Phuket tourism leaders this week were quick to praise the provincial government in lifting the 14-day mandatory quarantine that was required of all arrivals from four specific areas of Bangkok, saying the move would help open the door domestic tourism to resume, which would provide a much-needed boost by Phuke Panaphon "After ID-19 info all busine of trouble of Comm Phungdet."

to tourism businesses on the island.
The lifting of the mandatory quar-

antine requirement was made official with a new provincial order issued last Sunday (Jan 24), and confirmed by Phuket Vice Governor Phichet Panaphong on Monday.

"After facing the threat of COV-ID-19 infections in December, now all businesses in Phuket are in a lot of trouble," said Phuket Chamber of Commerce President Thanusak Phungdet.

"We need Thai tourists to come to Phuket. We want to see the same number of Thai tourists today that came to Phuket in October, when about 14,000 visitors arrived by air or road," he said.

However, Mr Thanusak is looking for more restrictions to be eased to help boost local tourism even more.

"So the mandatory 14-day quarantine has been eased. I am happy with Phuket Governor Narong's relaxation of the quarantine decision, but I want more restrictions relaxed so Phuket is open for people to travel in and out," he said.

Mr Thanusak urged free travel

between provinces that are COVID-free. "Other provinces that are facing problems can have their people self-quarantine. If any province has a problem [with COVID infections], they can react like Phuket has. Phuket province is an example for others," Mr Thanusak said.

Mr Thanussak also voiced his support for Phuket business owners to hold on and survive. "I want to give some encouragement to the business owners in Phuket. Right now they have to face up to the problem...



"We have to keep fighting because the vaccine is coming soon. We still need to have hope. Let's fight together and wait for the vaccine," he added.

HEAVY LIFTING

Phuket Vice Governor Phichet on Monday publicly confirmed the order issued last Sunday, which no longer requires arrivals from Bangkok to observe a 14-day mandatory quarantine after arriving on the island as a standard requirement.

The confirmation came at a meeting of the Phuket Communicable Disease Committee held at Phuket Provincial Hall, joined by Phuket Public Health Office Chief Thanit Sermkaew and other relevant officers.

V/Gov Phichet explained that under the new order all arrivals to Phuket are to be classified into one of four groups, reduced from five groups in the order issued on Jan 11. Unchanged is that all arrivals must install the Mor Chana app, register their travel details on gophuget.com and follow the disease control measures strictly before being allowed into the province.

Group 1 comprises people arriving from seven 'red zone' provinces: Samut Sakhon, Rayong, Chonburi, Trat, Chanthaburi, Nakhon Prathom and Nonthaburi. In addition to the three standard requirements above, Group 1 arrivals also must be tested and followed up by staff at an Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) and quarantine at home or at an Alternative State Quarantine (ASQ) hotel for 14 days.

Group 2 arrivals comprise people arriving from 21 provinces/areas on the secondary list of 'red zone' risk areas: Bangkok, Samut Prakan, Tak, Saraburi, Pathum Thani, Ayutthaya, Suphan Buri, Lop Buri, Sing Buri, Kanchanaburi, Nakhon Nayok, Ranong, Chumphon, Prachuap Khiri Khan, Sa Kaew, Ratchaburi, Petchburi, Samut Songkhram, Angthong, Chachoengsao and Prachin Buri.

Group 2 arrivals must comply with the three standard requirements above, but are no longer automatically required to observe any quarantine after arriving in Phuket.

However, V/Gov Phichet made it clear that Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) officers, who are tasked with checking and following up on new arrivals on the island, reserve the right to determine whether or not any new arrivals must observe a quarantine for 14 days.

Meanwhile, Group 3 arrivals comprise people arriving from 11 'orange zone' provinces: Sukhothai, Kamphaeng Phet, Nakhon Sawan, Uthai Thani, Chainat, Phetchabun, Chaiyaphum, Buriram, Nakhon Ratchasima, Surat Thani or Phang Nga.

Group 3 arrivals, in addition to the standard Mor

Chana, gophuget.com and COVID compliance requirements, according to the order must only "self-monitor at their home or accommodation for 14 days". Despite the wording of the order, the current practice appears that Group 3 arrivals may move freely about the island, but must closely self-monitor their condition.

Group 4 arrivals are people arriving from anywhere else in the country -38 provinces designated as 'yellow zone' risk areas. Such arrivals are required to comply only with the three standard requirements: install Mor Chana, register on gophuget.com and comply with COVID regulations.

However, not adding any clarity to the current entry requirements for Phuket, V/Gov Phichet on Monday noted that people making "round-trips" to Phuket – a term believed to mean day-trippers – must only 1) Install the Mor Chana app; 2) Register their travel details on gophuget.com; and 3) Follow the disease control measures strictly. No other details or requirements about day-trippers were explained.

V/Gov Phichet also repeated that there is currently a general ban on moving migrant workers from neighbouring countries into and out of Phuket, unless the employer had a necessary reason or was doing so in order to follow an order issued by the Ministry of Labour or other officials.

