OPTIMISM FOR TOURISM RECOVERY SHINES AS THAILAND PASS CANCELLED

ocal hoteliers are feeling good about Phuket's tourism revival prospects after the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA) in Bangkok last Friday (June 17) announced the easing of major restrictions that were highly criticised for deterring tourism arrivals.

The easing of restrictions will, among other effects, see the Thailand Pass Certificate of Entry no longer required from July 1. Also to come into effect next month is the lifting of the requirement to wear a face mask in general public areas.

"Phuket is certainly seeing a gradual return of tourism, and we're seeing more corporate mega events and weddings returning to the island – this is encouraged by the ease of travel restrictions and increase in airlift and frequency of flights to the island," said Bjorn Courage, President of the Phuket Hotels Association.

"Phuket Sandbox was the first indication of positive international borders reopening in Southeast Asia. Our island is ready, businesses are back to normal business capacity and we're ready to have tourists back," Mr Courage, who is also General Manager of the InterContinental Phuket Resort, told *The Phuket News*.

"That said, our industry is facing a massive challenge in human resources. There has been a substantial talent flight out of hotels and shortages in skills hospitality is a clear and present danger," Mr Courage noted.

"Our focus at Phuket Hotels Association is now highly focused on upskilling of existing staff and education in college and universities to provide a sustainable future in the industry. Brand Thailand is the face of the nation and our hotels are at the forefront of a global brand, so it's a critical time for action." (See 'Hotels target skills shortage' on page 6).

Following the CCSA's announcements last Friday, which includes

nightlife venues to return to normal trading hours from July 1 (see page 2), Tourism Minister Phiphat Ratchakit-prakan told reporters that the Thailand Pass system, where foreign tourists must seek prior approval from Thai authorities, will be halted from July 1, removing one of the country's last remaining travel curbs. (See page 7.)

"The Kingdom is one of the world's most popular travel destinations, but tourism businesses have long complained that its requirement for foreigners to submit multiple documents – from vaccine and swab test certificates to medical insurance and hotel bookings – was impeding the sector's recovery," Mr Phiphat said.

Nightlife hours to return to norma

ith the Centre for COV-ID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA) resolving to have all provinces in Thailand declared 'Green' areas effective July 1, operating hours of pubs, bars and other entertainment venues will return to normal, a senior Ministry of Foreign Affairs official announced last Friday (June 17).

The CCSA has resolved to declare all 77 provinces of Thailand "surveillance areas", or "green areas", in its COVID colour-coded zoning, Marathi Nalita Andamo, News Division Director of the Department of Information under the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, explained this afternoon.

The centre said it will also abolish the Thailand Pass System from July 1 onward, she added.

"The recategorisation now allows some nightly entertainment venues to operate until midnight, while others can open until 2am," Ms Andamo said, reported state news agency NBT.

ID-prevention measures, temperature screening in most buildings is no



longer required. Mask wearing is still recommended in most cases, the report noted.

BACK TO THE BARS

Weerawit Kreuasombat, President of the Patong Entertainment Business Association (PEBA), has noted a "Operators are advised to seek recent increase in trade among bars along Bangla Rd.

A report by Radio Thailand Phuket, which operates under the Phuket office of the Public Rela-Under the further easing of COV- tions Department (PRD Phuket), attributed the increase in business to the easing of restrictions brought

into effect on June 1, which allowed specially registered nightlife venues to sell alcohol until midnight.

The "Cinderella rule" is still in effect, at this stage until July 1.

Regardless, according to the Radio Thailand Phuket report, the easing of nightlife venue trading hours and restrictions has resulted in "almost 100% of the area's entertainment venues to be back open".

Mr Weerawit pointed out that most of the patrons currently enjoying the nightlife available are tourists from India and from Australia.

"However, the spending behaviour

of this group of tourists still may not be as much as tourists from Europe, who have not yet arrived because it is in the off season," Mr Weerawit said.

"But it's better than no tourists coming in," he noted.

"The overall atmosphere is considered to be good. Entertainment venue operators in Soi Bangla, Patong, are strictly following the measures that the provinces and the government have set," Mr Weerawit said

"It has been a hard lesson, but we are ready to provide services in accordance with the measures of the state for business operators in the tourism sector to take full advantage of the opportunity to open up the country by being a good host to welcome visitors of all nations and languages," he said.

BANGLA CHECKS

Despite the major announcements by the CCSA, nightlife venues are for now to continue operating under condition that they comply with Thai Stop COVID 2 Plus (TSC 2+) measures.

Kathu District Chief Siwat Warangkul, along with officers from the Patong Police, Tourist Police, Patong Municipality and local health officials on June 16 conducted inspections of nightlife venues along Bangla Rd for compliance with the COVIDprevention measures.

Leading the foray, which began at 7:30pm, were Maj Gen Saksira Phuak-am, Deputy Commander of Region 8 Police along with Phuket Provincial Police Deputy Commander Col Chaikiat Wiriyasathitkul, Lt Col Ekachai Siri of the Phuket Tourist

No legal action was reported to have been taken against any persons, whether they be business operators, staff or tourists.

The stated goal of the inspection was to ensure compliance and to inform people on the popular nightlife street of the COVID-prevention measures still in effect.

picked up in recent months, the industry is far from recovering, with huge jobs and business losses in a sector that typically accounts for about 12% of Thai gross domestic product," he added.

