eading local tourism figures are confident that Phuket's tourism industry is ready to welcome what few tourists will start arriving after the Phuket Tourism Sandbox model launches on July 1, allowing vaccinated foreign tourists onto Phuket without observing any mandatory quarantine other than having to remain on the island.

Following reports that Phuket will not be ready to reopen on July 1, Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha went online last Sunday (June 13) and posted confirmation on his own Facebook page that July 1 will go ahead.

PM Prayut stressed that the

'Phuket Sandbox' project was initiated in line with his guidelines to slowly reopen the country to vaccinated foreign tourists to revive tourism.

The PM pointed out that the Centre for Economic Situation Administration (CESA), which he chairs, had already approved the project. However, he also noted that the Sandbox model had yet to be approved by the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA) and the Cabinet, which at last report was expected to pass final judgement on the July 1 reopening next Tuesday (June 22).

Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Governor Yuthasak Supasorn was in Phuket in person last Saturday (June 12) to lead a workshop with leading local tourism figures to go

over the Sandbox requirements for allowing foreign visitors onto the island.

Mr Yuthasak noted that many tour operators, and governments, were waiting for final confirmation of the requirements of the Sandbox policy by publication in the Royal Gazette, which should be announced in the final week of June to meet the scheme timeline.

Mr Yuthasak said the TAT acknowledged there was growing concern and discontent among the private sector about the additional measures for tourist destinations to reopen, which could discourage visitors in the initial stages (see page 4).

He insisted the tighter screening measures were necessary as the Public

Health Ministry had stressed that no tourist should be infected while roaming the island.

"We should accept an influx of tourists is unlikely in the third quarter. The Sandbox scheme was established as a test run, which means it is a gradual process where we determine the best practices to allow other destinations to follow suit," Mr Yuthasak said.

Kongsak Khoopongsakorn, President of the Thai Hotels Association Southern chapter, told *The Phuket News*, "Phuket is very ready, in terms of both business operators and preparation. As the Phuket Governor said, we need three levels of being ready: Phuket, Thailand, and the world."

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Officials silent on COVID deaths

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t the time this article went to print, Phuket officials had yet to comment publicly on the three most recent deaths attributed to COVID-19 on the island.

As of Monday (June 14), Phuket had suffered five COVID-19 related deaths since Apr 3, most recently last Saturday (June 12) – the fourth COVID death on the island in two weeks.

However, as with the previous two COVID deaths in Phuket, on June 2 and last Friday (June 11), no details of the latest victim's death have been provided.

Officials have reported that Phuket's second death from COVID in the ongoing outbreak was an 86-year-old Thai woman who had a hyperlipidemia and hypertension on June 1. The woman's death sparked a mass testing frenzy at the major fresh markets in Phuket Town, including the forced seven-day closure of the fresh market on Ong Sim Phai Rd after four workers there tested

positive for the virus.

The first death attributed to COVID infection recorded since Apr 3 was that of a 71-year-old man who was already suffering from emphysema on May 11.

PATIENT COUNT FALLS

Phuket on Monday recorded four new cases of COVID infection on the island while the number of COVID patients still under medical care had fallen dramatically.

According to the Phuket Provincial Public Health Office (PPHO) daily report for Monday (June 14),

the four new cases brought the total number of people infected on the island since Apr 3 to 681.

The 681 cases did not include six people infected outside Phuket but brought to the island for treatment and one foreigner who tested positive on his 13th day stay in local quarantine on the island. As with the most recent deaths, no details have been released about the foreigner contracting COVID-19 while in local quarantine.

Of the 681 cases recognised since Apr 3, 658 had been released from hospital care while 25 patients remained under medical care and state-provided vaccination under the supervision, down from 32 reported as still under care two days earlier, on Saturday (June 12), the PPHO reported on Monday.

Of note, the PPHO recorded zero new cases of COVID infection on the island on both Saturday and Sunday last weekend (June 12-13).

MASS VACCINATIONS

The Phuket office of the Public Relations Department (PR Phuket) has reported that as of last Sunday (June 13) 73% of the target 466,587 people in Phuket to be vaccinated have received at least one vaccination injection.

The report for last Sunday marked that 340,483 had received one vaccination injection and that 139,507 people in Phuket had received two vaccination injections.

Of note, while the PR Phuket report marked that the target is for 466,587 people in Phuket to be vaccinated in order to achieve herd immunity by vaccinating 70% of the island's full population, only 397,971 so far have registered to receive a national mass-vaccination campaign.

The latest stage of the massvaccination campaign in Phuket got underway last week, with officials aiming to vaccinate 24,000 people who are older than 60 years old and those with risk medical conditions by administering the first doses of the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine to be deployed in Phuket from June 7-9.

Official reports confirmed that the AstraZeneca vaccinations were underway, but no update was reported at its conclusion confirming how many of the special risk groups had been vaccinated.

Unlike the past month of daily reports about the mass-vaccination campaign in Phuket, local officials have now fallen silent about the campaign. As of Monday, there had been no comment from local officials as to how they expect to vaccinate the minimum 70% required in order to technically achieve herd immunity by July 1 - a factor that has always been a requirement for the island to reopen under the Phuket Tourism Sandbox scheme from July 1.

...because our people are vaccinated, and we have enough or even more than enough for tourism industry businesses that are opening to welcome 120,000 tourists in the third quarter of this year.

"Is Thailand ready? We are speeding up to make agreements and confirm conditions on everything, which needs to be approved by the CCSA as soon as possible."

However, Mr Kongsak noted, "If the measures come to be very strict, then tourism cannot move on, and tourists will not come. If the measures come to be not strict, we may have a fourth and subsequent outbreaks, and tourists will not come.

"So every ministry needs to take this all in together and come up with the decision, which must be the most natural. No political issues involved," he said.

