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huket is moving ahead with the plan to re-open the island receiving fully vaccinated international tourists from July 1, Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew has confirmed.

The assurance was delivered during a meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall last Friday (May 7) that was attended by Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Yuthasak Supasorn Governor and TAT Executive Committee members by Zoom.

measures currently in effect in Phuket to control and prevent the spread of COVID-19, and briefed the TAT Governor on the current situation regarding infections in Phuket.

He also reported that so far 95,423 people in Phuket had received their first vaccination injection, with 90,781 of those also receiving their second injection.

At the time, provincial officials reported that 39.45% of the people in Thalang District, 28.13% of those living Kathu District and 21.75% of those living in Muang District had Narong explained.

In total 321,979 people on the Governor Narong explained the island remain to be vaccinated in order for Phuket to reach the target 70% of the population to achieve

herd immunity, he said.

The mass-vaccination campaign will continue in May, with Phuket to receive 200,000 more doses of COVID vaccine this month, he added.

Since then, Phuket officials have confirmed that more than 104,000 people in Phuket had been vaccinated against COVID, all through the Chinese-made Sinovac vaccine 'CoronaVac', including medical workers and health volunteers.

More than 100,000 people have now been vaccinated, Governor registered to be vaccinated in the second major round of vaccinations, which began last Sunday (May 9).

> Phuket is moving ahead with the 'Phuket Sandbox' tourism policy and will implement the measures as

already set out, Governor Narong said.

"During the second quarter of 2021 (April-June), vaccinated foreign tourists will be quarantined for a period of seven days before they can explore the area. There must be appropriate routes set out and measures in place in order for them to travel throughout the area in the form of 'sealed routes'," he said.

"Phase 2, during the third quarter of 2021 (July-September), foreign tourists who have been fully vaccinated and have tested negative for COVID-19 will be able to enter Phuket directly via plane, and they will be able to travel throughout the area of Phuket without [observing] quarantine," he added...

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Push for zero infections continues

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"However, the foreign tourists must stay in Phuket for seven days before they can travel to other areas [in Thailand], and they must follow the public health measures" he noted.

"Phase 3, in the fourth quarter of 2021 (October-December), is an extension of Phase 2, with foreign tourists who are fully vaccinated and testing negative for COVID-19 test being able to travel directly into other pilot areas such as Phuket, Krabi, Phang Nga, Samui District, Surat Thani Province, Pattaya City, Chonburi Province and Chiang Mai directly via plane and travel in those areas without quarantine.

"However, the group of foreign tourists must stay within the pilot areas for seven days before traveling to other areas, and they must follow other public health measures as well," Governor Narong explained.

"And Phase 4, during the first quarter of 2022, fully vaccinated foreign tourists who test negative for COVID-19 will be able to enter Thailand without quarantine," Governor Narong said.

"The implementation of the plan will make Phuket a 'Better Phuket', a 'New Phuket' and will allow for Mega Fam trips, all following our Phuket 'GEMMSST' strategies to become a leader in enhancing Thailand's tourism services that tourists are well versed in and trust the country's SHA safe travel public

health safety standards," Governor Narong added.

"In the period of May to June 2021, the Tourism Authority of Thailand will publicise the tourist plan and let the private sector offer packages," he announced.

"As for Phuket, we will prepare the area to be ready, safe, a white area [for receiving tourists]," he added.

"In July, we will have 6,000 tourists from nearby countries which will generate about B284.40 million, while tourists from far away countries will be about 23,700, which will generate B2.59 billion. More tourists are coming in the following months," Governor Narong said.

Governor Narong admitted that the current situation was still uncertain as there were still new infections confirmed every day, but added that measures were being enforced in Phuket to help contain the number of daily infections to less than 10 a day.

A proactive screening campaign is underway across the island, he

"Any persons who test positive will be quarantined at a 'Local Quarantine' facility and will remain in quarantine or under medical care until they have recovered," he noted.

Governor Narong also confirmed that from tomorrow (May 15) there will no longer be any rapid antigen tests for people arriving on the island from 'red zone' provinces.

If the arrival cannot prove they are fully vaccinated or have tested negative for COVID-19 within 72 hours of arriving, after May 15 they will be required to observe a 14-day quarantine "at their own residence or

hotel at their own expense", he said.

COVID COUNT

The confirmation of the July 1 push followed Tourism and Sports Minister Phiphat Ratchakitprakarn announcing that the number of COVID-19 cases in Phuket must reach zero before it reopens to foreign tourists.

He also announced that the government intended to move ahead with its plan to collect B300 from foreign tourists starting next January to set up a tourism fund for emergency use.

"We have to speed up inoculations, particularly in Bangkok, to achieve herd immunity by the fourth quarter. The number of daily infections should be below 200 by the end of this month to restore international tourism confidence," Mr Phiphat told the Bangkok Post.

Once the spread is under control, the government will resume travel bubble discussions with Singapore, Hong Kong, Vietnam, Laos and Malaysia, he said.

No country wants to engage in a travel bubble discussion with Thailand when there is still a high rate of infection, said Mr Phiphat.

The 'Phuket Tourism Sandbox' campaign to receive vaccinated tourists without quarantine requires higher standards, he said. The government anticipates zero cases on the island before July 1.

Of note, while the daily number of infections in Phuket hovered in

the teens and twenties last week. the number earlier this week fell to averaging 10-12, with officials reporting just eight new infections on Monday (May 10).

If 70% of residents on Phuket are vaccinated but new cases still emerge, the ministry will discuss with the Public Health Ministry about further action, said Mr Phiphat.

He said the ministry is maintaining its goal of 3-4 million international tourists arrivals, assuming the tourism sandbox in pilot areas carries on as planned.