MOVE PRAISED

Sanan Angubolkul, Chairman of the Thai Chamber of Commerce, said businesses are likely to breathe a sigh of relief as they can resume normal operations after the government announced the relaxations.

The battered tourism sector is expected to recover after the government ap-

proved the proposal to scrap the Thailand Pass requirement for overseas tourists. A tourism recovery will help boost the country's economy in the second half of this year, he said, forecasting more than 6 million foreign arrivals this "Though tourism has year, reported the Bangkok Post.

> According to Mr Sanan, the extension of service hours for bars, pubs and karaoke clubs beyond midnight will also be a sign for restaurants, taxis and other businesses to resume their services as normal.

> "Income from nighttime businesses across the country is estimated at B30-50 billion per month. We expect B200-300bn worth of money circulation will resume in the second half," he said. "In combination with income from foreign tourists, as much as B500-700bn is estimated to circulate in the economy in



the second half, encouraging people to spend more in the remaining months of the year."

Chaichan Chareonsuk, president of the Thai National Shippers' Council, said the government's decision will help resuscitate service and tourism businesses.

"Many countries already eased their strict control measures and reopened to foreign tourists, such as Vietnam. It was time for the Thai government to scrap such strict requirements to boost the economy," he said.

FURTHER EASING

However, tourism businesses have urged the government to further relax restrictions to stimulate the economy.

Marisa Sukosol Nunbhakdi, President of the Thai Hotels Association, said at the recent 'Thailand Moving Together' seminar held in Bangkok that

the reopening of the country is a lack of workers, as many former employees are hesitant to return due to the instability of tourism demand.

Ms Marisa observed that many nations have already eliminated mask requirements, and Thailand should adopt festival in October, as well the same policy, allowing businesses and individuals to decide for themselves whether to don a mask, she added.

Phuket Tourist Association's Vice President of International Marketing, Nantida Atiset, stated that Thailand's air connectivity must also be improved to increase capacity and provide support for chartered flights, particularly from India and major international destinations.

Of note, the PTA is organising a tourism road show to Delhi, Mumbai and Bangalore in early August.

Echoing Ms Nantida's

the greatest concern following sentiments, Somsong Sachaphimukh, Vice President of the Tourism Council of Thailand, noted that as many as 300-400 Indian couples are currently planning wedding ceremonies in Thailand for 2022.

> He added that the Diwali as the 75th anniversary of India-Thailand diplomatic relations, will also drive this market.

> Meanwhile, Sanga Ruangwattanakul, President of the Khao San Business Association, proposed extending the closing time for nightlife businesses in Bangkok and major tourist destinations such as Phuket and Pattaya beyond the closing times that were in effect before the COVID-19 pandemic, and which come into effect again on July 1, to help operators increase their revenue.







South African caught smuggling cocaine

ustoms officers at Phuket International Airport have arrested a South African man caught smuggling 1.49kg of cocaine, estimated to be worth B4.47 million, in 155 capsules in his stomach.

Customs spokesman Chaiyut Khamkun last Friday (June 17) confirmed that Customs officers had seized a total of 17.19kg of cocaine worth about B51.47 million in two incidents in the preceding two weeks.

The 29-year-old South African man was traveling from the Ethiopian capital Addis Ababa and landed at Phuket airport at about 12:30pm on June 9, Mr Chaiyut explained.

A baggage inspection found nothing illegal, but officers were suspicious that the man might be smuggling drugs into the country by passing through Customs after swallowing the contraband.

No explanation was given as to why Customs officers thought this.

The man was taken to Thalang Hospital, where an x-ray confirmed the officers' suspicions. Many foreign objects of a round, oval shape were identified to be in his abdomen.

The man subsequently admitted to swallowing capsules containing drugs.

consumed had not been confirmed, Mr Chaiyut continued.

However, the patient Customs officers later confirmed the man had swallowed B47mn, Mr Chaiyut said. 115 capsules altogether containing 1.49kg of cocaine, estimated to be worth B4.47mn, he said.

The South African man has since been taken to Sakhu Police Station, located just south of Phuket airport, and charged accordingly, Mr Chaiyut confirmed.

Then on Monday last week (June 13), Customs officers at Suvarnabhumi International Airport in Bangkok arrested three people arriving from Brazil who

At that time which drug had been were caught with 15.7kg of cocaine hidden in the bottom lining of their pieces of luggage.

The drugs seized was valued at about

The three entered the country with five items of luggage, which officers searched and scanned by x-ray, he said.

The inspections discovered the cocaine in packages that were wrapped with plastic as the inner layer and then wrapped with black carbon paper used for copying documents.

All three were charged for attempting to smuggle the drugs into the country, Mr Chaiyut confirmed.

Foreigners wanted for hit and run

POLICE ARE TRYING TO track down a grey Toyota Vios driven by a foreign woman that struck a woman beside the road in Cherng Talay on June 16 and failed to stop, leaving the woman in hospital with broken ribs and head injuries.

According to CCTV near the scene, the incident happened on the Bang Tao Rd at 4:17pm. The car was heading towards Surin Beach when it struck the woman.

The car has been described as a brand-new grey Toyota Vios bearing Bangkok licence plates with the number 8767.

Police and the owner of Pam's Relax Massage, where the woman worked, have so far asked not to name the woman injured.