"For the world level, we cannot control anything, as it is all about international relations policy. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs or the Ministry of Tourism and Sports should have made agreements to have travel bubbles with countries, but we have not seen anything," he added.

Phuket already has enough rooms at hotels to accommodate the positive projected number of tourists, Mr Kongsak said.

"We have about 300 hotels open right now," he said.

Tested on whether this will be enough, Mr Kongsak explained that the TAT had projected some 120,000 tourists to come in the first three months after July 1, giving an average demand of 40,000 visitors per month

"That averages to about 1,000 people per day. Tourists on average stay for 5.5 nights, which gives a demand of 5,000-6,000 room nights. Most tourists stay two people to one room, so we need about 3,000 hotel rooms per day. We have 15,000 rooms, so it is more than enough for the coming tourists," he said.

"For other businesses in the tourism industry, we still have more than enough. For example, we have 14,000 vans registered to serve tourists, but right now we have 9,000. I think that is enough. As for buses, they may not be used at this time, as we do not have tour groups," he added.

Mr Kongsak cautioned operators from taking government-supported loans in order to open if the demand is not yet there to support their businesses.

Thanusak Phungdet, President of the Phuket Chamber of Commerce, agreed, "I would love to advise hotel operators who are not yet ready to open, do not rush to reopen your hotels. Monitor the situation in July first, then decide to make any movement," he said.

"We do not expect a high number of tourists coming in the first couple weeks. I think we will have about 1,000 tourists. In this first month, I think the tourists may be those who work with the TAT," Mr Thanusak said.

"I will be happy to see more bookings after the official announcement [of the entry conditions]. I do expect to see more tourists in August and September," he added.





Pubs, bars closed for July 1

Patong Mayor confirms entertainment venues to stay shuttered

Patong Mayor Chalerm-sak Maneesri has confirmed that pubs, bars and other entertainment venues across Phuket will be closed for the July 1 reopening of the island to receiving vaccinated international tourists.

"For the entertainment venues in Phuket, from a meeting of [Phuket] officials, they altogether agreed to keep the venues closed in the first period of July, as we had a cluster from that kind of venue.

"Phuket Governor and the TAT Governor have not allowed them to open," Mayor Chalermsak told *The Phuket News* last Thursday (June 10).

Mayor Chalermsak, who took office only on Apr 28, plainly admitted the current economic situation in what was once Phuket's busiest tourism town.

"The economic situation in Patong is very bad right now," he said.

Mayor Chalermlask said that he was to meet representatives from hotels in Patong "to



share their problems and what they want the municipality [to do] to help to welcome tourists".

"So far to support the Phuket Sandbox, our staff have gone out and knocked on people's doors and encouraged them to register and get vaccinated in order to complete vaccinations of 70% of the people on the island. I have

gone to facilitate the vaccination at Jungceylon shopping mall every day," he said.

"We will send staff to hotels and other places to check whether staff at those places are vaccinated or not, to ensure that not only that they are kept safe, but also that tourists are kept safe," he said.

"For entertainment venues, from the meeting with Phuket

Governor and TAT Governor, the venues will remain closed for the first period of Phuket Sandbox because recently there has been a cluster from those types of establishments," he confirmed.

"To develop Patong, I will try to finish the resurfacing of the beachfront road before the new year, as after we had the electricity cables [and communications cables] installed under the ground, the road was damaged a lot," Mayor Chalermsak said.

"I will also make the view of the beach better, by clearing the signs and cleaning up the beach. Right now, it is monsoon season, we will have a lot of marine trash wash ashore," he added.

"I will develop environmental tourism and start by creating a footpath from the Seaview Patong Hotel [at the southern end of Patong Beach] to Tri Trang Beach and make the area into a botanic garden. The request to use the land has been already filed with the national government," Mayor Chalermsak said.

"Additionally, I will try my best to help vendors and business operators by negotiating for discounts on ground rents, so they can keep their business going," he added.

Operators of entertainment venues in Patong on May 31 filed a formal request for Phuket provincial officials to allow their businesses to reopen to prepare for return of international tourists from July

"For now, operators have bought thermometers to be used in front of their venues, and more than 90% of staff working in entertainment venues in Patong have been vaccinated," Mr Weerawit said.

"We all are pleased to cooperate with the Phuket Public Health Office [PPHO] for any other appropriate measures," he urged.

All pubs and bars in Phuket have been ordered closed since Apr 9 when Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew issued their closure ahead of the Songkran holidays

Under the latest order, they are to remain closed until further notice.

Wife blames AstraZeneca shot for husband's death

MEDICAL STAFF AT VACHIRA Phuket Hospital have confirmed that a 60-year-old Krabi man died from hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (HCM) shortly after receiving the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine.

Pruktichai Maksin, a lawyer, received the injection at Krabi Hospital Tuesday last week (June 8) and died two days later (Thursday, June 10).

Medical staff explained that the wall of Mr Pruktichai's heart had thickened due to high blood pressure which in turn led to his death.

Mr Pruktichai's wife, 55-year-old Rattana Klubching, believes that his death was a direct result of the vaccination as he was a fit and healthy man.

Ms Rattana explained that her husband did not exhibit any unusual symptoms or reactions in the 30-minute period immediately after receiving the vaccine.

However, around 9pm the following day her husband complained of chest pains and was taken to Krabi Hospital where doctors examined him, took x-rays and administered medication to help dissolve blood clots.

Mr Pruktichai was kept in hospital overnight for observation and around 11am the following morning suffered a heart attack.

Medical staff tried to revive him but were unsuccessful and he was pronounced dead shortly after. His body was taken to

Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town for an autopsy.

"I believe that my husband's death is because of the vaccine, as before this, he was healthy and strong," said Ms Rattana.

