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BANKS RECALLING LOANS POSE LONG-TERM THREAT TO ISLAND'S TOURISM RECOVERY

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huritt Maswongssa, who serves as the Southern Thailand representative on Tourism Council of Thailand (TCT), has called for government intervention on banks now calling in business loan repayments, warning that lack of action will send many hotels and other tourism-related businesses into bankruptcy and cause damage that will take the tourism industry years to recover from.

"Today, nearly all hotels on the island have bank loans. There are only a few hotels that do not have loans

with the banks. This leaves many businesses on the island exposed to critical risk from not being able to make loan repayments during the current economic situation," said Mr Bhurritt, who also owns and operates the Patong Resort Hotel as the General Manager.

"Some hotels may still be able to re-negotiate their loans or restructure them if they still have assets that they can use as collateral, but many hotels have been closed for a long time without any form of revenue, so it makes no sense for banks to be foreclosing on unpaid loans and seizing a property that will not make any money," he added.

"We need the government to make a deal with the banks in order to help hotels and other tourismrelated businesses on the island. If this does not happen, many hotels and tourism businesses are likely to go bankrupt," he warned.

"Worse, once these businesses close permanently, [beyond Phuket] hundreds and thousands of employees will be laid off, and that will aggravate the economy even further," he said.

Mr Bhuritt also called for serious representation be sent from Bangkok to assess the actual economic impact the COVID crisis is having on Phuket.

"In this situation, we need a proactive person to come to see Phuket as fast as possible," he added.

Mr Bhurritt warned that lack of government intervention on bank loans could push enough tourism-related businesses into bankruptcy to cause a downward spiral for the industry that would take years to recover from.

His concerns echoed those of TCT President Chairat Trirattanajarasporn, who late last month warned that the industry as at a "tipping point", with 30% of tourism-related businesses believed to have already "exited the market" in the first half of this year, a trend that could spell heavy long-term damage to the industry as a whole.

Teacher killed as storm fells tree

29-year-old teacher was killed after strong winds brought Ldown a tree onto staff accommodation at a school in Kathu last Sunday night (Aug 2) as strong storm weather lashed the island.

Police and rescue workers were called to Thairatwithaya School at about 8:25pm, reported Lt Col Somchai Nuboon of the Kathu Police.

Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew also present at the scene to oversee Kusoldharm rescue workers and Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM) officers carry out the rescue and recovery operation.

A large tree had fallen onto one of six staff houses at the school. In the bedroom of the house rescue workers found the body of science teacher Thanachart Teanwattanakun. 29, crushed to death as the ceiling came down on him.

Siriporn Borna, a teacher staying in one of the other houses, told police that her husband heard a loud sound

of the tree collapse and ran out to see what had happened.

Her husband called out to Mr Thanachart, but heard no response, and so quickly called the DDPM emergency hotline 1669, Ms Siriporn said.

Ms Siriporn also told police that a branch from the same tree had fallen on the house next to the one where Mr Thanachart was staying once before, but no one was injured in that incident.

The heavy weather followed

a nationwide warning issued last Friday (July 31) in which the Thai Meteorological Department forecast strong thundershowers with waves along the Andaman coast reaching up to three metres.

True to the forecast, heavy downpours drenched the island and wind speeds at the airport reached over 64km/h on the Saturday and nearly 52km/h around Phuket Town on the

Governor Narong Woonciew had ordered emergency services to be on standby to respond in case any further damage is caused by the onslaught of heavy weather, and disaster officials were been ordered to closely follow weather warnings issued by the TMD.

Emergency-response teams were dispatched to patrol risk areas, and ordered to have equipment ready to use at all times in order to help people in case of flash floods.

In line with the warnings repeatedly re-issued by the TMD, 12 in total from last Friday through Monday, the Phuket Marine Office ordered all small boats to stay ashore.

"As strong wind and waves are forecast (to reach) two to four meters high in the Andaman Sea, all ships should proceed with caution, and small boats keep ashore," the warning said.

All large boats, including large ferries, still heading out onto the bay, are ordered to ensure that life jackets are worn by all people on board while the boat is at sea.

"Boat operators must check their By Monday morning, Phuket boats for safety, that the engine and


other equipment on board is in good working order and make sure that all life-saving equipment is ready to use at all times," Phuket Marine Office Director Wiwat Chitchertwong said in his warning first issued last Sunday and repeated on Monday.

"In addition, all passengers must wear life jackets at all times while on the boat, and boat operators are to stay tuned to weather updates from the TMD," he added.

