TOURISM INDUSTRY PUSHES FOR FULL REOPENING OF ISLAND UNDER A RETURN TO 'NEW NORMAL'

ey Phuket tourism industry leaders have submitted a formal proposal to reopen the island fully to tourism on Dec 1 under the standard 'New Normal' regulations already in effect under a campaign called "Phuket Freedom Day".

The proposal was submitted to Phuket officials and the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) earlier this week, Phuket Chamber of Commerce President Thanusak Phungdet

The plan relies on officials vac-

cinating the island with third "booster shot" vaccinations by the end of October, Mr Thanusak explained.

"If that can be accomplished, we can fully open the island and treat COVID-19 like a cold," he said.

"As you can see at this stage only 1% of our COVID patients [in Phuket] have been designated 'category red' and need close-care treatment at a hospital, and about 4% of our COVID patients have been designated 'category yellow' and are [under care] at field hospitals – but 95% of our patients are 'category green' and are still healthy without any symptoms of infection," Mr Thanusak noted.

"So, we can see that the Delta

variant makes it very easy for us to become infected but does not result in serious symptoms. This is also a good result of our mass vaccination campaign. The Sinovac and Astra-Zeneca vaccines that we are providing work well," he added.

"The faster we can provide booster vaccinations, the faster we close in on our goal to freely open our island [to tourism], which we plan to open in December, or January next year," Mr Thanusak said.

"The plan requires all people to continue to follow the D-M-H-T-T measures set out by the Ministry of Public Health, but we will work on providing the third dose of vaccine as much as we can," he added.

"People who become infected but have no symptoms can observe home isolation and take care of themselves just like having a normal flu. Those who cannot do home isolation may be taken to a quarantine venue. If they have severe symptoms, they will be taken to a field hospital," Mr Thanusak explained.

"Medical staff will send equipment and medicine to each infected person at home, and the people must report their medical condition to staff every day," he added.

Tourists under the Sandbox scheme still need to meet the same requirements to arrive in Phuket,...



Big push to fully re-open to tourism

Continued from page 1 ...Mr Thanusak continued. "And the sandbox requirement may apply to domestic tourists too," he said.

Life under the plan will be "nearly normal like before the pandemic", Mr Thanusak observed. "Entertainment venues and other venues can be open, with no control [ban] on alcohol, which could be served and sold in restaurants.

Mr Thanusak noted the growing resistance to the policy of holding people who have tested positive for COVID-19 but not exhibiting any signs of infection being held at quarantine detention centres – regardless whether they have tested positive only by a rapid test kit and have yet to be confirmed infected by RT PCR test.

"Phuket people must understand that there is no point for taking infected people with no symptoms into quarantine places, which officers spend a lot of budget on and medical staff need to take care of them," he said.

"I think It is better to move the medical staff to take care of 'yellow' and 'red' patients in hospitals. Medical staff should show our people clear numbers of patients designated as 'yellow' and 'red', so that our people can be confident and understand the situation," he added.

"People who have died from the COVID-19 have been



elderly and suffering chronic diseases. Some of them had not received any vaccination injections. This COVID-19 virus can kill us just like other diseases and accidents, but we have never made daily reports and paid as much attention [to such dangers] as we have done for this," he noted.

"We need to know the statistics of our current situation. We are sad but need to accept the deaths. We cannot do nothing to move on and continue living our lives. If we cannot allow people to travel, Phuket cannot move on," Mr Thanusak said.

MONEY BOX

The 'Phuket Freedom Day' push is hoped to bring in more than B210 billion in tourismrelated revenue in just three months.

"We can't continue this way. Hotels are suffering losses. What we need is 'freedom day' on Dec 1," said Nanthida Atiset, vice-president of Phuket Tourism Association.

Phuket Tourism Council President Thanet Tantipiriyakit explained that opening the island to tourism on Dec 1 could see the more than 200,000 tourists arrive under the Sandbox scheme in December, and even more in the first quarter of next year in addition to boosted numbers of domestic tourists coming to Phuket.

"I really believe that we will have at least 200,000 foreign tourists in December, but we need to replan some settings to make it easier for tourists to come here," Mr Thanet said.

"In the first quarter next year, the number is expected to increase to 250,000-300,000 foreign tourists," he added.

"For the domestic market, I believe that after Sept 8, when tourists can enter the island under the new requirements, tourists will start to return. We will have at least 400,000 too 500,000 domestic tourists in the fourth quarter this year, and at least 500,000 to 600,000 tourists in Q1 next year,"

Kongsak Khoopongsakorn, President of the Thailand Hotels Association Southern chapter, noted that the constantly changing requirements was having an effect on bookings, making tourist arrivals difficult to predict.

"Right now, we still have a stable number of bookings, but with tourists' behaviour and other factors that change all the time, our tourists usually make bookings at the last minute," he said.

"We have received many questions from tourists about the [northern hemisphere] winter season. We expect that the bookings rate will increase about 20-30% among the hotels and resorts that are open under the SHA+ standard right now," he added.

"The two most popular topics that tourists have asked us are about the pandemic situation in Thailand because our numbers of new infected cases are still increasing. I believe we all are contributing much effort to control the number [of infections]," Mr Kongsak said.

"The second topic is whether the restaurants and other businesses in Phuket are open as normal or not. We always try to tell them that only some restaurants are open, but that doesn't diminish the joy of traveling here," he added.

"We have received many questions about the ban on serving and selling alcoholic beverages [in restaurants, with all bars and entertainment venues nationwide still ordered closed].

"I understand that this is a part of the disease control measures. The Governor [Narong Woonciew] told me that we are controlled under the CCSA order, so we cannot lift the ban," Mr Kongsak said.

"Tourism-related groups in Phuket have submitted a request to the Phuket government, the Phuket Public Health Office as well as the TAT director and the Minister of Tourism to consider lifting the ban on alcohol because we understand that our tourists need alcohol to enrich their meals," he explained.

"Imagine, they want red

wine with their steak, white wine with their seafood, and beer to refresh in the afternoon. If tourists do not have that kind of feeling, they will not feel like they are on holiday. They may consider going somewhere else like Tukey, where they have freedom to do such things," Mr Kongsak pointed out.

"I want the government to consider this, and we have demonstrated that drinking alcohol does not affect the number of infected cases much if we drink in the right manner, not partying. We need to find the main cause to solve the problem," he said.

Regarding the current state of Phuket's battered tourism industry, Mr Kongsak noted that operators that are currently open are not doing so for profit right now.

"The only hotel operators right now are those who mainly receive income from Sandbox tourists, but I would like to clarify that nowadays no hotels are managing to make a profit. There is no money left for the owners for sure," he said.

"Of B100 received, about 40-50% goes to paying staff, who are children of people in Phuket, and 30-40% goes to food suppliers, like farmers throughout the country. Then there is electricity and water bills, as well as paying taxi service operators, because right now most hotels on the island do not have their own cars to be used as taxis," Mr Kongsak explained.

Sandbox tourists shunted as Phuket officials delist guesthouses from SHA+

OFFICIALS HAVE YET presumed it was a password to explain why guesthouses or website problem. but was already inspected and approved as SHA+ accommodation venues are having their SHA+ licences revoked because they are fully legally operating as guesthouses, but not as hotels – a fact known at the time when they were approved.