Employers who need to move their workers must first submit the required documents to a relevant official and be approved, V/Gov Phichet said.

PLEA

The move to lift the quarantine for all Bangkok arrivals came just 24 hours after a highpowered delegation of Phuket tourism leaders delivered a plea to the provincial government to do more to ease the current suffering of businesses, and residents, on the island.

The delegation also called for the Phuket provincial government to prepare to start receiving international tourists from October, ahead of what would normally be Phuket's tourism high season, under a plan that would require all international arrivals to be vaccinated for COVID-19 before being allowed to enter

By that time, 70% of the population on Phuket is to be vaccinated for the disease.

The delegation delivered their plea at a special meeting held at Phuket Provincial Hall last Friday (Jan 22), chaired by Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew.

Among the key tourism industry representatives present to deliver the plea were Bhummikitti Ruktaengam, President of Phuket Tourist Association; Sarayuth Mallum, President of the Phuket Industry Council; Kongsak Khoopongsakorn, President of the Thailand Hotels Association Southern chapter; Thanusak Pungdej, President of the Phuket Chamber of Commerce; and Anchalee Thepabutra, a former Phuket MP.

Governor Narong noted that the meeting was a collaboration to discuss ways to stimulate tourism in Phuket "that is seriously stagnating from the second wave of COVID-19".

"Phuket has been hit hard by the second epidemic. Thai tourists do not come because they do not want to quarantine and follow the difficult steps to enter the province, not to mention there are no foreign tourists at this time," he said.

"We expect foreigners to start coming to Phuket at the end of the year, so for now we have to rely on Thai people together," he admitted.

Delivering the tourismrevival plan was PTA President Mr Bhummikitti, who said the COVID-19 vaccine was "the last ticket and the last hope" for Phuket tourism, "because Phuket tourism has no way out at this time".

"The vaccine is now available in many countries that can be the focus of Phuket's next travel model for foreign tourists. The private sector sees the possibility of opening to receive foreign tourists in October and through the high season at the end of the year," he said.

However, Mr Bhummikitti also called for strong measures to protect Phuket people from infection from foriegn visitors: "Tourists entering Phuket must be people who have been vaccinated with the COVID vaccine, and Phuket people must be vaccinated, at least 70% of the population," he said.

"This is to ensure the confidence of both Phuket residents and the tourists who visit, that they will not be infected by people in Phuket and the Phuket people will be confident that incoming tourists will not bring the disease to spread again," Mr Bhummikitti added.

Relief efforts continue islandwide to support people in need

PHUKET GOVERNOR ments and need to send their children Narong Woonciew stepped up last week to announce more help being provided to help those suffering financial difficulties from the COVID-19 crisis.

"We have looked closely at each village on the island, and we now have a list of the people who are in trouble in every village," Governor Narong said.

"We are coordinating with many organisations in handling this issue to help those affected, people who have lost their jobs and their income due to the COVID-19 situation," he explained.

"Some people still have debt and house payments, car pay-

to school, so local government agencies and other organisations have to solve these problems together," he added.

Among the examples Governor Narong cited on Jan 21 was the Rotary Club of Andaman, which has taken 25 people into their care and provided training so they can regain employment.

Many other government and other organisations were also coordinating efforts to provide more help and support for families in distress, he added.

In addition, many government offices and charity organisations have stepped up to provide rice and other daily necessities, in Chalong

and elsewhere on the island.

Chinese company One World One Home, through the Phuket Red Cross, held a food-donation cam- Iaddam, the 43-year-old father of paign at the offices of the Cherng Talay Tambon Administration Organisation (OrBorTor) on Jan 20 where hundreds of bags of rice were handed out to people in need.

Through its campaign, the company is to hand out 5,888 bags of rice, totalling 29,440 kilograms of the staple in Phuket.

Governor Narong along with Chalong Mayor Samran Jindapon met at the Phuket office of the Red Cross Society on Jan 21 with Taweep Mee Phan, the 57-year-old man from Chalong who recently tried to sell his left eye on Facebook to raise much needed funds to support his family.

Also present was Khanong

Pornpiphat 'Mint' Iaddam, the 20-year-old first-year student at Phuket Rajabhat University who collapsed and died after being told to keep running during a training session with the cheerleading squad in August last year.

The focus of the discussion was how more help could be provided to the families of the two men.

Mr Taweep has already been given a job so he can earn an income to help support his family, Mayor Samran said.

"For the case of the student, we will go to talk to the school director in order to discuss how to help them effectively," Mayor Samran added.

Rivals slain at bus station

wo men were shot dead by a colleague at Phuket Bus Terminal 2, the main interprovincial bus station north of Phuket Town, last Saturday night (Jan 23) in what appears to have been a drunken attack against a rival motorbike taxi group operating at the busy terminal.

