# **VACCINATION REGISTRATIONS, UNDERHANDED ANTICS**

he head of the Patong Entertainment Business Association (PEBA) has criticised the system for people to register to be vaccinated for COVID-19, calling the system over-complicated and overlooking the need to prioritise entertainment venue workers in the key tourism town.

register saw the association having to repeatedly submit names and details of more than 500 staff and management, PEBA President Weerawit Kreuasombat told The Phuket News.

"At first, the Phuket government sent an order to our association instructing us to start a registration service, so we opened a written registration desk in front of Illuzion and very quickly had the names of 554 people working in Bangla," he said.

"The 554 names are owners and workers in entertainment venues as well as some of their relatives in Patong," he added.

Initial hiccups in getting people to names, they told us to enter the name into the Excel file. They then explained to us that the team of registration officers had a lot of problems entering the information into the database, so I had to ask all of them to register again

by themselves through the website," Mr Weerawit explained.

"At this stage, I understand that we do not have enough medical staff because many people have to be vaccinated each day. A lot of people gather at the centres to be vaccinated. especially at Saphan Hin [near Phuket Town] and at Jungceylon shopping mall [in Patong]," he said.

"I think the registration through "After we submitted the list of the website is quite difficult for some people. Most workers know how to do it... but some people are still confused by the conditions for being approved to receive the vaccine. such as their medical history, what is a chronic disease and just the age

requirements," Mr Weerawit noted.

"I appreciate the effort from everyone and know well that everyone wants to do their best, however, I think we need local municipal officers to open for people to register and enter information into the system for local people, as I think that if each individual enters information by themselves, it will become a mess. Some people may be left behind,"

"Today, they are trying to vaccinate all people, not only the front-line work ers in the tourism industry. However, some entertainment venue workers told me that they are still afraid of the side effects of the vaccinations...



"I understand the fear of side effects, but I would say that the registration system is a fail [sic] as it requires people to go through a lot of processes," Mr Weerawit said.

"Some people thought they were already registered just because medical health volunteers had come to their houses and asked for their information," he noted.

Mr Weerawit also pointed out that foreigners working in tourism-related businesses in Patong had been neglected in the initial push to have people register to be vaccinated.

Asked whether the PEBA submitted names and details of foreigners working in Patong, he replied, "Nope, as we knew that the government asked only for only Thai people first."

However, Mr Weerawit quickly pointed out, "For me, I think the government must provide vaccinations to everyone. No matter what nationality the workers are, erators who have foreign em-



they must be vaccinated. I want all of them to be vaccinated, but it is beyond my power to do that.

"At this stage, nationality does not matter, we have to focus on the type of work they do and where they work. However, I understand that for the government, they must focus on the majority of people first," he said.

"I think all business op-

ployees must provide them vaccinations even if they have to pay for them," he added.

Following the several outbreak clusters of COVID19 emanating from entertainment venues in Bangkok earlier this month, resulting in enforced earlier closing times and heightened anti-COVID measures in the capital, Mr Weerawit pointed out that entertainment venues needed special attention.

In terms of how important it is for Patong entertainment industry workers, both staff and management, to be vaccinated as a priority, Mr Weerawit said, "It is very important because the workers are like those who are welcoming guests in our living room. They are like a connection between tourists and other groups of workers, like tuktuk drivers. The workers have close contact with tourists, so they have to be safe."

However, Mr Weerawit also noted that the feeling on the street was a lesser fear of COVID than the ongoing economic pressure continuing to bring financial hardship for all people in the town.

"Basically, at this stage, we are getting used to COVID-19 news. I don't think I am afraid of the infection as much as before, as the infection depends on how healthy we are and our immunity. The people at risk are only youths and elders. Right now, we also have vaccines, so the fear is becoming less and less," he said.

"To be honest, the most important thing right now is income, the money in our pockets. This is for both venue operators and staff. We have tried everything we can think of. At this stage, we are not afraid of being infected with COVID-19, but of dying with

"Bangla Rd is still quiet. We have a lot of custom-

ers only on the nights when we have concerts by famous singers. Overall, we are still suffering," he said.

Despite the ongoing economic crisis and many ordinary people still unable to pay household bills, underhanded antics are still being practiced in Patong, Mr Weerwawit also noted.