The operator of one guesthouse in Patong told The Phuket News last Saturday (Sept 4) that he first learned of the problem on Wednesday (Sept 1), when he went to register guest details through the Thailand SHA web portal - as required by law.

Unable to log in, the guesthouse owner at first told by the Thailand SHA web administrators that his guesthouse was no longer registered as a SHA+ venue.

Asked why the SHA status was revoked, the owner was told to contact administrators of the SandboxPhuket project through their Facebook page.

After days of receiving no reply, the owner was finally informed last night that, "We just get the report that you have no hotel license."

The owner was told to have his Sandbox tourists moved to another SHA+ venue. He was also informed that accepting any new Sandbox guests would be illegal.



"If you continue to accept customer, you will act against the law," said one message.

"Pls ask your customer to move to other hotel," the next message read.

The guesthouse in Patong is currently enjoying 100% occupancy. Most of the guests are Sandbox tourists, the owner said.

"The guesthouse was approved for SHA in April-June, and for and SHA+ at the end of June," he added.

The guesthouse was even issued a "SHABA ID" code in order to log in to the Thailand SHA platform to register completely without warning. guest details.

No longer registered as a SHA+ venue, the guesthouse can on longer issue confirmation of prepaid bookings at an SHA+ venue – needed by tourists applying for Certificates of Entry in order to travel to Phuket, the owner explained.

The guesthouse also can no longer issue any "release" documents needed by Sandbox guests to confirm where they stayed as SHA+ guests in completing their 14-day stay on the island. The same "release" document is needed for Sandbox tourists to be able to leave the island to travel to any other parts of Thailand.

"They have shut us down

We have a guesthouse license for 1-25 rooms. Everything is in order and we renewed the license in June. We follow the rules to the letter. Our hygiene routines are probably better than anywhere else in Phuket," the owner explained.

His guesthouse is not the only one to have had its SHA+ status revoked, he added.

The owner added that he had no idea what to tell his staff, who were recently brought back on in order to cope with the full bookings. "We have full strength of staff (cleaning, hotel manager and kitchen for breakfast)," the guesthouse owner said.

Door opens for domestic tourists

new provincial order issued by Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew has removed the requirement for domestic tourists to undergo an RT-PCR test for COV-ID-19 during their stay in Phuket.

The revised conditions came in Phuket Provincial Order No. 5267/2564 issued last Sunday (Sept 5). The order came into effect on Wednesday (Sept 8) and is to remain in effect until at least Sept 14.

The confirmation came not from an announcement that the requirement had been removed, but by omitting the requirement from the new order.

"People who come to Phuket for tourism and have proof of hotel or accommodation reservation which must be paid in advance. They must register [their travel details] at www. gophuget.com and show the QR code to officers at the checkpoint," the order notes.

The critical sentence now missing is, "If tourists stay longer than 7 days, they must be tested for COVID-19 on the 5th day of staying in Phuket", which was added to the previous order issued only four days earlier, on Tuesday last week.

Under the previous order, domestic tourists were allowed to enter Phuket on holiday provided they satisfy certain criteria, in-



accommodation reservation paid in advance and they must be tested for COVID-19 on Day 5 of their stay if they are staying more than seven days.

All people except those listed as exemptions are still prohibited from being allowed onto the island, essentially extending the "island isolation" protocol introduced last

The latest order, issued last Sunday, also added a new group of people under the exemptions allowed to enter Phuket, as "18) Patients who

cluding showing proof of hotel or need to see doctor or need to receive medical treatment (must have doctor's appointment) as well as people who are taking care of patients, doctors, nurses, medical staff and other relevant staff in public health related works."

> The latest order also has foriegn tourists who have entered Phuket under the Sandbox or the 'Sandbox 7+7' schemes added to the list of exemptions, allowing them to reenter Phuket as long as they satisfy the same criteria required of any of the other exemptions.

enter Phuket – including emergency medical personnel and vehicles, medical supply deliveries and consumer product deliveries, among others - must be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 by having received two doses of the Sinovac or Sinopharm vaccine, or one injection of the Sinovac vaccine and one injection of the AstraZeneca vaccine, or at least one injection of the AstraZeneca, Pfizer, Moderna or Johnson & Johnson vaccine at least 14 days before arriving.

Also, in order to be allowed into Phuket, all arrivals must present All of the exemptions allowed to results of an RT-PCR test or antigen

test performed by a medical facility within 72 hours of arriving proving that they are not infected.

Alternatively, arrivals must have been discharged from medical care for recovering from COVID-19 no more than 90 days before arriving.

The new order also added that Phuket and Phang Nga residents may freely travel between the two provinces as long as the key requirements are met.

"For people who have been registered on house registration documents in Phuket and Phang Nga and enter and leave Phuket regularly, can reenter Phuket," the new order says.

"Those people must be fully vaccinated and have tested negative by antigen test kit (ATK) which can be used for confirmation not over seven days," the order noted.

"They must also register [their travel details] at www.gophuget. com OR have a special permission letter signed by an officer at a District Office in Phuket," the order said (emphasis on "OR" added by The Phuket News).

The Phuket Check Point at Tha Chatchai, guarding the only road onto Phuket, will now open one hour earlier each day.

"The check point is to remain closed to all traffic except for emergencies from 11pm but open one hour earlier at 3am each night [sic]," the order confirmed.

Infections see sea gypsies in Koh Kaew under lockdown

THE RESIDENTIAL area of sea gypsies in Soi Koh Kaew 6 on the east coast of Phuket has been placed under lockdown for one week following a spate of infections in the community.

"No people are allowed to enter or leave the areas except for those delivering food, cooking gas, medical equipment, or medical staff in emergency vehicles such as ambulances," said a provincial order issued by Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew last Saturday night (Sept 4).

The order came into effect last Sunday (Sept 5) and will remain in effect through next Monday (Sept 13).

"The locked down area is in the sea gypsies community in Moo 3, Koh Kaew subdistrict, Mueng district, and there is to be a checkpoint at the entrance of Soi Koh Kaew 6," the order said.

"Officers from Koh Kaew Tambon Administrative Organisation [OrBor-Tor], Phuket City Police,



and other relevant officers are assigned to standby at the checkpoint.

"During the lockdown, officers from the Phuket Public Health Office [PPHO] and Muang District Office will test people in the area [for COVID-19] using RT-PCR tests or antigen test

"Koh Kaew OrBorTor with COVID-19. will deliver food and other

essential goods for people in the area, and arrange for staff to clean and sanitise the area," the order concluded.

The closure follows PPHO Chief Dr Kusak Kukiattikoon on Aug 31 confirming that 248 people had been tested in the area, and that 100 of them had been confirmed as infected

Eight COVID deaths in three days

PHUKET SUFFERED its darkest chapter during the pandemic last weekend when eight people died from COVID-19 from last Saturday through to Monday (Sept 4-6).

The Phuket Provincial Public Health Office in its daily COVID situation reports marked four deaths last Saturday, three deaths last Sunday and one more death on Monday (Sept 6).

No details were released of any of the deaths reported last Saturday, but the PPHO released details of the three chronic issues from kidney



deaths reported last Sunday as follows:

1. Thai man, 66, suffered

disease. No information about whether or not he had received any vaccination injections.

