Restaurants across Phuket may now sell alcohol and allow alcohol to be consumed on the premises until 11pm at night, Phuket Vice Governor Pichet Panapong has confirmed.

The news came after the meeting of the Phuket Communicable Disease Committee at Provincial Hall on Monday (June 21), with a new provincial order signed, dated and issued by Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew and posted online that night.

The order is marked as effective from Monday onwards, just nine days before the July 1 'Phuket Tourism Sandbox' reopening of the island to receiving vaccinated foreign tourists.

The order also followed the the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CCSA) last Friday designating Phuket a "yellow" province, among the safest in the country, in a new colour-coding scheme announced.

As such, Phuket was now allowed to enjoy eased restrictions in place to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

The CCSA's provisions, which also included that all pubs, bars and other "entertainment" venues in the country are to remain closed, were published in the Royal Gazette on Monday.

"Regarding the relaxation of the opening of places to set preventive measures, surveillance and control of the spread of additional COVID-19

in some areas, places can be opened for certain operations or activities and people can engage in activities necessary for their livelihood and occupation so that economic and social activities can be continued in parallel with public health measures," Governor Narong said in the order issued on Monday.

Under the new order all types of schools or educational institutions can use buildings and premises for teaching, exams, training or any activities as appropriate.

"Food or beverage outlets that are not operating as an establishment that resembles an entertainment service venue are permitted to allow food or beverages to be consumed in the shop within the specified time [the

hours permitted by normal laws].

"The sale and consumption of liquor or alcoholic beverages in the shop is allowed no later than 23:00," the order said.

From the annex to the order, 70% of staff of the outlet must be fully vaccinated with two injections or the number of doses required for each vaccine or only one injection of AstraZeneca at least 14 days before resuming work.

The order stipulated that entertainment venues in Phuket, including pubs, bars, karaoke venues and other venues "which are similar to entertainment venues", must remain closed, as well as venues for cock fighting, fish fighting, boxing and other kinds of gambling...







Prayut to inspect 'Sandbox' readiness

Prime Minister Gen Prayut Chan-o-cha is scheduled to fly to Phuket today (June 25) for an inspection of the island's readiness to reopen to receiving vaccinated forign tourists from July 1.

According to a report by state news agency NNT, PM Prayut and other ministers will depart Bangkok at 8:30am.

After arriving on the island, the group will inspect the full rehearsal by staff and officials at the international terminal of the airport in processing international tourists arriving under the 'Phuket Tourism Sandbox' scheme.

They will then move to Angsana Laguna Phuket, where they will inspect the mass vaccination efforts underway there and hold a meeting with local officials about the July 1 reopening.

In the afternoon, PM Prayut will lead the team to Ao Por Pier in Pa Khlok to review the procedures for checking tourists arriving in Phuket by boat.

After completing the inspections, the prime minister and his accompanying group will return to Phuket airport and fly back to Bangkok, said the report.

Staff and officials at Phuket International Airport on June 15



held a rehearsal of processing tourist arrivals.

Speaking to the press at an event before the rehearsal, Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew explained that similar rehearsals will be held at other main entry points to the island, namely at the Phuket Check Point at Tha Chatchai and at the major ports in Phuket used by boats arriving from other provinces.

Further practice runs were held at the airport on June 17 and 19, with another full rehearsal held on Wednesday this week (June 23). Similar rehearsals will be held at Rassada Pier and at the Phuket Check Point at Tha Chatchai today (June 25).

In "Stage 2" of the preparations, a full rehearsal will be held next Tuesday (June 29) as the last and final rehearsal before international tourists arrive, Governor Narong added.

Speaking at Phuket Provincial Hall last Friday (June 18), Governor Narong said, "We look forward to opening the island of Phuket in accordance with the guidelines approved by the CCSA, whose vision we want to see is a smooth operation. The economy can be restored while effectively preventing the spread of COVID-19.

"The measures are quite comprehensive considering those who will travel [to Phuket] will be from low-or medium-risk groups, including those who have already been vaccinated and after arriving in Phuket must be tested repeatedly, three times: the first day, the 6th day and the 12th day. And they must stay in Phuket for 14 nights before traveling

to other provinces in Thailand. But in the case of leaving the Kingdom, they can go without having to wait up to 14 days," he said.

"In addition, there will be an operations centre linking the tracking of people who travel to Phuket as well, at Phuket Airport, at the Tha Chatchai checkpoint for those arriving by land, and at Rassada Pier, Ao Por Pier and Chalong Pier for those arriving by water," he continued.

For tracking inbound tourists, Pracha Asawathira, a PhD academic with the Ministry of Digital Economy and Society (M-DES), explained, "We will use the tracking app Mor Chana, which Thai people already are familiar with. For foreign tourists, we will create an English version of the app which will notify officers if the tourists turn off the location sharing.

"We will coordinate with SHA+ managers in each hotel to send information about foreign tourist guests' movements to the central EOC [Emergency Operations Centre] every day.

"At the checkpoints, we will have a system for officers to check. The DEPA [Digital Economy Promotion Agency] will connect the network from the three ports together to share the information. We have contacted Immigration to share their information," Mr Pracha said.

Meanwhile, another easing of the COVID restrictions under the new Phuket provincial order allows supermarket convenience stores to remain open during their usual hours. Previously all 24-hour convenience stores had to close from 11pm to 4am.

Department stores, shopping centres and community malls are all allowed to resume their normal trading hours – except for game and amusement areas, and all game cabinets, game machines and game shops.

All hairdressing salons for men and women can now open as usual.

