



PHUKET TOURISM FIGURE SPEAKS OUT ON **LACK OF CLARITY FOR JULY 1 TOURISTS**

eading Phuket tourism business figure Bhummikitti Ruktaengam, President of Phuket Tourist Association, has openly criticized the lack of clarity about the conditions of entry for tourists looking to come under the 'Phuket Sandbox' from July 1, under which fully vaccinated tourists will be allowed onto the island without quarantine.

Mr Bhummikitti explained his concern after a meeting with Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Governor Yuthasak Supasorn and other top-ranking officials on June 2.

"We have only 28 days left, and I think information or clarity should have come out. However, from the clarity in several aspects," Mr Bhummikitti said.

"We have to accept that the TAT is just one of the organisations that should have clarity right now. The problem is that we are questioned a lot by foreign tour agencies about what the conditions are for coming tourists and anything they need to do or prepare.

"There are 28 days left until July 1 when foreign tourists are allowed to come, but the tourists have not been told what they need to do to prepare. We cannot answer them," he said.

"Our incapacity to answer the questions is because making decisions is out of our authority, so I want to ask the officials responsible, which mainly are three ministries: the Ministry of Public Health, the Ministry of Tourism

meeting, all we got was a lack of and Sports and Ministry of Foreign Affairs," Mr Bhummikitti added.

> "The three ministries must talk together and create clear information for what they want tourists to do under the Phuket Sandbox, which allows them to come to Phuket without quarantine.

> "Additionally, we also need the list of selected countries, the testing involved, and the tracing app to be used, which we have been talking about for a long time.

> "In Thailand, right now, there is no tracing app that really works. We have talked about this for two months, and now we have 28 days left to open the Sandbox. We have not received any answer about this, so I need to ask relevant officials for clarity. The three main ministries, not all the Cabinet," he said.

"If we have clear information, we will be able to answer their questions. Then they will come, helping our economy," Mr Bhummikitti explained.

"The Phuket Governor has talked about the risk management [of COV-ID-19], which all people in Phuket are working on and giving our best cooperation. The number of people getting vaccinated is proof of our unity to build herd immunity," he noted.

"The period of 28 days after this will be important for Phuket and the country. If the settings are not clear [sic], the Phuket Sandbox cannot open, and this we must be able to tell the world, as we have done before. If we keep giving explanations, will they believe us?" he posed.

"The Phuket Governor has clearly said that there are three levels of readiness, including the readiness of...

Hands-on' staff must be jabbed

eople working in services in Phuket that require contact or close proximity with other people must be vaccinated in order to be allowed to reopen, Phuket Vice Governor Piyapong Choowong has confirmed.

Vice Governor Piyapong explained during a live broadcast online on May 31, that many of the businesses allowed to reopen under the latest order issued by Phuket provincial officials were required to have their staff vaccinated for COVID-19 in order to be allowed to reopen.

Under the latest order, which came into effect on June 1, a total of 17 types of businesses are allowed

However, the requirement that staff at businesses requiring contact or close proximity to patrons must be vaccinated was not included in the main body of the order. The condition was included in an annex attached to the order.

"Workers in the venues that

staff and customers have to touch or be close to each other need to be fully vaccinated for Sinovac or have received the first injection of AstraZeneca vaccine," Vice Governor Piyapong said.

"The venues that we still ordered to remain closed are at risk of spreading the disease, and they are places that are not necessary for daily living," he said.

"For the restriction for some sounds contradictory to what I ex-

places, we have considered the places linking to daily life, and the risk of spreading the disease can be protected [sic]," he added.

After reconfirming that schools in Phuket are allowed to reopen from June 14, Vice Governor Piyapong read through the list of venues and businesses that must have staff vaccinated in order to reopen.

"Massage and spa venues. It

plained before, but right now, staff gyms, fitness centres, can open, as in this business are vaccinated. We believe that they are safe to work now," V/Gov Piyapong said.

"Staff who provide services in the venues must be fully vaccinated or have received the first injection of AstraZeneca vaccine, which is coming in June," he added.

"We have about 50% of our people who already have had their first injection. We believe that they are safe enough to work, but the disease control measures are still in effect," he noted.

'Workers in tattoo venues also need to be vaccinated," V/Gov Piyapong continued.

"Tourism-related businesses, snorkelling services and scuba diving businesses. Customers must not use snorkelling equipment together.

"Nurseries. Staff need to be vaccinated," he said.

"Outdoor sports venues and public parks. We ask you all to refrain from using the exercise equipment, as we do not have staff to clean them for you," V/Gov Piyapong noted.

"Indoor sport venues, including

there are staff to clean equipment and public areas. All staff must be vaccinated too," he said.

"Boxing stadiums. Staff have to be vaccinated, as trainers and trainees must be close to each other.

"Medical clinics for beauty service. Staff need to be vaccinated," V/Gov Piyapong added.

"Right now, Phuket is becoming safer and safer due to vaccinations. Even though some people like elders and pregnant women have not been vaccinated, they can live in our society safely too because we will have herd immunity,"

"However, those who have not been vaccinated may face difficulty with work," V/Gov Piyapong noted.

"It is your responsibility to be active to get vaccinated, as we are opening for you to register and get injected now," he said.

"In Phuket, we have had some people having side effects from the vaccination, but they had only light symptoms. No one has died from the vaccination in Phuket," V/Gov Piyapong assured.

...Phuket, Thailand, and the world," Mr Bhummikitti pointed out.

"I can proudly say that people in Phuket have given good cooperation, been united, and are ready. Whether the country is ready or not? We have to ask the three main ministries whether they are really ready and ask the national government whether they will give their best support. For the world level, we will see which tourists from which countries are ready to come," he said.

"This is very complicated. If we look at the main 28 countries of our Jusual source market] tourists, we have about 20 countries that have asked their people to observe quarantine when they return. It is not easy, but we need to be clear about our conditions for them first," he added.

