks up to 100m long, they pointed out.

If no action is taken, it is only a matter of time before more large sections of the road fall into the water, they said.

"Local villagers have had accidents many times because the road around the reservoir has collapsed," said local resident Wichian Sangsai, 53.

"The responsible agency has come to inspect [the damage], but have not come to make any repairs or improvements at all," he added.

Staff must stay on site during 'villa quarantine'

PHUKET VICE GOVernor Phichet Panapong has explained some of the control measures in place at the Sri Panwa resort, where the island's first travel bubble 'villa quarantine' foreign tourists, who arrived on Sunday (Feb 21), are observing a 14-day quarantine before being allowed to travel freely within Thailand.

The tourists are the first 'villa quarantine' travel bubble tourists to enter the country. The model, if successful, is hoped to be used elsewhere to help reopen the country

The tourists arrived from Indonesia on two flights operated by Indonesian national airline Garuda Indonesia.

In welcoming the tourists, Vice Governor Pichet said that 59 tourists had arrived.

However, according to a report by the Phuket office of the Public Relations Department (PR Phuket), V/ Gov Pichet on Feb 23 said that only 58 foreign tourists were observing the 14-day quarantine at the resort.

No explanation was given for the person no longer counted as a tourist.

Regardless, according to the PR Phuket report, Vice

been well organised and it will be used as an example for other hotels across the country to accept foreign tourists.

"Thank you to all the officers involved for their cooperation in making everything done very quickly, from the identification-checking process, whereby we had received the information before the tourists arrived on the island, all the way through to taking the tourists to the hotel.

"Every procedure [at the airport] was done quickly, including having swab test samples taken at the X-terminal building, which took about only 1.5 minutes each.

Governor Pichet said, "At this All this was completed with the activities undertaken at the stage, the villa quarantine has no obstacles, which meant resort by both staff and guests no instances of people being forced to gather in one area," he added.

> V/Gov Pichet also confirmed that the hotel staff must stay only in the resort area while the tourists are completing their 14-day quarantine.

"They cannot go outside of the location to ensure confidence for all people," he said.

"Accommodation for them has been arranged so they don't contaminate their homes," he added.

"The 92 hotel staff who work in guest service areas also had their body temperature checked and were tested for infection first. They must

also be tested again on March 5 and March 13 as part of the quarantine being provided in the resort," V/Gov Phichet said. Officers from the Phuket

Provincial Health Office (PPHO) are also involved in taking care of the guests and hotel staff there to keep an eye on both tourists and hotel staff, he said.

"They can communicate with health officials via CCTV in case of urgent help," he added.

The PPHO officers will also provide daily reports on

"Hotels and guests who are engaged in activities such as going to the gym, taking a walk or playing beach sports are also recorded so that the correct standards of conduct for these activities can be maintained. The measures used here will be used as the central standard and applied to other places in the future," V/Gov Pichet said.

"I would like to inform you that today's report, for the second day of quarantine, went quite smoothly. The screening results of all arrivals were negative, no infections were found," he said.

Police promise help for family

atong Police Chief Col Sujin Nilabodi has promised to help the family of noodle vendor Aroon Thongplab, who was shot by a drunken off-duty Phuket police officer on Bangla Rd on Tuesday last week (Feb 23).

"At this stage, officers from the Phuket office of the Ministry of Justice have already come to discuss this with us," Col Sujin told reporters at Patong Police Station Tuesday morning (Mar 2).

"If the victim's family asks for any compensation or help, we will file a request to the Ministry of Justice Phuket office so they can provide help and safety for them," he said.

The officer arrested for the shooting, Pornthep Channarong (who was a corporal of the Phuket Provincial Police at the time of the incident), was quickly stripped of his rank and dismissed from the Royal Thai Police.

He now faces an attempted murder charge for shooting 25-year-old Mr Aroon in the stomach just before 6am while Mr Aroon was walking along

noodle bowl from a customer.

Pornthep also faces charges of carrying a firearm in a public area, and discharging a firearm in a public area.

Col Sujin on Tuesday said that he had been informed by the case investigator, Lt Col Kittisak Sommart, that officers were still in the process of compiling evidence and witness statements in order to formally press charges against Pornthep.

"The next step is to questhe street after collecting a tion more witnesses and send the evidence collected to the Central Police Forensic Science Division," he said.

"I assure that we will work straightforwardly and decisively on this case. We will be fair to both sides. We will do our best for this case and will coordinate with relevant officers for helping the family," Col Sujin said.