Jarunee Kasurong, sister of the injured woman, filed a formal complaint of the hit and run at Cherng Talay Police Station on June 17. The complaint was received by Lt Col Worawut Sensob, Deputy Chief of Investigation at Cherng Talay Police.

Chayakorn Permpoon, owner of Pam's Relax Massage, explained that the woman was walking to a small shop nearby to buy a bottle of drink-

ing water when the Vios came around the bend at speed. The car swerved wide as it rounded the corner and struck the nowinjured woman.

A foreign woman was driving, with a foreign man sitting in the front passenger seat.

The woman struck by the car was rushed to Thalang Hospital and later transferred to Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town.

She is in a stable condition but remains in care and under observation.

Police have checked CCTV in the area, though there is very limited coverage showing the actual impact. Officers are continuing their efforts. At time of press, Cherng Talay Police had yet to confirm any success in finding the car or its driver.

Police investigate Patong taxi drivers brawl

POLICE ARE INVEStigating a street brawl involving motorcycle taxi drivers in Patong after a video of the incident was posted online raising questions about Phuket's tourism image.

The fight involving Patong 'public transport' drivers broke out at around 12:45am last Saturday (June 18), on Patong's renowned beach road, right in front of the Patong Immigration Office and some 200 metres from Bangla Community Police Station.

The incident was recorded by a dash-cam of a passing vehicle. The video was then posted online and went viral.

A 39-second-long clip shows a group of people beating another person right in the middle of the beach road. Some of the attackers can be clearly seen wearing blue vests, a typical uniform of Patong motorbike taxi drivers. The end of the fight was not shown in the clip.

It was later reported by local Thai media that several people presented themselves to Patong Police and confirmed that there

was a conflict between local motorcycle taxi drivers and a competitor "not from their queue" who tried to pick-up a passenger in their area.

It was not revealed if the passenger was a Thai national or a foreign tourist. The unnamed victim had yet to report the incident to the police.

Phuket Provincial Police

Commander Maj Gen Sermphan Sirikong confirmed to local media that he had been informed of the incident and ordered Patong Police to investigate the case in due manner. Yet at the time of press no official statement has been released so far by either Phuket Provincial Police or Patong Police.

Phuket enters bid for Expo 2028


huket Governor Narong Woonciew arrived in Paris last week ahead of Thailand entering its bid to host the World Specialised Expo in 2028 at the 170th General Assembly of the Bureau International des Expositions (BIE) held on Monday and Tuesday (June 20-21).

Governor Narong was joined in his visit to Paris by Chiruit Isarangkun Na Ayuthaya, Thailand Convention and Exhibition Bureau (TCEB) President, TCEB Southern Regional Office Director Pattanachai Singhavara, Phuket Tourist Association President Bhummikitti Ruktaengam and even Vachira Phuket Hospital Director Dr Weerasak Lorthongkham.

The Phuket delegation met with Thana Veskosit of the Thai Embassy in Paris last Friday (June 17) before the BIE General Assembly, during which six countries delivered their presentations in their bids to host Expo 2028.

Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha submitted a formal letter of support for Phuket to host the World Specialised Expo. The undated letter, shared by the Phuket office of the Public Relations Department (PR Phuket) on June 15, was submitted to the BIE in English,

"As one of the most visited coun-



tries in the world, Thailand has been honoured to warmly welcome many international friends to share our cultural heritage and enjoy the unique Thai ways of life in every different region of our country... Thailand has cherished seeing many international travelers in our country who have correspondingly kindled a unique spirit of friendship with the Thai people," the Prime Minister wrote.

"With this long history of connectivity with peoples of many cultures, Thailand has very much appreciated the spirit of global citizenship and, therefore, the importance of reinvigorating globalization for the benefit of all countries. In this regard, Thailand relishes the opportunity to accelerate international cooperation on the many global issues that require an enlivened spirit of global citizenship, whether it be for sustainable growth, climate change, the promotion of peace, or access to sustainable development," he continued.

"It is with this essence that I am pleased to affirm my support for the candidature of the island of Phuket to be the host for a Specialised Expo in 2028, with the theme of 'Future of Life: Living in Harmony, Sharing Prosperity'. I believe that with Thailand's experiences in sustainable development, world-class tourism, and hosting many international meetings, Phuket Expo 2028 will be a successful event that contributes to our shared commitment to the SDGs and indeed, a renewed spirit of internationalism through productive and innovative cooperation between our government, business, and civil society sectors," PM Prayut wrote.

"Thailand stands ready to welcome the world to Phuket Island for Phuket Expo 2028, and is looking forward to this excellent opportunity to promote a refreshed appreciation of global connectivity and solidarity that will contribute to our shared aspirations for development, progress, and prosperity for all," he concluded.

A notice posted with the letter marked that the expo is hoped to be held from March 20 - June 17, 2028.

The three-month event is expected to attract 4.9 million visitors to the fair, generating cash flow spending of B49 billion, altogether adding B39bn to the national GDP. Income from tax collection generated from Phuket hosting the event is estimated at B9.5bn

Hosting the event is expected to create some 113,000 jobs, with the event itself enjoying 9x ROI (return on investment).

The event is to be held on 141 rai of state land near Tha Chatchai in Mai Khao, at the northern tip of the island. The project plan is to build a "world-class health tourism city", with a 5,000-seat conference centre and research facility at the site, said the notice.