"Our association [the PTA] and others receive about 20-30 emails a day inquiring about the clarity [of the conditions] for Phuket Sandbox tourists," he said.

"This is a world-class issue, but I'm not sure whether we are taking this issue seriously enough," he concluded.

OFFICIAL RESPONSE Speaking after heading the

meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall, Mr Yuthasak confirmed that the July 1 reopening to international tourists was going ahead, while admitting that many factors still need to be taken into account and remedied.

Mr Yuthasak said he joined the meeting to prepare for joining a meeting of the Center for **Economic Situation Adminis**tration (CESA) in Bangkok the next day (June 4), where many aspects of the Phuket Sandbox model will be discussed by the committee, chaired by Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha.

tourists can stay how many days they want in Phuket if they do not go to other provinces. However, we still discuss that they may have to stay on the island at least 14 days to be allowed to go to other provinces in accordance with the current order by the CCSA [Center for COVID-19 Situation Administration, in Bangkok].

"They can stay five, 10 or 12 days in Phuket and fly out, but if they want to go to other provinces, they have to be in Phuket at least 14 days. That is what we are still discussing," Mr Yuthasak said.

they arrive in Phuket, Mr "The information right Yuthasak explained, "For now is quite clear. Foreign now, we plan to conduct swab tests on arrival [day 0], day 6 and day 12. Who will be responsible for the tests? For any cost of testing, which is for the safety of Phuket people, the government may have to find a budget to support this cost," he noted.

"If the testing is to be beneficial for the individual tourists, for example, when returning to their countries, if their governments ask them to present documents to prove they are not infected, they will have to pay for the test by themselves," he added.

Mr Yuthasak admitted that the reopening will not be a return to pre-pandemic

arrivals for COVID-19 after levels of tourism, but at least a reopening.

> "In the third quarter, we expect about 129,000 foreign tourists to come. The number is not high, compared to the number of hotel rooms in Phuket," he said.

"For domestic tourists, there is a holiday in July. We will cooperate with airlines and hotels to create special promotions for vaccinated Thai people to come to Phuket. To prove to them that the Phuket Sandbox is not only a paradise for foreigners, but also for Thai people."

Mr Yuthasak recognised the formal request for soft loans to be made available so that Phuket tourism operators can provide appropriate services to foreign tourists.

"For soft loans for operators, the national government has been trying to help, but there are limitations, including banks' conditions. We are not ignoring this issue and will raise this issue to be discussed at the meeting [tomorrow]," he said.

BIG PICTURE

Following the CESA meeting last Friday, Tourism and Sports Minister Phiphat Ratchakitprakarn confirmed that under the 'Sandbox' model tourists must remain on Phuket or 14 days – up from the previously touted seven days – before be- to visit Phuket on July 7 are ing allowed to travel to other from Israel, while visitors destinations in the country.

Mr Phiphat said the meeting had not yet approved plans to reopen Krabi and Koh Samui off Surat Thani to foreign tourists next month because CESA wanted to first assess the outcome of Phuket's reopening over the next two

Officials at the meeting also approved the tourism reopening of Bangkok, Phetchaburi (Cha-am district), Prachuap Khiri Khan (Hua Hin district), Chiang Mai, Chon Buri (Pattaya) and Buri Ram from Oct 1, he said.

Mr Phiphat previously said the combined tourism income of these 10 provinces in 2019 stood at B1.5 trillion, and that was the reason why they were selected to join the reopening pilot programme, which is scheduled to run from Oct 1 until Dec 31.

"Under the sandbox programme, Phuket will also reopen to Thais who have already received two doses of vaccines," he said. "The TAT will sign an agreement with the Board of Trade of Thailand to fly vaccinated members of the board to Phuket to promote the reopening on July 1."


Foreign tourists who plan from the United States will fly to the resort island on July 9, Mr Phiphat said.

He said he was confident at least 70% of Phuket residents, and 100% of local tourism operators will be fully vaccinated in time for the reopening on July 1.

As of Monday (June 7), about 67% of the target 466,587 of Phuket's population had been injected with a first shot of a COVID-19 vaccine, while 98,949 had received their second shot, according to Phuket provincial officials.

A total of 386,049 people have registered for the vaccination drive.

Phuket silent on jabs for expats

t the time of going to press, Phuket officials had yet to make any announcements about whether or not non-working expats living on the island may register to receive a state-provided COVID-19 vaccination, despite promises and announcements that foreigners everywhere else in the country could do so from Monday (June 7).

The delay in publicly recognising that non-working expats, including retirees, may at least register came more than two weeks after the Thai Ministry fo Foreign Affairs announced to the world in English that foreigners, and specifically expats and retirees staying the country, will be able to register from June 7, designated as 'national vaccination day'.

Natapanu Nopakun, Deputy Director-General of the Department of Information and Deputy Spokesman of the Foreign Affairs Ministry, on May 21 announced, "Thailand attaches importance to the vaccination of everyone in Thailand according to the level of risk, regardless of nationality.

"We practice what we preach. No one is safe in Thailand until everyone is safe, everyone is vaccinated," he said.

"Foreigners will be able to register at the hospitals where you have your own health records by using their

passport or social security number," Mr Natapanu explained.

"This is going to be effective across the country," he said.

"Aside from being able to do this at a hospital that already has your health records, it can be done at other designated hospitals, other designated centres as determined by the Ministry of Public Health," he added.

However, Phuket officials have never publicly announced that expats in Phuket will be able to register in accordance with the announcement broadcast in English from Bangkok on May 21.

Mr Natapanu has since recognised that provinces are allowed to operate their own registration procedures. Phuket officials have maintained that all people in Phuket must register through the Phuket Must Win web portal (www.ภูเก็ตต้องชนะ.com) in order to receive a state-provided vaccination, though the system was 'temporarily suspended' while officials checked people not registered as living in Phuket being registered through the system.