"Although business is still very quiet, some officers who make their own benefits from operators keep coming to Bangla Rd. We are dying, as we have no income, but they keep coming to get benefits from us. It is like entertainment operators and workers are being beaten by the officers," he said.

"In normal situations, we understand they do it, as we tend to operate in the grey areas, but for now we hardly have any income which must be spent on paying electricity bills and employees. I want this problem to be highlighted,"

# Paralysed by a drunken co

The 25-year-old noodle vendor shot by a drunken off-duty police officer on Bangla Rd will never walk again, and only recently underwent surgery to increase his chances of being able to sit up, doctors have told the young man's wife.

The noodle vendor, Aroon Thongplab, was shot in the stomach by Cpl Pornthep Channarong of the Phuket Provincial Police just before 6am on Feb 23 in an unprovoked attack while he was walking along the street after collecting a noodle bowl from a customer.

In less than 24 hours Pornthep was stripped of his rank and discharged from the Royal Thai Police, and now faces charges of attempted murder, carring a firearm in a public area without necessary reason, and firing a weapon in a public area.

Aroon has been receiving treatment at Vachira Phuket Hospital, where he finally woke from a coma, but remained paralysed as the bullet fired from close range had hit his spine.

Doctors have now told Mr Aroon's wife, Kulthida Chananan, 26, that he husband will not walk again.

"Doctors have confirmed to me that he will not be able walk again because the nerve in his spine was torn apart," Ms Kulthida told The Phuket *News* on Apr 6.

"He cannot feel or move the lower part from his waist. Doctors just gave him spine surgery last week, so that he can sit. However, the doctors cannot assure that the surgery will work. We have to wait to see if his recovery goes well

along with physiotherapy,"

"At this stage, he is still in the Intensive Care Unit at Vachira Phuket Hospital. He has not been able to speak because he still has a tube [intubated into his throat] to assist his breathing. His lungs have improved without any internal bleeding. He is conscious and able to move his hands a little bit, but we have to read his month to understand what he wants to say," Ms Kulthida explained.

Bringing formal charges against Pornthep have been slow, Ms Kulthida confirmed.

"I have already asked Patong Police, and they told me that at this stage the report to file [with the public prosecutor] is about 90% complete. I am also waiting for a notice from the court,' she said.

"Today [April 6] officers from Region 8 Police came to the hospital to question Aroon, but he has not been able to speak," she added.

"I asked them about the bail conditions, and they told me that the suspect is still in iail," she said.

Court approved Pornthep to be released on bail on B600,000 surety, despite a request from the Royal Thai Police to deny Pornthep bail privileges.

Ms Kulthida pointed out that without the intense media coverage that ensued in the aftermath of her husband being shot by a drunken police officer, interest in her case by officials had faded.

"On the first day, Region 8 Police gave me flowers and B20,000 cash, and Phuket Provincial Police gave me B10,000. After that some officials contacted me, but I have not received any news from them for a while. I do not know if they are working on my case or not," she said.

"I'm a normal person. I do not know which official to ask for help. My husband's case gained attention for a while, but after that no one contacted me," she added.

Ms Kulthida has been struggling to cope with the burden of dealing with officials while coping with the traumatic situation and already suffering financially.

"Ever since my husband was shot about a month and two weeks ago, my mum and The Phuket Provincial I have not been able to return

to selling noodles because I am busy filing documents with officials and visiting Aroon at the hospital," Ms Kulthida said.

"It's all down to me who is responsible for filing documents with officials, so I have to let my relatives take care of my children," she explained.

Mr Aroon and Ms Kulthida have two children: a 4-year-old daughter and a 4-month-old

Asked what assistance highprofile rights lawyer Kerdphol Kaewkerd from Bangkok was continuing to provide, Ms Kulthida said, "He often calls me. He said he is also waiting for a notice from the court. So mostly, he just asks about Aroon's condition."

During talks with Mr Kerdphol on Mar 2, Patong Police Chief Col Sujin Nilabodi promised to help Mr Aroon's family.

However, called by The Phuket News on Apr 6, Col Sujin was only willing to say, "Police have already concluded the investigation and will file the report to the public prosecutor next week."

Col Sujin then terminated the conversation, saying that he was busy.