"Right now, I am collecting documents from the hospital in order to file for compensation with the National Health Security Office [NHSO]," she added.

Mr Pruktichai's younger brother, Chamlong Maksin, explained that autopsy staff told him that the vaccine injection may have induced an irregular heartbeat in his brother and increased his blood pressure.

"I am waiting for the results of the examination from Krabi Hospital before discussing with relatives on how to proceed," Mr Chamlong said.

Mr Pruktichai's body was handed over to relatives to allow them hold his funeral at Wat Nai Chong in Thab Prik, Krabi, last Friday (June 11). *The Phuket News*

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TAT moves to clarify July 1 conditions

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n updated release by the Tourism Authority of Thailand .(TAT) has clarified several key aspects about the conditions of entry for vaccinated tourists under the 'Phuket Tourism Sandbox' scheme from July 1, but openly identified details yet to be confirmed for many critical aspects affecting tourists' stays on the island.

The release, issued last Wednesday (June 9) and updated Monday (June 14), now notes that seven airlines have announced direct flights to Phuket: THAI, Emirates, Qatar Airways, British Airways, Cathay Pacific, El Al, Emirates and Singapore Airlines. Airlines removed from the June 9 posting of the information page include Hongkong Airlines, EVA Air, Korean Air, Jinair and KLM.

The notice on June 9 also formally recognised that international travellers who have received the Thai FDA-approved vaccines AstraZeneca, Moderna, Johnson & Johnson, Sinovac Biotech and Sinopharm will be allowed to enter Phuket. However, as of Monday the notice only explained that vaccines approved by the Thai



Ministry of Public Health (MoPH) or approved by the World Health Organisation (WHO) would be accepted, but no longer named which vaccines they were.

Arrivals must be vaccinated more than 14 days to one year before entering Phuket, and proof of vaccination must be submitted when applying for a Certificate of Entry (COE), the release noted.

Children under 6 years of age must travel only with their parents or guardians who have been vaccinated. In the case the parents or guardians are found to have COVID-19, the children are to be placed in isolation for 14 days, the release added.

Regarding which countries tourists will be allowed to arrive from, the release noted that the Phuket Sandbox is applicable only for fully vaccinated international travellers from countries/regions with a low to medium risk of SAR-CoV-2 virus as announced and constantly updated by the MoPH.

"The list will be available soon," said the release.

"High-risk countries are not allowed entry at this stage," it added.

Under the section "Visa & Certificate of Entry", the TAT noted, "Every traveller must obtain a Certificate of Entry (COE) at https://coethailand. mfa.go.th/. Check the website to see the required documents."

"Embassy/Consulate-General takes 3 working days to process the application," it said.

"International travellers must have insurance covering treatment and medical expenses including those related to COVID-19 with a minimum coverage of US\$100,000. The insurance must cover the total duration of stay in Thailand," the TAT confirmed.

It is mandatory to book a 'SHA Plus' hotel for the first 14 nights in Phuket. "Residing in a private residence is not allowed on the first 14 nights for COVID-19 control purposes," the TAT confirmed.

However, there is no requirement that tourists must stay all 14 of their first days on the island at the one hotel.

Bookings must be prepaid, it added.

However, oddly contradicting the current Phuket Provincial Government policy for no members outside a family attending the same residence for any gathering, including sharing meals, in posing its own question, "Can a 2nd guest who is already resident in Thailand join a guest who has arrived 'internationally' into a 'SHA Plus' hotel?", the TAT said, "Yes, providing the guest follows all rules stipulated for Thais and expats in Thailand."

Ambulance driver, nurses escape serious injury in bypass accident

AN AMBULANCE DRIVER and two nurses escaped with only minor injuries after the vehicle hit a light pole and slammed into a tree on the central reservation while driving northbound on the bypass road early Monday morning (June 14).

The ambulance was not carrying any patients at the time of the accident.

Lt Col Chaliaw Thaihu of the Phuket City Police was called to the scene, in front of the Premium Outlet store, at about 1:30am.

Police together with Kusoldharm rescue workers arrived to see the Thalang Hospital ambulance with massive damage still wrapped around the tree.

The driver suffered only a minor injury to his forehead and the nurses suffered only minor scratches to their bodies. All three were taken to Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town for treatment.

The ambulance driver, whose name has not been released, told police that they

were returning to Thalang Hospital after delivering a patient to Vachira Phuket Hospital.

The driver said that heavy rain had made the road slippery and strong winds had made the ambulance unsteady. He lost control of the ambulance, hit the light pole and slammed into the tree.

The ambulance has been taken to Phuket City Police Station, and police said they were to check CCTV footage from cameras along the road to confirm the cause of the accident. Eakkapop Thongtub

Ex-prosecutors face bribe charge in long-awaited Phuket case

TWO FORMER PUBLIC PROSECUtors based in Phuket have been indicted in connection with demanding a bribe from a private company accused of encroaching on a national park, according to the Office of the Attorney-General (OAG).

The OAG said in a statement that the attorney-general had decided to indict prosecutors Thamma Sornchai and Wanchat Choonhathanom, the Bangkok Post reported last Friday (June 11).

The news follows the National Antinouncing in December that the agency was moving to have two former Phuket Public Prosecutors charged for corruption for allegedly demanding money from a defendant in order to drop charges of encroaching on state land.

Thamma was accused of demanding a bribe from a company run by a foreign national, sought for prosecution for encroaching on and grabbing land in Sirinart National Park in Thalang district of Phuket. The case reached the prosecutor in 2019, noted the Bangkok Post report today.

The prosecutors allegedly sought a bribe worth B10 million between them, with Wanchat acting as Thamma's accomplice.