Even snooker and billiards halls, and other venues with pool tables, are now allowed to open from 3pm to 11pm. Just like restaurants, 70% of staff must be fully vaccinated.

Internet cafes, theaters and waterparks are allowed to resume their normal hours of operation. However, amusement parks must



be open only from 6am to 8pm, the order said.

GATHERINGS

"Gathering for social activities, selling alcohol or alcoholic beverages in public areas, beaches, parks are to comply with the law," the order noted.

The order also noted that for organising activities where there is

a risk of transmission of the disease, "do not organize activities in which groups of more than 200 people [will congregate], unless it is an activity performed by a competent official or in an area designated as a quarantine facility,"

However, the order did not clarify whether it was still illegal to have friends visit a family home, an offense for which foreigners have been threatened with deportation.

The order issued on Monday (Provincial Order No. 3373/2564) rescinded the previous order, issued on May 29 (No 2921/2564), meaning that the new order comprises all the restrictions that are now in effect.

The new order no longer includes the provision that dining together or drinking alcohol at home or any other place of residence must involve family members and must not have an outside party.

"In the event that the offender is a foreigner it may be considered to cancel [the foreigner's permission to] living in the Kingdom in strict accordance with the Immigration Act," the previous order warned.

The new order issued on Monday no longer carries that warning.

Regardless, officials have yet to specifically confirm that this restriction has now been lifted.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Officers or employers must consider letting employees work from home

as long as necessary, in order to reduce people movement and the risk of infection.

Officers must strictly inspect the areas which are at risk of spreading the disease, such as factories and the worker camps. Whoever does not follow the suggestion of officers and act against this order must be punished under the relevant law, the order noted.

Failure to comply with the order may be punished under Section 51 of Disease Control Act 2015, which incurs a fine of up to B20,000, or under Section 52 of the act, which invokes a penalty of up to one year imprisonment or a fine of up to B100,000 or both, the order issued on Monday noted.

Those found breaching the order will also be charged under Section 18 of the Emergency Decree on Public Administration in Emergency Situations B.E. 2548 (2005), which invokes a penalty of up to two years imprisonment or up to B40,000 or both, the order warned.







Tar balls smother beaches

Sperm whale rescued at Bang Tao as local cleanups launched

eaches as far north as Mai Khao all the way south to Kata and Nai Harn this past week were plagued with oil spill 'tar balls', and saw a 4.5-metre sperm whale in need of rescue at Bang Tao Beach.

Oil first started washing ashore further north at Mai Khao on June 13, but days later was starting to plague other popular beaches. By last Sunday (June 20) tar balls were found strewn across the sands at Patong and Nai Yang.

At Patong Beach, the oil was washed ashore along with other marine debris, leaving a line of waste from the ocean strewn along the waterline.

Further north at Nai Yang Beach, oil-covered blobs of marine debris lay strewn along the beach as families played nearby.

More than 50 people were needed to rescue a sperm whale at Bang Tao Beach, on Phuket's central west coast, Thursday last week (June 17).

The whale had several



wounds along with oil smeared all over its nose and along its body.

The whale was taken into care by marine biologists at the Sireetarn Marine Endangered Animal Rescue Center, based at the Phuket Marine Biological Centre (PMBC) at Cape Panwa.

washed ashore Phuket beaches as tar balls is unlikely to have originated from the cargo vessel 'X-Press Pearl', which burned and sank off Sri Lanka last month, Dr Kongkiat Kittiwattanawong from the PMBC told The Phuket News on Monday (June 21).

"In the [southwest] mon-The oil spill that has soon season every year Phuket is likely to have some tar balls coming ashore," he said.

"Some people link this phenomenon to Sri Lanka. However, we have checked the model for the tides and found that any oil spill [from the 'X-Press Pearl'] should not affect the west coast of Thailand," he said.

where this oil may have originated from," he added.

"We have collected samples of the tar balls and gone to check the congestion of the tar balls on the beaches. Right now, we are checking its 'fingerprint' to see the composition of the oil and to find its origin," Dr Kongkiat explained.

While the oil washing ashore has caused much alarm for local residents, Dr Kongkiat said his team had yet to confirm how much damage has been done.

"We already sent staff to collect samples of seawater and other natural resources to check whether the oil has harmed animals. However, so far, we have not seen any deaths of marine animals from the oil spill," he said.

Presenting some good news, Dr Kongkiat confirmed that the sperm whale covered in oil rescued at Bang Tao Beach last week has recovered and already been set free.

"We provided treatment to the whale until it recovered its health, and we have already "We are still looking into released it to the sea," he said.

Staff from the PMBC reported on Sunday that they along with officers from Sirinath National Park had inspected Nai Yang Beach. The team said that in heavily affected areas on the sand the officers found the tar balls had a scatter density of 129 grammes per square metre.

The PMBC staff also took water samples for further analysis of the total petroleum hydrocarbon content in seawater.

Wherever the oil spill originated from, it appeared that Phuket had taken the brunt washing ashore. An inspection of Thai Mueang Beach, north of Phuket, last Wednesday (June 16) recorded a scatter density of only 25g per square metre, the officers noted

National park officers and local residents together cleaned up the beach last Sunday afternoon.

Local environmental group Sustainable Mai Khao also joined national park officers for a cleanup Monday morning. Further cleanups were held at Nai Yang Beach on Tuesday and Wednesday (June 23-24).

Non-working expats finally register for vaccination

FOREIGNERS IN PHUKET who have not been issued a work permit can now register to receive a state-provided COVID-19 vaccination, local authorities have announced.