# Airport reminds travellers 'gophuget' registration still required for arrivals

PHUKET INTERNAtional Airport has reminded travellers that they must still register their intended travel to Phuket through the gophuget.com web portal and have MorChana installed on their phone in order to be cleared to arrive on the island.

People must wear face masks at all times while in the airport area, and all travellers must register their travel details via gophuget.com and install the Mor Chana app, in accordance with a provincial order issued by the Phuket Governor, AoT Phuket noted in an official notice.

Also, no people with body temperatures over 37.3°C will be allowed to enter the airport. All people will have their body temperatures checked when entering airport buildings.

"Cleaning and sanitizing have been stepped up at all touchpoints (escalator handrails and luggage cart handles, etc.), and hand sanitizers have been placed throughout the airport," AoT Phuket also assured.

"Passengers should ar- the ticket," the notice said. rive at the airport at least 1-2 hours before departure time," the airport management advised.

The notice came as AoT Phuket released its full monthly schedule of domestic flights, showing Bangkok Airways, Thai Lion Air, Vietjet, Nok Air and Thai Smile all flying to and from Phuket, for the month of April. However, the airport cautioned that the flight schedule was subject to flight changes or flight times without prior notice.

"Please contact the airline directly before booking

People can file complaints with the Civil Aviation Authority of Thailand (CAAT), AOT Phuket noted in a separate post.

Meanwhile, the AoT management team responsible for Suvarnabhumi International Airport has issued a reminder that digital capture images and photocopies of boarding passes will not be accepted.

Only e-boarding passes present in an official app or presentation of an email will be accepted, the Suvarnabhumi airport operators confirmed. The Phuket News

# **Extend COVID visas early to avoid rush**

The Phuket Immigration Office has called for all foreigners staying on 60-day 'COVID visas' to extend them early to avoid overloading the office with last-minute applications, as experienced during the last days of last month.

The call follows surreal scenes at the main Phuket Immigration Office in Phuket Town on Mar 25, when scores of foreigners arrived en masse to have their 60-day so-called 'COVID visas' extended so they could continue their stay in the country.

The call for foreigners to extend their 60-day visas early also followed Immigration Bureau Commission Lt Gen Somphong Chingduang on Mar 30 issuing a notice to all immigration offices in the country to continue extending 60-day 'COVID visas' until



at least May 29.

"Since currently, the Coronavirus Disease or COVID-19 pandemic is spreading around the globe while Thailand is facing second waves of the outbreak, affecting the departure from Thailand and the foreigners staying within the Kingdom. Hence, it is approved for an extension of stay in accordance with the notice mentioned above until 29 May 2021," the notice said.

An officer at Phuket Immigration who asked to be called only "Inspector Kratae" told The Phuket News, "The COVID visa can be extended early within 45 days before the expiry date, just like other visas, but I would like people to come only one to two weeks early because we may need a couple of days to process the extension for some foreigners.

"We are worried about making sure their reported address and the address of their current accommodation matches," she said.

"Additionally, foreigners have to check the expiry date on their passport, as we canthe passport's expiry date. They also have to check if their passports have blank space for the stamp because we cannot extend their visa if their passports are full. They need a new passport," Ms Kratae added.

"We have to face these problems very often, so please check your passport and contact your embassy or consulate to renew as necessary," she explained.

"To prevent congestion at the office, please make a booking through the QueQ app before coming to the office, so you do not have to served]," she said.

In the QueQ app (available via Google Play and the App Store), Phuket Immigration is listed under the "Banks / Service" section.

As there is no "Extend COVID Visa" option available through the booking app,

not extend the visa beyond Ms Kratae advised people to select "Certification or request by an embassy".

> "Please confirm your booking when you receive the second alert through the app, otherwise the app will dismiss the queue booking you made," she warned.

> "I will ask my commander to add a new option for COVID visa extension later," she said.

Another officer *The Phuket* News spoke to also urged foreigners to not leave their visa renewals to the last-minute, in the hope of getting the maximum number days' stay.