For foreigners in Phuket, it has been a stop-go-stop experience, with officials announcing that foreigners can register through the portal, then later confirming that only foreigners issued work permits may register, as was allowed last month.

As of Tuesday morning (June 8), Phuket officials had not made any announcements that expats not working in Phuket may register to receive a state-provided vaccination on the island, not even with a post in Thai language published through the official government Facebook channels.

The Phuket Must Win web portal continues to feature its "Vaccinations for expats or migrant workers" option on its home page. However, expats attempting to register all through Monday confirmed they were unable to do so.

The failure to even recognise that non-working foreigners would be able to at least register to receive a vaccination followed a push by Phuket officials to provide vaccinations to more than 28,000 migrant workers and expats issued work permits carried out Thursday and Friday last week (June 3-4).

The aim was to provide first injections of Sinovac to 22,613 migrant workers and 5,758 foreign workers over just two days, Vachira Phuket Hospital Director Chalermpong Sukontapol had previously explained.

The June 7 deadline also came as officials began providing vaccinations to 24,000 people in Phuket over 60 years of age and people with recognised medical conditions that placed them in a special risk category.

The recipients were administered the AstraZeneca vaccine, the first time that AstraZeneca had been used in Phuket. Before reporting the mass vaccinations of the special category risk group, Phuket officials had not even reported that doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine had even arrived on the island.

The mass vaccination of the 24,000 was expected to be completed from Monday through Wednesday this week (June 7-9).

Fresh market closed in COVID tracing

ONE OF THE MAIN FRESH markets in Phuket Town last week was ordered closed for seven days by local officials as they traced COVID infec-86-year-old woman.

The woman who died was the second death in the current outbreak of COVID-19, Phuket Provincial Public Health Office (PPHO) Chief Dr Kusak June 2.

that the Myanmar woman who worked as a caretaker for the 86-year-old was infected, and then learned that five other Myanmar workers living at the same camp as the caretaker were also infected, he explained.

"First of all, I have to say sorry for the family and relatives. Yesterday, we had the second death from COVID-19 in Phuket. The case was an 86-year-old Thai woman who had a hyperlipidemia and hypertension," he said

"She died at about midday after she had been under care at the Phuket Provincial Hospital for seven days.

"She first came under care with fever and coughing, then doctors confirmed that she had pneumonia," he added.

"After we investigated her tions linked to the death of an case and questioned people who had close contact with her, medical staff found that a Myanmar national woman who was hired to take care of her was infected," Dr Kusak said.

"Medical staff went to Kukiattikoon confirmed on conduct proactive screening at the area where the caretaker Through contact tracing, stayed and found five other health officials had confirmed Myanmar workers infected." he continued.

"The workers worked at the Phuket Town fresh market on Ong Sim Phai Rd, so we swab tested vendors and workers at the market; 460 Thai people and 350 migrant workers were tested, and we found one Myanmar national worker who was infected," Dr Kusak said.

Health officers arrived with officials from Phuket City Municipality on June 2 to deliver the bad news. Newly installed Phuket City Mayor Saroj Angkhanapilas was present for the occasion.

Mayor Saroj explained to the market vendors that he had been informed of the need to take action by the Phuket Governor.

"As it became known, swab samples were taken from about 170 migrant workers at the market on May 31, and one of those workers has tested positive," he said.

Swab samples were taken from more than 400 people working at the market in total. The overall results of the tests had yet to be announced.

Mayor Saroj explained that at this time there was no reason to close Phuket Municipal Fresh Market 1, on Ranong Rd, as there had been no indication that anyone working at that market had been infected.

More than 100 migrant workers at the Ranong Rd market had swab samples taken on June 1, and a further 200 people at the market were to have swab samples taken on June 2.

Mayor Saroj explained that if any persons found working at the Ranong Rd market were found to be infected, then that market would also need to be closed temporarily.

While the fresh market on

Ong Sim Phai Rd is closed, the market will be cleaned thoroughly and sanitised by Phuket City Municipality staff to prevent further spread of the virus, Mayor Saroj said.

"This is to build confidence among customers and the vendors at the market and to continue preventing the spread of COVID-19," he said.

Phuket officials have yet to give any description of the third death recorded in the current outbreak, recognised

Checkpoint run ends in 60km chase

51-year-old man from Trang was arrested in an overturned car near Promthep Cape last Friday (June 4) after a 60-kilometre police chase that began at the Phuket Check Point in Tha Chatchai, where the man had refused to stop for officers while driving onto the island.

Chalong Police Chief Col Sarawut Chuprasit gave the name of the driver as Parit Poldet, 51, originally from Trang.

Col Sarawut explained that Chalong Police were first alerted to Parit fleeing police at about 8:30am after the car Parit was driving, a white Phuketregistered Suzuki Swift, hit and ran after slamming into the back of a black Honda Civic car making a U-turn on the Rawai beachfront road.

Parit was driving at speed along the beachfront road while trying to evade capture by Tha Chatchai Police in pursuit.

After hitting the black Honda Civic, Parit continued his attempt to flee, and lost control of the car on a curve on the steep hill near the Promthep Cape viewpoint. After breaking through a steelcable barrier, the car rolled and ended up coming to rest some 20 metres from the road upside down.

With Parit trapped in the car, but unhurt, officers arrived to break the window and help him out of the wreck, and escort him to Chalong Police

Parit told police that he had stolen the car from a relative in Trang the previous night and travelled to Phuket. He refused to stop at the Tha Chatchai checkpoint in Mai Khao to let officers check his car, and him, and instead chose to drive straight through.

Parit did not give a reason as to why he did so.

The driver of the black Honda Civic that was struck, who asked not to be named, said that she was turning right into a street near a 7-Eleven

store when her car was hit from behind. She had escaped serious injury, and suffered only a scratch on her forehead in the collision.

Col Sarawut confirmed that Parit has been charged for at least reckless driving, causing damage to other people's property. More charges were likely to follow.

