DAY 1 OF NEW ENTRY MEASURES SPURS HOPES OF TOURISM REVIVAL

opes are riding high for finally a serious turnaround in Lthe number of international tourists coming to the island following the eased restrictions for entry to

the country brought into effect last

Sunday (May 1). Under the new measures vaccinated tourists no longer need to be tested before departure or after landing in Phuket. Unvaccinated travellers who test negative for COVID-19 within 72 hours of departure will also be allowed to roam free after landing

without being tested. However, all arrivals must still first register via the Thailand Pass system to be issued a permit to enter

the country and unvaccinated travellers who cannot prove they tested negative within 72 hours of departure will must still observe five days' quarantine and test negative before being released.

An estimated 4,400 international arrivals landed in Phuket last Sunday (May 1), the first day under the new entry measures. The number of arrivals on that day alone was already nearly double the daily average for the previous few months, which regularly struggled to see more than 2,000 arrivals a day in Phuket, including Thais returning home, expats and even transit passengers.

The number of foreign tourists coming to Phuket is expected to continue to rise, said Monchai Tanode, General Manager of Phuket international Airport (AoT Phuket). noted. "It is particularly busy," one

Mr Manode was on hand to welcome the 324 arrivals who landed at Phuket airport at 6:55am on Qatar inspection of all the locations where Airways Flight QR842 – the first flight to arrive under the new entry measures.

"On average there are about 27 international inbound flights per day already scheduled for this month," said Mr Manode.

"This is the first day of the change in entry rules, and we have both domestic and international passengers arriving continuously," he said.

"After this the number of tourists travelling to Phuket is expected to be no less than 5,000 people a day," Mr Manode said.

The atmosphere inside the arrivals hall had noticeably improved, officials officer said.

Mr Manode also conducted a final arrivals are processed for entry, including Immigration, Customs and the Thailand Pass counter, where entry documents are checked.

"Everything is in good order. The whole process has been made simpler and it is much more convenient for tourists," he said.

Phuket Quarantine officials at the airport confirmed that the last person to enter Phuket under the Test & Go entry measures, now scrapped, was cleared by officials to leave the airport just before midnight last Saturday night.

Lost and found A 68-YEAR-OLD AMERICAN MAN LOST in the hills behind Naithon Beach last Friday

Lt Col Ekachai Siri of the Phuket Tourist Police said officers at Sakhu Police Station notified the Tourist Police of the missing man, William Ernest Nehrer, at about 5pm.

(Apr 29) was later found safe.

Officers gathered at the Pearl of Naithon hotel, where they were told that Mr Nehrer had gone for a walk in the Khuan Naithon forest but had failed to return. Mr Nehrer was last seen at 3:20pm.

Tourist Police, along with officials from the Tourist Assistance Center (TAC) and local residents, organised two teams to scour the jungle trails in the protected park area to search for Mr Nehrer.

He was found safe at about 6:20pm, Lt Col Ekachai reported.

"He was treated for some minor scratches from branches then escorted out of the area and safely returned to his accommodation," he said.

A grateful Mr Nehrer thanked the officers and other members of the search parties for their help. "I'm very glad to meet you guys," he said.

enues operating as restaurants may now legally serve alcohol until midnight under a new provincial order issued by Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew last Friday (Apr 29).

The easing of the early closing time, previously 11pm, came in Phuket Province Order No. 282/2565, marked "Relaxation of closing measures for places and activities that are at risk of spreading disease".

The order was signed by Governor Narong as in effect from last Friday (Apr 29).

The new provincial order confirmed the easing of a wide range of restrictions, confirming Governor Narong's announcement on Apr 26 that officials were preparing to ease regulations under what has been called conditions under 'endemic COVID-19'.

Under the new order all venues still technically considered as



COVID restrictions eased

entertainment venues must remain closed, a rule still mandated by the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA) in Bangkok that Governor Narong has no authority to overrule.

However, venues operating as "restaurants", which pubs and bars may open as under special registration, are now allowed to remain open until midnight.

Such "restaurants" must comply with SHA+ or Thai Stop COVID 2 Plus guidelines, and must enforce the COVID Free Setting measures, the order confirmed.

Meanwhile, all large gatherings of people may now be held "as appropriate", as long as the organisers hold the activity in accordance with the COVID Free Setting measures for the

event specified.

The activities identified as now all allowed under the COVID Free Setting measures were meetings, seminars, concerts, music performances, events, festivals, operating of department stores, shopping centers, community malls, the holding of trade fairs, exhibitions, fresh markets, flea markets, walking streets, and "any other activities".