In the fourth quarter, 10 areas are scheduled to take part in the sandbox initiative: Phuket, Phang Nga, Krabi, Koh Samui, Pattaya and Chiang Mai should already be participating, while Bangkok, Phetchaburi, Prachuap Khiri Khan and Buri Ram begin in the fourth quarter.

Mr Phiphat said neighbouring countries and the Chinese market must be watched closely, particularly the latter with its Golden Week Holiday slated for October. It is unclear whether the Chinese government will allow outbound travel by that time.

He said the global pandemic has highlighted the urgent need to establish a tourism fund, which has already been approved by the National Tourism Policy Committee. Fees collected from the fund can help the tourism industry cope with future uncertainties, said Mr Phiphat.

Rapid tests to cease for all arrivals, quarantine measure in effect

RAPID ANTIGEN TESTS will no longer be used to determine whether or not people may enter Phuket from tomorrow (May 15), Phuket Vice Governor Piyapong Choowong has confirmed.

Vice Governor Piyapong delivered the news through Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew broke the news during a high-level meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall earlier in the day.

Since Apr 22 all people arriving in Phuket from 'red zone' areas, now expanded to 25 provinces (see below), have been required to prove that they are fully vaccinated or have tested negative for the virus within 72 hours of arriving.

If the arrival has been unable to prove either, they were required to undergo a rapid antigen test as an initial step to determine whether or not they were infected.

The rapid antigen test has been free for Thais, but has cost foreigners B500 a time.

From May 15, that will no longer apply as the test will no longer be used, Vice Governor Piyapong explained.

"The Phuket Governor has set the goal to have zero cases a video broadcast online late of new infections within two last Friday (May 7), after weeks. We will do everything. No matter what it takes. We cannot be at risk like this anymore," Vice Governor Piyapong said.

"From now to May 14, we will still conduct the rapid antigen test, but from May 15, all arrivals from any areas without a COVID-free certificate or vaccination certificate must face 14 days quarantine," he said plainly.

"For day-trippers or others, I cannot reveal all the details, but the provincial order will come later," he added.

"We want to send a sign to the country that we are cleaning up our province. The three vice governors [in



to take care of each district by cooperating with local administration officers as well as community leaders to do proactive screening," V/Gov Piyapong noted.

"Within the coming two weeks, the result will be clearer in practice," he said.

"Right now, we are vaccinating religious leaders for all religions, as they are in frequent contact with people," V/Gov Piyapong said.

"It is very likely that we will have enough vaccines to provide vaccinations for every person on the island. If you are still deciding whether or not to get vaccinated, please come to get vaccinated," he urged.

Krabi, Trang added to 'red zone' entry list

Phuket officials have added Ranong, Krabi, Trang and Phatthalung to the list of 'red zone' provinces for which people arriving from must comply with the requirement to prove that they are fully vaccinated or have tested negative for COVID-19 within 72 hours of arriving, or else face a rapid antigen test as an initial step to determine whether or not they are infected.

'red zone' provinces, including Phuket, required to abide by the more stringent measures in order to enter Phuket as of last night is now: Bang- Point normally opens [so kok, Chonburi, Chiang Mai, they may be tested by health Nonthaburi, Pathum Thani, Samut Prakan, Samut Sakhon, Nakhon Pathom, Suphan Buri, Prachuap Khiri Khan, Rayong, Tak, Nakhon Ratchasima, Udon Thani, Sa Kaeo, Khon Kaen, Songkhla, Nakhon Sri Thammarat, Narathiwat, Surat Thani, Ranong, Krabi, Trang, Phatthalung and people who leave Phuket and return.

The official order, signed by Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew, is marked to remain in effect until May 15.

The order also made formal the requirement for all goods transport drivers passing through the checkpoint onto the island during the

hours 11pm to 5am, when all other traffic onto the island is prohibited, to pass the same requirements as people arriving from 'red zone' provinces.

"If any driver is unable to prove [the above] with a certificate, they must wait until the time that Phuket Check officials]," the order noted.

"Drivers must also show the goods they are delivering to staff at the checkpoint," the order added.


The checkpoint onto Phuket was ordered to close nightly from 11pm to 5am after health officers working there became "exhausted".

In the first seven days since the requirement came into effect on Apr 22, the officers had tested more than 22,000 people coming onto the island.

As of Monday (May 10), the medical workers at the checkpoint had tested more than 52,000 people.

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Neighbourhood COVID testing begins

huket health officials have launched a campaign to test people in communities across the island for COVID-19 to help identify people who are infected and limit the spread of the virus.

The "proactive screening campaign", organised by the Phuket Provincial Administrative Organisation (PPAO, or OrBorJor), began at Phuket Community Hall in Phuket Town last Friday (May 7), where RRT-PCR test swab samples were taken from more than 300 local residents.

PPAO President Rewat Areerob explained that the campaign is being funded by the National Health Security Office (NHSO).

"The project is to keep people disease-free and safe by making sure people at risk receive prompt diagnosis and treatment, and helps to build confidence among local residents and tourists in Phuket," he said.

"This third wave of COV-ID-19 is highly infectious. It is quick to infect and difficult to treat. If we do not screen people within the province or focus on risk groups made known by timelines [of movements of people now confirmed as infected with COVID-19], the infections may spread.

"Therefore, we must quickly manage to find the vulnerable group as soon as possible," he added.

The "proactive screening" in communities will continue until May 15, Mr Rewat said.

"If there is a trend [of rising number of infections] in many districts, we will have to extend the screening, but if the number of infections falls we will bring the project to a close," he explained.

VACCINATION OUTREACH

The community COVID test campaign last Friday was also held at Laem Tukkae on Koh Siray, on the east side of Phuket Town, where health personnel and medical staff from Vachira Phuket Hospital held a vaccination outreach clinic.

The village is home to one of the largest communities of Urak Lawoi sea gypsies in the country, today with some 1,600 residents living in an estimated 343 households in the village.