According to the OAG, the attorneygeneral has assigned the provincial


prosecutor's office to take legal action Corruption Commission (NACC) an- against the pair. The alleged bribe was demanded with a promise to the company that the case would be dropped and the provincial governor would not seek to reverse the decision.

A complaint was later raised against the prosecutors, prompting the OAG to order a probe which ruled the allegation had grounds. A formal investigation was then set up while at the same time the NACC launched a separate probe into the matter.

According to the OAG, the prosecutor's investigation confirmed the alleged bribery demand had taken place and ordered one prosecutor to be dismissed and the other transferred from Phuket. It is understood that Thamma had lost his job and Wanchat faced a transfer.

Later, the NACC probe also found grounds for the allegation and recommended the OAG indict the pair. Bangkok Post







Phuket Town Mayor takes Beach guards urge office, outlines policies

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aroj Angkanapilas has been installed as the new Mayor of Phuket City and held his inaugural meeting to take office.

Speaking at the main conference chamber at the Phuket City Municipality main office in Phuket Town last Thursday (June 10), Mayor Saroj broadly outlined his policies for the development of Phuket City Municipality. pushing towards a "special model" for the country to follow.

In outlining nine major policies his administration will follow during his fouryear-term, Mayor Saroj said the contact and feedback from the people was the top concern.

The municipality will improve the 24-hour complaints hotline, organise forums to hear opinions from all segments of the community and actively invite people to take part in submitting proposals to the government for consideration.

Improving education and with emphasis on sustainable

supporting children with disabilities and the underprivileged to receive equitable education were also high on his agenda, including developing educational institutions in terms of quality and efficiency, he said.

Improving civic and community areas, such as by creating a music-performance area at Oueen Sirikit Park and developing public areas at Khao Rang Park and Suan Luang Rama IX Park to become "beautiful as a tourist attraction and exercise place",

waste management, as well as developing a wastewater treatment system to be more efficient, were key objectives, Mr Saroj said.

In terms of local residents safety and security, the municipality will pursue quality of life policies such as promoting "safe cities" under the Pineapple Eyes project and monitoring traffic safety through CCTV.

Public health policies included pushing for the development of a public health service center to provide care for the elderly, as well as

improving care for the disabled and the development of dialysis centres, Mr Saroj said.

Other key issues to be addressed included developing areas in Phuket Town to become tourist attractions, such as by transforming the municipality's two main fresh markets to become "walking markets" and by developing the beach area at Saphan Hin.

Also key issues were consistent quality tap water supply, public transport, Wi-Fi connectivity, openly dealing with corruption complaints and the sustainable economic development of Phuket Town, he added.

"For the policies presented to the Phuket City Council to be effective and successful requires cooperation from all sectors, to cooperate with each other and develop with the intention of managing the government of Phuket City to be in accordance with the law, rules, regulations, ordinances and policies, and we will adhere to the principles of good governance in accordance with good governance practices," Mayor Saroj said.

monsoon surf safety

LIFEGUARDS ARE URGing people to swim only where red-yellow flags have been posted and lifeguards are on patrol following warnings from the Southern Meteorological Center of heavy weather and intermittent monsoon storms.

Nai Harn chief lifeguard Chula Nontree told *The Phuket* News last Wednesday (June 8), "Today, the sky is still clear, but we have about two-metrehigh waves. Please enter the water only in the areas between the yellow-red flags, and follow lifeguards' suggestions.

"Right now, we do not have many tourists on weekdays, but the beach is quite crowded on days with good weather. I want every person to keep social distance in order to prevent the spread of COVID-19," Mr Chula added.

More strong waves were expected to continue during the annual southwest monsoon, which lasts until about October. Rungrawee Oankhot, Director of the Southern Meteorological Center, West Coast, last week issued a standard weather warning for impending storms during the southwest monsoon.

Wind waves reach up to

two to three metres, and above three metres in thunderstorm areas, she said.

Meanwhile, the International Surf Lifesaving Association (ISLA) has announced *The Phuket News* as ISLA SE Asia's 'Guardian Lifesavers of 2020'.

"Their efforts directly contributed to the training of sixty Ocean Lifeguards on Phuket, and the donation of needed lifesaving equipment, which is still in use to this day. In addition, beaches such as Surin, Bang Tao, and Layan have had continuous qualified lifeguard coverage during the COVID-19 pandemic as a direct result of their efforts, wrote Daren Jenner, Thailand Section Chief, International Surf Lifesaving Association.

Rescued baby turtles hatch

A TOTAL OF 50 BABY green sea turtles rescued as eggs from a nest being inundated by strong storm-surge waves near Promthep Cape late last month hatched under care at the Phuket Marine Biological Center (PMBC) on June 10.

The nest was initially discovered on Laem Pai Beach, Rawai, by local resident Plernthana Chartsuk on April 18.

The nest was threatened

by strong waves surging high up the beach late last month, forcing marine life experts at the PMBC to take the eggs

In total, 83 eggs were

safely recovered from the nest and were taken to the PMBC at Cape Panwa, on Phuket's east coast. The remaining 25 eggs were no longer in a condition to produce offspring.

PMBC biologists reported that the 50 baby turtles took 53 days to hatch since the nest was found. The remaining 33 eggs were still under close care and expected to hatch soon, they noted.

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Property recovery will take time

huket's property sector is not likely to benefit until later this year from the 'Phuket Sandbox' July 1 reopening of the island to receiving vaccinated international arrivals, but the move will open the door to the island's real estate market to recover in the long term, local property experts have predicted.

"Condominiums and houses, located even in best sale areas, have been affected at every price level," Wichai Wiratkapan, Director of the national Real Estate Information Center (REIC), said during a live teleconference last week.

"If the situation improves, real estate sales may get better after the market slowdown in the first half of this year and the whole of last year," he said.