Patong thieves blame unemployment

TWO MEN ARRESTED IN Patong for stealing a coffee machine and two television sets from a restaurant have blamed unemployment for their turn to crime, saying that without work they had turned to stealing items in order to have enough money to pay for basic living expenses.

The two men – Samran Luiprasert, 42, from Samut Sakhon, and Amphon Boonchuaynamphon, 34, from Chachoengsao – were arrested by Patong Police early on June 2.

In their report of the arrests, police explained that the men were tracked down after the owner of the 'Safe Number One' restaurant on Phra Baramee Rd in Patong had filed a formal complaint that thieves had entered his businesses property and stolen several items.

Through CCTV, officers were able to see the thieves making their getaway on a black Honda PCX motorbike.

Police were also able to identify Amphon riding as passenger by the tattoos on his neck, arms and legs.

The officers tracked down Amphon to a third-floor room at a building without a designated address off Phra Mettha Rd.

During questioning, Amphon confessed to stealing the items - a

Jura coffee machine and two 43-inch Toshiba LED televisions – from the restaurant, reported police.

He also named Samran as his accomplice.

Officers then moved to arrest Samran at an unregistered address in a street behind the Government Savings Bank branch on Phra Baramee Rd, in Patong, the report noted.

During further questioning at Patong Police Station, the two men both admitted to the theft, police

The men said they sold the items and split the money between them to pay for daily expenses as both had been left out of work due to the COVID-19 crisis, police added.

Regardless, both men were charged for committing the theft, the report noted.

B5.3mn in drugs seized in one bust

TWO MEN WERE ARRESTED with 14,000 pills of methamphetamine (ya bah) and just over 3kg of crystal meth (ya ice), valued at about B5.3 million, in Phuket Town on June 2.

The news came via Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew at the press conference at the Phuket office of the Volunteer Defense Corps (VDC) on June 3.

Present at the conference at 9am were Vice Governor Vikrom Jakthee and other officers.

Governor Narong explained that the arrest was conducted on June 1 at about 5pm by Assistant Chief of Security Affairs Group, Jiradet Burarak, and other Territorial Defense Volunteers (OrSor).

No police officers were present for the raid, though Phuket Provincial Police Commander Maj Gen Pornsak Nuannoo was present for the press conference.

Banpot 'Jo' Saetan, 28, was arrested near the office of Phuket City Municipality Waterworks Division. where he was found with 400 pills of ya bah and 100g of ya ice.

From information given by Banpot, officers further arrested Patiyuth 'Mom' Yorsaengrat, 35, at a house in Soi Suthat 2, Phuket Town, where he was found with 13,600 pills of ya bah and 2.95kg of ya ice.

Officers also seized six digital scales, plastic bags, a motorbike and

two mobile phones as items of evidence. The value of the drugs seized was

estimated to be about B5.35 million. Patiyuth confessed that he was ar-

ranging to divvy up the drugs to sel to local dealers in Phuket. Banpot and Patiyuth were both taken to Phuket City Police Station and

charged with possession of a Category

1 drug with intent to sell. "The Phuket Government has ordered relevant officers to work on prevention and suppression of drugs in Phuket," Governor Narong said.

"So far, we have been arresting local drug dealers and users. Anyone who sees people involved with drugs, please contact us or police, so we can take action on it," he said.

Just two days later, on June 4, five suspects, including four teenagers, were arrested in a Sakhu drug raid that saw police seize over 25,000 ya bah pills and 250g of kratom leaves.

Food security efforts to reach 35,000 homes

he Phuket Provincial Administration Organization (PPAO, or OrBorJor) has put on sale 15,000 "affordable food packages" of essential food items at heavily subsidised prices for local residents suffering from the ongoing economic crisis.

Distribution points were open in 24 locations across the island's 17 subdistricts last Saturday (June 5).

Food sets were available at B70 per set and included 5kg of rice (B40 per pack), one bottle of cooking oil (B15 per bottle) and 15 chicken eggs (B1 per egg).

The campaign saw long queues of people in dire need of help, though officials maintained that the sale was conducted under strict disease prevention measures followed by all people present.

PPAO President Rewat Areerob said that the sale of the subsidized essential food items was organised in accordance with the guidelines given to local administrations. Earlier they were instructed to help their residents suffering from the economic crisis caused by COVID-19.

The move follows the announcement by Mr Rewat that deliveries of essential household supplies in what officials call 'survival bags' are to be provided to more than 35,000 households across the island to help people who are suffering from

the ongoing economic crisis.

Mr Rewat explained at a meeting at the PPAO offices on June 1 that the campaign was the result of a meeting with all local administration organisations in Phuket on May 18.

Following that meeting, the PPAO started accepting requests from local administration offices for help in providing support to people in their areas suffering deep financial hardship due to the ongoing crisis.

The PPAO received requests for support from local administration offices from May 13-30, Mr Rewat said.

"Each local administration organisation considered their budget to help their

"The bags will be distributed from June 10 to 35,668 households in seven subdistricts [tambon], comprising 11,890 households in Wichit; 5,756 in Chalong; 2,824 in Patong; 1,380 in Kamala; 5,015 in Srisoonthorn; 3,117 in Cherng Talay; and 3,107 in Mai Khao," he added.

Thailand strikes back

The country achieved its target of administering at least 300,000 doses of COVID-19 shots on the first day of the its mass vaccination drive last Monday (June 7).

Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha announced that it was a historic day of Thailand beginning to strike back at COVID-19.

As of 4pm on Monday, 306,580 shots had been administered nationwide, said the permanent secretary of public health, Kiattiphum Wongrajit.

Two kinds of vaccine were used on the first day of inoculations – China's Sinovac and AstraZeneca shots that were produced in Thailand.

Both vaccines require two doses to be fully effective, and the government is expecting the finish administering the first doses by the end of September.

Furthermore, the government is planning to procure 100 million doses to inoculate 50mn people, or about 70% of the population, by the end of this year to prepare for a full reopening in January next year.