Police were called to the bus station at about 10:15pm. Phuket City Police Chief Col Teerawat Liamsuwan arrived at the scene shortly afterwards with forensic police and medical staff from Vachira Phuket Hospital to investigate.

They found Prakob Chuthong, 54, lying dead in the motorbike area in a 24-hour parking garage at the bus station. He had been shot once in the head and once in the chest.

About 80 metres away in front of the bus terminal was Yod Sae Lee, 50, lying on the ground in front of a taxi service stand, badly wounded. Rescue workers administered CPR before rushing him to Vachira Phuket Hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

Wian Iadchuthong, 60, the gunman, who appeared drunk, was still at the scene, waiting to surrender to the police.

The initial investigation by police revealed that the three were close colleagues, but often engaged in heated verbal abuse over motorcycle taxi and taxi services at the bus terminal.

According to witnesses, before the shooting, Wian was

quietly drinking alone. After getting drunk, he walked into the parking garage where Mr Prakob was sitting and fired two shots from a 9mm gun at point-blank range, killing him instantly.

Wian then ran towards Mr Yod, who was sitting in front of the taxi service stand. Mr Yod fled to one side of the terminal building, only to be intercepted by Wian who

quietly drinking alone. After had run around the other side getting drunk, he walked into of the building to catch him.

Wian fired five shots, hitting Mr Yod once in the head, twice in the torso and twice in the legs.

On Monday (Jan 25), when police had Wian return to the bus station to re-enact his movements in carrying out the shootings, witnesses told police that Wian was known to be a "nice guy".

However, it also became clear that he had also just formed a new motorbike taxi group at the bus terminal.

While retracing his movements at the bus station, Mr Wian was silent to the press, but police – led by Phuket City Police Chief Col Teerawat and Capt Wipawan – confirmed that Mr Wian had confessed to the fatal shooting of the two men.

During the re-enactment, Jiraporn Longrak, who owns a small restaurant at the bus terminal, told the police that Mr Wian was a "nice man" and "he liked to help people around him".

"Mr Wian has been here about seven years, since the bus terminal opened. He worked at the old bus terminal in Phuket Town before he moved to work here. He used to say that he liked this kind of job," Ms Jiraporn said.

"Mr Prakob and Mr Yod were also colleagues of Mr Wian and they came to work here together," she added.

"Mr Wian used to be the president of the taxi cooperative at the bus terminal, but his term expired so he had his colleague, Mr Yod, take over," Ms Jiraporn explained.

Ms Jiraporn said that she had no idea what had prompted Wian to shoot dead Mr Prakob and Mr Yod, who like Wian was also originally from Trang. "He never told me about any problems with his colleagues," she said.

But something had changed recently in Mr Wian's life, Ms Jiraporn noted.

"Mr Wian lives in a house near the old bus terminal in Phuket Town, but for the last two days [before Saturday night], Mr Wian was sleeping here at the new bus station, and formed a new a taxi group of which he was the president," Ms Jiraporn explained.

Ms Jiraporn told the police that before the crime, Mr Wian and his colleagues were sitting in the 24-hour taxi service office and drinking together.

She later heard two gunshots and she ran out to see what had happened, and saw Mr Wian, who she thought looked drunk, sitting in front of the office waiting to surrender to the police.

Mr Wian on Monday was taken back to Phuket City Police Station, where officers said they were moving ahead with charging him for the double homicide.

Park officer sacked for spying on woman in toilet

A NATIONAL PARK OFFICER accused of spying on a woman in a public toilet at Phuket's Sirinath National Park has been dismissed from his role, Park Chief Pramote Kaewnam confirmed last Saturday (Jan 23).

The officer, 28-year-old Abdulrama Mahaderi, was accused by Miss Sopita and her boyfriend Panupong Rungrueng of climbing the wall separating the men's and women's sections of the restroom at Nai Yang beach on Jan 17 and peering down on Miss Sopita, mobile phone in hand.

Park Chief Pramote confirmed that an investigative committee had assessed the evidence and taken accounts from witnesses and that it was determined Abdulrama was guilty of "misbehaviour and improper actions".

Chief Pramote confirmed that Abdulrama's employment contract was subsequently terminated, effective Jan 20.

"It has caused disgrace to the Department of National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation and affected the image of the overall department," a post on Sirinath National Park's Facebook page read.

Abdulrama will also be facing police charges.

Capt Sura Lertthaisong of Sakhu Police confirmed to *The Phuket News* on Jan 20 that Abdulrama would be facing charges and that he was currently investigating whether a charge of "bullying in public"



under Section 397 of the Criminal Code would be appropriate.

The Phuket News has yet to confirm with Sakhu Police exactly which charge Abdulrama will face.

Abdulrama had previously posted on the official Sirinath National Park Facebook page: "The tourists told me that they did not want to press charges. They just told me that they did not want me to do anything like this again."