The Cabinet in January approved a budget of B4.18bn for Phuket to host the expo. The BIE is currently expected to arrive in Phuket for a fourday inspection tour, from July 25-28.

Man, 81, killed in motorbike collision amid dark roadworks

AN 81-YEAR-OLD MAN HAS died after the motorbike he was riding collided with another motorbike at speed on a dark road undergoing repaving in Tambon Thepkrasattri.

Police and rescue workers were called to the scene, near the Thalang Kung Kat restaurant on Don Chom Thao Rd in Moo 4, Thepkrasattri, at about 7:45pm on June 16.

Rescue workers provided emergency first and CPR to Jaroon Tararattanakul, 81, before rushing him to Thalang Hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

Also seriously injured was the other motorbike rider, Myanmar national Kyaw Naing Oo, 37, who was also transported to Thalang Hospital.

According to the preliminary investigation into the accident, Mr Kyaw Naing Oo was riding his black-red Honda Wave motorcycle from Baan Don towards Thepkrasattri Rd when the accident happened.

Local residents at the scene said that the road had become dangerous at night with no lighting while the road resurfacing continues, with more and more accidents occurring.

"It has been a long time, nearly a year, but the construction still has not yet been completed," one resident said.

"At night, especially during rainy nights, it is very difficult to see any other vehicles, and more and more accidents are happening," she added. Eakkapop Thongtub

Search continues for young whale caught in marine trash

SEARCH TEAMS FROM THE Department of Marine and Coastal Resources (DMCR) have yet to find the young sperm whale spotted swimming through marine trash off Koh Racha Noi last week amid concerns for the whale's health.

The search was launched after photos of the whale were posted online last Thursday (June 16), with the Navy joining the efforts through patrol boat TC 107 and surveillance drones scouring the area.

The DMCR reported last Sunday (June 19) that concerns were raised when it was noticed that the whale was repeatedly turning on its side while swimming. The whale was able to right itself to breathe, but marine life researchers in the area are concerned for the whale's safety.

The search is continuing with all fishing and other commercial boat operators in the area urged to report any sightings to officials immediately.

However, so far no sightings have been reported, the DMCR noted.

The sighting of the young sperm whale in distress while swimming through a flotsam of marine trash in




waters near Phuket came just eight days after Varawut Silpa-archa, Minister of Natural Resources and Environment (MNRE), on June 8 presided over a major event at Loma Park in Patong to mark World Oceans Day that was broadcast to more than 30 countries worldwide.

The event was held under the theme "Revitalization: Collective Action for the Ocean", with the Department of Marine and Coastal Resources (DMCR) hosting similar events in 10 coastal provinces.

The event was to encourage Thai people to conserve and take care of marine resources, Mr Varawut said.

Officials aim to halve deaths on Phuket roads

huket officials have announced a policy to try to halve the number of deaths on Phuket's roads within the next five years.

Phuket Vice Governor Anupap Rodkwan Yodrabam revealed the goal during a meeting of the Phuket Province Road Safety Administrative Center Committee at Phuket Provincial Hall on June 14.

The goal is to reduce the rate of road accident deaths to 12 people per 100,000 population by the year 2027, Vice Governor Anupap told the meeting, held at the Phuket office of the Department of Disaster Prevention and Mitigation (DDPM-Phuket).

The lofty goal would see Phuket's current resident population of over 500,000 suffer "only" 41 road deaths a year.

However, Phuket has already suffered 42 deaths and 7,079 people injured in road accidents so far this year, according to the Thai Road Safety Council.

Last year, while under severe travel constraints greatly hampering the arrival of tourists on the island, Phuket suffered 70 deaths and 13,138 people injured in road accidents.

In 2020, Phuket suffered 106 deaths and 16,859 people injured in road accidents.

Vice Governor Anupap pointed out that achieving the goal would require a

concerted effort by all agencies involved.

"Operations such as strict enforcement of the law by responsible officers and the prosecution of violators for noncompliance with the law to receive the maximum penalty so that drivers strictly comply with the law," was one of the key requirements, he said.

Other actions included making road crossing areas safe, such as by ensuring drivers have reduced speed before reaching the crosswalk, as well as providing clear traffic markings on the road surfaces.

More clearly visibly traffic warning signs were required, for both drivers and

pedestrians, to be able to see clearly, were also required.

Road safety awareness activities at schools were needed to ensure safety, especially at school crossings, V/Gov Anupap said.

"Awareness campaigns are needed to educate drivers of the losses that may occur from undisciplined driving and not following traffic rules," he added.

All local municipalities are to hold such activities every month, and inform the committee of their efforts to improve road safety over the past month on the fifth day of each month, V/Gov Anupap said.



Two injured as hanging cable downs motorbike

A 51-YEAR-OLD WOMAN and her 10-year-old granddaughter escaped serious injury after a communications cable hanging loose from a roadside pole brought down the motorbike they were riding on Chao Fa West Rd near Chalong Hospital last Sunday (June 19).

Local rescue workers were alerted to the accident by a passer-by who reported that two people had been injured in a motorbike fall at the entrance to Soi Pramote off Chao Fa West Rd, in Moo 8 Chalong.