Overall, 2021 is expected to see a 9.8% increase in the number of new units launched compared with 2020, with the total number of new units launched by the end of 2021 expected to reach about 3,005 units, with a total estimated value of B17.045 billion, Mr Wichai said.

For the whole of 2021, 1,246 units are expected to be sold, a 5.2% increase on last year.

Sales value total for 2021 is expected to reach B5.402bn, a 0.8% increase on 2020, Mr Wichai predicted.

"At the end of this year 2021, there will be 8,468 units in total left unsold, a 1.5% decrease on the total units left unsold at the end of 2020," Mr Wichai explained.

The 8,468 units in total left unsold will have an estimated value of B47.775bn, a 9.2% increase in the value of unsold units at the end of 2020, he said.

"For the whole year, we expect 6,374 units will be transferred, that's 19.5% more than in 2020, with the total value of transfers for 2021 valued at B21.161bn – a 20.9% increase on 2020," Mr Wichai

HOPES AND CONCERNS

Phattanan Pisutwimol, President of the Phuket Real Estate Association (PREA), said that despite the Phuket Sandbox reopening and the mass-

vaccination efforts underway across the island, he still had key concerns.

"The worst-case scenario is that few foreign tourists come while the number of Thais coming also decreases," he said.

Phuket's tourism and property sectors were deeply connected, Mr Phattanan said.

"Phuket's main foreign property customers are Chinese, Indian and Russian. These three countries have not allowed their people to travel abroad, but we expect this opening to be a testing model, because if we do not open we will not have a chance to allow our economy to recover," Mr Phattanan explained.

"In these three months, we must be able to control the spread of infection, and achieve herd immunity," he said.

If those tasks can be accomplished, "I believe that we will have more tourists in the Q4 this year," he said.

"The situation of real estate business in Phuket right now is very bad. If anyone can sell 10% of their units, they are doing very well," Mr Phattanan said bluntly.

houses left to sell because people do not have income and financial institutions are being strict in lending. Developers need to fight to get customers who are getting loans from banks," he noted.

"Real estate agents that have close relations with banks know who have been approved loans and will approach them. The real estate agents attract customers by offering special conditions, such as lower prices. This situation has intensified the promotional campaigns, which right now is already interesting, such as offering no payments for two years," he added.

Prayut refuses to lay vaccine blame

Prime Minister Prayut Chan-ocha refused to lay the blame for recent vaccination cancellations on individuals or state agencies, saying on Monday (June 14) that reports had been muddled by too many sources.

The national vaccination rollout hit turbulence last week after several public and private hospitals postponed inoculations amid a shortage of the COVID-19 vaccine.

"I'm not blaming anyone. Others may not have the same understanding of the issue because information is being passed through too many channels," Gen Prayut said while replying to questions about the stop-start nature of the national vaccination programme in some parts of the country of late.

The prime minister said he has instructed the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA) to reiterate his desire to balance current stocks according to demand and urgency.

He also said he wanted to see appointment numbers aligned more closely with the concept of demand so fewer people would have their appointments cancelled or be turned away. He added that he did not expect any more significant hiccups.

"If any such problems still exist, [we will] do some fine-tuning," he said.

The premier reiterated that supplies are received in batches throughout the month, and the amounts are not uniform.

"From now on, the appointments will be organised based on the vaccines that arrive in each batch," he said.

'GIVE PEOPLE THE FACTS'

His remarks were made after many hospitals in Bangkok, both privately run and state-owned, announced they had suspended appointments because they ran out of supplies.

Most of the postponed vaccination appointments were made by senior citizens and people with underlying medical conditions through the Mor Prom ("Doctor Ready") app.

This prompted Youwanush Kongdan, the director of Namarak Hospital, a private 10-bed facility in Bangkok specialising in breast cancer treatment, to take the problem to her Facebook page with some timely suggestions for the Public Health Ministry.

"I am making an appeal to the government that it should give people the facts and communicate with them in a straightforward manner," she said on Sunday (June 13).

"If you have sufficient vaccines, please say so. If you don't have enough vaccines, you also should say so and tell people when the vaccines will come. People will accept that.

"This war [against the coronavirus outbreak] needs a clear policy and quick communications.

"The [public health] minister is the commander-in-chief who sets the policy," she said. "Or is it the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration now?"

The post prompted Public Health Minister Anutin Charnvirakul to give an interview on Channel 3, in which he blamed the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration (BMA).

He said the Public Health Ministry had agreed to supply the BMA with one million doses of the vaccine and in less than two weeks 500,000 doses had already been delivered.

"Please don't say the ministry isn't doing anything because it already has distributed all vaccine supplies received from the suppliers to eligible parties as instructed by the CCSA and on time," he said.

Soon after Anutin's interview, the BMA's public relations office posted a statement on its Facebook page saying that the ministry failed to supply vaccines to the BMA as planned.

It said the BMA was notified by the ministry that 2.5 million doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine will be provided, and therefore the BMA planned its mass vaccination programme accordingly.

However, the BMA said it only received 350,000 vaccine doses, in addition to the 150,000 Sinovac jabs it had to cover injections from June 7-14.

Out of the total supply of 6.3 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines expected to be delivered this month, Bangkok was promised to get 1.16 million doses, while the other 76 provinces will receive 3.22 million doses, said Dr Opas Karnkawinpong, director-general of the Department of Disease Control (DDC).

On Monday, the CCSA held a joint conference with Dr Opas and Bangkok governor Aswin Kwanmuang to explain how the rollout is being managed.

Both reiterated the aim was to procure enough vaccines for at least 70% of the population to have received both doses necessary for immunity by the end of the year.

Dr Opas said that as of June 13, 6.1 million shots had been administered, adding that 17% of the capital's residents have now had their first doses, and they included many key education personnel, public transport workers and subscribers of the social security fund.