The announcement came through one sentence in a post on the official Facebook page of the "Official COVID-19 Information Center Phuket", operated by the Phuket office of the 7pm on June 16.

Of note, the post was in permit foreigners". English language.

The post read, "Currently Foreign workers who hold valid work permits are eligible for vaccinations. Registration must be completed by their registered companies."

Then the post noted, "Foreigners who are registered to reside in Phuket without work permits are now eligible to apply via the website www.phuket.win".

No other details were provided.

Phuket officials so far have yet to make any other announcements that registration is now open for non-working expats, in stark contrast to the repeated announcements for any other groups of people in Phuket being allowed to register to be vaccinated.

As is now usual with local announcements regarding vaccinations, some confusions ensued with no people being able to register for days after the announcement.


Later, some foreigners confirmed that they had been

outrage over haul of reef sharks

haul of blacktip reef sharks in baskets at the Phuket Fishing Port has caused a backlash online over the fishing of the sharks, which are considered a critical factor in keeping reefs healthy and balancing vital marine ecosystems.

Outrage spiked after photos of the sharks spread quickly online, and gained momentum after they were shared by well-known Thai marine conservationist Prof Thon Thamrongnawasawat.

Watcharin Rattanachoo, Chief of the Phuket Fisheries Office, called for understanding among the public, and explained that the fishing of blacktip reef sharks in areas not protected by law, although not liked by many people, is not illegal.

"At this stage, the blacktip reef shark has not been classified as a protected animal," he said.

"I understand the photos may hurt people who love animals, but the fishing and selling of these sharks is not illegal in Thailand," Mr Watcharin added.

He also explained that blacktip reef sharks are often eries offices in the past to



caught as by-catch.

"When smaller fishing vessels [under 10 tonnes gross] aim to catch grouper and other local fish, some blacktip sharks tend to be caught sometimes when they come to feed and gather around the shoreline rocks," Mr Watcharin said.

"Depending on the time [of the year] the sharks move into the fishermen's fishing area. This is usual during the rainy season from around January to early June," he added.

"Therefore, from the news above, it is not considered a violation of the law if fishing in the area is not prohibited and the correct equipment is used," Mr Watcharin said.

Mr Watcharin pointed out efforts by the Phuket Fishprevent fishing in protected areas and the illegal fishing of specific species, especially whale sharks.

"But in the news such as the blacktip reef shark, the law does not make it an offense. We must also be fair to fishermen," he said.

Marine life expert Dr Thon Thamrongnawasawat has campaigned for years for greater protection of blacktip reef sharks after a haul of the fish were found on sale at a fish market on Koh Lanta.

"Blacktip reef sharks and many other sharks are not protected animals [in Thailand]. I've tried to push for this many times. I hope we can progress, especially for hammerhead sharks and leopard sharks, whose numbers are rapidly falling," Dr Thon said.

"We must push for the protection of sharks, especially these two species [hammerhead and leopard sharks]," Dr Thon said.

"We need to learn more so that we know how many sharks are needed to preserve a marine ecosystem," Dr Thon

"Sharks are important to the ecosystem and the food chain. Sharks are also important for tourism," Dr Thon wrote.

VERGE OF PROTECTION

The Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment is planning to list blacktip reef sharks as a protected marine five men using a firearm to kill the sharks in Krabi came to light on June 14, reports the Bangkok Post.

Even though the sharks were not yet listed as a protected species, Natural Resources and Environment Minister Varawut Silpa-archa slammed the group's behaviour, calling it an act of gratuitous violence.

"I've already instructed Jatuporn Burutphat, permanent secretary for environment, to work with all relevant agencies to review our policies to better protect our marine resources. Agencies in the areas have also been instructed to beef up surveillance and better educate local residents," Mr Varawut said.

Sopon Thongdee, Director-General of the Department of Marine and Coastal Resources, said the department will be reviewing its list of protected animals and will register blacktip reef sharks as protected marine species.

"These sharks pose no threat to humans," he said.

He has instructed Marine and Coastal Resources Office 10 to file a complaint with Muang Krabi Police against the men featured in the video for using a boat without permission, which is punishable species, after a TikTok clip of by a B10,000 fine.

Laos national staying illegally in Pa Khlok among drug arrests

THALANG POLICE HAVE named a Laos national among three men arrested for drugs in Pa Khlok last week.

The arrests, led by Capt Suchart Ruecha, were conducted from June 14-18, said the police report.

The Laos national, named in the report only as "Mr Kit", was arrested on the Bang Rong-Bang Pae road in Moo 3, Pa Khlok, after he was found with nine pills of methamphetamine (ya bah) stamped with the letters "WY".

Mr Kit was charged with possession of a Category 1 drug, as well as entering and staying in the country illegally, the report noted.

The second arrest was that of Suriya Bangkaew, 29, who was arrested at his home in Moo 6, Pa Khlok, with 13 pills of *ya bah* also embossed with the letters "WY".

Suriya was taken to Thalang Police Station and charged with



possession of a Category 1 drug, the report confirmed.

The third arrest noted in the report was that of Anupong "Nat" Kertsup, 26, who was arrested at his house in Soi Bang Pae, Moo 3, Pa Khlok, after he was found with 404 pills of ya bah – of which 202 pills were also stamped with the letters "WY".

Anupong was taken to Thalang Police Station and charged with possession of a Category 1 drug with intent to sell, the report concluded. Eakkapop Thongtub

Indonesian fisherman rescued by Phuket fishing boat after nine days adrift

AN INDONESIAN FISHERMAN was rescued by a local fishing boat and taken to Vachira Phuket Hospital in Phuket Town on June 13 after he was adrift at sea in a small boat for nine days after his boat engine failed.