Rescue workers arrived to find Soraya Angsanam, 51, and her granddaughter Rattana Charoensap, 10, on the road with minor injuries. The pair were administered first aid at the scene before being taken to Chalong Hospital nearby.

Ms Soraya explained that she and her granddaughter were returning home after buying some lunch when she

rode over the loose cable and they were brought down.

The two had travelled about 100 metres past the pole before it pulled taut, snapping up her left arm and across her throat, causing her to lose control of the motorbike, Ms Soraya said.

Ms Soraya suffered only minor injuries along her left arm and across her throat, along with scrapes and bruises to her legs sustained when she fell onto the road.

Nong Rattana also escaped the incident with only minor injuries to her arms and legs, and a bump to her left temple.

It was not reported whether the two were wearing helmets at the time of the accident. After treating their inju-

ries, doctors released both Ms Soraya and Nong Rattana.

At time of press Chalong Municipality had yet to recognise the incident.

Cannabis use brings health risks and benefits, warns health chief

DR KUSAK KUKIATtikoon, Chief of the Phuket Provincial Public Health Office (PPHO), has spoken out on the use of cannabis and the availability of cannabis products in Phuket, especially consumables.

People should not think that marijuana has been approved for recreational use, Dr Kusak said during a radio interview on June 15.

Dr Kusak noted at the time that the Cannabis and Hemp Act had yet to be legislated. "There will be definitions for the use of cannabis," he said.

"While marijuana is restricted for patients, it should not be used by people such as those with symptoms of heart disease, lung disease, pregnant women and mothers who are breastfeeding. If necessary, consult a doctor," Dr Kusak said.

Hotels target skills shortage

s Phuket looks toward a revival in the tourism sector, hoteliers are struggling to find qualified staff to provide the level of service returning tourists are looking for.

Time is of the essence, Michael Zitek, Area General Manager at Angsana Laguna Phuket, said at an event on June 10.

"The skills shortage in hospitality in Phuket is dire. There are people who are very willing to come to work, but it is the next generation," Mr Zitek said at an AustCham event hosted at the resort that focussed on providing vocational training to plug the skills gap.

"As we have just finished the TTM 2022 [Thailand Travel Mart], we did not have enough full-time associates to deliver that level of service [required].

"We go out for recruitment and hire casual employees and the bodies are there. The desire to work is there, but there is a big gap to catch up to get it back to the skill levels people are expecting," he said.

"As an industry, we are pressed for time. We have high season looming in September and October," Mr Zitek noted.

The battering of the tourism industry during the COV-ID pandemic saw an exodus of skilled, experienced staff, Mr ZItek explained.

"Before COVID, from say 2017-2019, our supervisors and mid-level management were in their 40s and already had 20 years of experience. At the moment our supervisors are

maybe mid-20s.

"It has been this attrition of the previous professionals. They have had their own families to take care of and their own industries that they have commenced during the downtime. They have gone away from the industry and established comfortable lives, and they are not running back to Phuket and so on," he added.

"The bodies are there, the people are there, but the actual skills and experience are not," he said.

Mr Zitek's comments came at a presentation of a vocational skills training framework provided by the Hunter Education Group in Newcastle, Australia, working with the Nurture Higher Education Group (Nurture HE), which originated in Bangkok but also now provides international-level education in Indonesia and Vietnam.

The Nurture HE programme offers students a

hospitality degree issued by the University of Newcastle through the Thai Chamber of Commerce campus in Bangkok, which is home to some 24,000 students.

Stephen Healy, Co-Founder and Managing Director of Nurture Higher Education Group, explained that the degree is a fully qualified Australian degree, benchmarked against Australian university education standards. The skills and competencies taught must pass those standards, or the accreditation and certification cannot be provided.

Dary Milani, CEO, Hunter Education Group, noted that course units of competencies (skills) – anywhere from cocktail making to financial budget creation – are taught as separate subjects, but can be clustered together to deliver intensive training in specialised areas.

"The units can be taken in bite-sized pieces. Each of those unit competencies could be delivered in an accelerated cluster or intensive cluster over a weekend," Mr Milani said.

Even when fast-tracking courses, the quality of education for the overall degree is not compromised, Mr Milani noted. "Students must still meet a volume unit credits in order to complete the qualification in full," he said.


Mr Healy raised the possibility of pop-up training sessions to be held locally in order to help hotels fast-track the upskilling of their staff.

The competencies taught and tested do not change for small or large hotels. They remain the same requirements for certification, he said.

This provides for uniform skills validation and helps with transferability, Mr Healy noted.

"We're now really in a situation of rebuild and restore. I think it is important to address this in terms of the hospitality reputation of Thailand. It is important to give opportunities to grow and develop, and have certification that is transferable between hotels," Mr Zitek noted.

"The younger generation are quite confident to change jobs quite often, but if there were the opportunity to transfer that quality of education or skills to the next place and continue learning, as much as we compete, we could collaborate for the redevelopment of skills that represent Thailand," he concluded.

Emergency decree to remain for now: Prayut

BANGKOK

rime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha on Monday (June 20) insisted the government has not yet cancelled the emergency decree as there remain concerns that the special law is still needed, although easing of restrictions will continue and the Cabinet will reassess the situation when the time is right.

Prayut's remarks came after Move Forward Party (MFP) MP Rangsiman Rome urged the government to stop renewing the decree, which has been extended 18 times in two years despite the drop in COVID-19 cases and easing of restrictions.