Col Sujin's assurance of support for Mr Aroon's family came as Kerdphol Kaewkerd, a renowned Bangkok lawyer who has volunteered to help Mr Aroon's wife, Kulthida Chananan, with legal assistance, arrived in Phuket.

Mr Kerdphol on Tuesday said that a key concern was the Phuket Provincial Court approving Pornthep to be released on B600,00 bail. The court granted bail approval last Thursday (Feb 23).

Ms Kulthida, and another lawyer who is volunteering his services, last Saturday (Feb 25) filed an appeal to the court to reconsider its decision.

"The worrying issue is what we can do if the Phuket Provincial Court continues to approve the suspect to post bail," Mr Kerdphol said.

"The bail approval is now under the court's consideration again, even though the investigation police and the victim's family have already filed an appeal with the court to refuse bail," he added.

"At this stage the relatives of the suspect have not presented to the court the surety to post bail. If there is the second request for detention, I want police to again ask for the court to refuse bail.

"The victim's family is worried about their safety, of themselves and of witnesses. If the suspect posts bail, they are afraid he will threaten the witnesses to change their statements about the incident," Mr Kerdphol said.

Regarding the police offer to help, Mr Kerdphol explained, "At this stage, Mr Aroon's condition is still stable. Doctors are treating his lungs and kidneys. Doctors will not operate on his damaged spine [which the bullet hit] because they have to keep him alive as their priority.

"If relatives want to transfer him to a private hospital or a hospital in Bangkok, the Patong Police will file a request to the Royal Thai Police to give assistance," he said.

However, he added, "Doctors have not given any comment whether it is safe for Mr Aroon to be transferred [to any other hospital]."

"In case Mr Aroon does survive, but cannot live his life like before, how do we help him and other members of his family – his wife, sick mother and two children?" Mr Kerdphol posed.

"If police can ensure that they can take care of their safety, they will go back to selling noodles," he said.

"I feel sad for Mr Aroon's two children [a 4-year-old daughter and a 4-month-old son]. How can we help them, if Mr Aroon becomes disabled and his wife cannot work or make enough income for their family?

"They need a huge amount of funds, for living costs, the children's education and for legal processes involved in this case," Mr Kerdphol.

"I may hold a fundraising auction for my gold amulets to help them," he concluded.

Beggars, homeless to receive assistance

PHUKET PROVINCIAL officials are drawing up plans to provide more assistance to the number of destitute people in Phuket turning to begging and those left homeless by the current economic crisis.

Phuket Vice Governor Piyaphong Chuwong raised the issue at a meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall on Feb 25.

The meeting involved a collection of officials working under the name the Phuket Provincial Begging Control Committee, with the goal of providing assistance to homeless people and those begging to get by in the hope of making them self-supporting.

The committee members at the meeting drew up preliminary guidelines of action to be taken and launched what they called the 'beggars welfare project'.

The meeting concluded that the immediate steps to be taken were:

- 1. Establishing information on where beggars live in each community
- 2. Organising a community forum platform through which other people can help improve the quality of life of beggars
- 3. Providing appropriate welfare for families and target groups to meet the needs of work, health, education and

welfare, as well as educating of Begging Act (2016)

4. Following up on beggars' potential development and report their progress

"According to Phuket Provincial Government official statistics, last year Phuket had only four beggars and 163 homeless people registered in the database. Of those, 123 of the homeless were taken into care to stay at the Phuket Mit Maitri Home homeless shelter in Mai Khao. The other 40 people chose not to use the service to stay at Phuket Mit Maitri Home," noted Vice Governor Piyaphong.

Since 2017, only 79 people in Phuket were issued cards officially recognising them as destitute, with 15 of those people issued welfare benefit cards for the poor only last year, he added.

"The action plan has been local people about the Control arranged to develop skills and talents of the [affected] people by implementing a project to promote and support them, through which developing talents and skills is an important issue," V/Gov Piyaphong said.

Government officers will help such people to develop their talents and skills, and help them promote their talents and skills on social media... in the hope they can gain employment and help themselves to make a living, V/Gov Piyaphong added.

"This will be done while officers explain the welfare benefit card for poor people to them, so these people can receive help from the government," he said.



Hanging in the balance

huket Immigration is urging all expats staying on retirement visas whose applications to renew their one-year permit to stay have been refused due to financial reasons to apply for a 60-day "COVID visa" so they can continue to stay in the country.