2. Thai man, 51, had highrisk contact with a confirmed case. He had not received any vaccination injections.

3. Thai man, 80, had highrisk contact with a confirmed case. He had received one vaccination injection.

The death reported on Monday was that of a 77-yearold Thai man who had received two vaccination injections, the PPHO reported.

Bangla cables to be buried

angla Rd will be the next main street in Patong to have its power and communications cables installed underground, Theeraphat Petchsichuang, Chief of the Provincial Electricity Authority (PEA) Patong Office, has confirmed.

Mr Theeraphat made the announcement through a video segment posted by Radio Thailand Phuket last Thursday (Sept 2).

The burying of power and communications cables along Bangla Rd follows the completion of burying the cables along Thaweewong Rd (the beach road), Mr Theeraphat said.

"The next project will be another well-known Bangla Rd, followed by Pisit Koranee Rd and the road in front of Wat Patong respectively," he said.

"After the project is completed, there will not be power poles or cables, especially communication cables which are disordered and disturbing to tourists' eyes.

"We will also cover the switch boxes along the road with images of our attractions



[Phuket's natural tourist attractions] to make them [the switch boxes] beautiful," he added.

"The PEA has projects to put electric cables underground in big cities across the country. Phuket is considered one of the big cities, especially Patong, which is a well-known destination among tourists around the

"Under the cooperation between the PEA and Patong Municipality, the cable on the beachfront Thaweewong Rd has already been put underground. The project started in 2019 and finished in the beginning of 2021 under the budget of about B220 million," Mr Theeraphat said.

Of note, the move to install cables throughout Patong was launched in 2015, and

was confirmed last year that the project to bury the cables along the patong beachfront was being funded by a budget of B213,640,647 provided by Patong Municipality, supported by a budget of B60,365,957 provided by the Provincial Electricity Authority.

The beachfront section of the project, along three kilometres of the Patong beach road from the Pak Bang Canal at the southern end of the beach to Haad Patong Rd near Loma Park, was carried out under contract by jointventure I.M.P. Consortium

Mr Theeraphat in his announcement gave no indication of the cost for the Bangla Rd - Pisit Koranaee Rd project, or when the project was scheduled to start, or be completed by.

Delivery driver in wet-road wipeout

A 28-YEAR-OLD MAN EScaped serious injury after he lost control of his delivery pickup truck and hit a light pole, with the pickup flipping onto its side on the central reservation on Thepkrasattri Rd in Moo 1, Mai Khao last Thursday

The accident occurred before dawn, and Tha Chatchai Police Deputy Chief Lt Col Somkid Onchan was called to the scene at about 6am.

Police together with Kusoldharm rescue workers arrived at the scene to find the Bangkok-registered white Toyota pickup truck with massive damage to its front.

The driver, Kathu resident Wongsapat Ponyong, was waiting at the scene.

Mr Wongsapat had escaped the accident with only scratches.

Mr Wongsapat told police that it was raining while he was heading to Phuket Town to make deliveries. He was driving at about 80-



90km/h when he lost control of the pickup, hit a light pole and a tree on the central reservation, Mr Wongsapat explained.

Lt Col Somkid confirmed that Mr Wongsakorn had been charged with reckless driving and causing damage to government property.

Lt Col Somkid also explained that he did not have Mr Wongsapat tested for alcohol as he appeared to be sober and spoke normally.

Drunk fisherman drowns in Kathu pond

A MAN WAS DISCOVERED drowned last Thursday (Sept 2) after he had gone to retrieve his fishing nets in a pond in Soi Kathu 6, Kathu while under the influence of alcohol.

Kathu Police Deputy Chief Lt Col Chao Pomna was called to the scene at about 3:50pm. He was joined by Kusoldharm rescue workers at the pond near Sabai Village 2 housing estate where they were informed 33-year-old Prakob Sima was missing.

A friend, 18-year-old Panupong Thanakarn, told police that he and Prakob had been drinking alcohol together and then Prakob said he was going to collect his fishing nets from the pond.

"Prakob dived into the pond to collect the net while I remained at the edge because I do not know how to swim," said Panupong.

"He went underwater and never resurfaced, which is when I called people for help," he added.

Kusoldharm Foundation divers searched the pond for about one and a half hours before they found Mr Prakob's body which was then taken

to Vachira Phuket Hospital for examination. His body will then be released to relatives to allow them to make the necessary funeral arrangements.

Mr Prakob's wife, Sutthida Somuengsae, explained that her husband was very drunk and she had therefore advised him to collect the nets at a later stage but that he had ignored her and attempted to retrieve them regardless.

Plan for sealed yacht, dive tours well received

The move for Phuket boats to be allowed to provide sealed tours to Seabox tourists, seafarers and divers has gained momentum after being well received at an official meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall last Friday (Sept 3).

At the meeting, Kevin Lidureau of Seafarer Divers Phuket along with several other representatives from Phuket's marine tour industry presented the detailed plan, called 'Phuket Boating Andaman Seabox', which aims to have local dive and other marine tour operators conduct sealed tour holidays for tourists.

The plan, if approved, would allow tourists to land on Phuket and be safely escorted directly from the airport to an ALQ hotel for one night, where they will undergo an RT-PCR test, then board the boat to enjoy the first week of their holiday.

Under the project, the tourists will observe their two-day quarantine and five-day trips including two mandatory COVID tests conducted at an ALQ hotel before boarding the boat and upon disembarking the boat at the ALQ hotel, Mr Lidureau explained to *The Phuket News*.

The plan has been drafted in much detail, and currently stands as a multipage document in Thai.



Phuket Vice Governor Pichet Panapong, who chaired the meeting, asked that the proposal be fine-tuned with TAT Phuket and Phuket Harbour Department; so it can be presented directly to high-level officials in Bangkok, Mr Lidureau said.

The plan has been well received, Mr Lidureau added, noting that a senior official from the Ministry of Tourism & Sports called to thank him for the

"At this stage they want to limit the tours within the confines of the '7+7' scheme, so tourists spend their first night in a hotel on Phuket and return to spend their seventh night in Phuket so they can be tested [for COVID-19].

"They also want to limit the sea tours to three main areas," Mr Lidureau said.

The first area is a 'North route' for diving and yachting to the Similan and Surin Island National Parks, he explained.

The second area is 'Phuket, Phang Nga and Krabi (Yachting)', including the Phang Nga, Than Bok Khorami, Hat Noppharat Thara-Mu Koh Phi Phi and Koh Lanta National Parks.

The third area is the 'South route' for diving and yachting at Hat Noppharat Thara-Mu Koh Phi Phi and Koh Lanta National Parks.

"Right now tours to places like Koh Tarutao National Park are off the table unless they open the Sandbox and Seabox in Satun Province," Mr Lidureau added.

Jetstar reboots weekly flights from Singapore

JETSTAR HAS RELAUN- staff operating Phuket airport ched its service between Singapore and Phuket with a onceweekly flight now confirmed.

The inaugural Jetstar Asia Airways Flight 3K537 departed Singapore's Changi Airport at 7:44pm last Friday (Sept 3) and arrived at Phuket International Airport at 8:24pm.