The premier said the emergency decree was invoked to facilitate government efforts to curb the spread of COVID-19 and the special law has been an effective tool in helping to achieve that target.

He said the government would have to examine the COVID-19 situation and decide if the emergency decree

He said the government had eased several COVID-19 restrictions including allowing people to take off their face masks in open-air spaces, so there was also no need to

Thailand Pass, COVID insurance to end, face mask rules eased

BANGKOK

THAILAND PASS REGistration and compulsory COVID-19 insurance will be lifted for all people arriving in Thailand from July 1, a senior government spokesman said last Friday (June 17).

Taweesilp Visanuyothin, spokesman for the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration, said arrivals will need only show their vaccination certificates or COVID-19 test results.

Without such proof, arrivals will be given random, professional antigen tests at permanent border entry points. Random testing would continue until the government lifts all stateof-emergency measures to deal with COVID-19.

The Thailand Pass registration system will remain in place, but be used only for travellers to report suspected symptoms of dangerous and other communicable diseases, as determined by the Public Health Ministry, Dr Taweesilp said.

Foreign nationals will

not have to be insured for COVID-19, and thermal scanning will end at border checkpoints, he said. A certification of fitness for entry, issued by a Thai consulate, will also no longer be required.

The CCSA also agreed to ease the requirement for wearing a face mask, making it purely voluntary in low-risk areas, uncrowded areas or outdoors, across the country from July 1.

Face mask wearing will still be required in crowded and poorly ventilated areas such as public transport, and markets and concert venues.

The Department of Health director-general would provide guidance regarding the eased COVID-19 controls and the date for the new measures to take effect, Mr Taweesilp said. Bangkok Post

Bill to limit households to 10 cannabis plants maximum

BANGKOK

A NEW BILL BEING VETTED BY A House committee on cannabis and hemp will limit the number of cannabis plants which a household could grow to 10 and require large-scale cannabis growers to pay a progressive levy to the government which increases with the size of the operation.

A spokesman for the committee, Panthep Puapongpan, said on Monday (June 20) the majority of the committee's members agreed to cap the number of cannabis plants allowed per household to 10, in order to limit the potential for abuse in the wake of the plant's recent decriminalisation.

The cap will help ensure households could still benefit from the private cultivation of cannabis, which the government is promoting as a cash crop, Mr Panthep said.

At least 900,000 individuals have already registered to grow cannabis at home with authorities, according to the latest figures cited.

The bill also seeks to introduce progressive levies on commercial cannabis growers.

Under the proposal, growers with less than five rai of land will be subject to the least levies, while those whose plots are larger will be subject to a more stringent application process and higher levies, Mr Panthep said.

Those who cultivate cannabis and hemp for medical purposes will be considered as



an operator of a small-sized plantation and will have to comply with the same regulations when the bill becomes law, he added.

In related news, Associate Professor Chanchai Sittipunt, dean of Faculty of Medicine at Chulalongkorn University, revealed that three individuals were recently admitted to King Chulalongkorn Memorial Hospital after ingesting cannabis preparations beyond their tolerance.

They were all adults who had eaten products containing cannabis, such as cookies, without knowing exactly how much active ingredients were in said products, he said.

The doctor is optimistic that "overdoses" among consumers will decline as concerned authorities, including the Department of Health, have launched a campaign to educate the public as to how much cannabis can be safely added to food preparations without causing adverse effects and/or harm to consumers. 



Max's magnificent Montreal drive

FORMULA ONE

ine-tenths of a second has never looked so comfortable, but Max Verstappen made his defence against the faster Carlos Sainz look easy in a masterful victory at the Canadian Grand Prix last Sunday (June 19).

Verstappen is in full championship mode. We're nine rounds into the 2022 Formula One season and there's little doubt with whom the campaign momentum rests. The reigning world champion has extended his points lead for the last six races and now sits 46 points clear atop the standings, perilously close to two clear race victories with almost half the season gone.

Victory in Canada was the Dutchman's fifth in six rounds and sixth for the season. He's yet to finish a race off the podium.

It's true to say that his lucrative championship charge has come at the same time Ferrari has suffered the worst of its power unit issues, with Charles Leclerc twice retiring from the lead in the last four

races and starting from the back of the grid with a new motor in Montreal.

Sergio Perez also retired in Canada after just seven laps with gearbox trouble, muting his unexpected recent title tilt.

But even these incidents can't explain away the rate of knots at which Verstappen is pulling away at the head of the field. Perez and Leclerc, 46 and 49 points adrift respectively, have the same number of retirements as the Dutchman, with two apiece.

This isn't a story of reli-

ability or pure car speed. Verstappen is making the difference, as his Canadian Grand Prix-winning performance attests.

Red Bull Racing didn't have the fastest car in Canada, just as it hasn't for most of the season, but a masterful display of wet-weather driving squeezed the maximum from the RB18 to deliver Verstappen pole ahead of Fernando Alonso and outside title hopeful Carlos Sainz by more than 0.7 seconds.

In gloriously dry condi-

tions he turned that one-lap performance into race-long domination.

But this wasn't domination in the typical sense. Verstappen never led Sainz, his afternoon-long pursuer, by more than 10 seconds, and even when his advantage was at its largest around the pit stops he was being reeled in by the chasing Spaniard in his faster Ferrari.