However, after Mr Panupong posted a photo of Abdulrama and detailed his alleged indiscretion on social media, several others came forward with similar accusations.

"One group of women said that they were also spied on by this man on the toilet wall two months ago, but they did not report it and did not press charges – and the truth faded away as if nothing ever happened," said Miss Sopita.

Phuket Town bar hit with triple charge

A BAR OWNER IN Phuket Town has been charged for operating his business without permission and for neglecting the current provincial orders brought in to control entertainment venues.

An inspection under the command of Chief Col Teerawat Liamsuwan was led by Lt Col Jakkrit Taewattana early on Jan 19.

Officers inspected a bar named H2O Phuket at around lam which they discovered was being run despite not having an official legal license.

They also discovered the bar was offering illegal baraku



(shisha) and electronic cigarettes and, despite not possessing a license, was remaining open past midnight, contravening the conditions stipulated by the provincial order issued by Phuket Governor Narong Woonciew on Jan 11.

The owner of the bar, Thipasut Prateep Na Thalang, was taken to Phuket City Police Station and charged for opening an entertainment venue without permission as well as selling or providing prohibited goods.

He was also charged for the late closing of the venue which violated the provincial order which states that all entertainment venues in Phuket are to close at midnight and restaurants are not to sell alcohol after midnight.

Mr Thipasut now faces up to B160,000 in fines or up to a three years' in jail for breaches of the Disease Control Act and the Emergency Decree.

ypass speed limit hits 50km,

huket Town Traffic Police have confirmed that the speed limit on the bypass road is just 50km/h, after years of enforcing an unofficial speed limit of 100km/h.

The move came without warning, and only became known after a slew of local residents posted online copies of speeding tickets issued showing the speed limit as 50km/h.

The posts included complaints that police have for years assured that speeding tickets would be issued only for those caught exceeding 100km/h along the busy road.

Phuket City Traffic Police Deputy Chief Lt Col Rungrit Rattanaphakdee explained to The Phuket News last Thursday (Jan 20) that under usual circumstances motorists are permitted to drive up to 80km/h along municipality roads in accordance with the Road Traffic Act B.E. 2522.

However, for Phuket's bypass road, the speed limit is just 50km/h, as signposted along the road, he said.

Lt Col Rungrit's understanding that the speed limit signs posted along the bypass



road are mandatory contradicts the explanations given in 2015 by former Phuket Highways Office Chief Samak Liedwonghat and Lt Col Teerawat Liamsakun, who was Phuket City Police Chief at the time.

However, Lt Col Rungrit has now made it clear that the actual legal speed limit is just 50km/h, as the signs indicate.

Although last Thursday Lt Col Rungrit maintained that motorists would not be issued speeding tickets by the speed cameras installed on the bypass road unless the vehicle was travelling faster than 100 km/h - twice the legalspeed limit – on Monday (Jan

25) he told *The Phuket News* that police will now issue speeding tickets for motorists driving faster than 80km/h on the bypass road.

All of the photos of the speeding tickets posted online showed that all of the tickets were issued for vehicles travelling faster than 90km/h.

"There are signs showing where the speed limit area begins and where the speed restriction area ends which were installed after an order of the Phuket accident reduction committee even before I came to take this position," Lt Col Rungrit told The Phuket News.

at length that the bypass road was built to reduce traffic congestion in the Phuket Town area during peak hours.

However, the long straight sections of the bypass road has resulted in many high-speed accidents, he added.

"The signs are there to remind drivers to drive carefully under the speed limit, as normally drivers drive very fast on the road, leading to accidents," he said.

Lt Col Rungrit on Monday also confirmed that motorists fined for speeding or any other moving violations are currently not losing any demerit points from their driver's licences as the whole demerit-points system has yet to be launched.

The system was to be launched in December 2019. Officers in Phuket had been trained and were ready to start using the system, but the whole project – hailed as a milestone for its potential to help greatly reduce the carnage on Thailand's roads each year – dragged to a halt within weeks.

The system is now expected to be brought online sometime in the middle of this year, Lt Col Rungrit said on Monday.

"The demerit point penal-Lt Col Rungrit explained ties for traffic violations have not vet started. The system does not work because we are waiting for the Department of Land Transport database to be connected to all police stations in Phuket, and nationwide," Lt Col Rungrit explained.

"The system is expected to be operational by the middle of this year," he added.

"Once the Department of Land Transport database connection with the police is finished, officers will be able to search a driver's history, see any previous traffic violations and the number of points left on their licence," Lt Col Rungrit explained.

Anyone fined for speeding on bypass road will not lose points for now, but will when the demerit-points system comes online, Lt Col Rungrit

"When the system comes online, any tickets issued automatically by speed cameras will result in points taken being automatically deducted from the licence of the registered owner of the vehicle,"

"If the owner of the vehicle wants to dispute that, and present evidence that they were not driving the vehicle at the time, they will have to present their claim to the court," he concluded.