Sports events and places of exercise and training may now continue to operate, again in accordance with COVID Free Setting measures for the activity or venue specified.

"The opening of operations for activities of cockfighting, fish fighting, horse racing, bull fighting, boxing and bird racing can be opened with permission from the authorised person under the Gambling Act, B.E. 1935 and follow the safety measures for the organization (COVID Free Setting) in accordance with the guidelines. of places and activities as prescribed by the Ministry of Interior," the order noted.

Businesses and other organisations were urged to arrange staff to work from home where appropriate, and officials were ordered to enforce the regulations in their respective areas

The order included the standard warnings and penalties for breaches of orders implemented under the Emergency Decree.

...Test & Go entry schemes since Nov 1, when the Test & Go scheme was launched, totalled 500,555, Phuket Quarantine officials said.

The new entry requirements are a sendoff for the Test & Go scheme, which was lauded to bring much economic relief to the battered tourism industry, but failed to deliver on those promises.

As repeated by Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew last week, Phuket's tourism income was crushed by the COVID-prevention policies. Tourism revenues for the island plunged by 96%.

The only average income figure recthe pandemic is B1,900 per person per month, announced mid-last year. Although not confirmed officially, that figure is very likely to have increased, but not by much.

The government is hoping to see air travel soar following the lifting of the Test & Go requirements, with double the number of take-offs and landings at the country's airports by the end of this year, reported the Bangkok Post.

The Civil Aviation Authority of Thailand (CAAT) expects 83,500 flights per month at all airports by year's end, up from 44,500 at present, following the easing of COVID-19 restrictions, government spokeswoman Traisuree Taisaranakul said on Monday.

Significant jumps are expected in both international and domestic flights, she added.

The Test & Go entry requirements were lifted on Sunday (May 1) in a bid to woo

Boy, 8, bitten by shark

r Kongkiat Kittiwattanawong, Director of the Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) and the leading marine biologist on the island, on Monday (May 2) supported the view that an 8-year-old boy injured at Kamala Beach last Sunday (May 1) was bitten by a shark.

The boy injured was Naphat Chaiyarak Khrystenko, a Thai child with a Ukrainian father and Thai mother who all live together in Phuket.

Rescue workers arrived at the beach soon after 4:30pm and administered first aid for the deep lacerations to Naphat's lower right leg. He was then rushed first to Patong Hospital, then referred to Bangkok Hospital Phuket.

Naphat's injuries were serious wounds, requiring more than 30 stitches.

Naphat was bitten in the water in front of Kamala Police Station. He was some 100 metres from shore, but still in water only one metre deep

"Initially, we suspected that the injury was caused by one of two types of sharks found in the area: bull sharks

and the blacktip sharks, which we find around Kamala Beach," Dr Kongkiat, who has studied marine life in the Phuket region for decades, said on Monday.

"But, in the opinion of David Martin, an underwater photographer and shark expert, it's very unlikely to have been a blacktip shark due to the nature of the attack being very violent. The injuries are believed to be caused by a bull shark," he said.

"However, we cannot confirm exactly which species it is, but the wounds were definitely caused by a shark, because the scene of the incident is not known for barracuda.

"Specifically, the wound was caused by a shark as both upper and lower teeth were used in combination. It was a sharp wound on both sides and had both upper and lower teeth snapped at the same time. Therefore, it corresponds to the nature of the wound caused by sharks," Dr Kongkiat said.

"In addition, the scene of the incident was a 'stationary zone' where sharks were active. The incident was most likely caused by the movement of the injured [boy] in the cloudy water.

"The shark then came in for food, and thought it was

food, therefore biting the injured leg. But when it took a bite it found that it was not food and therefore did not attack again.

"Also, it's very rare that something like this happens," Dr Kongkiat said.

Dr Kongkiat explained his opinion to the press on Monday when David Martin and Phuket Vice Governor Pichet Panapong met with Naphat.

David Martin first gave his opinion that the bites were inflicted by a shark on Sunday, dismissing initial claims that the bites were caused by a barracuda.

Vice Governor Pichet explained that as Naphat and his parents were not tourists, they would not be entitled to some extra assistance, as is provided to international visitors.

"As for which marine animal attacked the child, academics and experts are the ones to make the best analysis," V/Gov Pichet added.

"Beach guards have been instructed to pay particular attention when supervising tourists' swimming in the sea. At the same time, warning signs and towers must be placed to watch over tourists," V/Gov Pichet said.