Marking the countrywide COVID-19 vaccination drive, Gen Prayut wrote on Face-

book that the battle against COVID-19 is still ongoing, a year and a half after it began.

However, this time, the country has vaccines which are its best hope to turn the situation around, he said.

"Vaccines will be the key to reopening the country to tourism, to rehabilitating the economy and to returning normalcy... Vaccines will be the force to drive the country forward with security and sustainability," he said.

Gen Prayut said the rollout will comply with guidelines he had laid down to ensure fair access.

As of Tuesday (June 8), the virus had infected 182,148 people and killed 1,297 people througout the country.

The prime minister assured those who have registered for jabs will be vaccinated with minimum delays, amid reports that some provinces would be allocated fewer doses than expected due to changes to the vaccine distribution plan.

"June 7, 2021 will go down in history as one of the important days in the country's fight against the pandemic. It marks the beginning of Thais striking back [against COVID-19]... and that we will not give up the fight until we win," he wrote.

Speaking at a media interview, Gen Prayut said that between 3.5mn to 4mn doses will be delivered this month and said that vaccines will be allocated to every area based

on their needs and current supplies.

Public Health Minister Anutin Charnvirakul said the ministry has agreed to procure 20mn doses of COVID-19 vaccines from Pfizer and 5mn doses from Johnson & Johnson.

He said that the purchase orders, which were originally scheduled to take place on June 4, would be signed this week.

Mr Anutin also said the government will provide vaccines to every age group if their safety and efficacy are approved, referring to China's decision to authorise the emergency use of Sinovac Biotech's vaccine for children aged between 3 and 17.

Food and Drug Administration (FDA) secretary-general Paisarn Dankum said Pfizer is expected to register its vaccine for emergency use this week. He said the application could be approved in one month if all necessary documentation is submitted.

The FDA has approved five vaccines against the COVID-19 with Sinopharm's formula being the latest.

The other four are made by Johnson & Johnson, Moderna, AstraZeneca and Sinovac.



Moderna vaccine shots B3,800 a set

Preliminary autopsy suggests hotel owner and wife drowned

PRELIMINARY AUTOPSY results on the bodies of a Phuket hotel owner and his wife who were found dead on the bottom of a swimming pool at a seaside resort on Koh Tao in Surat Thani last Friday (June 4) suggest they drowned.

The bodies of Rakeshwar Sachathamakul, 59, and his wife Anshoo, 55, were found in the pool at the Jamahkiri Resort & Spa by their son Ratish, 34.

Having returned from a the bottom of the pool.

He alerted hotel staff to call rescue workers who administered CPR immediately upon arrival but failed to bring the couple back to life.

Koh Tao Police Chief Col Kriangkrai Kraikaew confirmed police arrived at the scene around 4:45pm to find the two bodies lying beside the pool.

Col Kriangkrai explained that CCTV cameras near the pool were broken at the time of the incident so there was no footage showing what exactly happened.

He added that at this stage police believe that one of the

help. The other person then came to the rescue, but both ended up drowning.

Preliminary results of an autopsy conducted on the couple supported the suggestion that the pair had drowned, officials confirmed on Monday.

Physicians conducting the autopsy said the couple had died from a lack of oxygen, adding a lot of water was found in their lungs. No signs of physical assault were found on the couple although blood samples have been sent to a laboratory for further analysis, with results expected in about



SUSTAINABLY YOURS

s the world looks to reopening, it needs to consider making itself more sustainable. The current form of capitalism is based on profit maximization by selling the lowest-quality product and depending on good branding to get the highest price. This short-term thinking and 'buy and throw away' mentality has led us to the climate crisis that we are currently in.

However, sustainability doesn't need to come at the cost of profits and can benefit your brand. According to a 2019 survey by Accenture 72% of consumers are buying more sustainable products than they were five years ago and more than half of consumers said they'd be willing to pay more for products that they can reuse or recycle. A 2019 study from New York University found that products that were marketed as sustainable grew 5.6 times faster than products that weren't.

When making your business sustainable, there are three things that you should consider:

1. Your Supply Chain. A 2009 study estimated that 75% of a business's CO2 emissions are related to its supply chain. This comes from manufacturing, packaging and transporting goods, so, when possible, it is best to buy locally, which is also good for the economy.

2. The quality or durability of your product. Most companies don't build products to last and design them to be impossible to repair when they break down, which is good for the manufacturer's bottom line, but bad for the environment.

3. What happens to the product and/or the packaging at the end of its lifespan? If it's disposed of in a landfill, then it's not sustainable.

Here are three businesses in



Phuket that have adopted sustainability into the ethos of their brand.

Vegan Booty and VeganReady

are owned by serial entrepreneur Christina Wylie. The Vegan Booty is a restaurant in Chalong that sells burgers, pizza, chicken nuggets, ice cream and other indulgent plant-based comfort foods. VeganReady is a startup that sells a variety of frozen ready-to-eat meals, sauces, meat replacements and fully prepared meals for restaurants and hotels.

According to a 2018 study from Oxford, eliminating meat and dairy from your diet could reduce your carbon footprint from food by up to 73% and was one of the best ways to reduce your environmental impact on the planet.

Christina sources all ingredients for the meals in Thailand with as much as possible coming from Phuket and even some from the company's garden. The packaging for VeganReady is made from cornstarch, which you can return to her offices in Phuket Town either in person or by post so that it can be repurposed. The frozen bags are made with paper, which Christina admits doesn't hold up well in the freezer, so she is always on the lookout for ways to improve the sustainability of her packaging.

Project Rattan

was founded by Australian architect Patrick Keane and his wife Juliette



Eve. They fuse modern 3D technology and computer-aided design with traditional Thai arts and crafts to produce unique furniture and architectural installations. As the company name implies, they make their products from rattan, a fast-growing palm that is native to Asia.