On disembarking the plane, passengers were greeted at 8:40pm by Manat Sotharat, Deputy Director of Phuket Airport Operations and Maintenance, and fellow airport staff.

It was not confirmed how many passengers were aboard the flight.

Jetstar confirmed that the flight will operate at the same time each Friday once weekly, arriving at boarding gate 11 at Phuket International Airport.

Airports of Thailand (AoT)

also confirmed that eight flights arrived on the island on Sept 4 bringing 588 pas-

There were two Thai Airways flights, two from Singapore Airlines, one each from Emirates and Qatar Airways and two private jets.

Phuket Daily Sandbox Report issued by the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) reported on Monday that during the 68 days from July 1 to Sept 6 a total of 29,077 passengers had arrived in Phuket under the Sandbox scheme.

The campaign had also resulted in 492,405 room nights booked.

However, the report also noted that only 146 passengers had arrived on Monday (Sept 6), all on board two flights from Singapore.


Roll out of Pfizer injections begins

THE PHUKET PROVINCIAL Public Health Office (PPHO) has confirmed through a report that the Pfizer vaccine has begun being deployed to vaccinate people in Phuket against COVID-19. The report also marks that frontline workers arand other at-risk groups are starting to receive their third injection "booster shot".

The report, initially posted online through the Official COVID-19 Information Center", operated by the Phuket office of the Ministry of Interior, marked that last Saturday across the island.

As of Monday (Sept 6), the number stood at 5,461. Vachira Phuket Hospital had dispensed 3,651 does of the Pfizer, BioNTech vaccine, followed by Bangkok Hospital Phuket (504), Thalang Hospital (355), Phuket Provincial Hospital (316), Bangkok Hospital Siriroj (198), Patong Hospital (162), Chalong Hospital (162) and Mission Hospital Phuket (54).

if they were frontline workers or satisfied one of the key criteria designating the person as (Sept 4) in total 5,361 doses of at risk of developing serious Pfizer had been administered symptoms if infected with COVID-19.

In order for a foreigner's registration to be accepted, at least one of the following conditions must be selected during the registration process:

- Age over 60 years old
- Cardiovascular disease
- Diabetes • Chronic respiratory disease
- Cancer Stroke
- Obesity (BMI > 35 kg/m2or BW > 100 kg)
- Chronic kidney disease
- Pregnancy: Gestational age

The report marked the most comprehensive report issued so far reporting how

many vaccination injections of which types of vaccines had been administered so far across Phuket.

Of special importance is that the report, created by the PPHO itself, marks the "target total" as 547,584 – representing the total registered population on the island to be vaccinated, not the 466,587 cited in the daily vaccination updates, which represents the 70% target to be vaccinated in the hope of achieving herd immunity across the island.

The report marked that so far, as of Monday (Sept 6), 424,464 people (77.52%) had received one vaccination injection, while 378,628 people (69.15%) had received two injections, and are thus deemed to be "fully vaccinated".

Sandbox touted as B1.6bn boon

The Phuket Sandbox scheme will continue, Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew has confirmed, claiming that the project has so far generated an estimated B1.6 billion for the economy.

From July 1 to last Saturday (Sept 4) a total of 346 flights had arrived in Phuket, bringing 28,197 Sandbox tourists, Governor Narong told Deputy Army Chief Gen Nattapol Nakpanich during a **ZOOM** conference last Sunday (Sept 5), reported the Phuket office of the Public Relations Department (PR Phuket).

Of note, Gen Nattapol also serves as chair of an ad hoc committee of the Center for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA) in Bangkok.

Of those 28,197 Sandbox tourists, 88 had been confirmed as infected with COVID-19, Governor Narong continued, adding that 67 of those had recovered.

The "top 5 tourists", not including Thais, were from the United States of America (3,721), followed by the United Kingdom (3,470), Israel (3,153),

France (2,262) and Germany (2,247), Governor Narong said.

So far 10,492 Sandbox tourists had already returned home, and 17,705 had completed their 14-day stay in Phuket and had traveled to other provinces of Thailand, he added.

Just 4,963 Sandbox tourists remained in Phuket, Governor Narong said.

However, the Sandbox scheme had already injected more than B1.634bn into the economy, Gov Narong noted.

The Governor presented a breakdown of Sandbox tourists' spending, as follows:

- Accommodation B565
- Buying tourism products and services - B376 million
- Food and beverage purchases - B350 million
- Medical and health services - B229 million
- Other expenses B114 mil-

"The B1.634bn spent by tourists nourishes and drives the economy, as well as having the effect of spreading economic benefits to various sectors both directly related to tourism, such as hotels, restaurants, passenger transport, and so on, and other businesses that are supply chains supporting the tourism industry, such as agriculture, industry, energy, among others," Governor Narong said.

The "multiplier effect" as income is re-spent throughout the economy could generate as much as B3.818mn for the economy, he added.

"As for the number of SHA+ nights booked, the number of bookings from July to September totals 484,427 room nights," Governor Narong continued.

"The overview of the implementation of the Phuket Sandbox plan can still go forward," he assured.

"Disease control in the area is currently being carried out in the province by proactively inspecting the risk areas and risk groups, such as migrant workers at workers' camps, people in the fishing industry, and sea gypsies, among others, which have seen the number of infected people in the province increase over the past week, averaging 200-250 new infections [a day]," Gov Narong explained.

"When an infected person is found, they must be brought into the treatment system immediately," he said.

The report announcing that the Sandbox scheme has already generated B1.6bn for the island follows former Phuket MP Anchalee Vanich Tephabutra last Thursday (Sept 2) reporting that the average monthly income across Phuket stood at B1,961 – a figure she described as plunging people into "acute poverty".

This number is considered lower than the poverty line in Thailand," she added.

The devastation to people's incomes across the island was made clear by Dr Chayanon Pucharoen, Associate Dean for Research and Graduate Studies at the Prince of Songkla University (PSU) Phuket's Faculty of Hospitality and Tourism, who in March this year was asked to present his understanding of the economic situation in Phuket to Deputy Prime Minister Jurin Laksanawisit.

The news was not good. The central government's "We Travel Together" campaign was able to generate B1.5bn for the province, Dr Chayanon reported at the time.

However, that did not prevent the number of unemployed people in Phuket rising to about 64,000.

The average income had fallen to only B1,900 per person per month, he said.

Asked whether Ms Anchalee's assessment of the monthly average income of just B1,961 (about US\$60 a month) was accurate, Dr Chavanon told The Phuket News on Monday (Sept 6), "The situation has not changed."



Phuket Fishing Port reopens

PHUKET FISHING Port on Koh Siray, Rassada, reopened last Friday (Sept 3) after a two-week shutdown due to a spate of COVID-19 infections that ripped through the fishing community.

"Phuket has 17 fishing piers registered to the Department of Fisheries. Only 10 of the piers are used for bringing fish ashore, the rest are used for mooring," said Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew during an inspection last week.

"About 100,000 tonnes of seafood are brought ashore through the piers each year," he noted.

The annual yield of seafood produce brought ashore through Phuket's fishing piers was valued at about B4.5 billion, Governor Narong added.

However, Governor Narong gave no estimate of the economic impact of the main fishing port on the island shutting down for two weeks.