The Phuket News was informed of two boats being pushed ashore at the northern end of Chalong Bay after breaking loose from their moorings, but no injuries or any other marine safety incidents were reported.

On land, teams from the Phuket branch of the Provincial Electricity Authority (PPEA) all throughout last weekend and on Monday and Tuesday worked to restore power supply to areas across the island where power lines were affected by the storm conditions.

PEA Phuket Chief Boontham Jaroenpong urged any persons without power supply to inform the PEA by calling 076-216674.

Continued from page 1 ...off assets, choosing not to wait for an uncertain recovery, with those most heavily

affected being tour operators, bus services with small vehicle fleets, restaurants, souvenir shops and hotels that used to focus on foreign tour groups, especially the Chinese market, Mr Chairat explained.

"Third, we expect the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration [CCSA] to choose Phuket to be the first province to receive tourists from abroad, then the CCSA can use Phuket as the model for other provinces to use in receiving international tourists," Mr Thanusak said.

Bhummikitti Ruktaengam. President of the Phuket Tourist Association, has already called for Phuket airport to be allowed to receive direct

international flights, stating with chartered flights and private jets, saying the province already has three hotels accredited as "Alternative State Quarantine" (ASQ) venues.

At present, Phuket has three ASQ facilities. Another 16 hotels are awaiting approval.

Mr Bhummikitti said tourists in ASQ will help drive the industry and are likely to stay longer than the 14-day quarantine period, while tourists under travel bubbles may have a shorter length of stay, he told the *Bangkok Post*.

The province is preparing capacity for up to 20,000 tourists a day with 50 ICU beds equipped for coronavirus cases, he added.

The plan to open the province to chartered flights and become an ASQ destination was discussed with the Phuket provincial governor late last month. The idea of welcoming private jets from Malaysia, Hong Kong and Singapore will be discussed later, he said.

"If Phuket cannot get international flights until the end of the year, then the province will have only B80 billion in tourism inflow, compared with B440bn last year," Mr Bhummikitti said.

Developer dodges fence charge

Public pressure thwarts attempt to steal state land at Bang Tao

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o charges will be pressed against the owner of the 300-metre-long fence that was erected along Bang Tao Beach last week despite the fence being built on state land, MaAnn Samran, Chief of the Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organisation (OrBor-Tor) has confirmed.

The decision to not press charges was made in light of the fact that the owner had already had the fence removed, as ordered, Mr MaAnn explained last Friday (July 31).

However, MaAnn declined to identify exactly which person or company had ordered for the fence to be built.

Mr MaAnn said the decision followed a joint investigation by officers from the Damrongdharma Phuket branch of the Internal Security Operations Command (ISOC), Phuket Marine Office, Phuket office of the Department of Treasury, and Department of Lands.

Asked whether the land where the fence was built was being rented out by the government to a private party, Mr MaAnn said "I don't know if that land is being rented out."

"For people to rent government land long term, that is for the Treasury Department to determine whether they can or not," he added.

Mr MaAnn said the workers at the site had two days to clear the remains of the fence that are still standing.

Russian man, Thai woman rescued from rip current

EVEN BEFORE THE heavy weather landed on Phuket last weekend, lifeguards at Nai Harn Beach had urged people to swim only where red-yellow flags have been posted, and where lifeguards are on patrol, after a Russian man and his female Thai friend were rescued from a dangerous rip current at the beach on July 29.

The couple were rescued at about 11am, Nai Harn chief lifeguard Chula Nontree told The Phuket News.

"I saw the couple swimming in the water. The woman seemed to be not good at

swimming and was caught by a rip current," he said.

"The man tried to help her, and then they were together dragged around 200 metres from the beach," he added.

Lifeguards brought the two back to shore by paddleboard, Mr Chula explained.

"The man looked exhaust-

ed, so we gave him first aid by providing him oxygen to assist his breathing. The woman was also very tired, but she seemed to be in better condition than the man," he said.

"They both seemed to have recovered well and we did not have them taken to hospital.

"Every day we set redyellow flags to mark where it is safe to swim, and red flags marking where it is dangerous to enter the water," Mr Chula said.

"Please enter the water only in the areas between the yellow-red flags," he added.

Long weekend brings B95mn boost

¬he King's Birthday four-day long weekend earlier this month saw some 16,000 tourists come to Phuket, bringing a much-welcomed B95 million boost to the island's economy, reported Napassorn Kakai, Director of the Phuket office of the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT).