Taxi driver under investigation for alleged sex assault

A PHUKET TAXI DRIVER has been called in for questioning for inappropriately touching the thigh of a 15-year-old Australian girl at a popular shopping mall in central Phuket.

The girl's father filed a complaint at Cherng Talay Police Station last Saturday (Apr 30), officers confirmed.

The incident occurred at the parking lot of Central Festival shopping mall in Wichit on Friday (Apr 29), said the complaint.

The girl and her father were staying at a resort in Cherng Talay, but had to

fly home to Australia on Saturday (Apr 30).

The daughter was unable to remember the taxi's licence plates, but officers called in one driver for questioning at Cherng Talay Police Station last Sunday night (May 1).

No details of the driver were released, but police have confirmed that no charges have been pressed as yet while police continue their investigation.

Tourist Police are assisting with the investigation, officers confirmed.

Officials give electric scooters a test ride

PHUKET OFFICIALS HAVE APPROVED the use of electric scooters at the Phuket Provincial Hall complex on the south side of Phuket Town as a test phase to confirm how safe the "micro-mobility" vehicles are to use.

The approval was announced at Provincial Hall on Apr 27 during a visit by representatives from Beam Mobility (Thailand) Co Ltd, which earlier this year was renting out electric scooters to tourists in Patong and other tourist-popular areas.

At the announcement on Apr 27 Beam Mobility Managing Director Jeff Payne led the handing over of two electric scooters for use by officials.

Present to receive the scooters on behalf of Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew was Kanathip Sukcharoen, Head of the Phuket Provincial Office.

The scooters will be used in security operations around the Phuket Provincial Hall complex, also called the "Phuket Government Center", and for conducting inspections of construction at the site.

The scooters are to be at the Phuket Government Center for a period of 10 months. The scooters will be set up with a computer system to ensure that they are used within the government compound only, and not on public streets.

In February, Phuket police banned electric scooters from all public roads in Phuket.

People caught riding electric scooters on public roads may be fined up to B10,000 following an order issued by Phuket Provin-



cial Police Commander Maj Gen Sermphan Sirikong.

People caught riding electric scooters on public roads also could be charged with operating a vehicle without a valid licence under Section 64 of the same act, as no licence exists for operating electric scooters, as they are not recognised as vehicles by the Department of Land Transport and hence cannot be registered, Maj Gen Sermphan said in the order.

The penalty for operating a vehicle without a licence is up to six months' imprisonment or a fine of up to B9,000, or both, Maj Gen Sermphan added.

Raids net 9kg of 'ice', 54k meth pills

olice have seized more than 9kg of crystal meth (ya ice) and more than 54,000 methamphetamine pills (ya bah) in separate raids in Chalong and Cherng Talay.

A Thalang Police operation saw Worakorn 'Jay' Phisan, 36, of Moo 1, Srisoonthorn, arrested at the parking lot behind the HomePro store in Moo 8, Chalong, said a report released by Thalang Police on Apr 28.

The operation was led by Acting Capt* Supapot La-ongsakul of the Thalang Police, noted the report, which credited the operation to no less than 10 senior officers, including Phuket Provincial Police Commander Sermphan Sirikong.

After placing Worakorn under arrest, subsequent raids of two homes in Moo 5, Srisoonthorn found Worakorn in possession of a "Thai-made" firearm with a four-inch-long barrel made to fire .38 bullets.

Officers also seized 5.494kg of ya ice, 40,400 ya bah pills and 70 tablets of ecstasy.

The report marked that officers also seized two ammunition magazines,



one of which was loaded with seven .38 bullets. Officers also separately seized as evidence nine .22 bullets.

The paraphernalia seized in the raids included two digital scales, two wooden cabinets that required a key card to open, and the key card to open them, as well as a book containing records of drug transactions, an assortment of plastic bags and a Samsung mobile phone.

Workaorn was placed under arrest and charged with possession of a Category 1 narcotic (amphetamine, ice and ecstasy) with intent to sell, possession of an illegal firearm and illegal possession of ammunition, the report noted.

Meanwhile in Cherng Talay, officers led by Lt Col Phit Thongto of the Phuket Provincial Police seized 3.534kg of ya ice and 14,000 tablets of ya bah in a separate raid.

The drugs were seized after four people were placed under arrest outside a house near a transport company office in Soi Khoktanode 10, Moo 6, Cherng Talay, said a separate report issued by Phuket Provincial Police.

