he Phuket Tourism & Sports Office has said that the province will likely see up to 5 million foreign tourists this year as a result of Thailand's relaxation of entry restrictions, accounting for 50% of pre-COVID arrivals.

According to the head of Phuket's Tourism and Sports Office, Rachadaporn Oin, the island province has seen between 2,000 and 3,000 arrivals per day since the Test & Go program

was canceled on May 1.

The number is anticipated to increase to 10,000 per day during the fourth quarter's peak tourism season, Ms Rchadaporn said.

From May 1 to May 17, Phuket received a total of 45,806 visitors via 413 international flights. The Phuket Tourism & Sports Office now estimates that at least 200,000 international tourists will have visited Phuket by the end of May, she noted.

According to the Phuket Airport Immigration Daily Report, 15,224 of the international arrivals from May 1-21 were from India.

Ms Rachadaporn stated that Phuket received 5,207 international flights and welcomed 544,653 visitors between July 1, 2021, when the Phuket Sandbox program for people entering Thailand began, and May 17, 2022.

To help boost arrivals numbers Tourism & Sports Minister Phiphat Ratchakitprakarn and the TAT have been tasked with organising a number of roadshows in the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia to invite tour operators and citizens of the Gulf nations to visit Thailand this year, Ms Rachadaporn added.

THE BIG EASE

The monthly estimate for June bookings surpassed 1mn on May 12, the first time in two years the country has reached that milestone, said TAT Governor Yuthasak Supasorn.


He attributed the boost to the end of compulsory RT-PCR testing on May 1.

Household debt hits the age

inister of Justice Somsak Thepsutin was in Phuket last week to preside over the Household Debt Reconciliation Fair held at the Boat Lagoon Marina in Koh Kaew.

In total, 2,810 people at the event registered to mediate debts totalling more than B200 million, noted a report by the Phuket office of the Public Relations Department (PR Phuket).

Key officials at the event, held on May 19, included Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew and Phuket Vice Governor Pichet Panapong. Also finally seen in public were Phuket House of Representatives members Sutha Prateep Na Thalang and Natthee Thinsaku, both of the ruling Palang Pracharath Party.

House Representative Sayan Thammarat from Nakhon Si Thammarat Province was



also present

Mr Somsak said that the government and the Prime Minister had designated 2022 as the "Year of Solving Household Debt".

"This includes solving problems such as debts with the Student Loan Fund, with car and motorcycle hire purchase, credit card and personal loan debt, and Improving the institutions to organise events judicial process to facilitate debt resolution, and so on," Mr Somsak said.

"In this regard, the Department for Protection of Rights and Liberties and the Legal **Execution Department under** the Ministry of Justice have been integrated with the Student Loan Fund and financial

to facilitate the mediation process of household debts throughout the country," Mr Somsak added.

Ruangsak Suwaree, Director-General of the Rights and Liberties Protection Department, noted that the Student Loan Fund and seven "other" financial institutions were taking part in the debt-mediation fairs.

He named the seven "financial institutions" as the Government Savings Bank, Krung Thai Bank (which is a state operated bank), Siam Commercial Bank and Kasikornbank, as well as professional debt management companies under the JMT Network, namely JMT Network Services, J Asset Management Co Ltd and JMT Network Company C Service Public Company Limited.

In total, 2,810 people in debt had registered to take part in the event in Phuket, involving debts amounting to B223,728,892.53, he added.

Compensation totaling B186,702 was handed to two victims in criminal cases was also presented at the event, Mr Ruangsak noted.

Phuket was now home to five People's Dispute Mediation Centers established under the Mediation Act, B.E. 2562 (2019), he added.

The centres are located at Samkong, Chalong, Pa Khlok, Patong and at Wat Wichit Sangkaram in Phuket Town, Mr Ruangsak said.

"The aim of the centres Is to help reduce the number of cases that will go to court," he explained.

At the event, there were also booths promoting the services and functions of various government agencies under the Ministry of Justice, the Office of Insurance Commission and the Bank of Thailand "to provide knowledge and provide financial advice to the participants", Mr Ruangsak said.

The people who attended the event "were very satisfied with the mediation of household debts in organizing this expo", said the report by PR Phuket.

However, despite all the fanfare, it was not reported how many people at the event had successfully re-negotiated the terms of their debt.

Hope floats for tourism revival as restrictions finally eased

...this year, which is the high season, but the latest result prompted the agency to project a consistent monthly level of around 1mn from June until the rest of the year.

With that adjustment, the overall number of international tourists this year will be at least 8mn, the TAT said.

As of May 19, Thailand has welcomed 1.1 million tourists, of which 86,420 came from India, followed by the UK (85,926), Germany (71,173), the US (61,788) and Russia (59,591). The number of Thailand Pass registrations stood at 2.75mn.

Before the pandemic, the top five source markets were China, Laos, Malaysia, Russia and South Korea.

Mr Yuthasak said even though China maintains its zero-COVID policy and Russia remains at war with Ukraine, three other major markets lifted border restrictions to enable more convenient travel.

"India and the Middle East are high-potential target markets, particularly Saudi Arabia, which could see at least 200,000 tourists flooding in this year," he said.