According to preliminary figures of bookings made through the We Travel Together campaign, hotels in Phuket taking part in the campaign saw some 30% occupancy over the weekend, July 25-28, Ms Napasorn told The Phuket News.

However, only 80 Phuket hotels at that time were registered with the campaign, offering 5,600 rooms, she added.

Some high-end resorts enjoyed much higher occupancy over the long weekend, Ms Napasorn noted.

"Especially luxury accommodations such as Sri Panwa, Intercon and Keemala, which saw occupancy rates of up to 90%," she said.

Of the 16,000 tourists to come to Phuket over the four days, about 98% were Thai with the remaining 2% being foreigners, she noted.

"On average they spent B5,500 per person per day, altogether generating B95 million in revenues for businesses on the island," Ms Napasorn said.

The weekend saw a busy airport, Ms Napasorn also noted.

"There are currently 27 flights a



day operating at Phuket International Airport, and over the long weekend the airlines saw a load factor of 80%," she explained at the time.

Not all visitors landing at the airport spent their weekend in Phuket, Ms Napapsorn admitted, pointing out that some visitors headed north to popular destinations in Phang Nga, such as Khao Lak.

Also, not all visitors arriving in Phuket came by plane, she added.

"Some drove their own cars, or even big bikes, from throughout Southern Thailand," she said.


The most popular destinations and attractions drawing the visitors were popular tourist spots, beaches, scenic spots, the Phuket Old Town area, and local food and shops, Ms Napasorn added.

However, Ms Napasorn admitted that she had yet to be informed of the number of medical staff and volunteers currently booked to spend their holidays in Phuket under the government-subsidised 'Kamlang Jai' domestic tourism campaign offered as a thank you for all their work in preventing the spread of COVID-19 throughout the country.

"Right now I do not know the number of medical staff who will travel to Phuket. I will know later when the tour agencies providing tours under the campaign report back to me every month. The campaign is from August through October," she said.

Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew on July 29 highlighted that the arrival of the medical staff and volunteers on the island was a key opportunity to promote to potential Thai and foreign tourists that Phuket is a safe place to visit for a holiday.

He urged all hotels and other tourism-related businesses to provide their guests the best holiday experience they can, and not to take advantage of the tourists by inflating prices.



Beachfront footpath collapses

RAWAI MUNICIPALITY workers have sealed off a section of the sidewalk along the Rawai beachfront beside where restaurants have set up their own tables and chairs after three people were injured when a gaping hole opened where a section of the sidewalk collapsed.

The three people were injured when the concrete beneath them collapsed last Sunday morning (Aug 2).

The three were taken to hospital by ambulance, Rawai Mayor Aroon Solos confirmed on Monday, without giving any details of the ages or nationalities of the people injured.

"The three people were not seriously injured," he said.

One witness at the scene told The Phuket News that he ran to help after he saw one man had fallen into the of the sea washed away the hole with a restaurant table

landing on top of him.

"We have officers inspecting what to do with the hole now," Mayor Aroon told The Phuket News on Monday.

Officials from Rawai Municipality's Public Works division have yet to determine how to fix the hole to ensure that people are not in danger from further similar incidents.

"The constant movement soil underneath the seafront wall," Mayor Aroon explained.

"This left the seawall intact, but the soil behind the wall was washed away, leading to the concrete behind the wall collapsing," he added.

Officers will inspect all along the seafront wall to ensure the sidewalk is safe,

However, the tables and chairs along the beachfront sidewalk will remain, Mayor Aroon confirmed.

"The section along the sidewalk where the tables and chairs are placed are actually on private land. Only the strip beside the beachfront wall is a public area," he explained.

"When you walk along the footpath, you can see that the concrete where the restaurants' tables and chairs have been placed is different from the public walkway section," he added. Eakkapop Thongtub

Climate change on the cards

Rising sea temperatures may be affecting turtles' nesting season

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Txperts at the Phuket ≺ Marine Biological ✓ Centre (PMBC) have started a research project to investigate whether rising sea temperatures are a major factor in the recent spate of turtle nests laid out of their usual egg-laying season.

The project was launched after a large leatherback turtle came ashore a beach and laid a nest of 103 eggs in the Khao Lampi – Hat Thai Mueang National Park at night on July 28 – the fourth such turtle nest laid in the area in the past month.

Of the 103 eggs laid, 87 of them were capable of producing offspring while the other 16 were infertile, Mr Haritchai said. The eggs are expected to hatch in 55-60 days, he added.