Vice Admiral Choengchai Chomchoengphaet, Commander of the Third Naval Area Command, explained that the crew of local fishing boat 'Boonlaap 2' informed the Navy at 6:27pm on June 13 that they had found an Indonesian man adrift on a small boat south of Racha Noi Island, more than 30 kilometres south of Phuket.

Then at about 7:30pm, the crew informed the Navy that they would bring the man to the fishing pier on Koh Siray, Rassada, and asked for medical staff to be present when they arrived.

The man, not named in the report by the Navy, was brought ashore at about 10:30pm

The man looked exhausted and was immediately taken to Vachira Phuket Hospital, where he also would be tested for COVID-19, V/Adm Choengchai said.



In a video posted by the Navy, the man otherwise looked in good health. He was able to walk unassisted and even passed a temperature check conducted at the port.

The man told officers he had been adrift for nine days, V/Adm Choeng-

The man's engine had failed, and the boat was pushed across the sea by the wind until it was found by the local fishing boat, he added.

It was not reported where the man had originally put to sea.

V/Adm Choengchai said that the Navy will contact the Indonesian Consulate in Songkhla and Phuket Immigration to help get the man home.

National police chief steps up

Pol Gen Suwat donates B100k to support shot noodle vendor

ational police chief Pol Gen Suwat Jangyodsuk has donated B100,000 to the wife of a noodle vendor shot by a drunken off-duty police officer on Bangla Rd and vowed to ensure justice in the case.

The noodle vendor, Aroon Thongplab, was shot in the stomach by Cpl Pornthep Channarong of the Phuket Provincial Police just before 6am on Feb 23 while he was walking along Bangla Rd after collecting a noodle bowl from a customer.

In less than 24 hours Pornthep was quickly stripped of his rank and discharged from the Royal Thai Police, and now faces charges of attempted murder, carring a firearm in a public area without necessary reason, and firing a weapon in a public area.

His trial is to start on June

Joining him were Phuket Provincial Police Chief Maj Gen Pornsak Nuannoo and Patong Police Chief Col Sujin Nilabodi.

Lt Gen Kitrat told Mr Aroon's wife, Kulthida Chananan, that he had come to give B100,000 to her family

on behalf of national police chief Pol Gen Suwat.

"Do not be worried about the case because the national police chief has ordered to work on this case decisively. Police will not help bad police," Lt Gen Kitrat said.

"Which finger is bad, we

are ready to cut," he said.

Before Gen Suwat's donation, the only support Mr Aroon and his stricken family had received from the Royal Thai Police were flowers and B20,000 cash handed over by Region 8 Police the day after the shooting and B10,000 from

A campaign launched last month founded by a Phuket expat to help Mr Aroon raised almost B400,000 in just one

Mr Aroon was left paralysed by the bullet, which entered through the stomach and became lodged in his spine. a coma, doctors at Vachira Phuket Hospital managed to safely remove the bullet, but were unable to help Mr Aroon recover the use of his legs.

After months in recovery, Mr Aroon was only recently discharged from Vachira Hospital to return to stay with his family at their rented house in Patong.

Ms Kulthida explained that she needs to replan everything for her family's future because her husband has been left unable to make any income for the family. The young couple, Mr Aroon is 25 years old and his wife is 26, have two children: a 4-year-old daughter and a 6-month-old son.

"Aroon still suffers pain in his lungs from surgery and is unable to move or feel the

the Phuket Provincial Police. lower part of his body, from his waist to his toes," Ms Kulthida said.

> "Luckily, the upper part of his body can move and feel. He can use his hands to hold a spoon and fork to eat normally," Ms Kulthida said.

"I have to thank every person for helping me in this hard After Mr Aroon woke from time. My husband is likely to be disabled for his whole life, but I still have a good hope. If he is healthy, in the future he may go through physical therapy, enabling him to walk again," she said.

> "Aroon can hear everything I say and reply to me by gestures. He can speak, but it tires him. Nodding is yes and shaking his hand is no," she said.

> "He needed to use an aspirator for three months in the hospital, but now he can breathe by himself," she added.

> "As for progress in the court case, the court has appointed to have a questioning on June 28. Pornthep's family has never talked with me or offered any help. His mother knows what she should do," she said.

New Phuket Provincial Hall touted to open in Sept

PHUKET OFFICIALS EXPECT THE years-in-coming new Phuket Provincial Hall under construction on the south side of Phuket Town to finally be finished and open for services on Sept 1.

The news came from Phuket Vice Governor Vikrom Jakthee at the century-old current Phuket Provincial Hall on Narisorn Rd, in the old government quarter on the north side of town, on June 17.

Vice Governor Vikrom said that the September opening followed talks with the contractor – named only as "the Wall and Tesco joint venture" (literal translation from be open on Sept 1," V/Gov Vikrom said. the Thai กิจการด้าร่วม วอล แอนด์ เทสโก) – to finish the works left incomplete by the previous contractor Chun Eaw Co Ltd.

The main building, called "Phase 1", that will house government offices is not finished yet, but the meeting hall at the compound is already completed and has already served as a 'Field Hospital' during the initial COVID outbreak last year, V/G Vikrom explained.

The "Wall and Tesco joint venture" was hired by government contract signed on Dec 14 last year.

"The contract explained that the budget is B196 million, and the duration of work is 555 days, from Dec 15 to June 22, 2022," he said, repeating his update from February.