PM insists he will complete term

PRIME MINISTER PRAYUT CHAN-Ocha ended speculation about an early general election in bizarre fashion last Monday (June 14).

Gen Prayut asked the military-appointed senators to raise their hands if they did not trust him. None did.

The PM duly told the Senate he intended to complete his four-year term, which ends in 2023

Gen Prayut had prompted speculation about a House dissolution when he previously instructed the cabinet to speed up implementation of critical projects because the government had only "one year" left to work.

However, on Monday he confirmed he planned to stay on.

"I plan to complete my term, so it should




put a stop to the talk [about a snap election]," he said.

He added that he continued to dedicate himself to addressing the people's problems and still faced several lawsuits.

"I never think about myself," he insisted.

"It is all about work, day in and day out... and the more they try to throw me out, the more I'll fight." *Bangkok Post*





The 4Cs for Change

Into the Fire

On a beach in Phuket, an act of kindness leads British volunteer to life's calling

t's 2017 and tourism is near an all-time high in Phuket. The paint on a B5 billion airport expansion is barely dry, and the terminals are teeming with international passengers. Local businesses are booming, and Phuket's west coast beaches are packed with visitors.

As the monsoon season approaches, the island is facing a crisis. Droves of residents and visitors alike have been drowning in Phuket's ocean waters. Snorkeling, swimming and even wading all too often result in serious injury or death. Making matters worse, the provincial government halts funding for Phuket's ocean lifeguards, and the beaches are left unguarded.



An international lifeguard aid organisation, the International Surf Lifesaving Association (ISLA) has been following the situation. Fearing a humanitarian drowning crisis, ISLA president Henry Reyes sends a letter directly to Thai Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha pleading for the return of lifeguards to the island. There is no reply.

Phuket's lifeguard crisis is born. In steps Barney Hedgecock. A professional lifeguard from the famed Royal National Lifeboat Institution of England, the veteran lifesaver makes his move to help. Logging on to ISLA's website, he applies to be one of 20 elite lifeguard instructors chosen by ISLA to combat Phuket's drowning epidemic. The selection process is extremely competitive. Sixty-six other applicants to the volunteer project, all qualified lifeguards from around the globe, are turned away.

Being selected is only the first step in the volunteer process. Barney still needs to come up with thousands of dollars, just like the other volunteers, to fully fund the project and pay for his air travel. Then there's virtual homework and team building he must complete, all before arriving on island for the training project.



"I was apprehensive about my own abilities and whether I would be able to offer anything to this party of super heroes," recalls Barney.

"I loved chatting with my teammates during the training at Surin Beach, especially Aurelio Norte and Daniel Ferrari about their double lives as both firefighters and beach lifeguards. A career I had not previously considered suddenly became my life's ambition.

"On returning to England, I immediately began searching for firefighter recruitment anywhere in the country. I discovered that rarely did fire and rescue services in the UK recruit as it was such an elite job," he says.

"The hospitality from the instructor team in Thailand and the way those two spoke of the fire service, I knew I

had to pursue my dream. The application process took the best part of a year with various interviews, fitness tests and skills assessments," Barney notes.

"With much perseverance in October 2018 I found out I was successful in joining the London Fire Brigade and graduated from the training academy in December 2018. I now serve on Hammersmith Fire Stations Blue Watch whilst also part time beach lifeguarding on the beautiful Dorset coast.

"I'm still very proud of what we did in Phuket. It was a once in a lifetime opportunity."

Djokovic the history maker

Serbian comes from two sets down to win epic French Open

ovak Djokovic claimed a 19^{th} Grand Slam title and became the first man in 52 years to win all four majors twice when he came from two sets down to beat Stefanos Tsitsipas in a gripping French Open final last Sunday (June 13).

The world number one triumphed 6-7 (6/8), 2-6, 6-3, 6-2, 6-4 in four hours and 11 minutes over the Greek 22-year-old who was playing in his first Slam final.

Djokovic is now just one major away from equalling the all-time record of 20, jointly held by Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal.

It was a second French Open crown for the Serbian after his 2016 victory and adds to his nine Australian Opens, five Wimbledon titles and three at the US Open.

The 34-year-old is the first man since Rod Laver in 1969 to win all four Slams on multiple occasions and just the third in history.



"It was an electric atmosphere. I want to thank everyone who has been with me on this journey," said Djokovic after his win.

Djokovic is the first man ever to win a Slam title by twice coming back from two sets down following his last-16 battle with Italian teenager Lorenzo Musetti.

Djokovic now has 84 career titles in total while his latest win pushed him to the brink of US\$150 million (B4.6

billion) in prize money.

Next on the list is an assault on a calendar Grand Slam, only achieved in the men's game by Don Budge in 1937 and Laver in 1962 and 1969, by defending his Wimbledon crown and then winning a fourth US Open.

On top of that, Djokovic also wants the Olympic gold medal in Tokyo to complete the first ever Golden Grand Slam by a male player.

Tsitsipas, who revealed

that he learned of his grandmother's death just minutes before the match, said he was inspired to follow in Djokovic's footsteps.

"What I learned today is that no matter what, in order for the match to be finished, you have to win three sets and not two," he said.

"Two sets doesn't really mean anything. It's still one away of winning the entire match.

he said.

"Novak has shown what a great champion he is and I hope one day to have half of what he has achieved."

'RIGHT TACTICS'

Djokovic, meanwhile, said he gave away his winning racquet to a young boy watching courtside for "giving me the right tactics".

At the end of the mammoth encounter, Djokovic handed his racquet to the youngster who was then pictured on TV jumping for joy and in shock at the gesture.

"He was in my ear the entire match basically, especially when I was two sets to love down. He was encouraging me. He was actually giving me tactics, as well," said Djokovic.