"People should come to wait for a long time [to be renew their visas early, especially people staying on COVID visas. There is no need to panic. The global pandemic situation is still a long way from being resolved, and we will keep issuing these 60-day [COVID] visas until the situation improves,"

# Municipal election preliminary results released

THE PHUKET OFFICE OF the Election Commission of Thailand (PEC) has released the preliminary counts of all votes cast last weekend in the local elections in the 12 municipal areas on the island on Mar 28

More than 230,000 eligible voters turned out to cast their votes for candidates contesting the positions of mayor or as councillors in the 12 municipalities: Phuket City, Patong, Kathu, Wichit, Chalong, Rawai, Rassada, Srisoonthorn, Karon, Cherng Talay, Thepkrasattri and Pa Khlok.

However, PEC Chief Passakon Siripakayapon cautioned that the official results of the election might take 30-60 days to announce, giving election officials until May 27 to announce the results.

Staff at the PEC explained that in accordance with election law the PEC will forward the ballots to the Election Commission of Thailand in Bangkok for confirmation of the results, which by law must be announced within 30 days of the election, notwithstanding any complaints filed against candidates.

"The Election Commission will complete the count as soon as possible and announce the election results within 60 days of



# **Government hopes for** anti-trafficking upgrade

hailand has submitted a report to the US detailing its anti-human trafficking efforts in the hope of being upgraded from Tier 2 to Tier 1 in Washington's Trafficking in Persons (TIP) Report, due for release in June.

Deputy government spokeswoman Rachada Dhnadirek said the government was aiming for Tier 1 after being ranked in Tier 2 for three consecutive years.

Tier 1 lists countries whose governments fully comply with the minimum standards set out in the US' Trafficking Victims Protection Act (TVPA), while Tier 2 applies to governments that do not fully comply with the minimum standards, but which are making efforts to bring themselves into compliance.

In 2018, Thailand was upgraded from Tier 2's watch list to Tier 2 in recognition of significant strides made compared to the previous year.

Before that, Thailand was ranked in Tier 3 which is for countries whose governments do not fully comply with the minimum standards and are

not making significant efforts is the first Asian country to to do so.

Thailand submitted the 2020 TIP Report on Feb 2 and a report on progress in its antihuman trafficking operations from January to March of this year to the US embassy on April 3, according to Ms Rachada.

This year's submission includes statistics on arrests and punishments for humantrafficking offences as well as the implementation of the National Action Plan on Business and Human Rights. Thailand introduce such a plan, she said.

The country is processing human trafficking cases more quickly by shortening the investigation time from 118 days in 2015 to 70 days in 2020, Ms Rachada added.

The country has also developed procedures to help human-trafficking victims with differing sexualities and set up centres to help migrant workers with work-related problems.

Another important achievement was the use of the PRO-

TECT-U application developed by the Social Development and Human Security Ministry, she said.

Available in seven languages, the app receives complaints from human-trafficking victims and provides them with access to protection.

In the fishing industry, the Third Area Command's Maritime Enforcement Coordination Centre (THAI-MECC Area 3) was established to regulate and enforce laws protecting workers. This came in the wake of the fishing slavery scandal that rocked the Thai fishing industry a handful of years ago and led to Thailand facing dramatic economic punishments from the EU and the US if the country did not improve its efforts to prevent human trafficking.

Ms Rachada said Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha thanked all sectors, particularly the civil sector, for working together to prevent and suppress human trafficking in Thailand. Their cooperation had contributed to concrete achievements in the country's anti-human trafficking efforts, she quoted him as saying.

# 'Unemployed' elephants take 500km walk home


AFTER WAITING IN vain for tourists near Pattaya for more than a year, five elephants and their owners are making the 500 kilometre journey back to their northeastern home province of Surin – on foot.

Members of five extended families and their five elephants started the journey from Bang Lamung district on April 6, with a pickup truck protecting the group in the front and the back.

Napalai Mai-ngam, 26, said her relatives and their tamed elephants had been working at an elephant resort in tambon Lam Huay Yai for five years. They had made a good living, receiving a monthly salary of B15,000 per elephant plus tips from tourists who enjoyed riding their elephants on nature trails.

COVID-19 stopped everything in January last year. Their employer suspended paying their salaries when the Chinese tourists who formed the majority of their to villagers who donated customers disappeared.

With no immediate return of tourists in sight

amid the continuing pandemic, they finally gave up hope and decided to go back to farming in their home province.