At least 311 people in the village received their first vaccination injection last Friday, reported the PPAO.

The villagers will receive their second vaccination injection on May 30, the report added.

"This is the first community visited by public health workers to provide the COV-ID-19 vaccination service to the community," Mr Rewat noted.

"The Chao Lay [sea gyp-

sies] do not have access to technology and social media, and may not understand the language [Thai]. So the PPHO, Vachira Phuket Hospital and health volunteers have come to provide help to people in the area. The villagers themselves are very cooperative with vaccination efforts," he said.

"Everyone is enthusiastic. They know that getting vaccinated helps prevent serious symptoms if they contract COVID-19, which their community leaders have communicated to them all along," he added.

A separate vaccination outreach clinic was also held last Friday at Wat Mongkol Nimit on Thepkrasattri Rd in Phuket Town, where 262 monks, nuns and laymen working in temples in Phuket were vaccinated for COVID-19.

Among those present were monks, nuns and laymen from Baan Manik temple in Cherng Talay, Wat Thepwanaram in Srisoonthorn, Wat Kathu and Wat Ketho, also in Kathu.

Runway road closed for B38mn widening

THE ROAD PARALLEL TO the runway at Phuket International Airport (Route 4031) has been closed so that a private contractor can finish the long-awaited road-improvement project, which includes preventing landslides from spilling across the road and making it safer and wider.

The road parallel to the runway will remain closed until all works are finished, which is expected to happen by Nov 1, says an official announcement signed by Samak Luedwonghat, Chief of the Phuket Highways Department.

The section closed stretches from Muk Dokkhao to Phuket International Airport in Mai Khao. Motorists are advised to use alternative routes.

"We apologise for any inconvenience while the work is being carried out," the notice says.

Route 4031 made headlines in August 2016, when a landslide dangerously plunged downhill and across the road. No motorists were injured in the landslide, but the road was blocked by debris.

In September 2019, a B71.32 million agreement was signed for upgrades to Route 4031 and prevention of future landslides along the road.

The first part of the project was to reduce the slope and enhance the stability of the topsoil to prevent further landslides under a budget of B32.97mn. To do this the road was closed for four months, from Sept 1, 2020 to Dec 30.

The second part of the project (which has just started) is to expand a section of the road to two lanes each way and create a 1.5-metre-wide safety shoulder along one side of the road, under a budget of B38.35mn. This is to be done by November this year. The Phuket News

Man arrested for robbing, stabbing woman, 63, at Phuket Town temple

POLICE HAVE ARRESTED A 48-year-old man wanted for robbing and stabbing a woman in Wat Charoen Samanakit (Wat Lang San) in Phuket Town last week.

The robbery sparked outrage among Phuket Town residents as the suspect had stabbed Sombat Chanhong, 63, with a pair of scissors and grabbed her wallet while she was meditating in the temple alone at about 7am on May 6.

Phuket City Police Deputy Chief Maneemai, 48, originally from Krabi, along the Rawai beachfront last Saturday afternoon (May 8).

Police also seized a Krabi-registered Honda Wave that Khanchana was riding when he was arrested and used to flee the scene after he stabbed Ms Sombat.

The arrest came after police checked CCTV cameras to track down the suspect, and learned that he was homeless and often slept on Rawai Beach.

Khanchana confessed to robbing and stabbing Ms Sombat last Thursday. He also confessed to stealing a shirt and six duvets from a laundry shop in Wichit a few days earlier, said police.

Khanchana told police that he used

> He did not have permanent accommodation in Phuket, and slept on beaches and at roadside pavilions,

ICU bed shortage near critical

The number of beds available for COVID-19 patients in intensive-care units (ICU) at Phuket government hospitals is nearing 'critical', Vachira Phuket Hospital Director Dr Chalermpong Sukontapol has revealed.

If the number of patients needing ICU care continues to rise, patients at government hospitals may soon need to be transferred to private hospitals, or even to hospitals outside Phuket, Dr Chalermpong said.

Dr Chalermpong revealed the news during a live broadcast at Vachira Phuket Hospital last Sunday evening (May 9), joined by Phuket Vice Governor Piyapong Choowong.

Dr Chalermpong explained that the number of beds available in Phuket for general care of people confirmed infected with COVID-19 during the current outbreak was not a concern.

"The number of beds being used in hospitals is high, while the number of beds being used at the field hospital is not very high," he said.

In first raising the alarm over a possible shortage of ICU beds in

Phuket last week, Dr Withita Jaengiam, an epidemiologist at Vachira Phuket Hospital, explained, "In Phuket, 50% of the [confirmed] cases do not have any symptoms, 30% have light symptoms of pneumonia."

However, Dr Withita also noted, "...and 10% have severe symptoms. That means we need a lot of breathing apparatuses [to treat patients]."

Of the patients in care at Vachira hospital, the main government hospital on the island, Dr Withita noted last week, "About 50% of the cases have symptoms of pneumonia for which patients need breathing apparatus."

Dr Chalermpong yesterday further explained that patients considered PUI (person under investigation, for possible COVID infection) have separate rooms where they wait for the results of their swab tests.

"There are about 280 rooms for PUI cases in all hospitals, but not all of the rooms are proper negative pressure rooms for COVID-19 infected cases," he said.

But of those who do suffer symptoms of infection, suffer serious symptoms, Dr Chalermpong noted.

"In this outbreak, most of the infected cases [being treated] in hospital have severe symptoms, as the virus moves to their lungs. They need to receive close observation and treatment in hospitals," Dr Chalermpong said.

"Currently, the infected cases [at government hospitals] have severe symptoms, so we cannot let them stay at the field hospital at PSU [Prince of Songkla University Phuket campus in Kathu].

"There are 170 beds there, but we have never used over 100 beds,"

A second field hospital has been set up at the Phuket Rajabhat University (PRU) campus in Rassada, north of Phuket Town, but the number of people in care at the PSU field hospital has not yet reached a level for health officials to start using the field hospital set up at PRU.