"We have 352 fishing boats with 3,159 people working on the boats. Among the workers, 1,428

are Thais, and 1,731 are from Myanmar, Cambodia and piers," he said.

"After officers and staff from the Phuket Public Health Office (PPHO) came to conduct proactive screening and found many workers infected with no symptoms, we set up a storehouse as a community isolation venue which is filled with 150 beds. Right now, we have 120 workers staying at the venue," Governor Narong said.

"Meanwhile, we also have a total of 178 work-

ers staying on 18 boats as 'vessel isolation' offshore Laos. We also have about near Koh Tapao Noi. There 400 people working on the are 36 workers infected on five boats. The remaining workers are still healthy but volunteer to stay offshore on the boats," he added.

> Phuket Fishery Association President Somyot Wongboonyakul explained that the 14-day closure at the pier had affected fishermen and fish vendors, but also gave no estimate of the economic impact of the shutdown.

New law may replace emergency decree

The government may decide not to extend the enforcement of the emergency decree imposed to curb the spread of COVID-19 at the end of the month if new cases continue to decline at the current rate, according to Gen Natthapol Nakpanich, secretary-general of the National Security Council.

However, the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA) warned that new daily cases could reach up to 30,000 if people fail to take serious precautions after restrictions are eased.

Gen Natthapol, in his capacity as director of the CCSA's operation centre, said the decree had been invoked only to contain the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We are aware that society is unhappy about it. We have lived under the decree for such a long time," he said. "It was invoked to control the disease and its enforcement must come to an end sooner or later.



"It is likely that the decree will not be extended if the situation remains stable like this due to the cooperation of the public," Natthapol said, adding Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha and the CCSA will make a decision on the matter.

The emergency decree is being imposed in the country and empowers the prime minister to deal with the COVID-19 crisis. It gives Prayut the ability to directly address an emergency situ-

ation or prevent worsening conditions. He can also order bans to prevent entry to certain areas deemed prone to coronavirus infections; gatherings in crowded areas or any activity that would incite unrest.

Natthapol said the Public Health Ministry is revising the Disease Control Act, which would replace the emergency decree at the end of this month if it is not extended.

He pointed out that if approved by parliament, the revised disease control law will put in place more effective containment measures.

"The new law should be adequate or even better than the emergency decree," Natthapol said. "This is because the decree focuses on tough restrictions, though in some cases it does not provide an adequate response."

But the amended law will be better suited to the purpose because it has been proposed by the Public Health Ministry, which is more aware of the problems that need to be addressed, he said.

"The new law will provide comprehensive responses," Natthapol said.

If and when the new law is enacted, the CCSA will officially end its role, with the Public Health Ministry or the National Disease Control Committee expected to take over under new guidelines, he said.

A source at Government House said Prayut will chair a CCSA meeting today (Sept 10) to assess the situation after more than a week of the easing of COVID-19 curbs which began on Sept 1.



DDC confirms vaccine mix

DEPUTY DIRECTOR-General of the Department of Disease Control (DDC) Dr Sophon Iamsirithavorn confirmed last Friday (Sept 3) that Thailand will begin mixing AstraZeneca and Pfizer doses starting in October.

Dr Sophon has advised that the Kingdom's current mixed vaccination approach uses Sinovac for the first dose and AstraZeneca as the second after a 3-4 week waiting period. The mix is currently the main vaccination plan for people above the age of 18.

A second practice using AstraZeneca as the first dose and Pfizer as the second dose with 4-12 weeks separation is to become widespread starting vaccine arrives. The country is slated to receive 10 million Pfizer doses during the final

three months of this year.

A third approach, where two doses of Sinovac are boosted by a third dose of AstraZeneca after four weeks is also to be utilised.

The committee responsible was advised on its approach by a body studying immunity last month in which academic research from both Thailand and other participating countries was presented.

In addition, unvaccinated people who recovered from COVID-19 are to receive an immunity boosting shot of either AstraZeneca or Pfizer 1-3 months after recovery.

Addressing concerns that a booster shot poses the risk of cancer, the doctor explained the warning is only a general caution as the treatment has yet to receive extensive research. in October once more Pfizer He acknowledged however, that the third vaccination shot could impact a person's immune system. NNT

Prayut, ministers survive no-confidence vote

PRIME MINISTER PRAYUT CHAN-Ocha and five Cabinet ministers have survived the no-confidence vote with no surprises despite rumours that some coalition MPs might break ranks earlier.

Prayut got 264-208 votes, with three abstentions, the second-fewest votes of confidence after Labour Minister Suchart Chomklin from the Palang Pracharath Party, who got 263-201 with 10 abstentions.

In the previous censure debates, he sailed through with the most votes of confidence, with 274, both in February last year and February this year.

Health Minister Anutin Charnvirakul won this. 269-196 with 11 abstentions. Transport Minister Saksayam Chidchob got 269-195 votes with 10 abstentions. Both were from the Bhumjaithai Party.

Agriculture Minister Chalermchai Srion from the Democrat Party won the most votes of confidence at 270-199 with eight abstentions while Chaiwut Thanakamanusorn, the new digital economy and society minister from the PPRP, received 267-202 with nine abstentions.

During the four-day hearing, opposition lawmakers censured Prayut and his top ministers, saying they mismanaged the economic assistance programs, virus containment measures and the vaccination rollout.

This is the third attempt by the opposition to unseat the government since the 2019

elections, with attempts failing as Prayut's coalition holds about 60% of parliament seats. An earlier no-confidence vote this year was held in February.

Still, infighting within the PPRP may Deputy Prime minister and Public complicate matters, even if Prayut denies

> "Even though the prime minister survived the vote, it doesn't mean that the conflict between factions within his party has been resolved. It just means that the whipping for this vote was successful," said Punchada Sirivunnabood, a visiting fellow at Singapore's ISEAS-Yusof Ishak Institute.

> Prayut rebutted claims from the opposition, saying the government was doing its best to save lives and revive the economy despite the fast-evolving situation and budget constraints. He argued that Thailand managed the pandemic relatively well with infection and death rates lower than global averages, and that the government has provided unprecedented financial support.

> "Throughout Thai history, there's no other prime minister that helped the people like I did," Prayut said. Bangkok Post





ost of us are aware that puppies, whilst seriously cute, can be lots of hard work. I often hear clients exclaiming that they are 'looking forward to their puppy growing up!' However, it can often be a case of be careful what you wish for. The next stage in dog development, the adolescent stage can be equally as challenging and if you have adolescent kids, you'll know this already...

Like with children, once puppies hit the adolescent stage they go through a shedload of biological, physical, chemical and psychological changes, and accordingly their behaviours can (and usually are) affected. It's not all doom, gloom and panic, but there can be challenges – and if you're not ready for them, it can come as quite a surprise.



When does it happen?

Dogs tend to hit the adolescent stage at around six months of age and work through it until around two years old when they reach full maturity. There is a bit of variance as smaller dogs tend to mature faster than larger ones, however, you'll notice the bulk of the changes in the first six months or so.

Lots of people often advocate early sterilisation as a way to 'prevent' adolescent changes in dogs. But understand that whilst hormones clearly play a role in the changes that our dogs go through, they are not the only thing responsible for behavioural changes. Your dog's brain is growing and developing and the changes and quirks you notice are natural and likely occur regardless of whether they've been 'snipped' or not.