The strength and pliability of the material make it ideal for creating furniture and it can supplant less sustainable materials like plastic or hardwoods like teak that take a long time to grow. They source their rattan in Thailand and process it using non-toxic methods. Since it comes from trees, it also sequesters carbon rather than emitting it.

The company uses traditional artisans to work on their designs, which helps keep local craft workers employed, in a traditional art form that might otherwise go extinct.

The company's work has mostly been showcased in upscale restaurants like Spice and Barley or the Vikasa Yoga Retreat, both in Bangkok. However, their company is starting to get international recognition, especially for their unique interior structures, which not only create a pleasing aesthetic but give a building an organic feel to it.

Elleciel

a phonetic spelling for the acronym LSCL, which stands for Live Simply Consume Less, is a surfboard shaper



based in Nai Harn. David 'Mousset' Sautebin, a former Swiss watchmaker, has been in business since 2010. The most sustainable quality of his boards is their durability. Surfboards often only last for one or two years before they need to be replaced. However, David's boards have been known to go for five years without a ding.

He begins with an expanded polystyrene (EPS) foam blank, that comes from a Thai company. He then laminates the board with a layer of paulownia wood, which not only gives the board a beautiful aesthetic but also acts like a shell to prevent dings and dents. David then covers it with basalt or fiberglass and then coats it with Entropy Resin, which replaces petrochemicals with renewable biobased ones. The finished product is a surfboard that is not only more durable than a conventionally made one but also looks more like an organic piece of sculpture than a tool for riding waves.

These three green entrepreneurs prove that, although it requires some forethought, it is possible to run a successful and profitable business while keeping it sustainable. We need more businesses in Phuket to follow their example.

Euro 2020 finally gets underway

Pan-continental tournament overcomes year-long COVID delay

uro 2020 finally gets underway, a year late, today (June 11) with the European Championship being staged as a pan-continental event for the first time.

Matches will be played in 11 cities spread all across Europe, a set-up that is almost certain never to be repeated and was originally the idea of Michel Platini.

The opening game this evening sees Italy host Turkey in Rome (kick off 2am Saturday, June 12, Phuket time).

PLATINI'S 'PLAN'

It was in June 2012, just as Spain was winning that year's European Championship in Kiev, that Platini – then the president of UEFA – revealed the idea of staging the 2020 tournament in "12 or 13 host cities".

It was seen as a way of bringing the competition to a wide range of countries while avoiding having to



build new stadiums or other then, expanding to eight infrastructure in one place after the complications of staging Euro 2012 in Poland and Ukraine.

way to mark the 60th anniversary of the first staging of what was then the European Nations Cup, as a four-team competition in 1960.

The Euro has grown since semi-finals and the final.

teams, then to 16, and then to 24 for the last tournament in France in 2016.

"It is perhaps a bit of a Platini also saw it as a zany idea but it is a good idea," Platini insisted in December 2012.

THE TROUBLES **BEGIN**

Platini claimed that a pan-European event would mean fewer potential problems in terms of stadium-building. However, in late 2017 Brussels – initially awarded four matches – was removed from the list of host cities due to the inability of Belgian organisers to guarantee the planned new stadium could be built in time. When he initially floated the idea publicly, Platini had

also claimed that "in these days of cheap air travel anything is possible."

However, the growing climate crisis led to more and more voices speaking out against the carbon footprint caused by staging a European Championship in so many far-flung destinations.

Meanwhile Platini fell from grace in 2015 in the corruption scandal that took down FIFA president Sepp Blatter and led to the Frenchman being handed a long-term ban from working in the game.

POSTPONEMENT AND COMPLICATIONS

Platini's successor, Aleksander Ceferin, was left to deal with the organisation of the continent-wide tournament and UEFA was forced into the historic decision in March last year to postpone the finals just three months before their scheduled start due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Ceferin later admitted the idea of a European Championship in stadiums spread across the continent was "symbolically a nice thing, but not an easy task for us, even regardless of the pandemic."

UEFA put back the tournament by a year but said it would still officially be called Euro 2020.

However organisers had to accept the impossibility of playing matches in front of full stadiums and ended up dropping two more host cities which were unable to guarantee that any fans could attend.

Dublin and Bilbao, both due to host four games, were dropped in April. Seville was named as a replacement for the latter.

The number of host cities was therefore further reduced to 11, while Dublin's games were given to London and Saint-Petersburg.

At least the Euro is happening, contrary to what many observers feared a year ago. But the pan-European experiment will not be repeated for the next edition, with Germany already named as host for Euro 2024.

Les Blues favourites to triumph as England's Three Lions look to roar

IT MAY BE A YEAR LATE but Euro 2020 finally kicks off in Rome this evening (June 11) as former World Champions Italy host Turkey in Group A.

GROUP A

Roberto Mancini's Italy had an outstanding qualifying record, albeit in a relatively weak group, and go into the tournament full of confidence.

Paris Saint-Germain's Marco Verratti is their key man and if he can replicate his club form on the international stage then Italy should be able to qualify from the group. How far they progress after that is anyone's guess.

Turkey are many people's dark horses, managed by Şenol Güneş who previously took them to the semi-finals of the 2002 World Cup. Built on a solid defence, Burak Yilmaz, Ozan Tufan and Çağlar Söyüncü are all ones to watch and it would be no surprise to see The Crescent Stars venture deep into the competition.

Wales will look to emulate their fantastic achievement at Euro 2016 when they reached the semi-final although an ageing,



injury-plagued squad could struggle. A lot rests on the shoulders of talisman Gareth Bale.

Switzerland make up the group.

GROUP B

Group B sees Finland make their debut in the competition where they will face off against fellow Scandinavian's Denmark with the latter looking to the mecurial Christian Eriksen for inspiration.

Belgium are the overwhelming favourites to win the group if not the entire tournament with a squad packed with superstars such as Kevin de Bruyne, Eden Hazard and Romelu Kukaku. However, their ageing defence could potentially

undermine their aspirations and pose a headache for coach Roberto Martinez.