"However, the government has expedited the contractor to finish the work within July or August, the new Provincial Hall will

"A total of 18 government offices will move into the new building, as well as Krung Thai Bank and Thailand Post. From checking in April, 384 officers in total will move and provide services at the [new] building," he added.

Left unsaid was that V/Gov Vikrom pointed out in February that the "Wall and Tesco joint venture" contract of B196mn was reduced from B198mn as reported by Phakaphong Tavipatana, Phuket Governor at the time, on Sept 6, 2019.

At that time, with Governor Phakaphong in Sept 2019 requesting an extra B38mn to complete works unfinished by the initial contractor Chun Eaw Co Ltd, the total cost of the project had blown out to B647mn.

The original contract for building the new Provincial Hall, signed on Sept 9, 2014, stood at B450mn. The Phuket News

Man electrocuted while repairing home jacuzzi

POLICE ARE INVESTIgating what had led to a man being electrocuted while repairing a home jacuzzi in Cherng Talay last Saturday (June 19).

Capt Yannaphat Malai of the Cherng Talay Police was called to the home, in Soi Pasak 8/2, Moo 4, Cherng Talay, after the man's body was found at about 6:50pm.

Police together with Kusoldharm rescue workers arrived to find the body of Surapol Samthong, 45, originally from Trang, beside the sunken tub in an area under the floor.

After rescue workers safely

recovered Mr Surapol's body, forensic doctors from Vachira Phuket Hospital were called to examine the body. They found marks on Mr Surapol's right hand indicating that he had suffered an electric shock. Mr Surapol's body was taken to

Kunpiya Ragon, 38, originally from Surat Thani, who rents the home, told police that she asked the housing project manager to call a technician to repair the jacuzzi at about 11am.

The technician, Mr Surapol, arrived at about midday and started working on the repairs,

At about 6pm, her husband walked in to see the technician and found him dead, so he shut off the power to the house and called police, Ms Kunpiya said.

Hopes high for Sandbox boost

Thais to help tourism restart, forecast for B15bn in three months

he Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) are expecting the Phuket Tourism Sandbox reopening planned for July 1 to attract more than 600,000 foreign and local tourists to Phuket and generate a cash flow of about B15 billion in the next three months.

Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew said the TAT predicted about 129,000 foreign tourist arrivals and 500,000 Thais will visit Phuket between July and September, said a report by state news agency NNT.

"From July 1, Phuket will waive quarantine requirements for foreign tourists who have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19 under the 'Phuket Tourism Sandbox' model. The main goal is to be able to revive the local economy and prevent the spread of the pandemic at the same time. The model is being touted as a model for the reopening of the tourism industry," said the report.

"Governor Narong added that all parties are speeding up preparations to ensure the reopening proceeds smoothly as planned, stressing that strict disease control measures must remain in place so that the province would not be put in a lockdown again," the report continued.

According to a report by the Phuket office of the Public Relations Department (PR Phuket), Governor Narong also

repeated the main criteria for foreign tourists to be allowed into Phuket, namely that they must be fully vaccinated, be tested repeatedly and must spend 14 nights on Phuket before being allowed to travel to destinations elsewhere in the country.

According to the PR Phuket report, joining Governor Narong for the announcement were Phuket Vice Governors Pichet Panapong and Piyapong Choowong.

The report marked nine criteria for accepting foreign tourists, all of which Governor Narong already announced last Friday (June 18), and have been reported previously, and have already been reported by the Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT), which now appears to be the designated agency for announcing the entry criteria for foreign tourists in English. (See TATNews. org for the latest version of Antigen Test no more than the full list.)

GAPS IN CHECKING DOMESTIC ARRIVALS

While officials were focussing on the entry requirements for foreign tourists after July 1, not explained was how a student had returned home to Phuket from Yala, where he attended a school that had shut down due to a COVID cluster outbreak.

With the TAT now expecting 500,000 domestic tourists to come to Phuket from July through September, the checks on domestic arrivals entering the province becomes increasingly important

Under a provincial order issued on June 1, revising the longstanding requirements for domestic arrivals, all domestic travellers with the exception of children under 5 years old entering through any port of entry on Phuket must be fully vaccinated with a COVID-19 vaccine approved by the Royal Thai Government or have documentation proving they have tested negative for the virus via a RT-PCR or Rapid seven days before departing the province where the domestic traveller started their journey to Phuket.

Those who had recovered from COVID-19 no more than 90 days before arriving are also allowed to enter Phuket.

If the above requirements cannot be met the travellers are required to self-quarantine for a period of 14 days. Where the Disease Control Officer has issued an order to quarantine in the accommodation (Home Quarantine for Phuket residents or Hotel Quarantine for Domestic visitors) the traveller is to be monitored by officers of the Sub-District Center (EOC, Sub-District, municipality, sub-district administrative organisation) throughout the period of quarantine, said the order.

According to the timeline of the student's movements released by Phuket health officials last Friday, he had returned from Yala on June 13, but then presented himself at Thalang Hospital the next day for a rapid antigen test for no apparent reason.

Bus services from Bangkok ramped up

BUSES TO PHUKET FROM Mor Chit in Bangkok have resumed in the hope of spurring more visitors to the island, with the state-operated bus transport company BorKor-Sor (the initials of its name in Thai) offering 10% discounts on fares.

Sanlak Panyawatthanalikit, President of the Transport Company Limited (BorKor-Sor), announced the resumed services last Saturday (June

"The transport sector supports people and tourists who want to travel to Phuket, and



are ready to give instructions to all operators regarding user convenience, including implementing public health standards and strict safety standards to build confidence for service users," Mr Sanlak said.