"He was like, 'Hold your serve, get an easy first ball, then dictate, go to his backhand.' He was coaching me literally.

"I found that very cute, very nice. So I felt like to give the racquet to the best person was him after the match. That "But I had a good run here was kind of my gratitude for

so I am happy with myself," him sticking with me and supporting me."

DOUBLE DELIGHT

Earlier on Sunday, Barbora Krejcikova became the first player since Mary Pierce in 2000 to win the French Open singles and doubles titles.

Krejcikova teamed with fellow Czech Katerina Siniakova to defeat Bethanie Mattek-Sands and Iga Swiatek 6-4, 6-2 for their third Slam title together.

It came a day after the 25-year-old became the first Czech woman since Hana Mandlikova in 1981 to lift the singles title with a 6-1, 2-6, 6-4 win over Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova.

"It's an extraordinary achievement to win in singles and doubles," said Swiatek who was singles champion in 2020.

Krejcikova admitted she planned to enjoy a rare glass of champagne to celebrate her impressive achievement.

"I already said I don't really drink but I think it's a time to actually celebrate," she beamed after her doubles triumph.



F1 calendar in jeopardy

FORMULA ONE

THE CANCELLATION OF the Singapore Grand Prix for the second successive season bodes badly for Formula 1's record-breaking season.

Singapore's withdrawal followed the cancellation of the Canadian Grand Prix, originally set to run last weekend (June 11-13). It was to be replaced by a race in Istanbul, but a surge in cases in Turkey meant that too was cancelled.

Instead the French Grand Prix has been brought forward seven days to this Sunday (June 20), with two races back to back at Austria's Red Bull Ring to follow.

With Singapore's vacated weekend to be filled later in the year, F1 can purport to still be targeting what would be an unprecedented 23 grands prix. But serious further problems

The Australian Grand Prix, postponed from March to November, is also in doubt as the Australian government maintains strict immigration controls similar to those that undid Canada and Singapore, and the country's lethargic vaccine rollout means it's unlikely to hit the immunisa-

too is in flux with local authorities unlikely to approve it until the Olympics have been run successfully or otherwise.

The Brazilian Grand Prix is unlikely to proceed due to its persistent COVID infection rate, though Mexico City Grand Prix organisers are working to convince the sport it can run its event safely as daily coronavirus counts decline.

The final round of the year, in the United Arab Emirates, is also potentially under threat for its placement on the UK's do-not-travel list, which would require F1's seven UK-based teams to quarantine up to

tion benchmarks that could Christmas upon return.

The sport has some races The Japanese Grand Prix in reserve. The United States may host two rounds in Texas, while last year's fallback races at the Nürburgring in Germany and Mugello in Italy are likely to reappear to keep the sport within the certainty of the European environment.

Football loses but life wins

Denmark's Eriksen suffers cardiac arrest on pitch

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egarded by many as a symbol of hope and triumph over the COVID-19 pandemic, Euro 2020 finally got underway last Friday (June 11).

The month-long tournament, played across 11 European cities, generated huge excitement from London to Baku, from Amsterdam to Bucharest as fans were permitted to attend matches after a year-long absence.

However, the traumatic events that transpired in the third game of the tournament on Saturday completely overshadowed all anticipation and provided a sobering realitycheck.

Denmark took on tournament debutants Finland in an all Nordic affair at the Parken Stadium in Copenhagen where 16,000 raucous and passionate fans convened.

The hosts were quietly confident of not just their chances in the opening game



but in a broader context of being able to advance deep into the tournament with their talisman and national hero Christian Eriksen pulling the strings.

Playing at the peak of his powers having just won the title in Italy with Inter Milan, 29-year-old Eriksen is an attacking midfielder with such astute craft that he always inspires fear into opponents.

In the 43rd minute of the encounter with Finland Eriksen made a routine run to collect a throw-in from a teammate. Prior to receiving the ball he

started to waiver and lose his footing, eventually tumbling to the turf face-first.

No opposing player had been near him and it was immediately clear something was seriously wrong.

Danish captain Simon Kjaer dashed to Eriksen's aid, ensuring he had not swallowed his tongue and manouvering him into the recovery position. Players from both sides and English referee Anthony Taylor gestured frantically for the medical team to attend to the striken Dane.

Fearing the worst, the

crowd fell silent. Millions watching around the world on TV no doubt did likewise. This was a hugely distressing incident to be an observer of.

'HE WAS GONE'

The medics administered CPR then the defibrillator as Eriksen's teammates formed a protective circle to shield him from the spotlight of watching eyes at the ground and via TV broadcasts. Several were in tears of distress, covering their faces with their jerseys as they wept.

After a while, Eriksen for Finland.

was carried on a stretcher from the field and it was clear from initial pictures that he was conscious. A Reuters photographer in the stadium said he saw the player raise a hand to the crowd as he was carried from the pitch.

Eriksen was taken to Rigshospitalet hospital and shortly after the news everyone had been praying for was announced: that he was in stable condition.

Morten Boesen, the Danish team doctor who attended to Eriksen on the pitch, stated on Sunday there was still "no explanation" for why the midfielder had collapsed but did confirm he had suffered a cardiac arrest.

"He was gone, and we did cardiac resuscitation," Boesen said.

"How close were we? I don't know. We got him back after one defib [defibrillation], so that's quite fast," he added.

Surprisingly, the game was eventually completed after the news came through that Eriksen was in a stable condition, ending in a 1-0 win

But the game and the score were completely immaterial. Maybe even the entire competition would be. Such was the sheer shock of Eriksen's ordeal that it delivered a sobering dose of perspective and left one seriously re-evaluating priorities. Tributes and well wishes came flooding in from all over the world. It was clear Eriksen's predicament had touched, shocked and scared

Naturally, Eriksen will remain in hospital for the immediate future as further tests are conducted and it seems highly unlikely that his mercurial talents will ever grace a professional football field again.