The issue came to the fore after a retired expat who has been living in Phuket on a retirement visa for nigh on 10 years informed The Phuket News that his application to renew his permit-to-stay for another year had been refused.

The reason given for refusing his application was that he had failed to maintain the B400,000 minimum bank balance in a Thai bank account as required by the conditions



of being approved a one-year 'extension" to his visa.

Phuket Immigration Deputy Chief Lt Col Nareuwat Putthawiro has since confirmed to The Phuket News that the requirements for a one-year permit-to-stay for people on retirement visas have not changed, despite the ongoing crisis brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic.

However, he added, "Foreigners who have financial problems and are unable to

meet the requirements [for renewing their permit-to-stay], please apply for the 'COVID visa', which allows them to stay in the country for 60 days.

"This type of visa is aimed at helping all foreigners staying in Thailand during tough situations like this, both those staying here permanently or just traveling through," Lt Col Nareuwat said.

"Additionally, they can extend the visa many times," he added.

"To apply for the COVID visa, foreigners only have to present their passport and pay the B1,900 fee. Then the officer will have a one-page document for them to fill out their information," Lt Col Nareuwat explained.

"They can also contact the Immigration office to discuss their situation to see what other options there are," he added.

Turtle nest hatches at Patong jet-skis cleared Kata, first in 20 years

total of 29 baby leatherback turtles broke through the sand and made their way into the sea at Kata Beach last Friday night (Feb 26), as a large gathering of well-wishers stood back to watch.

Local residents massed at Kata Beach in high hopes of watching the turtles hatch last Thursday night after the sand above the nest started to collapse earlier in the day.

Marine life experts from the Department of Marine and Coastal Resources (DMCR) last Saturday morning reported that the first turtles surfaced at about 10pm and began making their way to the water's edge.

There were 80 eggs in total in the nest, the marine life officers reported.

In addition to the 29 that made it into the sea, five were taken into care as they were too weak to make the life-starting journey across the sand.

Three of the five baby turtles taken into care were released this morning. The other two will remain in care until they are strong enough to be released, the DMCR officers noted.

Of the 80 eggs, 32 baby turtles did not survive, and a further 14 eggs were not fertilised, the officers confirmed after inspecting the nest.



The laying – and now hatching – of leatherback turtle eggs on Kata Beach is seen as a very positive sign of the return of nature to the island's beaches after years of occupation by visiting tourists.

The nest that hatched last night is the first to be recorded at Kata Beach in more than 20 years.

The eggs are believed to have been laid by a 'supermum' turtle, weighting an estimated 300kg, which marine wildlife experts believe has laid at least five nests in the region, including at Mai Khao Beach at the northern end of the island and at Thai Muang Beach in Phang Nga, just north of Phuket.

The marine officers have named the 'supermum' turtle 'New Year', as she laid the nest on Kata Beach in the first hour of Jan 1.

for legal compliance

A CHECK ON JET-SKI operators at Patong Beach last Friday (Feb 26) found no irregularities, the regional office of the Marine Department, based in Phuket, has announced.

The check came at the order of Nachaphong Pranit, Director of Phang Nga Marine Department office, and who is currently serving as Acting Director of the regional Marine Department office, based in Phuket.

The officers confirmed that the jet-skis offered were legally registered and covered by the mandatory insurance, and the officers checked that the operators used the standard rental agreements when renting out the jet-skis.

Rental prices must be clearly shown and operators must conduct basic safety training to people who rent jet-skis before being allowed to operate the vessels alone, Mr Nachaphong said.

"Life jackets must be put on before using the vessel, for example, and our officers emphasised that jet-ski operators must implement COV-ID-19 screening measures under the New Normal guidelines issued by Phuket

health officials," he added.

Mr Nachaphong said that the checks were being conducted in order to build confidence in safety among tourists who travel to Phuket during their holidays.

"Officers from the Phuket office of the Marine Department will conduct random checks in every area," Mr Nachaphong said.

"If any violations are found, the highest legal proceedings will be taken," he warned.

"Therefore, we remind operators with jet-skis that are no longer fully legally registered to proceed with the renewal of the license and have their jet-skis inspected to make sure they are ready to use, and make sure the jet-skis are covered by Insurance Act as well," he said.

One resident reported seeing someone on his roof. Several roof tiles broke and the man fell to the ground, she added.