The four were named as Pongphat 'Nad' Puttharaksa, 24, and Nuttawut 'Boy' Klongsurin, 28, both living in Moo 6, Cherng Talay, along with Miss Yanin 'Kik' Nuchaikong, 26, from Uttaradit province and Ms Patcharin 'Pop' Boonyam, 28, from Kantang District in Trang province.

In placing the four under arrest officers seized as evidence a Phuket-registered Honda Wave 110i motorbike valued at about B20,000, said the report.

The four were taken into custody and charged with possession of a Category 1 narcotic with intent to sell, the report confirmed.

Back in Chalong, a 59-year-old man from Sisaket Province was arrested in Soi Ta-iad.

Roongruang 'Dee' Patikbutr was arrested in front of the All Time House rented room accommodation. A search of his room found him in possession of 24 ya bah pills.

Roongruang was taken to Chalong Police Station and charged with possession of a Category 1 narcotic with intent to sell, the report confirmed.

Norwegian expat, 76, rescued from fire, beloved dog dies

A 76-YEAR-OLD NORWEGIAN expat was rescued from a house fire at the Phuket Villa Chaofah 2 housing estate in Wichit in the early hours of Monday morning (May 2).

Lt Col Supotpong Chuaidu of Wichit Police was informed of the fire, in Soi 3/2 of Phase 2 at the housing estate, at 4:30am.

Wichit Municipality firefighters and emergency medical units quickly arrived to find thick smoke billowing out of the home.

They were told by local residents that one person, Norwegian man Knut Olsen, was still trapped in the house. Local residents had tried to rescue him but were unable to due to the thick smoke throughout the home.

Rescue workers entered the home and safely brought Mr Olsen out to safety. He was unconscious but breathing unassisted. Firefighters believe Mr Olsen was rendered unconscious by the smoke while he was still sleeping alone in the

Mr Olsen was administered then transported to Dibuk Hospital. Firefighters found Mr Olsen's



full-grown poodle, a female, inside the home. The dog, which neighbours said Mr Olsen was very fond of, had died from smoke inhalation.

It appeared that the fire started from the air-conditioning unit, then spread to the ceiling of the home, causing the thick smoke, firefighters reported.

Local resident Phawika Prasert, 39, said that neighbours were alerted to the fire by a loud noise from the air-conditioning unit.

"The house was thick with smoke, but there were no flames," Ms Phawika said.

Neighbours had rushed into the home to try to get Mr Olsen to safety, Ms Phawika said.

"But we did not know which emergency first aid at the scene room he was in because the smoke was so thick," she added.

Driver fined for obstructing ambulance

THE DRIVER OF A BMW SEDAN that obstructed an ambulance while transporting a seriously injured woman to Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town last week has presented himself to police and been fined for the transgression

The driver, named by police only as "Mr Thamrong" (family name not revealed), presented himself at Phuket City Police Station last Saturday (Apr 30), confirmed Phuket City Police Chief Col Sarawut Chuprasit.

Mr Thamrong confirmed he was driving the BMW on Apr 28 when it was filmed by the ambulance crew driving intentionally slow and erratically braking, preventing the ambulance from continuing its journey to the hospital. A video of the incident was posted online, stirring outrage among viewers.

Mr Thamrong said he did not hear the ambulance because he was "old and deaf", Col Sarawut explained in his notice released last Saturday.

Col Sarawut did not confirm how old Mr Thamrong is or give any explanation as to why Mr Thamrong did not notice the ambulance with flashing lights behind him all throughout the time that the BMW was filmed preventing the ambulance from passing.

Col Sarawut did confirm that Mr Sarawut was fined B500, the maximum fine that can be levied under

Section 74 of the Traffic Act.

Col Sarawut in his notice called for all motorists to give way to all emergency vehicles, especially when they are flashing their warning lights and sounding their siren.

In his six-point explanation, Col Sarawut called for drivers to pull over to the left when safe to do so to allow emergency vehicles to pass. If in traffic, the driver will have to choose which is the best way to get out of the emergency vehicle's way, he added.

Col Sarawut noted that although the maximum fine under the law for obstructing an emergency vehicle is only B500, if the failure to do so results in grave consequences, the driver may face much more serious charges.

In the event that it is later found that the patient in the ambulance dies because the ambulance was intentionally obstructed, the driver may even face a manslaughter charge, he said.

DSI chief inspects claims Jurin promises more to B50bn beachfront land

raiyarit Temhiwong, Director-General of the L Department of Special Investigation (DSI), on Monday (May 2) inspected 178 rai of beachfront land at Layan Beach with an estimated value of about B50 billion that has remained occupied by claimants despite an order by the Supreme Court to vacate their plots.