Three injured as pickup hits power pole

THREE MEN WERE INJURED when the pickup truck they were travelling in struck a roadside power pole about 50 metres south of the Tha Reua Chinese Shrine on Thepkrasattri Rd, in Srisoonthorn, last Sunday night (Jan 24).

Capt Somnuk Kaewpetch of the Thalang Police was called to the scene at about 10pm.

Police together with Srisoonthorn Municipality and Kusoldharm rescue workers arrived to find a black Toyota Hilux Revo pickup truck, registered in Uttaradit, still wrapped around the power pole on the southbound side of the road.

The pickup driver Khanchit Khampha, 46, and his front-seat passenger Thawatchai Wiwak, 31, had injuries to their faces and heads. Fellow passenger Theeraphat Kaewpetch, who was sitting on the back seat, was unconscious and had a leg wound.

Rescue workers rushed all three to Thalang Hospital, while

the pickup was taken to Thalang Police Station.

From questioning witnesses at the scene, police were told that the road was slippery because of rain, which may have led to Khanchit losing control of the pickup and hitting the power pole.

However, police found two large bottles of beer already opened in the truck, Capt Somnuk confirmed

At the time of press, Capt Somnuk had yet to confirm any tests for drunk driving and has been unavailable to confirm the extent of injuries to Theeraphat. Eakkapop Thongtub

Officials face forest probe

Investigation into forest encroachment to be handed to DSI

The investigation into the encroachment of more than 100 rai of protected forest in Phuket's Nakkerd Hills will be handed to the Department of Special Investigation (DSI) to investigate further as a special case - and involves an investigation into local officials actively allowing the illegal clearing of the protected forest.

Suphachai Suksai, chief of the Encroachment Prevention and Suppression Region 4 office under the Royal Forest Department, confirmed the move after his officers last week surveyed the area, a road and plantations carved out of the protected area straddling the hills between Kathu and Wichit, had affected a total of 108 rai of protected forest.

Mr Supachai and his team of investigators filed a formal complaint with the Kathu Police last Thursday (Jan 21).

Joining Mr Supachai's team of investigators were Boonlarp Suksai, Director of the Forest Resources Man-



agement Region 12 Office in Krabi, along with Phuket forestry officials, Phuket police officers and officials from the Phuket Internal Security Operations Command (Isoc) committee.

Isoc, of which there is a provincial office in every province in the country, serves as the political arm of the Thai military.

The affected area, within the Nakkerd Hills Protected Forest Area, is deemed an im-

portant source of water flowing into Bang Wad reservoir, the main water supply reservoir on the island, Mr Supachai said.

"From questioning forest officers with the Phuket Land Office we have found that the area does not have the right document [issued to allow any such clearing]," Mr Supachai added.

"The Department of Forestry will notify the Department of Special Investigation to accept this as a special case and to conduct an investigation to identify the offender, as the heavy machinery used to adjust the area and create the road to the top of the hills must certainly involve government officials or 'influencers' [sic] behind the scenes," Mr Supachai explained.

"This will undergo an indepth investigation," he added.

"The case will be submitted within two days," he said.

Mr Supachai recognised that his team had initially

believed that the affected area measured 83 rai, but explained that a more extensive survey had confirmed that the affected area was 108 rai.

"As can be seen, this is a high area offering views. It is unlikely that the perpetrators did this for agriculture, it is intended to be for tourism, because the site offers a wide view of Phuket, including many bays," Mr Supachai noted.

"The value of the land if opened for tourism purposes would be a very high value," he said.

"The road has been cut through a very fertile forest area, this is a watershed forest above Bang Wad Dam, which is an important water source for the people of Phuket, so we must preserve it. There are serious concerns about water supply," Mr Supachai added.

Mr Supachai did confirm that such works may not be illegal if the correct land document is presented, namely a claim to the land upheld by officials since before the area was declared a protected forest reserve.

"Initially, it appears that this area does not have a title document or any form of land claim for it issued to anyone, but the owner may have a Skor Kor 1 [land use document]. We still don't know. We cannot check to confirm this if the landowner does not present him or herself, but from our preliminary investigation the exact rights are not clear," he explained.

Mr Boonlarp of the Forest Resource Management Region 12 Office noted that any cases of encroachment involving more than 100 rai can be submitted to the DSI for further investigation

"As for having influencers behind it, we are investigating in depth whether any agency was involved in the encroachment and we would like to tell the people of Phuket if any are found," he said.

"Such deforestation can be reported to the Royal Forest Department anywhere, the defense unit or the forest center. The authorities are ready to conduct inspections in all areas," Mr Boonlarp said.

Scamsters prey on vehicle owners unable to make loan payments

REGION 8 POLICE ARE warning people unable to make their car payments to not fall prey to scam artists who convince people to hand over their cars on the promise that the buyer will take over the outstanding payments to the credit company.