Russia made the quarter-finals of the 2018 World Cup in their homeland although the squad has changed greatly since and they do not enter the competition brimming with confidence, despite their coach Stanislav Cherchesov maintaining they can shine.

GROUP C

North Macedonia are another country making their debut and in a group containing the indifferent Netherlands, Austria and Ukraine could possibly cause an upset or two.

Their captain, 37-year-old Goran

Pandev, has just finished his 20th season playing for Genoa in Italy and is their all time top scorer and appearance holder.

Having missed out on Euro 2016 and the 2018 World Cup, this is the longest absence from major finals for the Dutch since the mid-1980s - when they marked their return by winning Euro '88.

GROUP D

The Czech Republic, Croatia, Scotland and England battle it out in Group D. The latter go into every tournament with huge expectations and the Three Lions could possibly live up to their billing this time if coach Gareth Southgate can successfully fuse the dynamic between defence and an outstanding arsenal of attacking talents including Harry Kane, Jack Grealish, Phil Foden and Mason Mount. At 17 years old, Jude Bellingham is one to watch and could shine, given the chance. England play all their group games at Wembley which is a distinct advantage.

GROUP E

Spain will be confident to top the group although they are a pale shadow of their former all-conquering selves. Much is expected of Barcelona's 18-year-old Pedri, a prodigious talent who could light up the tournament.

Poland, led by lethal Bayern Munich striker Robert Lewandowski, will be vying to beat Spain to top spot in the group with Sweden and Slovakia, for which ensuring progression will not be a foregone conclusion for either.

GROUP F

It is a tradition for every international tournament to have its 'group of death'. Group F definitely adopts the mantle this time as holders Portugal, World Champions France, Germany and Hungary match up.

Germany have struggled of late although they nearly always seem to find their groove come tournament time.

France boast an exceptional squad with talents such as Paul Pogba, Kylian Mbappe, N'Golo Kanté, Antoine Griezmann, Ousmane Dembele and Karim Benzema placing them as many people's favourites to win the tournament.

Portugal still have much to offer with the age-defying Cristiano Ronaldo still their most potent threat and important player.

The Euro 2022 finals start this evening with Italy versus Turkey (kick-off 2am Saturday, June 12, Phuket time). Ben Tirebuck





Perez secures victory but mad Max the real winner

or years Red Bull Racing has dreamed of having a teammate befitting Max Verstappen's prodigious pace, and Sergio Perez proved he's their man in Baku last Sunday (June 6).

Perez sensationally claimed a breakthrough victory for Red Bull Racing at the Azerbaijan Grand Prix, but the real winner was Verstappen, who didn't finish the race at all.

Verstappen had led most of the way after jumping Lewis Hamilton at the pit stops, and Perez following him through for second place. The Mercedes car was far from its rapid best around the unique Baku street layout, and Verstappen, who started the weekend with a four-point championship lead, was set to extend that to 14 with a second straight win.

But the race was flipped on its head just five laps from that this is a marathon, not the finish when Verstappen's rear-left tyre spectacularly gave way at more than 315 kilometres per hour on the

start-finish straight, pitching him into the concrete barriers.

He emerged unscathed but incensed. In a hotly contested title fight, a failure to finish stings especially badly, and as Verstappen returned dejectedly to his garage Hamilton was preparing to line up second on the restart grid.

"We've got to remember a sprint," Hamilton radioed his team before the restart. "We've got to be measured on how aggressive we go."

His message was clear: with just two racing laps remaining he had the chance to open an easy 14-point lead in the title chase. After a difficult weekend in the car, second place would be more than enough reward.

But his good intentions lasted only to the first corner. He nailed his getaway to run side by side with new polesitter Perez, and the Mexican swooped defensively to the left to cover.

In the pressure of the mo-

ment, as he went to pull his upshift paddle, Hamilton accidentally hit the button to trigger what the team calls 'magic' mode, which biases the brakes fully forwards. His front wheels instantly locked up, and he dramatically overshot the corner in a plume of smoking rubber and tumbled out of the points.

In a duel off the line, victory belonged to Perez. But it's Verstappen who will leave Baku as the winner, his four-point lead of reigning champion Hamilton almost unbelievably intact.

Mercedes failed to score with either car for the first time since 2018. Red Bull Racing extended its championship lead to 26 points.

This close championship will be decided not only by Verstappen and Hamilton's worst days but by the performances of their teammates. In pressuring Hamilton into a mistake, Perez executed his role to perfection.

Perez might finally be the driver the team's been waiting for. Whether he can help make Verstappen a world champion remains to be seen.

"We understand that our fans were looking forward to another edition of the Formula 1 Singapore Grand Prix," said Colin Syn, Deputy Chairman of Singapore GP Pte Ltd.

"To cancel the event for a second year is an incredibly difficult decision, but a necessary one in light of the prevailing restrictions for live events in Singapore."

Since its debut, the Formula 1 Singapore Grand Prix has attracted fans from over 100 countries and established itself as more than just a race with a robust circuit-wide concert and entertainment

Historic Thai equestrians qualify for Tokyo Olympics

CONGRATULATIONS ARE IN ORDER for the Thai national team and the Thailand Equestrian Federation (TEF).

For the first time, under the visionary leadership and equestrian passion of Dr Harald Link and Nunthinee Tanner, president and vice president of the TEF, a team of three Thai elite riders have qualified to compete at the Olympics.

The trio – Arinadtha 'Mint' Chavatanont, Weerapat 'Bomb' Pitakanonda and Korntawat 'Nat' Samran – have qualified for the team eventing discipline, securing their tickets to the July 23-Aug 8 Tokyo Olympics at the Baborowko Equestrian Festival held from May 27-30 in Poland. Nara Ketusingha is the team manager.

Eventing is a holistic test of an equestrian athlete as it combines three disciplines – show jumping, dressage and cross country.