"This kind of incident is happening in many provinces, like Bangkok, Samut Sakhon, Samut Prakan, Songkhla and Surat Thani," Dr Chalermpong said.

"Vachira Phuket Hospital has nine ICU rooms. Only five of the nine rooms are negative-pressure rooms for severe-symptom cases, while the remaining four are now used for cases with light symptoms under close observation," he explained.

"For now, the five cases in our five negative-pressure rooms have very bad symptoms, while the symptoms of the four cases are still stable and under consideration to be moved out of the rooms," he added.

"If the nine rooms are full of severe symptom cases, that will be a big critical stage. We may need to transfer our patients to other provinces or private hospitals, which may involve additional costs," Dr Chalermpong said.

"We have only a small gap to reach the critical stage," he warned.

"In these two weeks, I want to ask every person to avoid gathering for any activities," Dr Chalermpong

"One more thing is that please register to get vaccinated to achieve herd immunity and to reduce the chance for you to have severe symptoms if you are infected," he said.

"We will have 100,000 doses of Sinovac coming in the middle of this month and another 100,000 doses in the beginning of June," Dr Chalermpong explained.

"In June, we will receive 240,000 doses of AstraZeneca," he said.

Vaccine registration for expats stalls | Chalong Hospital open once again

THE REGISTRATION OF FOREIGNERS working in Phuket to receive the state COVID vaccination through the 'Phuket Must Win' web portal got off to a rocky start this week, with companies unable to register their foreigner workers as of 3pm Tuesday – the day employers were promised they could register their foreign workers.

Pracha Asawathira PhD, an academic with the Ministry of Digital Economy and Society, announced the May 11 launch date during a two-hour live online broadcast late on May 5.

Mr Pracha handed over the announcement to Worapol Ungtrakul to explain the details. Mr Worapol is a member of the Phuket Tourist Association who is part of the task force assigned to oversee the operation of the 'Phuket Must Win' web portal (www.ภูเก็ตต้องชนะ.com).

Expats working in Phuket must be registered under the name of the company they work for, which means the HR staff must register for them, Mr Worapol explained.

"Their work permit must be valid too," he noted.

"Expats who do not work for any company still have to wait for the next phase of registration, which will allow foreign individuals to register by themselves," he added.

The 'Phuket Must Win' web portal has undergone an overhaul, Mr Worapol said.

"Right now, our vaccination system is like 'Version 2'. Registered people can make their own choice where and when to receive their vaccination injections. If any date or time is full, it will not appear for people to choose," he explained. The Phuket News

CHALONG HOSPITAL reopened to receiving patients on Tuesday (May 11) after it

was closed for cleaning and its staff quarantined and tested for COVID-19 following a 74-year-old woman outpatient testing positive for the virus after she visited the hospital. "Right now, Chalong Hos-

pital is ready to reopen, as our high-risk staff already finished their quarantine and are all tested negative," said an announcement posted on the official COIVD-19 information Facebook page, 'Phuket Anti-COVID19'.

"The management of Chalong Hospital announced the temporary closure on May 3 because we were informed that a patient was confirmed infected, and our medical staff

were considered high risk people," the announcement said.

"To boost the confidence among those coming to the hospital, officers of Chalong Municipality have already come to sanitise all areas of the hospital," it noted.

The hospital was to reopen on Monday (May 10), Chalong Hospital Director Suchart Nichawanna said in his initial announcement to close the close contact with the patients. facility.

He also confirmed that 45 staff and medical personnel deemed to have had high risk exposure to the 74-year-old woman were admitted to stay at The Royal Paradise and Spa Hospital in Patong, which is currently serving as a 'Local Quarantine' facility.

Meanwhile, 14 personnel deemed to have had 'lowrisk exposure' exposure to the woman were allowed to self-quarantine and monitor themselves for signs of infection at home.

Four patients who were receiving treatment at Chalong Hosptial during the 74-year-old woman's visit were transferred to Dibuk Hospital, along with their relatives, who were in

B1bn for job-creation projects, help for COVID unemployed

THE PHUKET PROVINcial Government has received just over B1 billion to dedicate to job-creation projects and to support those left out of work, and out of income, by the ongoing economic crisis.

Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew revealed at a meeting at Phuket Provincial Hall on May 5 that the provincial government had received a budget of precisely B1.000.249.488 under the national project to develop and support the "grassroots economy".

The budget must be spent on projects that satisfy at least one of four criteria: to develop local products, tourist attractions, services; to improve the quality of agricultural products; to support and improve labour skills; and to develop infrastructure to support the economic recovery and development of the community.

"So far, 18 projects have been proposed and are now under consideration," Governor Narong said.



"The Phuket Government has set a goal to help at least 10,000 of 13,247 people who have been registered with the Phuket Provincial Administrative Organisation [PPAO, or OrBorJor] as unemployed because of COVID-19 economic crisis." he noted.

"Also, to help 'sensitive' people [the disabled and the elderly) and those who file a request for help," he added.

"I will call all three district chiefs, village and subdistrict chiefs [Kamnan and Phu Yai Baan] and relevant officers to hold a meeting together and discuss the preparation for the projects, in order to accomplish our goal," Governor Narong said.

Government refuses to back billion-baht THAI cash injection

THE FINANCE MINISTRY will not recapitalise financially troubled Thai Airways (THAI) of which it is the biggest shareholder, the State Enterprise Policy Office (SEPO) chief said this week.

The remark by SEPO Director-General Pantip Sripimol came amid concerns the carrier will regain the status of a state enterprise through the re-acquisition of the ministry's majority stake in THAI.