The eggs were moved to a safer location beach inside the national park, where they will be sheltered by protective barriers and watched over by park officers, Mr Haritchai explained.

"Big waves were reaching

nest was laid so we had to move quickly to make sure the eggs were not affected. We did not want to lose any of them," he said.

"If anyone sees a turtle laying eggs on a beach, please call us at 076-679134 so we can quickly go to protect the eggs and take care of them," Mr Haritchai added.

> "Turtles usually lay eggs from November through March, but it is July now and turtles are still laying eggs," he said.

"It is hard to tell, but right now we believe that rising sea water temperatures may have affected the turtles, tricking their biological clock into thinking that it is still the right time of year to be laying eggs.

A team of researchers have been tasked with looking into any correlation between the two, he noted.

"I want to look at the number of turtle eggs laid and the correlating sea water temperatures along the Andaman coast areas of Phang Nga and Phuket for last year and compare that data with this year. That will give us a better understanding of what is



happening," Dr Kongkiat said.

Dr Kongkiat offered alternative explanations for the spate of "off-season" turtle

"It is possible that the mother has not laid eggs before. An experienced turtle would not lay eggs where the waves flood up to the nest. They also prefer to lay eggs where there is less activity on the beach and fewer fishing boats in the area." he said.

Officers at the Khao Lampi – Hat Thai Mueang National Park found another nest of leatherback turtle eggs on Sunday, July 26 about two kilometers south of Khao Nayak, near Khao Lak, where yet another nest was found on July 7.

As the nest found on July

26 was deemed not under threat by the strong southwest monsoon surf, the officers covered the nest back up and built a protective enclosure around it to protect it from predators.

The leatherback turtle nest found on the beach in front of Khao Nayak, the "resident reef" at Khao Lak, on July 7, contained nearly 100 fertilised eggs that are expected to produce younglings.

Just one week before that nest was found, a nest of leatherback turtle eggs was found on Thai Mueang Beach that was believed to have been laid by the same turtle that came ashore at Mai Khao Beach just days earlier.

Phuket more liveable than before COVID-19

or most people, the COVID-19 global pandemic has been spirit-crushing. rate. If anything, Phuket has been getting a much-needed break to recover from environmental effects that have been accumulating for many years.

Aside from a greener environment, which makes the idea of residing in Phuket all the more enticing, the island's current property market prices are also ideal for investment. Due to COVID-19, the Thai property market experienced a slight hit, largely due to a drop in Chinese investors who were either unable to travel to Phuket or had reduced purchasing power as a result of the pandemic, causing property prices to fall. However, Pira expects the market to pick up at the end of this year or

early next year. "If you want to invest in a slice of paradise at a fraction of the price or buy low and sell high to make a good profit, this is the perfect time!" he says.

While Phuket may be greener than it was, Pira stresses that there are still countless people on the island living under the poverty line that have been further affected by COVID-19. Six years ago, Khun Ball climbed a tree to pick fruits when he fell, became severely injured, and lost the ability to walk. Although there is a chance that Khun Ball can

walk again with physical therapy, it remains an unaffordable dream as the pandemic shrunk his family's income to a fifth.

"It's heartwarming to know that there have been efforts to help Khun Ball's family rent a small shophouse in which they can continue their family donut business and make a better living," says Pira. "As a responsible member of the community, we ought to help more people in need like Khun Ball and ease their burdens. We, at Blue Horizon Developments, have been playing our part. We hope that with all of our combined efforts, we can make a real difference for everybody!"









An angry banana like no other!

We sat down with Neil and asked him a few questions about the Angry Banana.

What made you decide to write a children's book?

The recent period of lockdown and time spent at home gave me the chance to be creative and learn something new. This is my first picture book and I learned a lot about keeping the story short and sweet, as well as making sure there are enough cheeky jokes in there to capture children's attention!

As an Early Years teacher and parent, I am always looking for fun ways to talk to children about social skills, as well as managing feelings and behaviour. What started as a silly story told to my own children ended up becoming a book that I wrote and illustrated myself.

Where did the idea about an angry banana come from?

It was as random as it sounds! I knew that I wanted to write a story about a character who needs help regulating strong emotions. So, it was always going to be an Angry something or another. I went through a number of possibilities but settled on The Angry Banana because it had a nice sound to it. Almost as soon as I had a name, I sketched him out and he came to life.

Could you describe The Angry Banana?