Considering the complicated history of the claims to the land, which involves some three kilometres of pristine beachfront, the DSI had taken up an investigation of the claims to the land as a special case, said Mr Traiyarit.

At a meeting with Manoch Punchalad, the newly elected Chief of Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organisation (OrBorTor), Mr Manoch explained that the government had been fending off claims to the land for 30 years, stating: "It has been a struggle."

In total nine claimants have refused to recognise their claims to the land dismissed by the Lands Department in

In dismissing the claims the Lands Department "revoked" illegally issued land title papers the claimants had presented as evidence of the claims, he explained.

Six of the nine filed official objections to the decision. three did not contest losing their claims.

"In handing down its decision against claims by two parties, the Supreme Court ruled first in 2015 and again 2017 that all 178 rai of land is state land. In its determination, the Supreme Court estimated the land to be worth B50 billion," Mr Manoch said.

Mr Traiyarit warned that any persons found still trespassing on government land would face prosecution.

"There are many [land] cases in Phuket, but we are paying a lot of attention to this case because other cases are now moving forward. Many cases are in the process of prosecution," he said.

Already 10 cases of land claims in Phuket have been forwarded to the National Counter Corruption Commission (NACC), Mr Traiyarit

"There's probably a lot more to try and keep an eye on," he added.

Phuket has gained a notorious reputation for land title documents being illegally issued by officials, much of which has been blamed on Tawatchai Anukul, who was the Phuket Land Office Chief in 2003.

After 13 years on the run, Tawatchai was finally arrested in 2016.

However, within hours of his arrest he was found hanged in his cell at the DSI headquarters in Bangkok.

homes for sea gypsies

DEPUTY PRIME MINISTER and Minister of Commerce Jurin Laksanawisit has vowed to provide more housing for sea gypsies in Phuket and other Andaman provinces.

The promise came last Friday (Apr 29) during a visit to the Moken sea gypsy village in Mai Khao, where Mr Jurin said the government's goal was to enhance the quality of life among the region's native inhabitants by providing "Stable Houses - Sufficiency Homes".

The goal is to provide 26,164 houses for sea gypsies in the Andaman region within the next five years, Mr Jurin

Mr Jurin said that the ongoing project to provide homes to indigenous peoples nationwide had seen 120,000 houses provided in the past 10 years. The overall goal is to provide 1 million houses.

Only in the six Andaman provinces of Ranong, Phang Nga, Phuket, Krabi, Trang and Satun have specific goals set for the number of homes to be provided in the next five years. The breakdown by province was: Ranong 2,376 houses, Phang Nga 4,930 houses, Phuket 2,241 houses, Krabi



6,260 houses, Trang 5,470 houses and Satun 4887 houses.

"A total of 17,000 houses were built nationwide in 2020, and a further 24,000 houses in 2021. This year a further 27,000 houses will be built, giving a total of 68,000 houses provided over three years," he said.

"We're here to help solve the problems of those of us who don't have a home, don't own land or rent a dilapidated house," Mr Jurin said.

"The Ministry of Social Development and Human Security and the Community Organizations Development Institute [CODI] will help to make roads and provide electricity and water supply and other utilities to such areas, and help secure loans for houses so that the home will finally belong to our brothers and sisters. They will be able to live on state land without being prosecuted," he added.

Time to pay the

uring the height of COVID-19 restrictions, many small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) applied for "soft loans" from both banks and government agencies alike. The various SME loan initiatives were introduced in late 2020 with the aim of providing businesses with easy access to emergency funding during the first wave of the pandemic.

In Thailand, over US\$15 billion (B515.887bn) in loans were handed out at interest rates varying from 2% to 4% which were absorbed by the Thai government for six months for SMEs. Over a million companies are said to have made use of the initiative.

By the time applications were closed to new borrowers in 2021, the number of companies that took out COVID-19 loans ballooned to over 2 million, meaning there are now over US\$25 billion of soft loans that need to be paid off in the coming years as the virus approaches endemic status.

These soft loans were a



lifeline for many businesses at the height of the pandemic, but they have started mounting additional financial burdens as repayments intensify as yet another monthly outgoing to already stretched cash flows.

While many businesses have hoped that such assistance would help them survive the pandemic, many have found that they have yet to experience full recovery, if at all. There are fears that more than half of those who took out these support loans will be unable to repay them.

Admittedly, repaying these loans will be difficult given the uneven economic recovery. Nonetheless, it is crucial for struggling businesses to seek

help and advice if they experience difficulties keeping up with repayments before their accounts are classified as nonperforming loans. Once loans have been reclassified as nonperforming, businesses will find it very difficult to secure future financing and may even risk being put through increasingly aggressive collection procedures employed by collection agencies and other third parties.