Olympic qualification as a team is particularly difficult because all riders must qualify, as opposed to just one for individual disciplines.

The Thai national team has been strategically targeting to make their debut on the world's greatest sporting stage for over 10 years, with the TEF continually raising the team's standards.

The riders have been training with renowned French eventing athlete and trainer Maxime Livio since 2013.

Livio is an accomplished athlete in his own right with 25 wins in major eventing

competitions and is consistently ranked among the top French riders.

He guided the Thai team to win a team bronze medal in the 2018 Asian Games in Jakarta as well as golds for both team and individual disciplines at the 2019 FEI Asian Championships held at the Thai Polo and Equestrian Club in Chon Buri.

Riders will continue training through this month at Ecurie Livio Stable in Saumur, France, before moving to Aachen, Germany, next month for horse quarantine prior to the Olympics, as required by the host.

Athletes will also undergo two rounds of COVID-19 screening before entering Japan and receive daily testing for the duration of the Tokyo Games.

As the first Thai equestrian team to ever qualify for the Olympics, and with the unwavering support of the TEF, we can look forward to seeing these rising stars compete on the world stage for years to come.



here have been countless admirable charity initiatives across Phuket in the past 12 months or so where donation drives have been established to help those truly in need during these difficult times of the COVID-19 pandemic.

On June 20, British expat Mark Gillett is taking his efforts to raise much needed funds more than a step further by channelling his love for outdoor adventures and running the length of the island, a distance of 70km.

The 36-year-old teacher at KIS school in Kathu has set himself the arduous challenge of running from Promthep Cape in the island's south to the Sarasin Bridge in the north, battling various challenges enroute such as punishing hills, rugged terrain and energy-sapping beaches.

He plans to stick as close to the coast as possible throughout, starting the endeavour at 4am in the hope of covering as much as he can before the heat and humidity take effect. A select set of fellow running enthusiasts will join him for certain sections, more so to provide him with refreshments and moral support, although for the large part he will be going it alone.

Having supported an independent food drive in Kathu last year, Mark is hoping his efforts can raise direly needed funds to contribute towards food drives the One Phuket initiative has been leading for the past year.

He also plans to register his challenge with The Fastest Known Time, an organisation that records routes and times achieved by a range of outdoor pursuits enthusiasts throughout the world. Mark hopes his challenge can entice and encourage others to repeat his feat and establish the route as a popular draw for Phuket.

Partnering with One Phuket and the Scholars of Sustenance program, Mark wanted to use his passion to help contribute to the excellent work they do, which is how the idea for the upcoming challenge was conceived.

"As far as I am aware, nobody has done this previously," Mark told *The Phuket News*.

"If my efforts can help contribute to those on the island who have truly suffered during this pandemic and who really need assistance then it will be more than worth it," he added.

Making his attempt all the more admirable is the fact he has only just returned from a serious knee injury two months ago that hampered his training and preparation.

"I have been building up more and more every week," Mark said. "I increase my distance around 10% every week, which in turn has improved my strength and durability. Regular trail runs across the island are a key part of my training regime as is the weekly speed training I undergo.

"I have also added in strength and flexibility work such as yoga which has helped with conditioning and will hopefully help mitigate any chance of injury."

'BIG ADVENTURES ON AVERAGE TALENT'

Marks' slogan of "big adventures on average talent" certainly belies his ability and grand aspirations.

He moved to Phuket two years ago with his young family, accepting a job on a whim having never visited Thailand before. He has been an avid outdoor adventurer since his formative years, cycling and running to work back in his native London, taking on the occasional 10km run and halfmarathon, climbing mountains

and undertaking mountain bike adventures. He sets himself a new challenge every year, each one more demanding than the last.

Last year during the lockdown he became the joint-first person in Thailand to complete the run-Everesting challenge, a brutal undertaking where the participant must repeatedly scale a slope enough times to equal Mount Everest's 8,849-metre height. At the time, less than 100 people had completed it worldwide.

Mark chose Kalim view-point in Patong as his destination which he had to run up 39 times over 18 hours to cover the 42.29km distance. It was, understandably, the toughest physical challenge of his out-door pursuits thus far but the achievement and fact he had raised much needed funds for the Kathu food drive made it more than worthwhile.

"Taking real risks is what truly motivates me," he said. "Taking on something where there is a very real chance of failing.

"I am fascinated by how the mind and body react when truly pushed and the going gets really tough. Long distance and endurance runners often mention hitting the wall and entering a dark place mentally and it is facing that and coming through the other side that really appeals to me."

"Of course, raising money for a worthy cause is the real payoff that makes all the pain worthwhile."

'HAIRY MOMENT'

"Running has become an identity for me in recent years," commented Mark when asked what attracts him to the sport.

"It is a really varied sport where you get to see and learn about so much. I have become so familiar with so much of Phuket through running, seeing parts that most don't and meeting so many different people."

When asked what, if any, negatives he has encountered during his various excursions, Mark was quick to list the possibility of injury as his number one worry. He experienced this last year but used the setback to learn and address his weaknesses.

He adds that encountering wildlife is especially exciting, particularly on the trail runs, and he has come across several snakes while off the beaten track although has never had any issues.

"Spiders on the other hand can be a real concern, especially the huge Orb spiders that you encounter on trail runs. Running face-first into the web of one and getting entangled was an especially hairy moment although thankfully they are not venomous!"

One further initiative close to Mark's heart is the environment and a desire to see a reduction and ultimately eradication of single-use plastics.

All the food he takes in on his challenge will be homemade and stored in reusable containers. Likewise, drinks will all be consumed from flasks and similar receptacles. Not a single-use bottle or container in sight.

Initially, he was hoping to factor this into his run, maybe stop at a beach or two en route to help with a clean-up drive although the current restrictions on people gathering in groups deterred him.

Maybe that could be his next challenge once things have returned to a semblance of normality, I suggest.

The wry smile and glint in his eye is enough of a response to suggest he has already more than considered it.