The airline lost its statewned status last year when the ministry decided to reduce its stake to under 50%, to help ease the debt-rehabilitation

Several Cabinet ministers, however, were concerned the government would need to guarantee a loan worth billions of baht to prop up THAI if it were to come under the state enterprise umbrella again.

Reportedly supporting THAI's reinstatement as a state enterprise were Finance Minister Arkhom Termpittayapaisith and Deputy Prime Minister Supattanapong Punmeechaow, who is also chief of the government's economic team.

They argued the reinstatement, which would require the Finance Ministry returning as a majority shareholder, would boost the airline's financial strength and its bargaining power with creditors.

Creditors were to meet on Wednesday (May 12) to decide whether to accept the airline's debt restructuring plan.

Meanwhile, Ms Pantip insisted the ministry would not seek to recapitalise the airline and was prepared to see its stake diluted if other shareholders bought more shares.

The ministry holds a 49.9% stake in THAI. She said if the

ministry injected more funds into the company, it would be akin to attempting to divert money to "fill up the sea", a move which would be hard to justify to taxpayers.

Now that THAI is operating as a private company, it is no longer entitled to state assistance and the Finance Ministry is under no legal obligation to offer help to a private firm despite the vast shares it owns in the airline.

SEPO Chief Pantip declined to say whether THAI should be reinstated as a state enterprise, saying it is a matter of policy yet to be considered.

Sinovac safe for over 60

enior citizens have no need to worry about getting inoculated with Sinovac's COVID-19 vaccine, as a study carried out in China has confirmed its suitability for use in adults over the age 60, said Sophon Mekhton, assistant to the Public Health Minister and chairman of the COVID-19 vaccine management sub-committee, on Monday (May 10).

The results of the independent study, Dr Sophon said, should dispel any remaining doubts about the safety of Sinovac jabs for senior citizens, which stemmed from a lack of empirical data for the age group after the vaccine was rolled out.

Dr Sophon said many have received Sinovac jabs across the world and the vaccine was found to be safe.

The study found the company's vaccine, which uses culture-grown virus particles to stimulate the body's immune response, is effective and safe, which is reassuring, he added.

Responding to the World Health Organization's (WHO) previous statements regarding



Sinovac's vaccine, Dr Sophon urged the public to not cling on to old information.

The WHO had earlier said that an independent assessment of Sinovac jabs showed the vaccine poses a low risk of serious adverse effects for adults over 60.

The same study, however, backed Sinovac's claims that two doses of the jabs can effectively and safely prevent virus transmission in other age groups.

The AstraZeneca vaccine, which will be ready in about a month, will ultimately be the primary COVID-19 vaccine for individuals over the age of 60. AstraZeneca has been the vaccine of choice for senior citizens in Thailand, although the lack of supplies has prompted a switch to Sinovac.

Last Friday (May 7), the national communicable diseases committee approved the use of Sinovac's COVID-19 vaccine for people over 60.

Dr Sophon said all vaccines have a chance of causing negative side-effects, although the likelihoods are very slim, before assuring the government has a plan in place in case senior citizens vaccinated with the Sinovac vaccine develop unwanted side-effects.

Thailand has imported 3.5 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines from Sinovac to date. A further 500,000 doses donated by China will arrive this week, while the two million bought by the Government Pharmaceutical Organisation will be delivered later this month.

PRIVATE SHOTS

a package of two shots of Moderna COVID-19 vaccine offered by private hospitals will be no more than B3,000, hospital executives say.

The Private Hospital Association announced the plan after a meeting last Thursday (May 6) to discuss a common approach to offering alternative vaccines. Moderna is likely to be the first brand to be ordered by the Government Pharmaceutical Organization (GPO) on their behalf.

Private hospitals have started surveying the demand for the vaccine. Once they get an estimated number, they will ask the GPO to buy it for them, Dr Chalerm Harnphanich, chairman of the association, said after the online meeting.

All member hospitals agreed to offer the package at the same price, estimated at not more than B3,000, including service fee, insurance and value-added tax, said Dr Chalerm, also chairman and CEO of SET-listed Bangkok Chain Hospital Plc.

He said the Moderna vaccine cost \$37 to \$38 (B1,200) a dose. Two doses are required.

The hospitals are also working with the General Meanwhile, the price for Insurance Association and the Office of the Insurance Commission on coverage in case of side effects or allergies.

> The premiums are likely to be B50-100 for the coverage of 90-100 days after the first shot.

> If side effects are serious and required hospitalisation, the insured will be compensated with B100,000 or 1 million in case of death.

> Dr Chalerm was not sure about the arrival time of the vaccine but assured there would be no delay.

> "As soon as the Food and Drug Administration approves it and we receive the products, we will distribute them to over 400 [private] hospitals nationwide as soon as possible," he added. The FDA is expected to approve the vaccine this month.

Thailand inks pre-Brexit export quota deal with EU

THAILAND AND THE European Union (EU) have signed a new tariff rate quota deal, under which a predetermined number of the kingdom's goods can be exported to the bloc at pre-Brexit tax rates.

The agreement, which replaces a similar agreement that had to be renegotiated following the United Kingdom's departure from the economic bloc on Jan 1, will come into force next month

Pimchanok Pitfield, Thailand's permanent representative to the World Trade Organization (WTO), said on Tuesday (May 11) she signed the agreement with José Fernando Costa Pereira, Portugal's ambassador and permanent representative to the EU's Political and Security Committee (PSC) in Brussels, Belgium recently.

"Products covered in the agreement include rice, poultry and fishery products, which Thailand will still be able to export to the EU with the same trade privileges extended before ment of Foreign Trade has

Brexit." she said.

This agreement, however, only deals with quotas for goods which had been regulated under a previous agreement. Export duty reductions will be sought in separate trade negotiations which will be held between Thailand and the EU, as well as the United Kingdom, she said.

The Commerce Ministry will negotiate for higher quotas and lower duty rates for agricultural and fishery product exports from Thailand to the EU and Britain, she said.