The warning follows five victims, including some from Phang Nga, gathering at the Region 8 Police headquarters at the northern end of Phuket on Jan 19 to file a formal complaint, which was received by Investigator Maj Gen Naphanwoot Liemsa-nguan.

In total the victims had handed over eight vehicles, altogether valued at about B4 million.

One victim, Hanafee Dolah told reporters that the economic impact of COVID-19 had left him unable to continue making payments on his Toyota Hilux Revo.

Fearing legal action and being blacklisted for not making payments, he decided to sell the pickup

A man calling himself from him. Rit Trakan contacted him through Facebook, and the two came to an agreement that Mr Rit would take ownership of the pickup on making a downpayment and taking over the payments to the credit company, which had only six monthly installments left to pay.

Mr Rit said that he would contact the credit company and have his name put on the purchase contract, Mr Hanafee explained.

That never happened.

The finance company later contacted Mr Hanafee asking him to make his contracted monthly payment,

received any more payments

Mr Hanafee has not been able to contact Mr Rit, and the Facebook page used to contact him is now closed.

Fellow victim Sethakorn Ruangklim said, "I want to remind people who want to sell a car like this must be very careful because as far as I know there are still many other victims of this."

Region 8 Police are now investigating the claims.

"We have received the complaint and are looking into the claims, and we will prosecute those found breaking the law," Maj Gen Naphanwoot said.

Phuket Smart Bus grinds to a halt – again

THE PHUKET SMART Bus has stopped running, again, due to the lack of people on the island using the service

The Smart Bus stopped playing its way from the airport to Rawai on Jan 19.

The Phuket Smart Bus is the only true form of public transport on the island that carries passengers from one tourism beach resort town to another all along Phuket's west coast.

The suspension of the service comes as a result of the number of people on the island plunging as domestic tourism remains plagued by the current COVID-19 situation elsewhere in the country, Phuket Smart Bus Co Ltd (PKSB) General Manager Wanida Nimnuan told *The Phuket News*.

"As there are fewer tourists on the island, which means far fewer passengers, the Phuket Smart Bus service had to be suspended due to the COVID-19 situation," Ms Wanida said.

"At this time, we were still unable to confirm on which date the service will resume. The Phuket Smart Bus will start rolling again as usual when the situation improves," she added.

The Smart Bus service resumed in November after more than eight months out of action since the 'tambon lockdown' in April last year.

However, even when resuming the service in November, Ms Wanida noted that it was for a trial period only to assess the level of demand. *The Phuket News*

Prab's brother enters election for Patong Mayor

Pakrit Keesin, younger brother to influential Patong businessman Preechawut 'Prab' Keesin, has announced that he will contest the seat of mayor in the upcoming municipal election in Patong to be held on Mar 28.

Mr Pakrit, whose nickname is 'Puen', the Thai word for "gun" [Mr Pakrit chooses to spell his nickname this way], made the announcement at The Royal Paradise Hotel & Spa in Patong last Sunday (Jan 24).

Rak Patong Party was founded in 1994 by Mr Pakrit and Mr Prab's father, longstanding Patong Mayor Pian Keesin. Mr Pian led the party until his death in 2014.

Mr Pakrit has now taken on the role of leader of the Rak Patong Party.

Mr Pakrit announced at the press conference yesterday that the Rak Patong Party is an alternative political party that aims to help resolve problems of the Patong people, from local residents to businesses.

"Patong needs a leader with a good international perspective. He must not only have good policies, but must also listen to the local people – especially in this current situation," Mr Pakrit said.

"I want to follow the quote that Keesin and Saichon Sombat.


my father always said, 'Nayok na dam prachachon nasai' [Dark-faced mayor, bright-faced people]," Mr Pakrit added.

More elderly ordered to repay huge sums to state

ore cases have emerged of elderly people being told to return tens of thousands of baht to the state after it determined they were not entitled to the allowances they received for years.

Buan Losuwan, 89, agreed on Monday (Jan 25) to return B84,400 she had received from the Tambon Charoen Suk Administration Organisation over 10 years, but asked for more time to repay it.

At time of press at least three new cases had emerged in Nakhon Ratchasima, including 83-year-olds Samrit Phusawang and Kuang Somboonram.

Both had received the elderly allowance for over 14 years from April 2006 to November 2020. They recently received a letter from the Tambon Cho Ho Municipality, telling them to return the money – amounting to B83,383 each, including interest.

The state determined they were ineligible for the allowance because they were found to have received a separate monthly pension due to the death of their husbands while performing official duties.

Both have been summonsed to appear before the Nakhon Ratchasima Municipal Court for a prima facie examination on Feb 18.

Wannapa Sanpen, a daughter of Mrs Samrit, said her family was stunned on



receiving the letter and that her mother had never intended to claim the money in the first place. She only did so after a municipal official told her to apply and even helped her prepare the necessary documents. Her mother thought it was her lawful right to receive the elderly allowance, she said.