The Angry Banana is a simple counting book for children aged 2 to 6 years old, with a story that teaches us to be patient and calm. Counting to 10 is not only a useful mathematical skill, it is also a great way to keep a cool head when we are feeling grumpy!

My illustrations were carefully designed to prompt questions from parents and teachers that will help children to develop their foundational understanding of numbers, or 'number sense'. I have included a page with teaching tips at the back of the book to help with this.

How has the book been received?

My first batch of books sold out really quickly, and it has been amazing to receive so many positive responses from children, parents and teachers alike. To hear that children have been asking for the book to be read over and over is

probably the best news I could have received. As long as they are enjoying it, I feel as though it has been a success!

What are your plans for the future is this going to be the first in a series?

I am already receiving orders from people in the USA, Australia, New Zealand and The UK, so he will be an International Angry Banana very soon! I am excited about promoting this book a little more, and seeing how far I can make him travel.



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Bam double downs Chelsea

Skipper Aubameyang leads Arsenal to record FA Cup win

ierre-Emerick Aubameyang wrote his name into Arsenal folklore as his two goals were enough to defeat London rivals Chelsea 2-1 and win the FA Cup last Saturday (Aug 1).

Aubameyang underlined his importance to the club by winning and scoring a first-half penalty to level the game after an early Christian Pulisic goal had given Chelsea a deserved lead.

The Gunners skipper, the first African to captain an FA Cup final side, then scored an exquisite goal in the second half that was enough to ensure the North London club secured a record 14th final win.

It was also a two-goal masterclass from Aubameyang in the semi-final that enabled Arsenal to overcome favourites Manchester City and advance.

However, despite his heroics, there remain questions as to his immediate future; facing another season without Champions League football and with just one year left on his contract at the Emirates, the Gabon international has been linked



with a move away this summer.

Arsenal boss Mikel Arteta is hopeful his star striker will stay and has emphasised how critical he is to the future aspirations of the club.

"He knows what I think about him, I want to build a squad around him," the Gunners boss said post-

about getting the deal done. I think César Azpilicueta when he hauled moments like that will help to realise and give him belief that we are in the right path and he is a big part of it."

The game itself was somewhat marred by controversy as referee Anthony Taylor sent off Chelsea's Mateo Kovacic for a debatable second yellow card and was criticised for "I think he wants to stay, it is not being harsher on Blues' captain

down Aubameyang in the incident that led to the penalty.

A miserable day was compounded for Chelsea as Azpilicueta and talisman Pulisic succumbed to hamstring injuries and were forced from the field, joined shortly afterwards by Pedro Rodriguez whose Chelsea career ended with a dislocated shoulder.

All three will be sorely missed as the Blues try to turnaround a 0-3 deficit in their Champions League last 16, second leg tie against Bayern Munich tomorrow (Aug 8).

Victory secured Arsenal's place in the Europa League next season after they risked missing out on European football for the first time in 25 years after finishing eighth in the Premier League.

The knock-on effect is that their bitter North London rivals Tottenham now have to enter the qualifying rounds of the same competition, threatening a potential fixture pile-up in what will already be a packed season and no doubt provide ammunition for Spurs boss Jose Mourinho to complain.

The fall guys are Wolves who are now not eligible for next season's Europa League. They are, however, still contesting this season's competition and, should they win it, will qualify for the Champions League next season.

It may have been a day of disappointment for Chelsea but they had already achieved their primary goal from Frank Lampard's first season in charge by securing a place in next season's Champions League via a top-four finish in the league.

COVID claims Suzuki Cup

THE ASEAN FOOTBALL Federation has announced that the 2020 AFF Suzuki Cup will not be held this year because of COVID-19, ending the suspense shrouding the future of the regional championship scheduled for November-December.

The announcement last Thursday (July 30) followed a videoconference meeting of representatives of the regional football federations, which was attended by Foot-

ball Association of Thailand (FAT) Secretary-General Patit Supaphong.


Patit said the AFF member federations were in favour of putting off the tournament. Later, AFF president Khiev Sameth issued a statement,

confirming the postponement of the popular event to 2021.

"Since the onset of COV-ID-19, the AFF has been closely monitoring guidance from the World Health Organisation, health ministries, government agencies, Fifa and AFC," said Khiev.

"With the risk of the spread of COVID-19 remaining high, the AFF finds itself in a situation where we cannot proceed safely with the AFF Suzuki Cup 2020," he added.