There will be one new bus service daily each way, Mr Sanlak explained.

One bus will depart the Bangkok Bus Terminal at Chatuchak, also called 'Mo Chit 2', at 4:30pm, while a bus will depart Phuket Bus Terminal 2, located in Rassada, north of Phuket Town, also at 4:30pm.

Fares will cost B637 roundtrip. However, the BorKorSor is offering 10% discounts on all BorKorSor-operated bus services, Mr Sanlak noted.

All people using bus transport services to travel to Phuket are to comply with COVID health measures, he added. The Phuket News

Phuket Town market reopens after COVID scare shutdown

THE TALAD KASET FRESH MARKET on Ong Sim Phai Rd in Phuket Town reopened on June 18 after staff of Phuket City Municipality and vendors conducted a big cleaning to boost local people's confidence.

The market had been closed for two weeks after medical staff found that some workers at the market were infected with COVID-19.

Just two days earlier (June 16), Dr Kusak Kukiattikoon, Chief of the Phuket Provincial Public Health Office (PPHO), explained that the four cases found infected on June 14 were all Myanmar national workers who worked at the Talad Kaset market.

That confirmation followed Dr Kusak on tions, he said. June 1 explaining that the 86-year-old Thai woman who was identified as the second death from COVID-19 since the 'Third Wave' outbreak hit the island on April 3 had close contact with her Myanmar caretaker, who was later also found infected.

"Medical staff went to conduct proactive screening at the area where the caretaker stayed and found five other Myanmar workers infected," Dr Kusak said.

"The workers worked at the Phuket Town fresh market on Ong Sim Phai Rd, so we swab tested vendors and workers at the market; 460 Thai people and 350 migrant workers were tested, and we found one Myanmar national worker who was infected," Dr Kusak said.

Present at the market for the "Big Cleaning Day", during which all areas of the market were sanitised, were Vice Governor Pichet Panapong and newly installed Phuket Town Mayor Saroj Angkanapilas.

Mr Saroj explained that the market has been in operation for 42 years.

The market will now operate as two sec-

"From 4am to midday there are 483 yendors in the market building, 57 vendors on Ong Sim Phai Rd, and 61 vendors near Robinson department store. From 3pm to 11pm, there are 57 street food vendors serving the public," Mr Saroj explained.

"As a result of the current COVID-19 outbreak, some vendors and workers in the market were found infected. Then the market had to be closed for two weeks, from June 3-16, to follow the disease control measures of the Phuket Communicable Disease Committee," he said.

"Therefore, Phuket City Municipality has conducted this cleaning and sanitising of the market, in order to boost the confidence of vendors and shoppers," he said.

"However, vendors and shoppers must strictly follow the disease-control measures to prevent the market from becoming [the centre of] a cluster again," he said. The Phuket News







A third COVID shot may be required, says DDC

The Public Health Ministry is speeding up a study looking into the need for a third COVID-19 vaccine shot for people who are fully vaccinated as certain coronavirus variants are more infectious than others.

Along with this study, a ministry committee is tasked with assessing whether it is safe for people to be jabbed using different vaccine brands after the initial first shot is given, said Dr Opas Karnkawinpong, director-general of the Department of Disease Control (DDC) last Monday (June 21).

Dr Opas, however, insisted it was still too soon to say whether a booster shot is actually needed and if the shot can come from a different manufacturer.

"Knowledge [about the virus and the vaccines is updated] constantly so we need to wait until we have sufficient information to support any new decisions to make," he said.

Dr Opas was responding to questions over the need for a booster shot for vaccine recipients in Thailand and whether it could come from a different brand.

He said the ministry's study is similar to one being conducted by a team led by Dr Yong Poovorawan, head of the Centre of Excellence in Clinical Virology at Chulalongkorn University.

The number of people in Thailand

infected with the Delta coronavirus variant, which first emerged in India, is increasing and likely to replace the Alpha variant, first identified in Britain, as the dominant strain causing infections, Dr Yong said.

Citing findings from a new study published by the British medical journal The Lancet on June 14, he said a considerably higher level of immune response to a COVID-19 vaccine is needed as an efficient defence against the Delta variant.

Both the Pfizer and AstraZeneca vaccines were cited in this study, he said, adding a study carried out in Scotland showed they were less effective in preventing infections caused by the Delta variant.

Fourteen days after a second shot, the Pfizer vaccine was found to be 79% effective in preventing Delta variant infections, while the AstraZeneca vaccine was 60% effective against the strain, Dr Yong said.

In a similar situation, those vaccines were found to be up to 92% and 73% effective against the Alpha variant, Dr Yong added.

As for other COVID-19 vaccines that induce lower rates of immune responses, he said, third shots may need to be used as boosters while the country waits for new vaccines to be developed to specifically deal with the Delta variant.

In response to growing public concern over lower immune responses induced by COVID-19 vaccines, Dr Opas said the ministry is also monitoring information taken from the ongoing mass vaccination drive.

Dr Yong added that everyone in the country will be vaccinated as promised.

Japan donates unwanted AstraZeneca vaccines

THAILAND'S HEALTH minister Anutin Charnvirakul confirmed last Monday (June 21) that Japan is to donate a supply of Astra-Zeneca COVID-19 vaccines to Thailand.

The donation will help contribute to the national vaccine supply following a series of delays which have resulted in a consistent shortfall with many hospitals having to cancel appointments due to lack of availability.

Anutin confirmed the delivery of the vaccine is expected to be sometime in July although no specific details were provided on dates or quantities.