After receiving the letter, she and her mother went to the municipality office, where they were told to pay back the money in instalments – B18,000 for each of the first three months and then about B1.000

per month until the debt was paid in full.

Ms Wannapa said they wanted the monthly repayment to be reduced to B500-600 and hoped the court would have mercy on Feb 18.

A third resident of Korat, 73-year-old Prachuap Padawan, received the monthly allowance from April 2009 to November 2020 and has now been ordered to return a total of B77,737 including interest.

She is also due to appear before the Nakhon Ratchasima Municipal Court on Feb 18.

Early-stage abortions get Senate support

LEGISLATORS IN THE Senate on Monday (Jan 25) voted in 166-7 in favour of permitting abortion up to 12 weeks of pregnancy while maintaining penalties for later terminations.

The majority voted to amend the existing law that criminalises abortion, pledging support to a plan seeking to tackle unregulated terminations by non-medical practitioners.

Last week an amendment to the Criminal Code was passed by the lower house that followed on from a Constitutional Court ruling last February stating that criminalising abortion was both unconstitutional and a violation of human rights.

The amendment proposes that any abortion undertaken after the 12 week timeline would only be allowed if a certified doctor deems there is a high risk of fetal impairment, danger to the life of the mother, or if a pregnancy was the result of rape, deception or coercion.

Those that did not meet this criteria would be considered illegal and punishable by up to six months in prison, or

a fine of up to B10,000 or both.

"This means abortion is conditional and can only be done by doctors according to the law," Senator Wanlop Tangkhananurak said on Monday.

The proposal was not met favourably by pro-choice activists who argued that maintaining penalties would ensure the stigma of abortion continues and not protect the rights of the mother.

"We want all penalties to be revoked because it is a person's right to abort a pregnancy without being punished," Nisarat Jongwisan, councillor and activist at Tam Tang, a pro-choice group said.

Tourism dept turns to films

THE TOURISM DEPARTment is aiming to generate B3 billion from international film crews this year, targeting projects with an investment of over B100 million in Thailand, after foreign tourism revenue plunged 82.63% last year.

Following the Centre for COVID-19 Situation Administration's (CCSA) granting special entry permission to film crews last year, 53 film production projects were based in country between August and December, contributing Blbn to the economy.

This month, four more



film production projects are underway, forecast to generate B186mn and another 89 film crews are presently undergoing quarantine.

Another 136 film crews, accounting for a combined budget of B850mn, have

sought to film in Thailand during the first half of this year, which would help create 800 jobs for locals.

Thailand welcomed 176 international film productions last year, generating B1.73bn for the local economy, mainly from China, followed by India, the UK, the US and South

"International productions can proceed and generate income for locals despite the tourism slowdown," said Anant Wongbenjarat, director-general of the Tourism Department.

teven Spielberg has a lot to answer for," German expat Holger Schwab quips when asked why the worldwide perception of sharks is predominantly negative.

Holger is owner of Phuket-based Sea Bees Diving and has been a keen diver himself for over 35 years. Along with fellow German expat dive instructor Alex Loew, they have been alarmed to see shark numbers declining off Phuket waters for many years now.

As a result, Holger and Alex established The Fin Arts in 2017, a Phuket-based social enterprise that displays and sells shark sculptures, each one handpainted by its growing network of local and international artists, with a percentage of proceeds going to shark and marine conservation projects.

A workshop was recently set up in Chalong affording local resident artists Sunanta Nualsomsri and her sister Saowaluck the creative space to produce the impressive sculptures and it is hoped providing more direct access to the general public will help continue to raise awareness.

The sculptures come in three sizes: 30-centimetre sharks cast in polyresin to decorate desks and shelves; and 100-and 150-centimetre sharks made from fibreglass, statement pieces that The Fin Arts uses to catch eyes at conven-





tions. All designs can be customised in a bespoke manner to the customer's requirements.

The inspiration for this was provided by the Elephant Parade on display in Chiang Mai in 2017. In a similar vein to The Fin Arts, Elephant Parade exhibits decorated elephant statues to raise awareness of the need for elephant conservation.

The objective is to bring the message of shark conservation efforts into everyday lives, into homes and offices in order to create a conversation, raise awareness and educate people.

"The sculptures are different, unusual," says Holger. "They often achieve the desired effect of initiating a conversation that can result in a positive impact."





Shark Guardian is the main conservation project The Fin Arts supports. Its focus is to both educate and establish a meaningful dialogue about these important creatures of the deep. The UK-registered charity collaborates with marine biologists and shark experts to share data and research, visits schools across the world to educate the next generation about the plight of sharks, and petitions and lobbies governments.

Education the key

Although Holger's reference to Hollywood mogul Spielberg's role in depicting sharks as villains courtesy of his 1975 blockbuster film *Jaws* is tongue-incheek, there is a simultaneous tone of definite lament and, for him, education is the key driver in effecting change.