And then their strategic duel turned into a 15-lap battle after a late-race safety car. Sainz had lost track position

but had gained fresher tyres, and when the pace car returned to pit lane and the race resumed, the faster Ferrari immediately began harassing the leader.

EFFORTLESS

Corner after corner and lap after lap Sainz tested and prodded Verstappen's defences, but the Dutchman seemingly effortlessly absorbed every advance. His positioning through the hairpin leading onto the long back straight was centimetre perfect to neutralise Sainz's straight-line speed, leaving the Ferrari tantalisingly short of runway to try a late-braking move into the final chicane.

Every blow was parried until Sainz's tyres lost their edge. His winning margin was just 0.993 seconds – perfectly judged and never really in doubt.

That's no slight on Sainz, who enjoyed his best weekend of the season, as was clear by his aggression late in the race. It's just recognition of the reality that Verstappen is operating on such a high level that he's taken the season completely into his own hands.

The Dutchman hasn't nec-

essarily got quicker year on year – in fact this season's Red Bull machine is a lesser match with his driving style compared to last year, muting some of his strengths – but whereas aggression had been his trademark in previous campaigns, this year it's his composure.

True, he's no longer locked in career-defining toxic title fight with a seven-time champion, but having deposed the establishment last season, his self-assuredness in the car this year is clear.

Even when he's been flustered by technical problems or bad luck – his radio outbursts in Spain were a reminder of the hot-headedness that used to be his calling card – it no longer translates into petulance on the track, where control is now overwhelmingly defines

It made the difference in Canada, and it's been making the difference all season.

Ferrari has problems with reliability and at some tracks problems with speed. But its biggest problem is Max Verstappen, and its challenge is to break his seemingly impervious title defence. And it needs to do so as soon as possible.

Thai women cricketers making a mark

THAILAND'S NATIONAL WOMEN cricketers have become one of the most rapidly improving teams in the world of cricket, with their string of accolades including a historic win on Nov 29 last year over Bangladesh at the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup Qualifiers.

The result encapsulated years of hard work and dedication with talented bowler Nattaya Boochatham taking five wickets to restrict Bangladesh to 176 from 50 overs, while the prolific opening batting partnership of Sornnarin Tippoch and Natthakan Chantham produced 90 runs, laying down a foundation for a 16-run win for the Thai side.

The feat led to the Cricket Association of Thailand being awarded the coveted ICC Association Women's Performance of the year title.

While the senior team continues to make their mark in world cricket, the junior side also recently showcased their skills at the ICC U-19 Women's T20 World Cup Asia Qualifiers in Malaysia, which ran June 3-9.

They made their debut at the inaugural cricket event under the guidance of Indian coach Nitish Salekar and Thai coaches Ratana Saengsoma and Peerawat Duangchit. Despite beating Qatar, Malaysia, Bhutan and Nepal, a loss to UAE meant they finished second in the group and were unable to qualify for the World Cup in South Africa next year.

However, the progress is encouraging. The 14-member team has an average age of 17 and hails from provinces across Thailand. They were recruited by the Cricket Association of Thailand's academy and offered full scholar-

ships to study until university and train.

Shan Kader, the association's director of cricket development, said the players have been with them since the age of 13, and have dedicated themselves to following in the footsteps of their seniors by practising a strict programme that calls for discipline and perseverance.

"Cricket is a team sport, and monetarily the cost is very high. Coming this far with the team has been nothing short of a miracle for a sport such as cricket in Thailand. There has been a lot of dedication and passion put into making the players excel," remarked Kader.

"Finances are a huge part of sustaining ourselves, just like any other sport, so to get all the help we can is important. I would say there are many ways to support national cricketers, apart from following their achievements. Sponsors can look into cross-marketing to promote their goods and support the team's progress to the next level of their cricket journey."

Thai cricketers have shown their potential at global events time and time again. At the rate they are going, Thailand qualifying for the ICC World Cup is no longer a pipe dream. Bangkok Post

US Open to allow players from Russia and Belarus

layers from Russia and Belarus will be allowed to compete in the 2022 US Open under a neutral flag, the US Tennis Association (USTA) announced on June 14.

"The USTA will allow all eligible players, regardless of nationality, to compete at the 2022 US Open," it confirmed.

The move comes after the Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP) and the Women's Tennis Association (WTA) stripped Wimbledon of ranking points after the grass-court Grand Slam tournament banned Russian and Belarusians.

Ukrainian former player Sergiy Stakhovsky immediately condemned the decision.

"You cannot put a price tag on being able to live with yourself," tweeted Stakhovsky, who retired from tennis earlier this year and has joined Ukraine's reserve forces in Kyiv.

"I salute Wimbledon, the only entity which has a moral code."

Federation (ITF), the ATP and WTA Tours have all condemned the Russian invasion of Ukraine, supported by

They banned the countries from international team competitions and issued directives that players from those nations compete under a neutral flag in other competitions.

"The USTA will work with the players and both tours to use the US Open as a platform to further the humanitarian effort of the 'Tennis Plays for Peace' program," said USTA president Mike McNulty.

The USTA also said it would introduce initiatives

to help ongoing Ukrainian

"Unfortunately, the need for help only continues to grow," said McNulty.

humanitarian efforts.