HOW THE COVID-19 LOANS WORK

Strategising how one can overcome difficulties repaying COVID-19 loans requires an understanding of what they entail. As a minimum,

directors need to understand whether they themselves have any obligations or are personally liable for the loans if their company is unable to meet the agreed repayments. In most cases, loans for supporting SMEs during COVID-19 did not require directors to take on any personal liability; however, it is prudent to ensure that this is clear before taking further action.

That said, businesses that still find themselves in a distressed state and unable to repay their loans should consider renegotiating the terms of their loans with their creditors to free up necessary cash flow. The possibility of pursuing this option would be more likely

if the business is considered viable or high potential as it would signal eventual recovery and growth in the future. In some cases, it may also be possible to write off a portion of the loan depending on the circumstances of the company.

When renegotiating, one

of the options that distressed companies may consider is extending the repayment terms of their loans, though certain thought must be taken with regard to possible financial implications, including personal guarantees and mortgaging of assets. While financial institutions were initially encouraged to take a compassionate stance amid the pandemic, the government is facing significant pressure to ensure as much of the funds disbursed to distressed SMEs are recovered as possible. This means it is possible that banks and other financial institutions will begin taking a harder stance on those who attempt to close a company or flee Thailand with outstanding loans, and legislation can trigger civil and criminal investigations into companies that successfully manage to leave an unpaid balance.

Companies should also consider how they used their COVID-19 loans given that they were disbursed to help businesses survive the impact of the pandemic. Companies were generally given freedom to use the loans in whatever way would help their company survive, whether it was paying rent, overheads, or their tax obligations. Using these funds on frivolity, or even to maintain the lifestyles of certain directors or key personnel, may incur severe penalties.

Of course, these are simply general options companies can take when strategising how to repay their COVID-19 loans. However, solutions will ultimately be contingent on the circumstances faced by each individual company in distress. Therefore, it is prudent to seek expert advice before loans go into default where options are significantly worse.

Thailand Pass stays for now, but in 'faster form'

he government has said it has not cancelled the Thailand Pass registration requirement for foreign travellers yet but it will be made more convenient and quicker to obtain.

Dr Sumanee Wacharasint, assistant spokeswoman for the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA), said the requirement will be retained but the procedure will be streamlined for smoother ease of entry into the country.

"The procedure involves checking vaccination certificates, proof of hotel bookings, insurance documents, and documents for booking RT-PCR tests upon arrival," said Dr Sumanee.

The Test & Go entry scheme was cancelled last Sunday (May 1), meaning there is no longer any need for bookings for alternative quarantine (AQ) hotels and RT-PCR tests, which will facilitate faster Thailand Pass registration. Vaccination certificates take less time to check than book-

ings, Dr Sumanee said.

"Therefore, Thailand Pass registration has remained in place, and there should be no problems from May 1. But the CCSA will monitor the situation regularly. If the situation improves, a further easing of entry rules is expected to follow."

Deputy Prime Minister and Public Health Minister Anutin Charnvirakul added that the government will consider where they will scrap antigen testing and Thailand Pass registration requirements for foreign visitors once data from the cancellation of the Test & Go entry scheme and RT-PCR tests upon arrival

has been reviewed.

The Test & Go and Sandbox schemes ended on Sunday for vaccinated travellers, replaced by a "no quarantine" programme. RT-PCR testing is no longer required and COVID-19 insurance is reduced from US\$20,000 (B685,000) to \$10,000.

The unvaccinated are now welcome if they present proof of a negative RT-PCR test no more than 72 hours before their trip; but they must be quarantined for five days, with another RT-PCR test on day 4 or 5, and travellers are also advised to self-administer antigen tests during their stay.

TOURISM FEE OF B300 SET FOR Q3

Meanwhile, it has been confirmed the B300 tourism fee is scheduled to begin being collected between August and September this year using the Thailand Tourism Fee (TTF) system implemented by airlines.

Chote Trachu, permanent secretary of the Tourism and Sports Ministry, said last Friday (Apr 29) the fee is meant to help tourists in case of emergency, such as a sudden sickness, accident or political unrest while travelling in Thailand.

He further explained the TTF system will integrate with airlines' websites to display an additional screen for fee collection for foreign passport holders. The TTF system activates 30-day insurance coverage for tourists once they arrive.