It was not specified which time of the year the competition is planned to be held. AFP







ewis Hamilton took a record-breaking seventh home-race victory at the British Grand Prix last Sunday (Aug 2) on just three wheels after a last-lap tyre failure robbed him of a cruise to the chequered flag.

Hamilton's front-left tyre let go with half a lap remaining and a 40-second advantage over second-placed Max Verstappen, who had just put on a set of the fastest rubber.

The gap closed at a ferocious rate, but Hamilton coaxed his stricken car to the line with five seconds of his margin remaining to record perhaps the most tense home win of his career.

"Up until that last lap everything was relatively smooth sailing," he said. "The last few laps I started to back off, then down the straight it de-plated.

"I was just praying to try to get it around, to not be too slow. I nearly didn't get it around the last two corners, but I did.

"That was definitely a heart-in-the mouth kind of feeling. Just driving it, trying to keep the speed up."

For Verstappen the outcome was bittersweet. He had been running a lonely third behind Hamilton and

Valtteri Bottas when on lap 52 the second-placed Mercedes suffered what turned out to be a foreboding front-left tyre blowout.

The Dutchman zoomed past the stricken Bottas to inherit second, but with the Finn no threat behind and Hamilton too far ahead to attack, he dived into the pits for a set of soft tyres to score a bonus point for fastest lap.

The team wasn't to know Hamilton would suddenly become vulnerable had Verstappen only been close enough to take advantage.

"It's lucky and unlucky," he said. "I'm very happy with second, it's a good result for us again."

Bottas couldn't hold onto the final podium place, his tyre failure coming early on lap 50 and consequently forcing him to limp back to the pits, losing bucketloads of time.

He emerged from his emergency pit sop in 12th, which became a desperate 11th after McLaren's Carlos Sainz also succumbed to a tyre blowout on the final lap, falling from fifth to 13th.

Instead it was Charles Leclerc who inherited a rostrum finish for Ferrari. The Monegasque was off the pace of the top two teams all race but managed to keep himself out of the fray of the midfield to capitalise on the chaos that unfolded ahead.

Tyre trouble

The spate of explosive rubber came about thanks to an ambitious strategy brought about by a lap-12 safety car triggered by a violent crash at the ferocious Maggots and Becketts complex by Alpha-Tauri's Daniil Kvyat, who emerged from the wreckage shaken but unscathed.

With 40 laps remaining in the race, the caution period was right on the cusp of the maximum tyre life of the hard tyre, but the prospect of a one-stop strategy was tempting enough for almost the entire field to adopt it.

Renault wasn't so afflicted by tyre trouble, allowing Daniel Ricciardo to chase

home Leclerc, the Australian falling short of a podium by just 1.1 seconds.

It equalled Ricciardo's best Renault result, having earnt it with a late-race pass on Lando Norris, who finished fifth ahead of Esteban Ocon, completing Renault's first double points finish of the year.

Pierre Gasly finished seventh for AlphaTauri, holding off Red Bull Racing's Alex Albon on a difficult weekend for the Thai driver.

Lance Stroll sunk to ninth after starting sixth for Racing Point, the Canadian fading the longer the race went on and Sebastian Vettel finished in 10th place.

Thai league hopes for spectator return

TOURISM AND SPORTS MINister Phiphat Ratchakitprakarn said on Monday (Aug 3) he will ask the government to allow Thai league matches to have spectators when the season resumes next month.

The campaign was suspended in March due to the COVID-19 pandemic and will restart on Sept 12 and end in May next year.

Phiphat took part in a special exhibition football match in Rayong last Saturday as the government tried to rebuild tourists' confidence in the popular seaside province.

The 'New Normal' Demonstration Match: Rayong Kick Off! was staged after a coronavirus-positive Egyptian military official visited several busy spots in the province, sparking fears of a second wave of coronavirus outbreak in the country.

Spectators were allowed to watch the match at the stadium with strict protocols.

"It's a good test and a pioneer match for the resumption of sports competitions in the country," Phiphat said.

"As for the Thai league season which will resume in September, there could be spectators if there is not an increase in COVID-19 cases."

He said he would ask the government's Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA) to allow spectators to watch Thai league matches.

Gongsak Yodmani, governor of the Sports Authority of Thailand, said he believed the CCSA would be satisfied with the exhibition match in Rayong and this could lead to the agency giving the green light for Thai league games to have spectators.

In the match, Warinthon Panyahakarn and Danai Jarujinda netted two goals each and Prabpakon