Much of the boost in numbers comes after a slew of measures to ease restrictions for tourists



to come to Thailand, which key tourism figures have been calling for, for months.

Last Friday (May 20), without admitting the Thailand Pass has been a major inhibitor deterring tourists from wanting to have to deal with another bureaucratic hurdle in order to go on holiday, the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration (CSSA) in Bangkok announced measures to expedite issuing approvals of Certificates of Entry through the system from June 1, with registrants to have their applications processed automatically, and issued within hours, not days.

The Phuket News has already independently confirmed that recent arrivals coming to the island for major sporting events had their Thailand Pass approvals confirmed within about two hours.

The CCSA last Friday also waived quarantine for any high-risk contacts, and downgraded COVID restrictions throughout much of the country. and approved pubs, bars and other entertainment venues to open until midnight, all effective from June 1.

From June 1, the Thailand Pass requirement will remain for tourists, but will be waived for Thai nationals. Unvaccinated foreign tourists who test negative on rapid antigen tests upon arrival will be allowed to skip quarantine.

The big push to ease the COVID restrictions for travellers follows Willie Walsh, Director General of the International Air Transport Association (IATA) in his keynote address at the Changi Aviation Summit in Singapore earlier this month urging Asia-Pacific states to loosen restrictions on air travel.

"Demand for flights in March rose to 17% of pre-COVID levels after having hovered below 10% for most of the last two years. This is far below the global trend where markets have recovered to 60% of pre-crisis levels.

"The lag is because of government restrictions. The sooner they are lifted, the sooner we will see a recovery in the region's travel and tourism sector, and all the economic benefits that will bring," said Mr Walsh.

BARS CALL FOR MORE

Vendors of alcoholic beverages and hotel and retail operators are calling for the further relaxation of nightlife entertainment rules and an extension of opening hours until 2-4am as pubs, bars and karaoke lounges struggle to survive.

Thanakorn Kuptajit, executive adviser at the Thai Alcohol Beverage Business Association, told the Bangkok Post that the group was grateful for the government's decision to allow entertainment venues to sell alcohol until midnight, although some regulations remain.

But he urged the government to relax other rules imposed on service providers and customers if local infections continue to wane, in order to facilitate nightlife spending by tourists.

"The extension of service hours to midnight is unlikely to be enough to bring nightlife business back to normal," Mr Thanakorn said.

According to Mr Thanakorn, apart from the nightlife sector, the government should accelerate the revitalisation of the domestic economy by increasing consumer spending for daytime businesses.


The government should revise laws deemed obstacles to doing business during the daytime, including those that prohibit alcohol sales between 2pm and 5pm, because this affects hotel and retail operators, he said.

Somphol Tripopnart, chief shopping centre business officer at mall operator MBK Plc, said the extension of service hours until midnight should help raise spending from both Thai and foreign tourists, particularly independent travellers.

"It would be more useful if the government dismisses some emergency decrees regarding COVID-19. Foreign tourists have already gone through various health-check measures before entering Thailand," said Mr Somphol.

"The best would be the reclassification of COVID-19 as an endemic disease before the target date of July 1."

Violent teens face charges Held on remand at Phuket Prison over attack on disabled girl

The two young teens who attacked a 17-year-old disbaled girl at Khao Rang last month have been taken into remand and will face charges of physical assault causing harm, Phuket City Police have confirmed.

The confirmation came through a statement issued by Phuket City Police on May 19 explained as a "clarification of the case".

Maj Gen Sermphan Sirikong, Commander of the Phuket Provincial Police, had heard of the incident and ordered Phuket City Police Superintendent Col Sarawut Chuprasit to investigate in accordance with his authority and report the facts, the statement said.

According to the police statement the incident occurred around 8am on Apr 21.

The disabled girl, her mother and the girl's 16-yearold friend met with the investigating officer at Phuket City Police Station to report the incident at 6pm on Apr 22.

The statement identified the two culprits in the attack as Mr Boy (not his real name) aged 15 years, and Mr Song (not his real name), a transgender woman presumed to be 16 years old.

The pair arrived at the disabled girl's house and asked her to join them at the top of Khao Rang (Rang Hill), in Phuket Town.

The disabled girl's friend drove the motorbike while the police statement explained.

After they had parked at the viewpoint at the top of Khao Rang, "Mr Song" grabbed the disabled girl by the hair and pulled her off the motorbike to the ground and began to attack and repeatedly hit her, the statement said, describing the incident exactly as shown in the video later posted online of the attack.

The investigating officer

disabled girl rode pillion, the recorded receiving the complaint at 18.53 hrs on Apr 22, the statement noted.

> The disbaled girl was sent to Vachira Phuket Hospital to have doctors examine and formally record her injuries to use as evidence in the case, the statement added.

> The investigating officer tracked down the two culprits, Mr Song and his accomplice Mr Boy, in order to press charges against them.

the disabled girl agreed to waive charges as they offered their forgiveness from the apology given by the two teens, the statement continued.

At that time it was understood to be nothing more than a quarrel among children, the statement said.

However, a video clip of the attack was posted online at around 10pm on May 17, showing precisely how the attack was carried out.