Maybe, as we progress and hopefully a fit again Eriksen speaks publicly, the tournament can still serve as a celebration of a return to normality. However, the harrowing events in Copenhagen last Saturday have reminded us all that football is just a game between 22 players and not of life or death.

As Danish newspaper Dagbladet said so adroitly: "Denmark lost but life won."

Vietnam wants SEA Games moved


VIETNAM HAS PROposed to postpone this year's Southeast Asian Games (SEA Games) as the country grapples with a fresh outbreak of COVID-19.

The regional equivalent of the Olympic Games is scheduled to be held from Nov 21 to Dec 2 in Vietnam's capital city of Hanoi and 11 other locations across the country – some of which are at the epicentre of the fresh COVID-19 wave

However, authorities in Vietnam want to postpone the 31st edition of the Games to July of next year.

"The Vietnam Olympics Committee, the host for SEA Games 31, has sent a letter to countries informing them of its proposal to postpone SEA Games 31 to July 2022 due to the complicated situation of the COVID-19 pandemic," Phap Luat Online stated on June 9.

The Vietnam Olympics Committee confirmed that the SEA Games Council, which is based in Bangkok, met on June 10 to discuss.

CYCLING

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e calls it the "craziest, hardest challenge of my life," an assertion no doubt many would agree with.

On June 26, British expat John Julius "JJ" Bennett is taking on the monumental feat of replicating the famed Tour de France around Phuket, cycling a distance of 3,417km over a 19-day period to raise funds for the One Phuket food drive supporting those devastated by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

"It is heartbreaking to see so much poverty impacting so many in Phuket," says 57-year-old John. "People's lives have been ruined, lifetime savings have disappeared, businesses gone forever and many families within poorer communities remain desperate for food and bare essentials.

"I have seen many Phuketians selling their saucepans for as little as B100 just to be able to buy some food to eat, which is incredibly sad," he adds.

Stirred by the dire situation, John decided to take on a challenge that would attract attention and hopefully raise much needed funds.

"To cycle 3,417km in 19 days is tough," John commented. "To put it

into perspective, that is equivalent to the distance between Edinburgh and Moscow, or Canada to Mexico. Many people have told me I am completely mad and I probably am, but that's what makes it a challenge."

The cycle will be split across 21 days with two days allocated for rest and incorporates the varying stages seen at the Tour de France; hills, flats, mountains and time-trials will all factor in across separate days with the longest cycle set at a distance of 249.5km.

RECORD HOLDER

Last year John rode 3,000km in 30 days around Phuket and raised B150,000 for a charity supporting youngsters and babies affected by the pandemic. He is hoping to improve on this achievement this time around.

John has always been a cycling enthusiast. Aged 14, he became national school boy champion and junior record holder in the South West of England for the 25 miles Time Trial, a record that stood for 30 years. At senior level he raced in France for Peugeot but never made it to the real Tour de France. "I just wasn't good enough," he says, modestly. While continuing to cycle for fun, John took a sabbatical from racing for many years before returning competitively and

winning over 200-time trial races in the UK between the ages of 35-45.

He moved to Thailand seven years ago to take on the role of Professor of Sports Science at Thammasat University in Bangkok. Regular freelance work at Thanyapura meant frequent visits to Phuket, a move he and his wife made permanent last March just before the first lockdown descended.

'HYDRATION, NUTRITION, PACING'

John's training regime in preparation for the upcoming challenge is intense and regimented, incorporating anywhere between one to four hours before or after work, five times a week.

"I was too heavy six weeks ago, so have had to focus on losing 6kg and teaching my body to use more fat as a fuel and less carbohydrates. It's quite a complex process that uses specific nutrition techniques and specific training intensity to teach the body into burning more fat.

"For example, Friday evening a low carb meal, then Saturday no breakfast, a coffee to kickstart fat metabolism, followed by a four-hour ride at fat burning intensity with only 10 grammes of carbohydrates per hour, just enough to ignite the fat and get me home."

John's comprehensive training

routine and sports science expertise will place him in good stead for when the challenge starts, crucial when tackling the average daily rides of 169km.

"The key to coping with the distances is hydration, nutrition and pacing," he says.

"I am confident I can hold 200 watts using a power meter on the bike to gauge my effort. Having a support car with me means I have peace of mind that all my drinks, nutrition and spare bike are at hand if required."

The one challenge he has no control over, of course, is the weather, something he states could be the biggest hurdle.

"Whereas I don't mind some rain, which can be warm and cooling, it is monsoon season and the heat and humidity are intense."

"But by starting at 6am daily, 160km will take me between five to six hours, meaning I am back by lunch and avoid the main heat of the day.

"However, the 249km stage will take me eight hours, so that day will be really tough physically and mentally.

"I will become more and more fatigued as the days go on but it then becomes a mental battle of focus and motivation. When someone tells me I am mad and it's impossible to emulate these distances aged 57, it just makes me want to complete it and raise as much as we can."

'RAISE AWARENESS'

With Phuket scheduled to reopen to vaccinated tourists on July 1 many see light at the end of a very long and painful tunnel. However, if anything the last 18-months has taught us it is that nothing is certain and to be prepared for the unexpected.

"We are in desperate need of donations right now to help keep families fed and watered for the next six months," John says gravely.

"If we can get 1,000 people to donate US\$10 (B310) each that will help feed and support an incredible amount of families struggling in poverty.

"I am willing to give up three weeks of my time to ride 3417km in monsoon rains, 35-degree heat and 90% humidity. All I want out of this is to raise awareness and donations to help. Every single baht will go to the charity."

All donations can be made via the GoFundMe page, established to ensure maximum transparency and to monitor all contributions.