"At this stage, we have reported the incident to the police and they are still searching for the man," she said.

Seafood festivals return to attract more domestic tourists to island

he first of three largescale seafood festivals was launched at Saphan Hin last Friday night (Feb 26) in the hope of helping local people make an income by attracting more domestic tourists to the island.

Present for the grand opening was Rawat Areerob, President of the Phuket Provincial Administrative Organisation (PPAO, or OrBorJor), joined by Phuket Vice Governor Pichet Panapong and Phuket City Municipality Chief Administrative Office (Palad) Chalermporn Piyanarongroj.

Mr Chalermporn said that the seafood festivals, launched under the banner "Roi Rim Lay", aimed to not only help vendors at the festival to make an income, but also farmers, producers, food business operators and other businesses.

"Anyone whose incomes have been affected by COVID economic situation," he said.

The Roi Rim Lay festival at Saphan Hin will continue for the days, concluding to-

Chalermporn said.

The festival has 170 stalls, mostly offering renowned local delicacies, but also including vendors offering a wide range of products, he added.

Mr Chalermporn explained.

The festival also includes live music and entertainment, and on-stage performances by local students, he added.

Mr Rewat pointed out Phuket's standing as a tourism destination, and its recognition by Unesco as a City of Gastronomy.

"This gives an opportunity to develop the economy and further investment from the food tourism business in the future," he said.

ID-19 virus has affected the economy of Phuket, the main source of income [in Phuket] is from tourism. Therefore, we must stimulate the economy in Phuket to recover after being affected by the COVID-19 epidemic.

"We sincerely hope that the first local food festival of Phuket, Roi Rim Lay, will help stimulate the economy, strengthen the foundation of the economy, and accelerate spending by people to stimulate purchasing power in the economy of Phuket, which will allow farmers, producers and entrepreneurs to earn more income from this event," he said.

The Roi Rim Lay festival will also be held later in Patong and in Cherng Talay, Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew announced at a launch event held earlier this week, also attended by Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Phuket office Director Nanthasiri Ronnasiri.

VAT lifted on visiting superyacht charters

THE ROYAL THAI Government has removed valued-added tax (VAT) from being levied on all visiting superyacht charters to help support the country's marine industry.

The decision came at a meeting in Bangkok late last Tuesday (Feb 23) chaired by the new Minister of Finance, Arkhom Termpittayapaisith, and attended by officials from both the Customs and Revenue departments.

At the meeting it was finally confirmed that foreignflagged visiting superyachts will from now on be welcome to spend the winter seasons in Thai waters and offer their yachts for charter without having to pay VAT on the value of the vessel.

The meeting marked the culmination of a six-year campaign to bring this allimportant change in the local regulations, and thus finally enable a new 'third destination' for the global fleet and a new 'Superyacht Tourism' industry to boost Thailand's pandemic-challenged tourism economy.

Public registration for vaccine to start in May

embers of the public who are interested in being inoculated against COVID-19 will be able to register in early May, ahead of Thailand's vaccination drive which is set to begin later in June, the government said on Monday (Mar 1).

Registrations will be done on the Mor Prom ("Doctors Ready") app, a new platform that was specifically designed to facilitate the government's vaccination program, Deputy Public Health Minister Sathit Pitutecha said.

According to the deputy minister, a large batch of COVID-19 vaccines from AstraZeneca is due to arrive in June, which will enable the government to cover a greater subset of the population.

"The timing isn't that late especially when compared with other Asean nations," he said.

The first batch of COVID-19 vaccines supplied by China's Sinovac was distributed to 13 provinces that the government considers high-risk areas on Monday. The doses were then administered to eligible priority groups, which include frontline healthcare workers and individuals with underlying health conditions.

In Pathum Thani, 200 people received their first dose of COVID-19 vaccine at Pornpat Market in Thanyaburi district on Monday, which recently made

the headlines after a large number of COVID-19 cases were linked to the market's premises.

The province is aiming to administer the first dose of vaccines to 8,000 healthcare workers, state officers and health volunteers handling COVID-19 cases, individuals with underlying health conditions, as well as vendors at Pornpat and Suchart markets.

Pathum Thani Governor Chaiwat Chuenkosum was the first person in the province to receive the first dose of the vaccine.

In Ratchaburi, the vaccination program began with the province's chief

public health officer, Pachari Arirop. The province received 2,500 doses of Sinovac vaccines. An hour after she was injected, Dr Pachari said she didn't develop any unusual reactions.