The statement said it was not known who recorded the clip to be published on social

On seeing the video, the disabled girl's mother informed officers at 5pm on May 18 that she wished to proceed with charges over the attack.

Boy and Song at 1pm on May 19 were called back into Phuket City Police Station, where they were informed of the charges against them.

The two were taken to Phuket Provincial Prison to be held on remand, the statement added.

However, the mother and involvement and support in other cases, they will be prosecuted according to the law for all cases as well," the statement said.

> The pair also stand accused of another attack in which Song threatened to stab a girl with scissors if she intervened in his attack on her friend. Song cut the friend's long hair, before fleeing the scene, a viewpoint in the Klong Mudong area in Wichit.

> Song spoke directly with reporters on May 19, identifying himself as "Nickname My K".

> He said that the incident involving cutting the girl's hair was over the girl borrowing B1,500 and not paying it back before she left to another

> "It was time to return the money and [she did] not return it," he said.

> "My K" offered no explanation as to the threat of stabbing the friend with scissors and no excuse at all for attacking the 17-year-old girl disabled by polio.

New Phuket prison already 85% full

THE NEW PHUKET Provincial Prison, built at a cost of B789 million on 108 rai in Srisoonthorn, central Phuket, is already 85% full, a news release by local public relations officials on Monday (May 23) has confirmed.

The new facility was completed in 2020, with all inmates moved from the former Phuket Prison in Phuket Town to their new accommodation on Dec 29 that year.

The new prison is allowed to hold prisoners ordered to serve sentences of up to 30 years, explained a release by the Phuket office of the Public Relations Department on Monday (May 23).

The prison has a total old. sleeping area of 5,535.92 square metres, providing a standard 1.6sqm per inmate.

The prison is designed to accommodate a total of 3,459 inmates, comprising 3,086 male inmates and 373 female inmates. However, the new prison today already has 2,943 inmates, comprising 2,552 male inmates and 391 female inmates.



missioned in 2014 to resolve the notorious overcrowding at the former Phuket Prison in Phuket Town, which covers only six rai and today stands more than 100 years

According to the report on Monday, the old prison was originally designed to accommodate 950 inmates, but was holding as many as 2,500 inmates.

However, reports over the years have confirmed that the old prison for long periods held more than 3,000 inmates at any one time.

Aqua Lumina underway in Phuket

The Aqua Lumina festival officially opened to the public at Nai Harn Beach last Friday night (May 20) with Nithi Siprae, Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) Deputy Governor for Digital Research and Development, officiating the grand opening.

"The TAT in its promotional tourism marketing is accelerating the creation of activities in parallel with public relations campaigns to build the confidence among tourists, especially domestic tourists, to return as soon as possible," Mr Nithi said.

"This will be the main target group that will be able to help rehabilitate and help entrepreneurs in the country's tourism industry, especially in the three provinces with the main potential on the Andaman coast - namely Krabi, Phang Nga and Phuket – so they are able to resume operations after the epidemic situation returns to normal after more than three years," he added.

"The TAT is confident that this Aqua Lumina festival will be able to stimulate travel to the southern region. Krabi, Phang Nga and Phuket are still the main destinations for both Thai and foreign tourists to come back to again, especially during the off-season (Green Season) from May to June," Mr Nithi said.



Phuket Vice Governor Pichet Panapong pointed out the importance of Phuket's tourism industry recovering.

"Phuket is an important province in Thailand with strong tourism. It is popular among both Thais and foreigners, and became a tourist city that generated the country's second largest income as a province, greatly supporting the economy of Thailand,"

"But in the past two years the COVID-19 epidemic has severely affected the tourism industry of Phuket, and the income generated," he added.

"It has been a huge loss of income," V/Gov Pichet said.

"But now the COVID-19 situation around the world is expected to ease and there are a number of quality tourists from around the world who plan to

travel abroad. This is an opportunity for Thailand as a tourist destination to show its potential in tourism by organising activities covering sports, arts and the culture of Thailand. This is coupled with a combination of innovative, internationally recognized events and activities to achieve the goal of revitalising tourism and the Thai economy," he added.

The festival began in Krabi on May 14, where it continued until Wednesday (May 25).

The festival in Phuket is being held at Nai Harn Beach, where 12,000sqm of space has been allocated, from 5pm to 10pm each night through to May 31.

The Phuket edition, held under the theme "Guardian Land of the Andaman", features illuminated sculptures and multimedia shows, as well as

"projection mapping" that will 3D images with light.

Local bands, artists and other performers will be providing the entertainment, and of course there will be plenty of local food available, provided by local chefs, street vendors and restaurants on the island.

Prizes will also be up for grabs for people attending the event, which will be open to the public from 5pm to 10pm each night.

Free shuttle buses to and from the Aqua Lumina activities area at Nai Harn beach have been organised to reduce traffic congestion at Nai Harn and to make it easier for people in the centre of the island to join the festivities.

The free shuttle buses will depart the three main pickup points at Phuket Municipality Market 1 (Downtown) on Ranong Rd in Phuket Town, Central Floresta shopping mall on the bypass road and at Karon Beach (Nong Harn Park) at 4pm, 5pm, 6pm, 7pm, 8pm and 9pm.