People exempt from the tourism fee collection include diplomats, government officials, people with work permits from nationalities under a memorandum of understanding with Thailand, and children under 2 years old.



COVID-19 wards start to close

SEVERAL HOSPITALS have begun closing their COV-ID-19 wards as the number of virus-linked admissions has fallen, according to the Department of Medical Services.

That is because most COVID-19 patients are now receiving care at home for mild symptoms, said Dr Somsak Akksilp, director-general of the department, on Monday (May 2).

"With this decreased work-load in handling COVID-19 patients, it's time for hospitals to return healthcare resources to other departments that need them more," he said.

Dr Naronglit Masayaanon, deputy dean of the Faculty of Medicine at Mahidol University, meanwhile, said Ramathibodi Hospital is resuming its normal operation timetable after many were delayed while priority was given to COVID-19 patients. Lerdsin Hospital, too, is scaling back and will stop admitting COVID-19 cases to its field unit which currently only has 30-40 of its 200 beds filled, said Dr Somsak.

He noted that the field hospital was set up to treat up to 200 patients.

"New COVID-19 patients who come to this field hospital are therefore transferred to a hospital where they actually have the right to free healthcare services," he said.

"[Lerdsin Hospital] now expects to, in about a week or two, resume its normal operations as before [the COVID-19 pandemic began],"

Moreover, he said the close monitoring of coronavirus strains will continue after recent detections of new subvariants abroad.

"Guidelines on the prevention and treatment of COVID-19 in the event the disease becomes recognised as endemic are currently being drafted," he said. *Bangkok Post*

am sitting in the lovely We Café by Rawai Beach enjoying a healthy salad lunch with one of the most remarkable cyclists I've ever met... hell, he's one of the most remarkable humans I've ever met!

Mark Stevenson recently completed an epic bicycle ride from the north of Thailand to Phuket over the previous two months. He cycled thousands of kilometres, across mountains, past rivers, rice paddies, small town markets, big cities, ancient monuments and modern tourism infrastructure. He cycled the terrifying mountain ride from Chiang Mai to Pai and Mae Hong Song, the so-called "road of three thousand turns". He has cycled on previous trips through Cambodia and Vietnam and down the Mekong, covering mammoth rides that few cyclists can even imagine, never mind contemplate actually achieving.

Even more incredibly, Mark is a hunk of cycling iron aged 68 no less! At an age when most men are looking for their slippers, so they can potter around their geraniums, Mark is out there pushing hard pedals in Asia's often brutal heat for up to 10 hours a day. If all this weren't enough, Mark is also the survivor of not just one, but TWO liver transplants... one of a tiny handful of



humans on this planet who can make that stunning claim to immortality.

As I sit with this incredible man, who is as gentle, kind and congenial a lunching companion as you could imagine, it's hard not to feel in awe of his sheer will power, strength of character and immense physical courage. His is a sensationally inspirational story of conquering the most horrendous pain and suffering that life's outrageous fortune can impose.

Mark's incredible journey started not in the far north of Thailand, but many years before. Born in Liverpool in 1954, he grew up in Southport in the tough northwest of England, where Mark's rebellious early years were associated with drug abuse and vio-

lence, resulting in numerous custodial sentences. By the age of 25, this selfconfessed 'bad boy', had learned one of life's important lessons, indeed what most people take for granted, that is the true value of freedom. He became very aware that he had to escape his current environment to continue his freedom. In his twenties, Mark's strong character and determination started to shine through and he straightened himself out and started working hard in construction, where his natural strength and determination were great assets in building a successful career.

He emigrated to the lovely city of Cape Town in South Africa and ended up owning and running a construction company there. Adult life had become sweet, until a legacy from Mark's misspent youth caught up with him. Unbeknownst to him, Mark had contracted hepatitis-C from a dirty needle in his teens. In 2010, aged 56, he started feeling very tired and went for tests at Cape Town's famous Groote Schuur Hospital. The prognosis could not have been worse!

Mark was told his liver had a cancerous tumour which was inoperable and he would be lucky if he lived for another 18 months. He decided to return to England and was fortunate enough to be asked if he would take part in a research project testing new drug therapies to reduce the size of cancerous tumours. With nothing to lose, he joined the ground-breaking research and was very fortunate to learn that the therapy had indeed shrunk the tumour in his liver to a size where it became possible to receive a transplant, IF a suitable liver became available.

In 2013, after several false starts, a donated liver was finally procured and a seven-hour operation saw Mark receive the transplant, and became one of a handful of lucky survivors of this difficult medical process.