If you've had your dog since a puppy, you may find it easier to tolerate this phase of their development having gone through the full on process of raising a pup. Whereas if you've just adopted an adolescent, you may find this more challenging if you were expecting to have avoided the puppy/chaos stage and adopt a calm, easy going dog. Either way, the bond you have with your new dog will help guide both of you through this stage and makes things easier to work with.

What Will I Notice?

One of the things that starts to tail off into adolescence is the seemingly endless teething and mouthing that young pups enjoy. If you've worked well with this in the puppy phase, to redirect to good chew toys, you'll find your dog naturally choosing these anyway. Some dogs just like to chew and remain power chewers for life, the difference as they get older (and thus stronger) is that they may need more suitable chew toys that can sustain the stronger bite of developed jaws and teeth.

For those who have had puppies, you'll note they seem to sleep forever. Sure, they are whirlwinds when awake, but tiring them out is quite easy. Adolescents however have different schedules with more 'awake time' and lots of energy. The best counter to this, is lots of short burst exercise, training sessions and mentally stimulating games, toys and activities. Exercise on its own is fine, but just makes them fitter, faster and stronger. Mental activity is what will really tire out your power house dog. Equally,

even though your dog seems bigger and stronger, their bones and joints are still fusing and developing and are not yet ready for long powerful runs, jumps and impact work.

Part of the benefit of these 'more awake' hours, is that adolescent dogs seem to take more of an active interest in going for walks, and exploring – far more than puppies usually do. Pups have that inbuilt, biological trigger that seems to keep them 'close to home' – and for good reason. But as they get a bit older, they now have the desire to explore their surroundings, and equally, now have more energy and strength to keep up with you on those slightly longer walks.

A note of caution here, you'll probably also find that your dog's recall, and desire to be next to you, is waning considerably now - so don't be surprised if Rover is less interested in coming back to you. To this end, always keep your dog on leash, work him daily to build that recall so down the road, you can walk off leash with no issues.

And on that note, it may not be just his recall that seems to fade. You may feel that all that hard puppy obedience work you put in has suddenly left. It hasn't, but you still need to keep working with your pup. Again, a bit like child adolescents, their brains can be all over the place at times. Be patient, stay the course and keep working through it. It will pay off later down the line. And with that in mind...

Keep Socialising!

It is still really important to continue to properly socialise your dogs through this stage. Remember this doesn't mean just 'let them play with other dogs and people', it means getting them ready to be sociable members of society. This may appear more challenging with a recently adopted adolescent dog with no history, but it's still possible and we need to expose them POSITIVELY to as many situations, people, places and so on as possible.

f you are a fan of NBA basketball you will know that over the past few years there has been a huge debate over who deserves to be called the greatest basketballer of all time. Is the great man of the '80s and '90s, six time championship winner Michael Jordan. Is it the sadly deceased Koby Bryant, or is it the man quickly closing in on Jordan's championship and MVP records - LeBron James.

Well now Warner Bros. have entered a new chapter into that debate. First Michael Jordan was the star of the original Space Jam movie back in 1996 and now they have made LeBron James the star of its sequel – $Space\ Jam: A$ New Legacy.

Storywise the brand-new film is pretty basic. James plays himself although in this world he is at loggerheads with his youngest son Dom (Cedric Joe – *Loving Him*). Dom is a gifted young video game maker who wants to attend an elite Gamers Camp while LeBron wants his son to follow in his footsteps and to attend a Basketball Camp.

Those two worlds then collide when Warner Bros. highly successful algorithm, literally a digital figure named Al G. Rhythm (Don Cheadle – *Crash*), makes the decision that the company needs to hire LeBron and digitally insert him into some classic shows and



movies. LeBron laughs and rejects the idea and in anger Al G. Rhythm lures both him and his son into the Warner Bros. world where he challenges him to a basketball game to show who has the 'skills'.

Al G. Rhythm then sets out to create a super-team using the nearly unbeatable players that Dom has created for his game while LeBron is reduced to putting together a team with the forgotten Looney Tunes stars - including the fan favourites Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck and Road Runner.

The premise behind the film is basic but somehow director Malcolm D. Lee (Girl's Trip) manages to make it all work. It is obvious that the film is supposed to be a vehicle to not only bring

the Looney Tunes back into popularity with a younger generation but to also showcase the entire WB World. There are a plethora of characters appearing from other WB franchises throughout this film so no you aren't seeing things if you suddenly see King Kong or Voldermort appear... and at times the film itself plays up to that with heavy references to films such as The Matrix.

While some may view that as a negative it does actually become a positive for the film because it ends up meaning that this is a film that can be enjoyed by the whole family. In fact you could argue that while this is clearly a film aimed at kids it is a film that will largely be loved by adults because of the nostalgia factor. If your kids are not fans of basketball or haven't raided vour own Looney Tunes VHS collection then chances are they are going to wonder what on Earth is happening throughout

Of course what WB is actually hoping for is that your kids will fall in love with the good old Looney Tunes characters off the back of this film and that is something that could certainly happen. The animation team behind the film do change-up things during the film and try to make the Looney Tunes characters look more modern and to a certain extent it does work.

The other big question that people are going to wonder going into this film is does LeBron James have the acting ability to pull off a movie like this. The simple answer to that is yes, the long answer is don't expect to see him in any Oscar-winning roles anytime soon. James does what it takes to make this film work and he is more than passable even in scenes where he has to reach for his emotions. The man who steals the show though is Don Cheadle who seems to be channelling Jack Nicholson's performance in *The Witches of Eastwick* throughout the film.

To sum up Space Jam: A New Legacy is not a waste of time but be prepared as an adult to get more out of this film than your kids will. It's loud, it's funny and at times is a walk down memory lane.

Let Albon go, says Wolff

FORMULA ONE

MERCEDES TEAM boss Toto Wolff has urged rival team Red Bull Racing to release Thai-British driver Alex Albon from his existing contract to enable him to return to F1 with Williams next season.

It has been confirmed British starlet George Russell will replace Valtteri Bottas to take the second seat at Mercedes next season alongside seven times world champion Lewis Hamilton.

Bottas confirmed on Monday (Sept 6) he will be racing for Alfa Romeo next season.

Russell currently races for Mercedes-powered Williams meaning they will require an additional driver next term and Albon is among the favourite candidates to land the role.

However, he needs to be released from his current contract with Red Bull before this can be triggered, insisted Wolff.

"It's tricky to have a 100% Red Bull driver on a Mercedes power unit, so

I'm happy to work with him as long as they let him free from his Red Bull contract," the Austrian told reporters at the Dutch Grand Prix last Sunday (Sept 5).

Albon, 25, is still under contract with Red Bull Racing despite the team dropping him at the end of last season. He is currently competing in the German Touring Cars circuit.

Red Bull boss Christian Horner, however, is concerned that Mercedes may overlook Albon and instead look to promote their new Formula E champion Nyck de Vries for the seat.

"We have no management contract with him, neither do we have an option of taking him back and therefore Nyck can drive in any team," Wolff added.