Returning free shuttle buses will depart the Aqua Lumina area at Nai Harn at 6pm, 7pm, 8pm, 9pm, 10pm and 10:30pm.

The festival will conclude with the Phang Nga edition from May 27 - June 2, at Memories Beach in Khao Lak, under the concept of "The Land of Dancing Waves".

Entry to any of the festivals is free.

Working group aiming to tackle Phuket's drug problem

A MEETING WAS HELD BY LAW enforcement officials in Phuket on May 19 to review data and the surveillance of illegal drugs coming onto the island.

The working group was headed by Chatchai Paikhao, Director of the News Data Analysis and Surveillance Division at the Region 8 DEA and took place around 9:30am on the fourth floor of Phuket Provincial Hall. Relevant officials from additional government agencies also attended.

The meeting detailed how illegal drug distribution and usage is still widespread across the island with methamphetamine the most common drug, followed by 'ice' (crystal meth), marijuana and cocaine.

When analysing the behaviour of sellers and buyers of drugs the discussion added that they consistently communicate online by email or via social media accounts such as Facebook and LINE.

Analysing past data on delivery patterns of drugs, the working group explained how parcels of narcotics continue to be sent to the island and are usually hidden in coastal areas such as mangrove forests or fish cages. They stated this makes it difficult to detect but is an area that needs to be focused on



more whereby more thorough searches are undertaken.

The group explained that as the country relaxes conditions relating to travel brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic it is inevitable that an increase in tourists and workers to the island will be witnessed which will lead to an increase in demand for illegal substances.

As such it was proposed that increased cooperation with government officials and related networks is required to monitor drug delivery routes both by land and by water, and that airlines need to conduct more thorough surveillance to combat the smuggling of drugs onto the island.

The meeting also touched upon guidelines for rehabilitation of drug addicts and the importance of addicts receiving prompt and effective treatment. The Phuket News

Snowstorm ends Chulu West climb

he attempt by Phuket residents Yanisa Kingmala-Beven and her husband Rohun to climb Chulu West in Nepal to help raise funds for Phuket's Soi Dog Foundation has been aborted by a snowstorm that prevented any climbers from reaching the peak.

Yanisa, 51, and Rohun, 64, are both healthy and well. "No injuries apart from the mental disappointment of not reaching the summit," Rohun told *The Phuket News*.

"We had gained an altitude of 5,400m on the summit attempt. We were climbing on ropes up towards camp 1 for an acclimatisation and training day. We returned back down to high camp at 5,200m for an overnight stay in the tent," Rohun explained.

"We woke at 5am and it had snowed over 20cm during the night with very poor visibility. The conditions made it impossible to move up higher so the climb was aborted.

"There were two other international teams perched on the rocks at high camp and all teams decided to descend back to base camp. No teams



made it to the summit all season. It took over an hour of cautious trekking down a very steep face to reach base camp," he said.

The wind was not a factor so there was no damage to the tents or other equipment, Rohun confirmed. The overnight temperature went down to around -5°C.

"The total trek was 19 days with 12 days actually on the trail. Our first shower was on day 13 and a welcome relief indeed. We spent three days in Pokhara for rest and recupera-

tion," Rohun said.

"The overall effects of the physical challenge and time sent at altitude certainly have had a debilitating impact on the body. The first beer went down rather well," he said.

The couple began their descent on day 10, from high camp, through base camp and back down to Ladar, the highest village on the trek at 4,900m.

The three-day descent took the couple through the famous Thorong La Pass in Damorar Himal. Thorong La Pass is known as the highest mountain pass in the world, and at 5,416m is ironically the same altitude the couple managed when climbing Chulu West.

Yanisa and Rohun started their climb up to the pass at 3am and took around four hours up very steep terrain.

"After rest stops in Pokhahra and Calchhi, where we have some Nepalese friends, we finally arrived back in Kathmandu on day 19," Rohun confirmed.

Yanisa and Rohun will now continue their journey to the UK to recover and enjoy a break. "We are going to England for the summer and begin the planning for the next expedition," Rohun said.

"We plan to be back in Phuket in late August to see our four rescue dogs who will have missed us," he added.

The couple have reached their goal in raising US\$3,000 for Phuket's Soi Dog Foundation, which will directly go towards helping the stray dogs and cats of Southeast Asia.

"We have raised, to date, over \$3,000 and the fundraiser will stay open until May 28," Rohun confirmed

"Thank you to everyone who donated to Soi Dog Foundation and supported the climb," he said, stressing the importance of the support that he and Yanisa have received.

People can still donate to the cause on the Facebook fundraising page or through the Soi Dog website (for people in Thailand).

"We are already planning our next expedition to come back for another try at a 6,000m in Nepal. Watch this space," Rohun teased.

EGAT touts boosted power supply to Phuket

KITTI PETCHSANTAD, DEPUTY GOVernor of Transmission Systems of the Electricity Generating Authority of Thailand (EGAT), has announced that EGAT has completed the project to improve the transmission system to southern regions of Thailand, effectively, doubling the electrical-supply capacity to Phuket.