Mark had visited Thailand several times before his transplant and had become fascinated by Buddhism and meditation. He returned to Cape Town and these spiritual practices, combined with running up Table Mountain, plus gym and cycle-training sessions, became the pillars of Mark's strongwilled endeavour to re-build himself.

Tragically, Mark's new liver failed after only 18 months and in 2015, the same surgeon at Groote Schuur Hospital told him that his new liver was dead and that he should fly back to the UK that very evening in preparation for the worst. Full of medication, Mark arrived back at the famous Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham where he had received his first transplant, for a nail-biting three-month wait until finally another liver became available.

Just 25 months after his first transplant, Mark became one of the almost unique humans on this planet to have undergone two successful liver transplants.


Sitting with Mark at We Café in Rawai after his tremendous cycle trip from Thailand's north, and his even more mind-blowing life's journey, I asked him how he now felt about all that has happened in his extraordi-

Mark emphasised that he is essentially a recreational cyclist who has now come to view these long trips as an extended meditation on the beauty and calm of being outdoors. He gave great credit to his Thai partner, Khun On, who encouraged and accompanied him on his epic rides, despite never having ridden before!

Mark spoke with immense passion and insight about the profound gratitude he now has just to be ... here... now... alive.

Mark's incredible life, in which he has twice faced then escaped death, makes his personal appreciation of this powerful piece of wisdom unique. It is, I believe, a wisdom we should all try to comprehend and make our own.

Season on the line for Lewis

Crucial race for seven-time champ in first ever Miami Grand Prix

The sold-out Miami Grand Prix this weekend (May 6-8) promises to be a week-long party, but there'll be no celebrating for Mercedes in a crunch two weeks for its title defence.

It's rare to see genuine bewilderment written on Lewis Hamilton's face, but his sense of shell shock at the end of the Emilia-Romagna Grand Prix was palpable.

He'd just trailed home 13th, his worst result on pure pace in 13 years, counting way back to 2009 when he was driving an underdeveloped McLaren.

The entire weekend had been poor for Mercedes. Both he and teammate George Russell were knocked out of qualifying in the bottom 10 and made up no ground in the sprint, and though a great start from Russell and a slice of good luck catapulted him to fourth at the flag, there was no misrepresenting how uncompetitive the Mercedes



W13 was at the classic Italian circuit.

A little wild-eyed as he stepped out of the car, Hamilton was almost lost for words at first before he found the most difficult ones to say to express his current predicament.

"I'm out of the championship for sure. There's no question about that."

Just four races into a 23race season and the seven-time champion had written off his chances – and those of his Mercedes team, the reigning constructors champion.

How did things go so badly

'PORPOISING'

The Mercedes car is a difficult beast to wrangle. The era's most dominant team has gambled big on an extreme aerodynamic design – the car has essentially no sidepods, a stark departure from every other machine on the grid – but so far it's not paying off.

Instead the W13 is difficult and unpredictable to drive. Worse, it's the most badly affected by 'porpoising' – the bouncing up and

down on its suspension – as the aerodynamic floor stalls as it touches the ground at high speed and then reloads as the car rises back up.

While some teams have managed to dial out the bouncing and others have incorporated it into their performance envelope - Ferrari's SF-75 is among the more enthusiastic bouncers on the grid – none is experiencing worse porpoising than Mercedes. Indeed it's so bad that Russell is reporting back and chest pain from the violence of the vibrations.

The bouncing can be solved by raising the ride height, but that comes at the expense of performance, making it self-defeating. The team could stiffen the suspension, but that would make the car undriveable over the kerbs. Reducing the downforce overall would make the car difficult to handle at most tracks.

The team is running out of ideas after four rounds. More than once Hamilton and Russell have reported that set-up changes make no difference

to overall performance or, at worst, make the car slower.

The team is a fortunate 47 points behind Ferrari in the constructors standings thanks largely to two non-scores by Carlos Sainz and three retirements for Red Bull Racing, while George Russell is 37 points off Charles Leclerc's title lead, with Hamilton a further 21 adrift.

The season is long, but while Mercedes is still trying to crack its car both Ferrari and Red Bull Racing are working on making theirs faster.

The challenge starts at this weekend's Miami Grand Prix, where the team intends to bring its first round of updates, having held off so far to avoid muddying the waters as it analysed its problems.

The following race in Spain, a well-known F1 test venue, will then be the acid test of the team's progress.

The first-ever Miami Grand Prix is being billed as a high-roller party venue, but there'll be no time to soak in the atmosphere for Mercedes and Lewis Hamilton. Their seasons are on the line.