The offer from Tokyo comes after it donated 1.24 million doses of the Astra-Zeneca vaccine on June 6 to Taiwan which was struggling to secure sufficient numbers and had accused China of interference.

Japan had secured enough AstraZeneca doses for over 60mn of its citizens but is not administering the formula despite approving it, as concerns linger about rare cases of blood clots.

Instead, it is prioritising administration of the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines and has secured enough of both to potentially jettison its AstraZeneca stock elsewhere.

So far, Thailand has fully vaccinated 2.1mn people out of its 66mn total population using a combination of AstraZeneca and the Chinese-manufactured Sinovac, some of which was donated by China.

The Chulabhorn Royal Academy confirmed on Monday that 1mn doses of the Sinopharm vaccine, also produced in China, arrived in Thailand on Sunday and should be able to be administered by hospitals as an alternative to the jabs provided by the government from today onwards.





Helping people get back on their feet

he International Veterans Association (IVA) Phuket has stepped up to hold an 'employment assistance fair' to help local people, and local businesses, find skilled staff as the island prepares to reopen to receiving vaccinated international tourists from July 1.

Verstappen wins French GP

Red Bull driver leaves it late to outwit Hamilton in Riviera thriller

ax Verstappen pulled off a masterful strategy to pass Lewis Hamilton for victory with two laps to go in a nail-biting French Grand Prix last Sunday (June 20).

Verstappen started on pole but lost the lead almost immediately when he ran wide on exit, allowing Hamilton to slip through and control the pace of the first stint.

Valtteri Bottas held third off the line and was on the attack, the Finn bouncing back strongly from his horror race in Azerbaijan two weeks ago. He sandwiched Verstappen behind the leader, and Mercedes opted for aggressive tactics by bringing in Bottas, not Hamilton, first at the pit stops to try to strategise him into second.

Verstappen stopped on the next lap, just maintaining position, but Mercedes waited a crucial extra lap before bringing Hamilton in for his

own new set of tyres.

It was an error, and by keeping his ageing tyres for an extra lap Hamilton found himself rejoining the race behind Verstappen, demoted to second.

The Mercedes cars were still faster, but try as they might to force their way through, Verstappen was too quick down the straights, allowing him to defend in the

key overtaking zones and maintain a delicate lead.

But the fighting was coming at the expense of severe tyre degradation, and there was concern that getting to the chequered flag without a second stop may not be feasible - Bottas said as much over team radio early in the race, though the team chose not to act.

initiative. With Verstappen warning he couldn't defend against the faster cars on old rubber to the end, the team brought him in for new tyres with 20 laps to go, dropping him to fourth behind the Mercedes cars and teammate Sergio Perez, who was running an alternative strategy.

FAMOUS WIN

Red Bull Racing seized the Perez's presence was crucial,

preventing Hamilton from following Verstappen lest he get caught behind the Mexican.

Now lapping up to two seconds a lap faster, Verstappen waved past Perez and muscled his way through Bottas to give himself a 10lap advantage.

He had 18 seconds to make up to Hamilton, and after being waved into third by Perez he made short work of Bottas on lap 39 and closed to three seconds of the lead with five laps remaining.

He didn't need them all, and on the penultimate lap he breezed into the lead down the long back straight to record a famous win.

"Luckily it paid off!" Verstappen said of his strategic gamble. "The whole race we were fighting each other. I think it will be like this for the rest of the season."

Hamilton came home second, partly relieved to have minimised his car's troubled build-up to the weekend Sebastian Vettel and Lance through practice but warning that his team had work to do to keep itself in title contention.

"Of course we didn't win and we were in the lead... but still it was a great race," he said. "We've got to find some pace, that's for sure."

Sergio Perez and Valtteri Bottas battled for third late in the race, but Perez had delayed his sole pit stop until almost halfway through the race, earning him tyres seven laps fresher that eased his way past the second Red Bull Racing machine.

"A great race, great strategy from the team," Perez said. "I'm happy we won the race today – good points for the team."

McLaren teammates Lando Norris and Daniel Ricciardo battled in reverse order in the first part of the race, but a better strategy with a late pit stop got Norris ahead at the end, leaving Ricciardo to defend against Pierre Gasly and Fernando Alonso in the closing laps.

Aston Martin teammates Stroll drove superb recovery drivers from 12th and 19th through strategy to score the final points of the race.

Kiwi selected as first transgender Olympian

NEW ZEALAND WEIGHTlifter Laurel Hubbard was confirmed as the first openly transgender athlete to compete at the Olympic Games last Monday (June 21) when Kiwi officials named her in the squad for Tokyo next month.

New Zealand Olympic Committee chief Kereyn Smith said Hubbard, 43 – who was born male but transitioned to female in her 30s – had met all the qualification criteria for transgender athletes.

"We acknowledge that gender identity in sport is a highly sensitive and complex issue requiring a balance between human rights and fairness on the field of play," Smith said in a statement.

Hubbard, who also competed as a male, became eligible to lift as a woman after showing testosterone levels below the threshold required by the International Olympic Committee.

She will contest the womens +87kg category in Tokyo, an event in which she is currently ranked 16th in the world.

Current IOC rules state a trans

woman can compete provided her testosterone levels are below 10 nanomoles per litre, a criteria Hubbard meets

But critics say she has numerous physical advantages from growing up male that make her presence in the competition unfair for female-born athletes.

Hubbard, an intensely private person who avoids the media, did not address the gender issue in remarks released by the NZOC.

But she thanks the community for supporting her return from injury.