Dutch delight for Max in home Grand Prix triumph

he Dutch Grand Prix last Sunday (Sept 5) couldn't have gone any better for Max Verstappen and his legion of home fans on a weekend Mercedes began the painful process of renewing its driver line-up.

The Dutch Grand Prix may always have been in Verstappen's destiny. Revived after 36 years, it exists only because of the man the Dutch call 'Super Max', whose prodigious talent has ignited a supporter base so fierce that it rivals the renowned passion of the Ferrari tifosi or the German Michael Schumacher diehards of the 2000s.

The well-travelled 'orange army' has already made successes of races all over Europe as Verstappen's star has risen; now Circuit Zandvoort, near Amsterdam, is reaping the rewards of having a homegrown hero.

And from the moment Verstappen set foot on the circuit for his Thursday track walk,



complete with standing ovations from the already massing crowd that would swell to a sold-out 70,000 people, victory at home seemed the only possible outcome.

Zandvoort's fast bends and rolling undulation seemed built for the Red Bull Racing car, which powered around the renovated circuit as if on rails. Yes, Mercedes lost a full hour of crucial practice to a broken engine, but Hamilton's car was recalcitrant all weekend long regardless, distrustful of the unusual steep banking.

In the end Verstappen had enough pace in hand to

swat away every challenge Mercedes threw at him, and in a haze of orange smoke and to the thunderous approval of the audience he soaked in the feeling of his first home victory.

"The expectations were very high coming into the weekend and it's never easy to fulfil that, but the whole crowd has been incredible, and I am so happy to win here," he said. "I've never experienced anything like this before in my life."

But the victory will quickly fade from memory as just one of 21 chapters in the 2021 season, and already it has been overshadowed by Mercedes's decision to send Valtteri Bottas packing for Alfa Romeo in favour of rising star George Russell.

Bottas has long been behind the ferocious title pace set by Verstappen and Hamilton, while heir apparent Russell, in the final year of his Williams apprenticeship, is increasingly frequently outperforming his backmarking machinery.

Bottas's contribution to Mercedes cannot be understated. His super single-lap speed and strong technical feedback has kept Hamilton and the car sharp. Crucially, his apolitical demeanour has kept the team harmonious after its high-profile boilovers in the preceding Lewis Hamilton-Nico Rosberg era.

"He has been the best teammate I've had the pleasure of working with," Hamilton said, while team boss Toto Wolff added: "Valtteri has done a fantastic job over the past five seasons, and he has made an essential contribution to our success and to our growth."

Brazil vs Argentina qualifier halted by COVID controversy

BRAZIL'S WORLD CUP QUALIFYING clash against Argentina was dramatically suspended shortly after kick-off last Sunday (Sept 5) as controversy over COVID-19 protocols erupted.

Amid incredible scenes at Sao Paulo's Neo Quimica Arena, the match between the two giants of South American football came to a halt when a group of unidentified officials came onto the pitch, triggering a melee involving team staff and players.

from the tunnel without his team shirt on as confusion swept around the stadium.

The stunning intervention came just hours after Brazil's health authorities said four players in Argentina's squad based in England should be placed in "immediate quarantine" for breaching COVID-19 protocols.

According to Brazil's National Health Surveillance Agency (ANVISA), Premier League players Giovani Lo Celso (Tottenham), Emiliano Martinez (Aston Villa), Emiliano Buendia (Aston Villa) and Cristian Romero (Tottenham) provided "false information" upon their entry to Brazil.

Romero, Lo Celso and Martinez were all in the Argentina starting line-up that kicked off Sunday's game.

However the four Premier League players were accused of failing to disclose that they had spent time in the United Kingdom in the

14 days prior to their arrival.

A ministerial order dating from June 23 Argentina's players trudged off the pitch prohibits the entry into Brazilian territory of to the changing room as the furore arranged. any foreign person from the United Kingdom, Argentina captain Lionel Messi later re-emerged India or South Africa, to prevent the spread of variants of the coronavirus.

> "ANVISA considers that this situation represents a serious health risk and recommends that the local health authorities (of Sao Paulo) order the immediate quarantine of the players, who are prohibited from taking part in any activity and from remaining on Brazilian territory," the agency said in a statement.

> ANVISA said Brazil's Federal Police had been notified so that "the necessary measures are taken immediately".

Brazilian website Globoesporte said the Argentina Football Association (AFA) could request an exceptional authorization from authorities in Sao Paulo to allow the players to take the field against Brazil.

The controversy comes after nine Brazilians based in the Premier League failed to travel to South America following objections from their clubs. AFP

The Andaman Sea shone in all its glory upon the return of the awardwinning Phuket Raceweek on Aug 27-29 in Chalong Bay.

After a one-year hiatus due to pandemic restrictions, organisers pulled out all the stops and worked with the Thai yachting community to put on a successful three-day sailing event with 10 boats taking part in three classes.

Close racing was the name of the game in the OMR Sports Multihulls class, with all entrants on the podium during the seven-race series. A fast finish with three wins from three races wasn't quite enough for Warwick Downes' Bonza, however, whose two third places and a fourth earlier on in the series meant they had to settle for second place behind Fugazi, skippered by local multihull guru Mark Pescott.

Elsewhere in the class the two Fireflys were having their own tussle, swapping places each race. By series end, it



was Twin Sharks, skippered by Jason Corall, who edged out Jojo Tayong's Voodoo to take third place and the Firefly bragging rights.

A trio of locally-built Stealth catamarans battled it out in the OMR Cruising Multihulls class. Designer and builder of the Stealths, Alan Carwardine, was skippering Saffron and used his build expertise and local sailing knowledge to edge out the others and claim victory overall. While Mick Coleman's Fez and Glywn Rowlands' Twister 2 kept them honest, they had to settle for second and third respectively.

Niels Degenkolw's team on Phoenix dominated the IRC Monohulls class winning six out of six and claiming the 2021 class crown. Mas Alegre and Night Train went head-to-head for second place bragging rights and by series end it was Paul Baker's Mas Alegre that came out ahead claiming second with Paul Merry's Night Train in third.

New to Phuket Raceweek this year was a Pursuit Race – the first time such a race has been held during the regatta and possibly the first time in Thailand. Held on the second day, the entire fleet

were set off according to their handicap (slowest boat first) and finished off Koh Larn in Chalong Bay. Fugazi claimed the honours in the Multihulls class while Phoenix came top in the Monohulls class.

Another first this year saw hydrofoil kites and wing foils compete on the final day. Taking out the inaugural wins were Zayyar Wit in the Hydrofoil Kite class and Alejandro Vernis in the Wing Foil class.

'WONDERFUL SHOWCASE'

Despite the challenges of putting on an event during a pandemic, the 2021 Phuket Raceweek will be remembered for three days of sailing in near perfect conditions, great camaraderie amongst the participants and a wonderful showcase of Phuket's hospitality and preparedness.

Driving awareness through its #PhuketSailing campaign, the organiser's were laserfocused on delivering a safe event with lots of on water fun, during these challenging times.

"We discussed holding the event with key members of the local sailing community and they were all keen to go ahead" said Byron Jones, Managing Director of organisers Media Business Services Co. Ltd.