"Phase 1 of the project has been completed, and we have started to distribute electricity through 500kV (kV) high-voltage transmission lines from Bang Saphan 2 High Voltage Power Station in Prachuap Khiri Khan Province through Surat Thani 2 Power Station, and ending at Phuket High Voltage Power Station 3, a total distance of 504 kilometres," Mr Kitii said in an announcement on Friday (May 20).

"It is the first 500kV power transmission system in the southern region," he said.

The overall project is to increase the power transmission capacity from the Central region of Thailand to the South by more than double, from 700 megawatts (MW) to 1600 MW, Mr Kitti explained.

"The first phase of transmission system construction began at the end of 2016 and was able to deliver electricity at the end of April," Mr Kitti confirmed.

"The project is to help support the expected increase in electricity demand after the COVID-19 situation subsides in the southern region and tourist provinces, especially Phuket Province, which has the highest demand for electricity in the south and is an important tourism industry economic zone of the country," he said.

"This project is the first step in helping to increase the power supply capacity of Phuket up to 1,170MW. It also helps reduce the risk

of power outages in a wide area in the southern region in the case there is a disruption of the transmission line linking the Central region to the Southern region as well," he added.

In all of Southern Thailand, Phuket power consumption is second only to Songkhla province, followed by Surat Thani, Nakhon Sri Thammarat and Trang, Mr Kitti noted earlier this year.

Phuket draws 400mW from the national grid, mostly supplied from the Khanom Power Plant in Nakhon Sri Thammarat, but supplemented by power plants at the Ratchaprapha Dam in Surat Thani and the Chana Power Plant in Songkhla.

The project also aims to avoid another massive power disruption like the one in 2013 that saw all of Southern Thailand without power supply simply because one major power supply feed passing through Chumphon broke down while the other main supply feed was offline for maintenance.

Meanwhile, Phuket continues to suffer small, localised power outages across the island as Provincial Electricity Authority (PEA) workers continually upgrade and repair power lines serving business areas and communities.

Too Good to Be True: The Ponzi Scan

ne of the most common financial frauds is the Ponzi scheme, which promises "guaranteed" high returns, higher than those offered by other financial institutions and businesses. To pay the original investors, payments from new investors are usually used to pay profits to the scheme's operators and pay a return to prior investors. This cycle continues until the scheme can longer find new investors or if too many investors try to cash out their investment. In almost all cases, investors lose everything.

Thailand is no stranger to Ponzi schemes, especially in real estate and currency/stock investments. It got so bad in the 1980s that the government stepped in with a strangesounding law called "The Emergency Decree on Borrowings which Constitutes Fraud to the Public B.E. 2527", also known as the Anti-Ponzi Law.

The Anti-Ponzi law primarily covers offences that are like a classic Ponzi scheme, where someone publicly presents a scheme with a guarantee of attractive returns higher than traditional investments. It

How Ponzi Schemes Work Proceeds received from subsequent investors are used to give earlier investors promised returns. Perpetrators often lure investors with rates that are higher than those provided by licensed financial institutions or legitimate businesses

sets a maximum interest rate anyone can offer to investors as that offered by financial institutions which are currently capped at 3% per year. Any type of investment offering a return over this could fall foul of the Anti-Ponzi law.

Generally, to be found guilty, a defendant must know or should have known that the money received from recent investors was to be diverted

to compensate earlier investors and knowingly failed to conduct a legitimate business activity capable of generating the promised returns.

You only need to show that the scheme, directly or indirectly, lured 10 or more people into the offering. Whether the scheme operator made a profit from the scheme is irrelevant, and the court will find a case if it finds that funds were transferred between different investors to pay a promised return.

The Anti-Ponzi law has a big stick – for each investor who fell victim to the scheme, the perpetrator will be charged with one count of fraud. If convicted, the court can sentence the scheme operator from five to ten years imprisonment, a statutory fine of anywhere between B500,000 and B1 mil-

lion, as well as an additional fine of B10,000 for each day the perpetrator committed the offences and for each investor defrauded. Those sentences can be imposed concurrently for each count. An unlucky defendant could even potentially be sentenced to over 200 years' imprisonment.

The Anti-Ponzi laws also deem it an offence if the defendant refuses to disclose information relating to their business.

STRICT LIABILITY **OFFENCES**

In addition, the Anti-Ponzi law also sets out two types of strict liability offences. This means the defendant is liable for committing an action, regardless of what their actual intent was when committing the act. Regardless of intentions, they can be found guilty.

The first offence deals with foreign exchange fraud committed against the public, and the second offence is where the perpetrator operates a business, receives at least B5mn in investments from more than 10 people, and then pledges a return on this investment over the set maximum interest rate.

The defence to these strict liability provisions is that the scheme or business could have generated a return at the advertised rate, but there was an unforeseeable decline in economic activity or other causes that made the business unable to yield the promised return. COVID seems the "usual" excuse these days.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU **HAVE LOST IT ALL?**

Ponzi schemes take on many forms, from property investments with so-called "guaranteed returns" to business investments with supposed foolproof profits. These Ponzi schemes and other fraudulent activities could also fall under other regulations that have different proof and legal considerations. Nevertheless, this little-understood law packs a big punch and is a stern warning to scammers. It may not get your money, but it's a good start in the process.