Ratchaburi was among the first provinces to first receive COVID-19 vaccines because it neighbours Samut Sakhon, the epicentre of the nation's second wave of COVID-19, she said.

In Bangkok, 130 doctors and healthcare workers were given their first shots of the COVID-19 vaccine on Monday, said Bangkok Governor Aswin Kwanmuang, adding that the city plans to vaccinate 3,700 people in six areas throughout this week.

Prayut defends police over rally

PRIME MINISTER PRAyut Chan-o-cha on Monday (Mar 1) defended the police's handling of the anti-government rally the previous day in front of the 1st Infantry Regiment barracks, King's Guard, insisting crowdcontrol measures were in compliance with international standards.

Riot police from the Metropolitan Police Bureau (MPB) used tear gas and water cannon to block the protesters from approachresidence in the barracks.

They also fired rubber bullets at the protesters during the clash, with MPB commissioner Pol Lt Gen Phukphong Phongpetra admitting that rubber bullets were used to quell violence before the situation spiralled out of control.

In defence of police actions, Gen Prayut said the protesters had advanced into police and restricted areas and assaulted police officers, so officers needed to respond to the situation.

"I insist the crowd-control measures were in accordance with international







With just under five overs left to play and 44 runs needed for victory, Asia's five remaining batsmen could only muster another 35 more runs as Saju Abraham (10) looked to threaten the outcome before Robertson dismissed the Asia tail-ender with a stunning reflex catch off his own bowling.

A determined all-rounder performance including figures of 73 not out and 1 for 50 off seven overs earned Robertson the game's MVP award, with mentions to Bhattacharaya (3 for 59 off six) and Flowers (56 and 2 for 48 off seven).

New UFC deal for Loma, next opponent confirmed

¬hailand's first and only Thai fighter in the Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC) will remain with the promotion after signing a contract extension last week.

Phuket-based fighter Loma Lookboonmee recently announced the signing of her extension in a social media post. Not long after, news broke online of her next opponent. Loma (5 wins, 2 losses) is scheduled to take on America's Sam Hughes (also 5-2) on May 1 at UFC Fight Night in Las Vegas, Nevada.

The fight will be Loma's fourth in the premier promotion, and she will be looking to extend her winning streak to two. Loma's last battle in the Octagon was a unanimous decision victory over former Invicta Atomweight champion Jinh Yu Frey in October last year. In that fight, Loma displayed a significantly improved arsenal of attacks, including her grappling, while picking off strikes seemingly at will.

UFC officials were impressed enough with the victory, coupled with improvements in her game, to offer Loma another slate of fights for the promotion.

It's a decision that the Buriram native and Tiger Muay Thai and MMA Train-



ing Camp is ecstatic to accept, given her status as Thailand's lone UFC fighter and the struggles of fighting, training, and travelling during the worldwide COVID pandemic.

"I'm looking forward to getting back in the cage and continuing my journey as a mixed martial artist," Loma said in an Instagram post announcing the contract extension.

At 25-years-old, Loma has already been fighting for over 17 years, having stepped into her first professional Muay Thai bout at the age of 8 through her father's gym, Boonmee Sithemarat, a Lumpinee and Rajadamern stadium

veteran. In a career that spanned over 200 Muay Thai fights, and multiple world titles, Loma is looking to become a force in MMA, while also putting her country on the combat sports map.

"I believe we will see more Thais in the UFC," said George Hickman, the head MMA coach at Tiger Muay Thai and MMA Training Camp in Chalong.

"I don't think the rest of the world really understands without coming here, that it's such a rich culture, and history of fighting. It's important that, not just Thai people, but the next generation understands what MMA is and realise that it can be very impactful for their lives."

THAILAND'S NATIONAL sport has been confirmed on the official medal program for the 2023 European Games in Poland, the International Federation of Muay Thai Associations (IFMA) confirmed last Friday (Feb 26).

The IFMA is recognised by the IOC as the world governing body for the sport, made up of 146 member National Federations, working united towards promoting Muay Thai as a way of life.

"This is a historical day for Muay Thai and most importantly, for the athletes of Europe to be part of this important continental multisport event governed by the European Olympic Committee," said Chair of the IFMA Athletes' Commission Janice

"This step forward gives the athletes and the youth a chance to be a part of the Olympic Dream and embody the Olympic Values of Excellence, Friendship and Respect," she added.