"I am grateful and humbled by the kindness and support that has been given to me by so many New Zealanders... your support, your encouragement, and your aroha (love) carried me through the darkness," she said. AFP

Tokyo 2020 shows off Olympic Village

OLYMPICS

TOKYO 2020 ORGANISERS threw open the doors of the Olympic Village to the media last Sunday (June 20), showcasing virus upgrades including a fever clinic just over a month before the Games begin.

Organisers are in the home stretch of preparations before the July 23 opening ceremony, and are trying to build confidence that the megaevent will be safe for athletes and the Japanese public.

As they unveiled the dedicated virus clinic, there was a warning that drinking in groups would be prohibited and confirmation a mixed zone for guests had been scrapped.

Warning posters that caution residents to take anti-virus measures including room ventilation have been placed throughout the mini-city, which can sleep 18,000 athletes and team members during the Olympics and 8,000 during the Paralympics.

The fever clinic, separate from the main medical facility, will be used to test and isolate people suspected of virus infection or considered close contacts of those who test positive.

Other measures include reduced seating for diners, plexiglass shields between gym equipment, and a kit of hand sanitisers and soap to be handed to village residents.

Built on reclaimed land looking out over Tokyo Bay, the village has

been empty except for workers since the event was postponed last March. Opening in just over a fortnight, the village will be particularly important for athletes this Games because they are barred from going anywhere else except training and competition venues.

Under strict virus rules, athletes will be tested daily and required to wear masks except during competition, eating and sleeping.

Competitors can only enter the village shortly before their event and must leave within 48 hours of being eliminated or their competition ending.

And conditions won't exactly be luxurious, with single rooms of nine square metres and doubles of 12 square metres.

Beds are made from recyclable cardboard, but are tough enough to

stand up to beefy weightlifters and towering basketball players, organ-

Olympic officials expect most of those staying in the village will have been vaccinated, but the rules apply regardless of inoculation status, and athletes could be kicked out of the Games if they fail to comply.

Although overseas fans are banned, organisers confirmed on Monday that up to 10,000 spectators will be permitted to enter each venue, provided the number does not exceed 50% of its capacity.

Organisers are battling public opposition to the Games, with national polls regularly showing most Japanese would prefer the event be delayed or postponed. However, recent surveys have showed sentiment may be shifting more positively as the Games approach. AFP

"We will be a test for whichever team we come up against in the last 16," said the Italy manager, Roberto Mancini. Italy play Austria tomorrow.

The Netherlands have looked equally adept thus far with a tight defence marshalled by Matthijs de Ligt and former Manchester United player Daley Blind. Right wing-back Denzel Dumfries has been a revelation, scoring twice and having a hand in several other goals.

Belgium have performed well without really attracting many headlines, maybe due to the fact they are currently the number one-ranked team in the world and therefore much is expected from them.

Romelu Lukaku is in fine scoring form and key men Kevin de Bruyne and Eden Hazard have both successfully returned from injury to play major parts in the last two group games, offering an ominous warning to the rest of the competition.

At time of press, England, France, Portugal, Germany and Spain had yet to complete their respective group games. However, none have demonstrated any kind of sign that they are ready to push on and emerge as serious contenders for the title. Ben Tirebuck

on Rahm knew after contracting COVID-19, I missing his parents meeting his son and losing a near-certain PGA victory two weeks ago that he was due for something good to happen.

It turned out to be winning his first major title, which happened last Sunday (June 20) at the US Open at Torrey Pines, one of his favorite places in the world.

"This one is very incredible, very hard to believe that this story can end up so good," Rahm said after his victory. "It almost feels like it's a movie that's about to end and I'm going to wake up soon.

"With the setback I had a couple of weeks ago, to end up like this, it's incredible," he added.

Rahm had seized a sixstroke lead after 54 holes at the Memorial on June 6 when he was told seconds after finishing his round that he had tested positive. He spent the next week in quarantine until two negative tests allowed him to return to US Open preparations.

On Sunday at the same



course where he proposed to his wife Kelley Cahill and where he won his first US PGA title in 2017, Rahm sank birdie putts on holes 17 and 18 to defeat South African Louis Oosthuizen by one stroke.

Rahm also became the

new world number one ranked player after his win, the first Spaniard to win a US Open and the fourth to capture a major title after Sergio Garcia, Jose Maria Olazabal and the late Seve Ballesteros.

"I'm a big believer in kar-

ma and after what happened a couple weeks ago, I stayed really positive knowing good things were coming," Rahm

"It felt like such a fairy tale story that I knew it was going to have a happy ending."

FIRST FATHER'S DAY In a strange way, getting COVID-19 helped Rahm pull off his long-sought breakthrough major triumph.

"I believed from the biggest setbacks we can get some of the biggest breakthroughs,

and that's why I stay so positive," Rahm said.

The Spanaird has been trying to better control his temper on the course, but after a club-crunching incident at last month's PGA Championship, has felt calmer and in greater emotional control.

"I feel like coming in here without having practiced much relaxed me a little bit. In case I play bad, I have an excuse. Hey, I had COVID," Rahm quipped.

"I feel like it relaxed me a little bit and ever since the Sunday at the PGA, I felt a bit of a shift on the golf course mentally. I still had that grit, but almost like each miss bothered me less."

Rahm, who said his biggest COVID-19 disappointment was not being there when his parents saw their grandson for the first time, celebrated his first Father's Day as a dad hoping to set an example for two-month-old son Kepa.

"I really set out myself to be an example for my son that he would be proud of," Rahm said.

"You have no idea what this means," he told his infant son as he hugged his wife in celebration.