As always, "if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is" remains true.



Phuket readies for first cruise liners

PHUKET MARITIME authorities are preparing for Phuket to receive one of the largest cruise liners in Asia as the country reopens to cruise tourism.

Capt Thammawat Malaisukarin, of the Royal Thai Navy Third Area Command, based in Phuket, on Monday (May 23) called for relevant agencies to coordinate their efforts to create a standard operating procedure for cruise operators to comply with in order to streamline organising their tours to the region.

cruise liners made port in Phuket about 200 times a year, bringing 400,000 tourists to the island, generating an B800 million per year in income," Capt Thammawat said.

"With no cruise liners making port in Phuket during the COVID-19 pandemic, that income was zero," he noted.

"In the near future it is expected that large cruise ships will begin to travel on the Andaman Sea, and they are expected to return in numbers equal to before to bring tourists to Thailand

the COVID-19 situation," he added.

"Tensions in Europe "Before COVID-19 large and Russia will make more tourists turn to Asia-Pacific, and it will appeal to tourists from other regions, such as Australia and New Zealand," Capt Thammawat said.

> The goal is for the government agencies to have all cruise tour operators on board with all requirements by July 1, to facilitate "the return to full service for 100% of cruise operators", he added.

The cruise line 'Spectrum of the Seas', currently in Singapore, is scheduled

in June, Capt Thammawat

The ship is described as the first ship of the Quantum Ultra class currently operated by Royal Caribbean International. Launched in 2019, the ship has a length overall of 347 metres. The vessel has 16 decks and can carry a maximum of 4,905 passengers.

The standard operating procedure is to be compiled as a step-by-step process in the form of a book containing all the required documents. The book will be presented to the Phuket Governor for approval, Capt Thammawat said.

Prayut shrugs off poll result, defends record

BANGKOK

rime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha on Monday (May 23) dismissed the results of the Bangkok governor and councillor polls, saying they don't reflect his current political popularity.

Speaking to reporters in the wake of defeat, Prayut said the sweeping victory of independent candidate Chadchart Sittipunt and wins for opposition parties in the council elections were not an accurate representation of voters' faith in his administration.

Mr Chadchart cruised past other candidates, including former Bangkok governor Aswin Kwanmuang and his deputy, Sakoltee Phattiyakul, on Sunday. The Pheu Thai and Move Forward parties won a combined 34 of 50 Bangkok councillor seats, while the Palang Pracharath Party (PPRP) managed to get only two.

The PPRP, which ushered Prayut into the top job, won more Bangkok seats in the

general election in 2019, gaining 12 out of 30 slots.

"It is only an election in one province," he said. "The results showed the desire of voters in Bangkok. That is not related to the government."

Prayut's comments came shortly after he defended his administration's performance over the past eight years, saying he has managed to lead the country through one crisis after another and that he is trying his best to move the nation forward.

Speaking at the "Better Thailand: Open Dialogue"

seminar on May 19, he recounted the day when he decided to seize power almost eight years ago, saying the country was deeply divided,

He said the country was bogged down in conflict, leaving the people in distress while Thailand was becoming the "sick man of Asia".

litical lines for over a decade.

"Some people may have forgotten this. When the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO) was formed, we were aware that [restoring order] would come at a price...

[but] we were criticised for being undemocratic," Prayut said.

"At the time, the NCPO tried to ensure that people could still enjoy their freedom of expression in line with the law, with all sides given as much leniency as possible.

"The NCPO had a great deal of special power, but I only used it when it was necessary to solve problems. When it came to the justice system, independent agencies were still able to carry out their work without any interference.

"The primary aim [of the coup] was to maintain order and steer the country forward and restore international confidence in Thailand," Prayut

He also emphasised the need for the 20-year national strategy - which covers security, competitiveness enhancements, human resource development, creation of opportunities and social equality, environmentally-friendly growth and public-sector readjustments - in order to turn Thailand into a developed country by 2037.



Ukrainians find safe haven on Koh Samui

SURAT THANI

SEVENTY UKRAINIANS who fled from their war-torn homeland have found peace and safety since arriving on Koh Samui.

Supachai Pongchabapnapa, owner of The Kala Samui Hotel in tambon Maret, said he opened all of the hotel's 38 rooms to the Ukrainians, who had gradually arrived on the island since the Russian invasion of Ukraine on

Mr Supachai said since the hotel had been closed by the COVID-19 situation, he felt it would be better to open it to the Ukrainians for humanitarian reasons, rather than leaving it closed. He is charging each guest B200 per night.

For about two months, the 70 Ukrainians, mainly women and children, have occupied the rooms, from where some of them work online. There are no other guests at the hotel.

Mr Supachai said he did not think about making a profit from them. The money they paid was barely enough to pay the hotel staff wages.

"It's better than nothing. When the (Russia-Ukraine) conflict ends, they can return to their country and resume normal life. I only hope they will have a good impression of Thailand, the Thai people and the people of Koh Samui. Maybe in the future they can return as full-scale tourists.

"About 90% of the Ukrainians staying here had never been to Thailand before. This is their first time. They hope they will be able to go home in about five months. But I think it could be as long as seven months," he said.