Since 2019, the Depart-

been acting as Thailand's main negotiating body in talks with both the EU and Britain, in a bid to – at the very least – secure the same export quotas and privileges which Thailand used to receive from both parties

before Brexit, she said. Between 2017 and last year, the value of two-way trade between Thailand and the EU had averaged between B1.4 trillion each year, in which Thailand imported products worth B656 billion from the EU per year and exported products worth B744bn per year to the EU. in for a treat with the recent opening of L'Arôme by the sea in Patong. The three-storey restaurant and bar sits on the beach overlooking the stunning Andaman sea and affords gorgeous views of Patong Bay. Its location, formerly that of popular Italian restaurant White Box, is ideal and offers a semblance of calm; close enough to the hustle and bustle of Patong without being overwhelmed.

The international L'Arôme stable has six restaurants throughout China and two in Paris, one of which, FANFAN PARIS, is Michelin-listed. Their website states "restaurant concepts based on originality, culinary authenticity, quality service and passion".

This ethos is more than apparant from the outset of my visit as my partner and I are warmly and professionally welcomed by host Micheline and led to the roof-top bar on level three of the property for presunset drinks.

The spectacluar sea views and stunning sunset are complemented by a choice of deliciously refreshing mocktails as we eagerly survey our evening menu.

Alcoholic beverages are off the menu in the current COVID-19 climate yet this does nothing to detract from the ambience or experience as we select our dishes and head down a level to the main dining area.

Tables are immaculately presented and fully respect social distancing rules. There are a total of 40 covers on this level, the perfect number and layout to enjoy the atmosphere without feeling overcrowded.

Shortly after being seated we are offered a small delectable treat of watermelon infused with sun-dried fish, perfect for cleansing the palate in advance of the culinary delights ahead.

For starter the tuna tartare flavoured with lime



and sesame oil and served with hand-crafted flowers of beetroot and radish with an avocado purée is simply a delight; the combination of flavours come together perfectly for a light, refreshing taste explosion.

Likewise the scallop carpaccio which offers thinly sliced Hokkaido scallops with mango, alfalfa sprouts and citrus purée. It is divine and my only quibble is I want more of it!

Fear not though as the main courses are on their way. We order the dijon crusted lamb rack with red wine sauce and the 250g Tajima Wagyu Ribeye steak.

The lamb is delicious and perfectly cooked, accompanied by creamy mash potato and a selection of seasonal vegetables chosen by the chef.

The steak, however, is the showstopper for both my partner and I. Considering ourselves somewhat as steak aficionados, we have consumed our fair share over the years with the pick coming in a small Japanese steakhouse in Tokyo several years ago.

L'Arôme's steak at least equals if not betters that offering. It really is that good. Cooked to perfection,

it literally melts in one's mouth. It is so perfectly seasoned that it did not require the additional side sauces. The fact it is served on a slab of hardened Himalayan rock salt only added to the visual allure - they say you eat with your eyes and I had close on gobbled this down before it even hit the table!

Dessert managed to maintain the incredibly high standards with the rich dark chocolate mousse, miroir glaze and praline "Le Trianon" a true delight.

On speaking with Micheline afterwards, we learn that all the chefs at L'Arôme are internationally-experienced Thais who take the concept of contemporary culinary trends in Paris, specifically from FANFAN, and combine their own ideas.

"We have kept our menu small, choosing to pay attention to cooking techniques and plating design for each of our dishes," she says.

"The dishes that currently feature on our menu are based on the bestselling flagship recipes from our Michelin-listed restaurant in Paris, FANFAN PARIS. Hence you can be sure to receive authentic French flavours," Micheline adds.

L'Arôme only opened on April 19^{th} yet clearly word has already travelled fast as it is busy on the evening we visit and there is a vibrant atmosphere in the air. The fact they have taken the plunge to open during such an exceptionally challenging time is brave and deserves huge kudos. It also suggests they are supremely confident in their offering, and justifiably so. The staff are attentive and knowledgeable and an appropriate pacing between courses is adhered to throughout.

Ongoing promotions include the sunset pinto set (selection of 4 bar food plus 2 mocktails) for B680, the 3-Course Menu Decouverte for B999 and the 4-Course Menu Degustation for B1499.

I genuinely believe the future is bright for L'Arôme and would highly recommend a visit. It's only a matter of time before I return!

uch beloved by me and many other local cyclists is our bicycle's ability to take us to relatively quiet, undiscovered corners of the Andaman which have remained fairly unblemished by the ravages of mass tourism and commercialisation. One such beloved corner of 'forgotten Phuket' is Ao Sane Cove, with its three little beaches overlooking the much larger and more commercial Nai Harn Beach in the island's southwest corner.

Perhaps it's the steep little access road that runs almost through the super-luxe Nai Harn Resort's car-park that deters many from journeying out along the promontory at the northern end of Nai Harn Beach, or maybe it's the fact that this hilly little road is a dead-end terminating at the Baan Krating Resort, but whatever the reason, the glorious Ao Sane Cove and rocky surroundings remain largely off the casual visitors' radar and so retain a charming sleepy, ramshackle ambience.

Early writers about Phuket from Steve Rosse in his regular Sunday 'On the Rock' column in The Nation in the 1990s through to Derek Davies writing in the UK's Sunday Telegraph in



his 2003 article titled 'Never Mind the Marmite' waxed lyrical about the early ramshackle authenticity of the unspoilt Phuket of yesteryear. According to these romantic snapshots of a bygone Phuket, there was a lazy, laid-back, sand-between-the-toes ambience about beach life in those seemingly far-off days before mass tourism took hold and strangled the authenticity out of this lovely island replacing it with mayhem, pollution and stress.