"The USTA will be responding very soon with a broad set of initiatives that will include significant financial assistance and other programs to further support humanitarian relief and the people of Ukraine."

Wimbledon's ban has ruled out a swathe of top players, including Daniil Medvedev,

the men's world number one and the reigning US Open champion, as well as last year's women's US Open semi-finalist Aryna Sabalenka and two-time major winner Victoria Azarenka.

However, one player has taken a drastic step to ensure that she is eligible to compete at the All England Club when play commences on Monday (June 27).

Natela Dzalamidze, a 29-year-old Russian doubles player ranked number 44 in the world, has avoided the Wimbledon ban by changing her nationality to Georgian.

Dzalamidze will compete in the women's doubles with Serbia's Aleksandra Krunic.

An All England Club spokesman said they were powerless to interfere in Dzalamidze's change of nationality, as this was a matter for the WTA and ITF, and that she had satisfied the entry requirements.

"Player nationality, defined as the flag they play under at professional events, is an agreed process that is governed by tours and the ITF," the spokesman said.

Fitzpatrick wins US Open with sensational finish

ENGLAND'S MATT FITZPATRICK captured his first major title on Sunday (June 19) by winning the US Open in dramatic fashion, making spectacular shots as rivals crumbled under final-round pressure.

After a thrilling three-man fight down the back nine at The Country Club, Fitzpatrick fired a two-under-par 68 to finish on sixunder-par 274 and defeat Americans Scottie Scheffler and Will Zalatoris by one stroke.

World number 18 Fitzpatrick, who Club, matched Jack Nicklaus as the only US Open and US Amateur winners on the same course, the US legend doing the double at Pebble Beach.

"It means the world," Fitzpatrick said of the achievement.

The 27-year-old from Sheffield, who shared fifth last month at the PGA Championship for his best prior major result, sank a stunning 48-foot birdie putt at the 13th hole to grab a share of the lead.

At the 15th, Fitzpatrick blasted out of the right rough to just inside 19 feet and rolled in a tension-packed putt to reach 6-under and lead by two thanks to a Zalatoris bogey.

After birdies by top-ranked Masters champion Scheffler at 17 and Zalatoris on 16, Fitzpatrick clung to a one-stroke lead at the 18th tee.

The Englishman sent his tee shot into a won the 2013 US Amateur at The Country left fairway bunker, but blasted a magnificent approach to 18 feet and two putted for par.

Zalatoris had a 14-foot birdie putt to force a playoff but when he missed, the record US\$3.15 million (B111mn) top prize went to Fitzpatrick.

"Matt's shot on 18 is going to be shown probably for the rest of US Open history," Zalatoris said.

"I walked by it and thought that going for it was going to be ballsy, but the fact that he pulled it off and even had a birdie look was just incredible. So hats off to him."

Japan's Hideki Matsuyama, the 2021 Masters champion, fired the best round of the week, a bogey-free 65, to finish fourth on three-under 277.

Four-time major winner Rory McIlroy and two-time major champion Collin Morikawa shared fifth on 278. AFP

Phuket's Top Noi a UFC star in the making

ON JUNE 10 IN SINGAPORE, Phuket's Top Noi Kiwram (8-3) not only became the first male Thai fighter to enter the UFC cage but also to have his hand raised as champion in the world's biggest MMA promotion.

The 29-year-old beat Yuma Horiuchi of Japan via unanimous decision in the first round of the 'Road to UFC' tournament at the Singapore Indoor Stadium, after going a full three rounds in the flyweight (56.7 kg) matchup.

The 'Road to UFC' event is part

of the UFC's efforts to showcase, and sign, high-level MMA prospects from across Asia, with Top Noi being the only representative from the Kingdom.

The Buriram-native has been honing his skills for the better part of the last decade in Phuket, under the tutelage of George Hickman and Alex Schild, training out of the new Bang Tao Muay Thai & MMA gym alongside the first Thai in the UFC in Loma Lookboonmee. a female strawweight fighter.


A lifelong Muay Thai fighter, Top Noi was able to showcase his elite striking skills during the fight, landing strong punches and kicks

against the Japanese fighter, setting up traps with his movement, and utilising his clinch to fend off much of his opponent's attacks. He was also able to show his improved grappling defense, which has been a focal point of his training over the last few years.

But what turned heads for many fans and media was the entertainment factor, as Top Noi danced while walking out to the cage, continuously playing it up for the cameras, and was noticeably talking to his opponent during the fight. For him, fighting is fun, and he enjoys playing mind games with his opponent, even before the bout. During the weigh-ins and staredown the day before the fight, Top Noi refused to shake his opponent's hand just to get in his head.

"I do this and he is then never sleeping. He's thinking 'oh, this guy is crazy'. I'm having fun bro," he said during the post-fight press conference minutes after the bout. "You want to put on a show, to entertain," he added.

The win ensures Top Noi moves on to the semi-finals of the 'Road to UFC' flyweight tournament, for which a date has yet to be set. At the moment, he's slated to take on Park Hyun Sung (6-0) from



South Korea, whom Top Noi has previously trained with.

It's a dream come true for a fighter who is part of the next generation of Thais moving the sport of MMA forward in Thailand. From fighting in local and regional promotions, he's climbed up the ranks to potentially join his fellow Thai Loma Lookboonmee in the UFC.

Right now the future looks bright for Thailand's MMA scene.