The pachyderms would have to walk the 500km distance because the owners could not afford to hire big trucks to carry them. The owners also hoped their elephants could feed themselves by grazing along the way.

Ms Napalai estimated that it would take about two weeks for her group to reach their home district of Tha Tum in Surin and that she was very grateful fruit, drinking water and food to them as they passed by. Bangkok Post

# Cabinet ministers, MPs enter COVID quarantine

Supachai Jaismut, registrar of the coalition Bhumjaithai Party, said Transport Minister Saksayam, the secretary-general, attended a



ewish space lasers, the lizard oligarchy, QAnon, 5G causes COVID-19, the global pandemic is a hoax, Bill Gates is trying to microchip the world, the moon landing was faked, the Earth is flat. Conspiracy theories have always been with us, but mostly they remained on the fringe, with your weird uncle who claimed aliens abducted him. However, today thanks to the Internet and social media they've gone mainstream, but like theoretical physicist Lawrence Krause likes to say, "Keep an open mind, but not so open that your brain falls out."

Webster's dictionary defines a conspiracy theory as, "A theory that explains an event or set of circumstances as the result of a secret plot by usually powerful conspirators."

It would be easy to write them off as a harmless distraction, but during a global pandemic people are making lifechanging decisions based on conjecture and falsehoods. So why do people believe in things that don't have evidence behind them?

#### **The Three Blind Men**

There's an Indian story about a group of blind men who wanted to know what an elephant looked like. So, they in-



spected it by touch, each of them taking a different part of the animal. The first blind man grabbed the trunk and said, "An elephant is like a gigantic snake." The second grabbed its tusk and proclaimed, "The elephant is like a sharp spear." The third blind man placed his hand on its side and said, "The elephant is like an enormous wall."

We are all a bit like those blind men grasping for our own personal truths, but not understanding the bigger picture.

# Why Do People Believe in Conspiracy Theories?

Real conspiracies exist. The United States National Security Agency spied on its citizens and allies. Big tobacco lied about cigarettes being harmless. Big pharma lied about how addictive their opiates were. However, the truth didn't come out because of Internet keyboard warriors jumping to conclusions based on circumstantial evidence. They were discovered because of government investigations, whistleblowers or investigative journalists who had substantial amounts of solid evidence in the form of organisation documents and peer-reviewed science to support them.

Our brains are wired to look for explanations even when one isn't readily available and are heavily influenced by cognitive biases and heuristics.

A cognitive bias is an error in how you interpret information. Behavioural economist Daniel Kahneman has identified dozens of these. For example, confirmation bias occurs when you only look for information that supports what you already believe. The Dunning Kruger effect is when you think you are more knowledgeable in a subject than you actually are. This bias can lead to poor decisions.

A cognitive heuristic is when our brains use shortcuts in thinking to

draw conclusions. For example, the stereotype that someone who wears glasses is smarter than someone who doesn't.

Our brains use these strategies because for most of human history we've needed to make quick life or death decisions that didn't allow for a lot of analysis. However, today there is less of a threat of being eaten by a wild animal, but the choices we need to make are infinitely more complex.

Although we have science to address these complex questions, sometimes the answers are complicated and even contradictory because there isn't enough data available to draw a definitive conclusion. People often want a sense of certainty and need simple solutions that will not take much time to understand, so they resort to conspiracies.

It's also easier to spread lies. In a 2018 MIT study published in Science Magazine researchers concluded that false information spreads on average six times faster on social media platforms than the truth does. The primary reasons were that they were novel ideas, designed to evoke powerful emotions like surprise or disgust, so people shared them more often.

#### **How To Spot Fake Conspiracies**

If you want to spot fake conspiracies, it is important to understand the scientific process and to be skeptical about outlandish claims. Behavioural economist Daniel Kahneman recommends thinking systematically to overcome cognitive biases and heuristics. You can begin by asking yourself a series of questions. Who is the source of the information and what are their credentials? Is there empirical evidence, facts or peer reviewed science to support the claim? Is there historical precedence for it? Is the information consistent with your experiences and those around you? Does the source have an agenda and what is it?

Getting to the truth can be a long and complex process, but it is important for making good decisions. To paraphrase philosopher Ayn Rand, "You can deny reality, but you cannot deny the consequences of denying reality."