Before the current pandemic, mayhem, pollution and stress (which sound like a firm of particularly venomous lawyers!) had sadly become the "new normal" of Phuket life which mass tourism had unleashed and as a result, quiet, relatively undiscovered corners such as Ao Sane, which offered a temporary escape to a saner, more charming, vision of island life, had become increasingly rare jewels.

One of the few blessings of our current state of massively diminished tourism is a reinvigorated natural world and on Ao Sane Beach last week this was abundantly apparent. I had cycled there from Chalong by way of the steep Promthep and Windmill Hill climbs, but the beauty of cycling south down to Ao Sane is that you can also choose to take the benign, flatter routes via Soi Sai Yuan, or Wiset Rd, thereby eliminating the lung-bursting climbs.

I arrived on the beach by 5:30pm and found myself one of only five people on the three, rock-strewn, small beaches as a stunning sunset broke over the headland to the west of us.


As you'll know if you regularly read this 'Blazing Saddles' column, I am a great believer in combining cycling with other forms of exercise, particularly for

the upper body, in order create a more balanced overall workout (see Blazing Saddles - 'Strokin' in Phuket', Mar 28 2021) and so I had decided to do some snorkelling while I was at Ao Sane this particular evening.

I threw a snorkel mask around my neck and waded out into the churning waves, then ducked down into the magical underwater realm to see how 'Covid Days in Phuket' were playing out amongst the marine denizens. The answer seemed to be, "exceedingly well, thank you very much" by the looks of things! A noticeably large number of fish were frolicking down there in an explosion of piscine exuberance. Coral was rejuvenating, blue starfish were embracing the rocky crevices and sea urchins waved their spiny greetings. It was glorious to witness and represented a transcendent escape into a diverting and harmonious parallel world.

I spent almost an hour swimming about the rocky outcrops, before clambering back onto the beach to sit and watch the sunset with a cold rewarding drink. Certainly, times are tough for many in Phuket during this pandemic, but we are blessed indeed to have at hand escapes to delightful throw-back corners of Phuket such as Ao Sane to take us back to a far saner time!



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

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
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Hamilton pinches Spain win

Briton's daring dash after inspired pit stop beats Verstappen

ewis Hamilton pulled off a daring dash to pinch victory from Max Verstappen and extend his championship lead at the Spanish Grand Prix last Sunday (May 9).

Hamilton took his 100th pole on Saturday but couldn't hold the lead on the first lap, with Verstappen getting the better launch and cutting down the inside of the Mercedes at the first turn.

The Dutchman made an early break, but the Briton made steady gains in the first stint to get back within a second on lap 25, in time for the first pit stop window.

Red Bull Racing pre-empted a Mercedes move by pitting Verstappen, but Mercedes held its nerve, keeping Hamilton out on old tyres until lap 29.

He emerged with a six-second gap to the lead, but the winds were starting to turn in Spain. On fresh rubber Hamilton was substantially faster than Verstappen, and in only three laps he was all over the back of Verstappen and haranguing him for the lead.

But passing is difficult at the Circuit de Barcelona-Catalunya, and the longer the pair ran on their tyres, the less of an advantage Hamilton's newer rubber offered.

It was then that the Mercedes pit wall pulled a blinder, hauling

Hamilton into the pits for a surprise second stop on lap 43, handing him 23-second deficit with 23 laps to close and pass.

Such was Hamilton's pace – and so ailing were Verstappen's tyres – that he got the job done in just 17, allowing him to cruise home in the final six laps to claim a 98th career victory.

"I feel great after this. I feel like we could go again," a jubilant Hamilton said. "It was a long way to come back from 20-odd seconds back, but it was a good gamble. Really great strategy by the team.

"Just a remarkable job by everyone here in this team through and through. What a day."

STOIC IN DEFEAT

With three wins and a second place from the first four races, this is Hamilton's strongest start to a season in his career, and he now leads the championship by 14 points.

Verstappen was stoic in defeat, the Dutchman admitting that the challenging and technical Barcelona track proved Red Bull Racing remains a step behind Mercedes in pure pace.

"In a way I could see it coming," he said. "There was not much we could've done.

"It shows we are not where we want to be. We have to push hard and catch up because we are a little bit slower."

Valtteri Bottas finished a distant third in the second Mercedes after falling to fourth on the first lap behind Ferrari's Charles Leclerc. Within a matter of laps he'd lost touch with the battle for the lead, and though he was able to strategise his way past the slower red car, he was 26 seconds off the lead by the time he reached the flag.

"It's a bit of a shame, but at least we made it to the podium," he said. "As a team we're still scoring solid points but not perfect points, so there's still work to do."

Leclerc came home a strong fourth for Ferrari in a race quiet once Bottas found a way through to the podium.

Sergio Perez recovered from eighth on the grid to finish fifth. The Mexican spent much of the race behind McLaren's Daniel Ricciardo before snatching the place from the Australian with a bold late-braking move around the outside of turn one.

Ricciardo came home sixth, equalling his best result for McLaren this season in a much improved performance after a difficult start to his career in orange.

Carlos Sainz followed Ricciardo over the line less than a second adrift for seventh ahead of Lando Norris in the second McLaren.

Osaka casts doubt on Tokyo Olympics

JAPANESE TENNIS STAR Naomi Osaka has said she is "not really sure" the delayed Tokyo Olympics should go ahead as the city battles a surge of coronavirus cases less than three months before the start of the Games.

A virus state of emergency in the Japanese capital and other parts of the country was extended last week as organisers weigh up whether to press ahead in the face of mounting pressure to cancel the global spectacle.

demic, the 23-year-old reigning US and Australian women's champion told the BBC "to be honest, I'm not really sure" if they should be held as planned from July 23.

"I'm an athlete, and of course my immediate thought When asked if it were is that I want to play in the Grand Slam winner said at

"But as a human, I would say we're in a pandemic, and if people aren't healthy, and if they're not feeling safe, then it's definitely a really big cause for concern."