DDC ramps up anti-monkeypox measures

BANGKOK

THE DEPARTMENT OF DISEASE Control (DDC) has introduced strict rules for screening visitors travelling from countries where monkeypox has been found.

Travellers will have to fill in health declaration cards to be presented on arrival. The cards will also have a QR code that needs to be scanned so that incoming tourists can be provided information about symptoms and report them after arriving. They can then be advised on where to get medical help.

The DDC had set up an emergency operations centre (EOC) to monitor the spread of the virus and demanded immigration officials watch out for visitors from Central and West Africa, the United Kingdom, Spain and Portugal, where the virus has been detected.

Any visitors who appear to have potential symptoms will be hospitalised for tests.

Dr Chakkarat Pitayawonganon, director of the department's epidemiology division, said on Monday (May 23) that the EOC will help screen incoming tourists who might be at risk of having contracted the virus after travelling to countries with outbreaks.

It can be transmitted from one person to another by close contact with lesions, bodily fluids, respiratory droplets and contaminated materials.

Thailand had to establish the EOC to closely monitor the outbreak overseas even though there have been no recorded

cases in the kingdom so far.

The EOC aims to keep an eye on cases abroad and update the latest data on how to prevent the virus, he said.

Dr Chakkarat said that during the incubation period, infected people might not show visible symptoms such as rashes and raised spots that turn into blisters and then scabs.

They might pass screening at immigration and enter the country. However, officials will look closely at passengers from countries that have outbreaks.

He also added that passengers must fill in health declaration cards before arriving for inspection. The cards will ask questions about having possible symptoms.

The first symptoms include having a high temperature, headache, muscle aches, backache, swollen glands, chills and exhaustion.

Dr Chakkarat explained that monkeypox causes symptoms that are similar to those of smallpox although they are often less severe. Bangkok Post



'f you are reading this article, I assume that there are two things about you. First, you feel annoyed that you need reading glasses all the time to see up-close. Second, your age is over 50.

Fonseka fails to fry Pancake in classic heavyweight dual

Morgan (148) and Manish combined to steady the ship, reaching 145/4 before the latter was stumped by Abu Bakar and the former caught by Khan in the 23rd over, leaving the Penguins needing 14 to win from the final Deuskar over.

Following a six, a run out and some comical fielding from the first 5 balls of

the over, just one run was required to win from the final ball. Looking to win in style, Robertson (9*) failed to connect. Manchester City win title on a dramatic final day

anchester City won the Premier League for the fourth time in five seasons after a pulsating title race reached a dramatic conclusion as the champions staged an incredible comeback from two goals down to beat Aston Villa 3-2 on Sunday (May 22).

Pep Guardiola's side were teetering on the brink of blowing the title after falling 2-0 behind midway through the second half at the Etihad Stadium.

But Ilkay Gundogan sparked an astonishing City revival as the German midfielder reduced the deficit before Rodri grabbed the equaliser.

Gundogan turned in City's third goal in the space of five minutes in the 81st minute, triggering wild celebrations and rendering second-placed Liverpool's 3-1 victory against Wolves irrelevant.

City finished with 93 points, one point ahead of Liverpool, as they ended their rivals hopes of winning an unprecedented quadruple.

Guardiola's men can rightly be called a dynasty after joining Manchester United as the only clubs in the Premier League era to have won four titles in five seasons, with Alex Ferguson's teams doing it on three separate occasions.

The eighth league title in City's history is Guardiola's ninth major trophy



since arriving at the club in 2016.

"These guys are legends. When you win in this country four times in five years, it is because these guys are so special. They will be remembered forever," Guardiola said of his players.

He was also quick to salure Liverpool, saying: "I've never see a team like Liverpool in my life. I know how tough it is but they help us be a better team season by season. Big congratulations to them."

On a breathtaking final day, Burnley were relegated as Leeds beat the drop, while Tottenham qualified for the Champions League at the expense of their north London rivals Arsenal.

Tottenham's 5-0 rout of Norwich secured fourth place at Carrow Road and Champions League football next season.

Goals from Harry Kane and a brace each from Dejan Kulusevski and Son

Heung-min secured the win, with the latter sharing this season's Golden Boot award with Liverpool's Mohamed Salah as joint highest scorers on 23 goals.

Tottenham's victory left north London rivals Arsenal in fifth place despite their 5-1 win against Everton.

Burnley's six-season stay in the top tier ended with a 2-1 home defeat against Newcastle, with Leeds staying up after a 2-1 win at Brentford.

Leeds started the day below Burnley on goal difference, but the Clarets were beaten by Callum Wilson's brace, while Jesse Marsch's team escaped thanks to Raphinha's penalty and Jack Harrison's last-gasp strike.

Manchester United lost 1-0 at Crystal Palace, but qualified for the Europa League thanks to West Ham's 3-1 defeat at Brighton.

Verstappen takes title lead after Leclerc Ferrari failure

FORMULA ONE

MAX VERSTAPPEN WON the Spanish Grand Prix last Sunday (May 22) to lead the 2022 F1 championship for the first time after Charles Leclerc retired with an engine failure.