"We moved from our traditional July slot to August to accommodate local needs and while we had to ensure all was in line with local authority rules and COVID measures, the event went off without a hitch and everyone who took part had a great time," Jones added.

Ronaldo's lucky number seven

THIS WEEKEND SEES the return of Cristiano Ronaldo to the Premier League as he makes his second debut for Manchester United.

Having originally cut his teeth and forged his game and reputation under the watchful eye of Sir Alex Ferguson between 2003-09, Ronaldo returns a globally recognised brand, the most popular social media celebrity alive with over 550 million followers.

The cult of numbers may be meaningless to some but the number seven component of Ronaldo's brand CR7 carries huge significance to its owner and has very pivotal historical relevance.

The number seven jersey at Manchester United has a rich history of almost mythical status that has been worn by some of the club's most iconographic and iconoclastic players.

George Best was the first to imbue legend on the shirt, partly due to his reputation as a genius maverick of a player, partly because he



wore the shirt when United status speaks for itself. won their first European Cup against Benfica in 1968. Either way, it set off a trend of great players adorning the shirt and created his

Not long after Best came 'Captain Marvel' Bryan Robson who wore the shirt with distinction for 13 years between 1981-1994 before handing it over to arguably the club's biggest icon of recent years: Eric Cantona.

'The King', as he is still affectionately known, rewrote the script and helped propel the club to unprecedented heights during a five year spell at the inception of the Premier League.

Next came 'Goldenballs' himself, David Beckham. Legends in sport don't get much bigger and Beckham's

It was after Beckham departed for Real Madrid in 2003 that Ronaldo adopted own legend amongst a list of giants in the game.

Despite the number seven already allocated to Edinson Cavani, the Uruguyan handed the jersey back to his new teammate when it was confirmed the Portuguese was rejoining United.

The are millions around the world who await with baited breath to see what history and legend Ronaldo writes next now he and his favourite number are once again reunited at United. It starts tomorrow (Sept 11) against Newcastle United (kick-off 9pm Phuket time). Ben Tirebuck

heelchair racer Pongsakorn Paeyo, Thailand's most decorated Paralympian at the 2020 Games, is looking forward to more success at Paris 2024 after winning three gold medals in Tokyo.

Pongsakorn and a large number of teammates arrived in Phuket on Monday (Sept 6) to enter 14-day quarantine as required by the government's COVID-19 protocols.

They were greeted by government, sports and local officials as well as well-wishers at a colourful ceremony at Phuket International Airport. The athletes received bouquets of flowers from HRH Princess Sirivannavari Nariratana Rajakanya, a former national athlete in badminton and equestrian.

They were the second group of Thailand's Paralympic delegation to return from Tokyo after wheelchair fencer Saysunee Jana, weightlifters Narong Kasanan, Thongsa Marasri, Kumaan Anon, and Judo athlete Methinee Wongchompoo touched down last Wednesday (Sept 1). The final members of the Thai delegation were scheduled to arrive on Tuesday (Sept 7).

The Thai team won five gold, five silver and eight bronze medals at Tokyo 2020 which ended last Sunday.

Before the Tokyo event, the Sports Authority of Thailand predicted its athletes would get four to six gold medals. In the end, they claimed the same number of total medals, 18, they had won in the 2016 Games but the Rio campaign remains the country's most successful with six gold, six

silver and six bronze medals.

Pongsakorn, 24, claimed golds in the men's 100m, 400m and 800m T53 events, making him the first Thai to win three titles at one Games.

"I am glad that I helped enhance the country's reputation. I am proud of myself that I also broke the records in all three events I entered at the Tokyo Games," the Khon Kaen native said.

"My next target is certainly at Paris 2024. I have to prepare myself from now to make Thais happy again."

Pongsakorn has now won five Paralympic gold medals, two short of the country's record set by fellow wheelchair racer Prawat Wahoram who has bagged seven.

Pongsakorn will receive B21.6 million in reward from the government for winning three titles in Tokyo. Under the National Sports Development Fund's bonus scheme for Paralympians, a champion will get B7.2mn, a silver winner B4.8mn, and a bronze medallist B3mn.

Asked what he would do with the money, he said: "I don't know at the moment. I just want to take a rest and then start training."

Thailand's other gold medallists at the 2020 Paralympics are wheelchair racer Athiwat Paeng-Nuea, who won the 100m T54 title, and the boccia team, who were successful in the defence of their title in the BC1/BC2 category.

Wheelchair fencer Saysunee Jana was Thailand's first medallist at Tokyo 2020 after she took bronze in the individual epee on Aug 26.

Badminton players Sujirat Pookkham and Amnouy Wetwitan earned Thailand's 18th and last medal on the final day of competition last Sunday.

The 35-year-old Sujirat also won the women's singles silver in the sport that made its Paralympic debut in Tokyo.

Other Thai medallists are boccia stars Watcharaphon Vongsa and Pornchok Larpyen (runners-up, individual BC2 and individual BC4), wheelchair racers Prawat Wahoram (silver, 1,500m T54), Putharet Khongrak (bronzes, 1,500m and 5,000m T54) and Saichon Konjen (bronze, 800m T54), table tennis athlete Rungroj Thainiyom (bronze, men's singles Class 6), taekwondo fighter Khwansuda Phuangkitcha (bronze, women's K44 49kg), and the men's table tennis team (bronze, Class 3).

Tokyo bid a colourful farewell to the Paralympics last Sunday after 12 days of stereotype-defying, recordshattering performances despite a year-long pandemic delay.

The closing ceremony featured a riot of neon-clad breakdancers, unicycling butterflies and strutting stiltwalkers, using materials recycled from the Olympic opening ceremony for its vivid props.

Tokyo Governor Yuriko Koike handed the Paralympic flag over to International Paralympic Committee chief Andrew Parsons, who passed it on to Paris Mayor Anne Hidalgo, representing the 2024 hosts.

"During our carnival of sport, we have celebrated difference, exhibited the best of humanity and shown unity in diversity," Parsons said.

"I don't want to do this, but the time has come for me to declare the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games closed," he added, signifying the official closing of the

Laguna Phuket Triathlon cancelled due to COVID concerns

IT WAS CONFIRMED LAST Wednesday (Sept 1) that the 2021 Laguna Phuket Triathlon scheduled for Nov 21 has been cancelled due to ongoing health and safety concerns relating to the COVID-19

A new date has been set for the 28th edition of the event on Nov 20, 2022.

"With the increasing spread

of COVID-19 in Thailand and the current restrictions on mass participation events, the country is facing its worst outbreak," the official announcement read.

"Therefore, it is with a heavy heart that we announce the cancellation of the 2021 Laguna Phuket Triathlon and the transferal of all entries to next year's race on 20 November 2022.

"In consideration of the health and safety of our participants, as well as following the new control

measures by the Centre for COV-ID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA), and in collaboration with the government, our partners, and sponsors, we are confident that this is the best course of action. We hope that you can support and join us next year," the announcement said.

It added that every entry for this year's competition will be automatically transferred to next year's race on Nov 22 and that no action from those already registered looking to transfer their booking is required.

If that person is unable to make the date next year then the option is there to transfer the booking under the name of another person. This has to be done by Sept 30, 2021, however. Any requests after this date will not be accepted and will count towards the 2022 race.