Osaka's uncertainty was echoed by compatriot Kei Nishikori who admitted it could be difficult to host the Olympics even behind closed doors due to the high number of athletes expected to take part.

"I don't know what they are thinking, and I don't know how much they are thinking about how they are gonna make a bubble, because this is not just 100 people like typical tournaments," he said after beating Fabio Fognini in the Italian Open first round on Monday.

"It's 10,000 people in the village and playing tournaments. So I don't think it's easy, especially with what's happening right now in Japan. It's not doing good."

More than 10,000 athletes from 200 countries and regions are set to travel to Tokyo for the Games, with a decision regions, including Tokyo. expected in June on how many domestic fans, if any at all,

can attend. Meanwhile, International Olympic Committee chief Thomas Bach has been forced to postpone a visit to Japan after the coronavirus state of emergency was extended.

Bach's trip was scheduled for May 17-18 but organisers "decided to postpone it based on various situations including the [government's] extension of a virus state of emergency".

Japan's state of emergency, which is less strict than blanket lockdowns in other countries, was last week extended to the end of May in the hardest hit



Relegation confirmed COVID rages, says Ganguly for Baggies and Fulham CRICKET THIS YEAR'S SUSPENDED

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The fate of both Fulham's and West Bromwich Albion's season has finally been confirmed as both teams joined Sheffield United in relegation from the Premier League.

The Baggies were soundly beaten 3-1 by Arsenal last Sunday (May 9) to condemn them to the drop and inflict a first relegation from the top-tier on manager Sam Allardyce.

"It is a disappointing night but we have to take it on the chin," former England manager Allardyce told the BBC post-match. "Everyone has to accept it and recover quickly."

It remains to be seen whether Allardyce will continue as manager as the club look for an immediate return from the Championship.

Likewise with Scott Parker at Fulham, although initial speculation suggests he will remain in the hot-seat as the Cottagers look to bounce straight back up. Their fate

In Parker Fulham have a manager who has already achieved the feat, after he guided the side to promotion via the play-offs last season after they were relegated the previous year.

He has received extensive praise for his side's style of play and they have recorded impressive victories away at Liverpool, Everton and Leicester City.

Anfield in March they managed to amass only a single point from the subsequent seven games – relegation form in anyone's language.

Posing a serious goal threat was arguably their greatest downfall as they managed a paltry 25 goals in 35 games with only Sheffield United hitting the target fewer times this season.

"I'm hurt, I'm gutted and the players are," said Parker after relegation was confirmed.

"Everyone at the football However, since the win at club has tried everything possible to stay in this division. The facts are we've fallen a little bit short in our quality."

Elsewhere, Manchester United's 3-1 win at Aston Villa meant Manchester City's title celebrations were put on hold after City themselves lost 1-2 at home to Chelsea. However, if by the time this report hits the streets United has dropped points in either midweek game against Leicester or Liverpool, the title will have already gone to their cross-city rivals.

Arguably the biggest shock of last weekend was Newcastle trouncing Leicester 4-2 at the King Power Stadium. It indicated that unrest in the northeast maybe isn't as bad as often portrayed and there could be reason for optimism going into next season.

Leeds United beat a tiredlooking Tottenham 3-1, a scoreline that belied the dominance of the home team who have had a remarkably impressive return to the top-flight and also have much to look forward to next season.

West Ham's top four aspirations took a serious hit as they were beaten 1-0 by Everton.

THIS YEAR'S SUSPENDED Indian Premier League (IPL) cannot be completed in India while the country battles a raging coronavirus crisis, India's cricket chief Sourav Ganguly has said.

The IPL was abruptly halted at the halfway stage last week after several players became infected. India is reporting nearly 4,000 deaths and about 400,000 new cases a day.

Ganguly, president of the Board of Control for Cricket in India, said there was no way for the lucrative tournament to resume before India play the final of the World Test Championship against New Zealand in England on June 18.

"Too early to say how we can find a slot to complete the IPL," Ganguly told Sportstar magazine in India last weekend.

"There are lots of organisational hazards like 14-day quarantine. It can't happen in India. This quarantine is tough to handle," he added.

Last year's IPL was moved to the United Arab Emirates because of the pandemic and a number of English coun-

ties have offered to host the remainder of this IPL.

As pandemic case numbers took off in India, more than 10 players and support staff in the IPL teams tested positive in the biosecure "bubbles" set up for the league.

The IPL was halted after four players from Royal Challengers Bangalore, Sunrisers Hyderabad and Delhi Capitals tested positive.

Most foreign players have since left India.

New Zealand wicketkeeper-batsman Tim Seifert and Chennai Super Kings' Australian batting coach Michael Hussey remain under treatment after testing positive. Hussey recently returned a negative

English clubs dominate euro competitions

COVID cases rock national football teams

THREE NATIONAL TEAM footballers, two men and one woman, have been diagnosed with COVID-19, forcing an immediate suspension of practice and quarantine for all other players and staff at the camp.

The Football Association of Thailand (FA) disclosed last Saturday (May 8) that six people – two players

and four officials - had contracted the virus and were either now in isolation or being treated in hospital.

The infections occurred as the team was preparing for upcoming mini-tournaments ahead of the Asian qualifiers for the 2022 FIFA World Cup in Qatar.

One player and one official from the women's national football team have also tested positive, according to the FA which has been testing both the men's and women's teams every seven days.

The players and staff who tested positive were contacted by medical workers who asked about their condition and checked their personal

The players and staff whose COVID-19 test results were negative have gone into isolation in their rooms at the football camps which is away from public areas.

The FA said the health authorities will carry out swab tests every 3-5 days until they can be certain of a COVID-free environment at the camp.

The players and staff have all received the first of two doses of vaccine.

Practice has been suspended while the admission of another batch of players to the camp has also been deferred indefinitely.