Leclerc had been leading the race by more than 13 seconds when he suffered a sudden loss of power on lap 27 and was forced to retire, his first failure to finish since last August.

Verstappen experienced troubles too when a gust of wind blew him into the gravel, dropping him behind George Russell and teammate Sergio Perez. His DRS flap also broke, opening only intermittently when he tried to use it to overtake.

After some thrilling racing on lap 24 between Verstappen and Russell, the Dutchman decided to switch his strategy from two stops to three so he could exploit his car's superior pace in clear air.

The tactics worked, and after two flat-out stints on the soft and medium tyres, he made his final pit stop and rejoined the race fractionally ahead of Russell, who had to manage his tyres more to get them to the end with one fewer stop.

Perez was left in the lead but was asked to make way, clearing Verstappen's path to victory and a six-point championship lead.

Red Bull's double score also put the team ahead in the constructors standings with a 26-point margin over Ferrari.

Russell finished third, the first Mercedes podium of the season, after the team made significant progress on the problems that have plagued the car so far this season.

In badminton, the Thai women's team won the gold medal after beating Indonesia 3-0 while Pornpawee Chochuwong and Kunlavut Vitidsarn claimed gold in the women's and men's singles finals respectively.

The men's and women's teams won gold in table tennis and tennis Luksika Kumkhum won the women's tennis singles title.

Snooker star Wattana Pu-ob-orm won his first SEA Games gold medal at the age of 53, defeating Lim Kok Leong of Malaysia 4-2 in the best-of-seven frames final on Sunday (May 22) to secure the title that hand long eluded him.

The women's volleyball team continued their dominance, winning gold for the 15th time at the biennial Games while the Thai boxing team took home four gold, two silver and two bronze medals.

Teenage sensation Puripol Boonson won the men's 100 metres, 200m and 4x100m titles to complete a hat-trick of sprint crowns on his Games debut. Supanich Poolkerd took bronze in the women's 100m.

Kobsit Sittichai won gold with a leap of 2.21 metres in the men's high jump and Jariya Wichaidit won silver in the women's iavelin with a throw of 55.65 metres.

Weightlifter Thanyathon Sukcharoen won gold medal in the women's 45kg with a new SEA Games record of 174kg total while Surodchana Khambao also won with a new Games record of 195kg in the

women's 49kg class. Compatriots Witsanu Chantri (men's 67kg), Rungsuriya Panya (men's 89kg) and Duangaksorn Chaidee (women's 71kg) all also won gold medals.

In golf, the Thai women's team won gold after beating Malaysia in the final but the men's team had to settle for silver after losing to Malaysia 2-1 in the title match.

The Thai men's and women's teams had to settle for silver in football when they both lost to hosts Vietnam in their respective final games. However, their futsal counterparts made up for it somewhat by winning gold in the men's and women's finals, with Vietnam once again the opponents.

In cycling, Thailand's Peerapol Chawchiangkwang took the men's road individual time trial gold medal and Jutatip Maneephan won the women's road race criterium event.

Thailand continued their sepak takraw supremacy, sweeping the men's and women's regu titles, as Issarapong Duangkaew and partner Thanawan Yananun won two golds in men's dancesport and the Kingdom won an eSports gold in Garena RoV competition. Ben Tirebuck

Phuket athletes help Thailand to second place at SEA Games

SEVERAL ATHLETES FROM Phuket contributed to Thailand's impressive medal haul at the recent 31st South East Asian (SEA) Games in Vietnam as the Kingdon finished in second place overall with 331 medals (92 gold, 103 silver and 136 bronze).

Thanakrit Yodrak comfortably beat Cambodia's Youdeth Sam 34-5 to win the gold medal in the men's taekwondo 58kg class in his SEA Games debut on May 19.

"I am very happy to win gold in my first SEA Games. I trained very hard – three times a day, two or three hours each session," said the 19-year-old fighter Phuketian.

"This is just the beginning as I have a bigger target – I want to compete in the Olympics."

Monsicha Sakulrattanatara improved on her past Games performances when she won silver in the women's individual karate kata on May 19. The 24-year-old had won two bronze medals at both

the 2017 Games in Malaysia and the 2019 Games in the Philippines.

Monischa, who took up the sport at the age of seven and trained under the tutorship of former Thai karate champion Yanisa 'Pui' Torrattanawattana, immediately took to social media to thank her family, coaches, physicists, trainers, nutritionists and fans for their direct and indirect support.

Meanwhile, Phuket's Komkrit 'Kris' Keadnin won bronze in the men's Jujitsu under 56kg Nogi category and fellow Phuektian Thanakorn 'Nong Condo' Sangkaew, was part of the men's petanque team who won gold.

Elsewhere, highlights included

reigning Olympic champion Panipak Wongpattanakit winning her third straight SEA Games gold medal in the women's taekwondo 49kg class on May 19. The 29-0 win over Julius Dhaysi Oo of Myanmar extended world no.1 Panipak's winning streak to 36 matches, dating back to Nov 2018.

Also in taekwondo, Athi Sararat won gold in the men's 87kg class and Sasikarn Tongchan silver in the women's 62kg. In total, the Thai taekwondo team won five gold, three silver and one bronze medal.