"In 35 years of diving I have only ever heard of one serious shark attack on a diver, which occurred in Egypt several years ago," he says. Indeed, you are far more likely to die from a popping champagne cork, being struck by lightning or a falling coconut from a tree.

"Humans are not part of a shark's food-chain," adds Holger, stressing that rare attacks are usually the shark mistaking a human for food, taking a "test bite" but then releasing.

If the COVID-19 pandemic has taught us anything it is the precarious yet crucial balance between humans and nature. The importance sharks play in the eco-system of the ocean can not be understated, says Holger.

"As apex predators, sharks play a crucial role in maintaining marine biodiversity," he says. "You take the shark

out of the equaton and it undermines the whole structure. The consequence of their dwindling numbers and potential disappearance altogether would be devastating," he notes, adding a critical reminder that 70% of the earth's oxygen comes from the ocean.

Estimates state that between 100-120 million sharks are killed every year. A third of all sharks are threatened with extinction in the near future.

Unregulated fishing, bycatch, a continued demand for shark fins for soup and teeth and jaws for souvenirs, and contact with marine debris, such as plastics and discarded 'ghost nets' are the main contributing factors to these statistics.

The fishing industry has become much more aggressive and greedy, says Holger, with an increasing number of vessels taking to the waters each year, often operating in illegal territories and utilising illegal methods.

As the demand for fish increases to record numbers, particularly across the Pacific, unregulated fishing is becoming an increasing problem. Unscrupulous methods adopted with longline fishing in particular where the actual size of nets are decreased below the regulated requirement means dolphins, seabirds, sea turtles, and sharks are unintentionally being caught and killed.

The shark fin market is also a major issue, despite restrictions being introduced and consumption dropping. Used for soup at auspicious occasions typically in China and its associated territories, it is estimated that 75 million sharks are killed for this barbaric practice every year. Shark fin soup is still also widely available in Thailand.

"The sad thing is that a shark's fin is merely cartilage and therefore offers very little in terms of taste," says Holger.

Still, Holger remains upbeat and confident that things can and will change, in the short and long term.

"We will continue our efforts in trying to help protect and conserve these beautiful creatures who are so fundamental in so many ways," he says.

Enjoying floaters with an accent

f the lotus and water lily are likely to be main players in your Thai water-garden, there are others which can perform useful cameo roles. One such performer is the Egyptian papyrus (cyperus papyrus). Every schoolboy knows one fact about this plant: it was used to make the first paper. The second 'fact' is not common knowledge — namely that the 'bulrushes' in which the infant Moses was hidden, were almost certainly papyrus reeds.

Tall with long, elegant stems surmounted by a ring of fine leaves (modified stems) which radiate out from a central hub, this sedge will grow a couple of metres tall, a stately presence above the surface of your pool or pot.

Smaller but equally valuable as a water margin plant and much easier to find in garden centres, is its relative, cyperus alternifolius. Sometimes known as the umbrella plant, it hails from Madagascar and has a circle of broader, grass-like leaves gracing the top of each slender stem.

Both are what Americans like to call "accent plants", and provide a contrast to surface-hugging plants such as water-lilies, or floaters such as water lettuce or water hyacinths. I have a cyperus growing at the edge of my fish pond and a couple in large pots keeping company with guppies and Mexican swordtails which hide in its ample roots. And it will grow more-orless anywhere.

Another familiar sight on Thai forecourts is the water canna or Thalia geniculata, an upright foliage plant, often with attractive red stems, and large bright green, lanceolate leaves which appear lower down the growth. The clusters of tiny flowers are purple with white spots and dangle from the ends of stalks which



may be three metres tall. Settled in a well-watered pot, Thalia can take the full sun of a patio, but it will also survive in permanently moist soil, or at the edge of your fish pond where it will add height and substance to existing foliage. Thalia will germinate from seed or can be divided at the roots. An "accent plant" with a difference. Leaves tend to go yellow at the edges, particularly if short of water.

Both the papyrus and water canna root, conventionally enough, in saturated soil. On the other hand, the water hyacinth (eichornia crassipes) literally floats on water. So named because it produces lilac-hued spikes of hyacinth-like blooms above bulbous, air-filled stems, these blooms can look attractive in a confined space. The free-hanging submerged roots are purplish-black, the stiff oval leaves a deep green.

One of the fastest growing of plants, it reproduces by means of stolons or underwater runners which form new plants. Because of this rapid growth, it can colonise and dominate a stretch of water in days, carpeting the entire surface and killing off other aquatics. The water hyacinth also has some commercial value in Asia: it can be pressed into service as a mulch or fertiliser while its fibrous roots are used to make upmarket, woven furniture. This needs to be exploited.

Eichornia is a bit more exotic than the humble water lettuce (pistia stratiotes) which also floats, but produces no flowers of any significance. In similar fashion, its emerald green, deeply pleated rosettes of leaves sprout from roots trailing below the surface. These lie more-or-less flat when there is plenty of surface room, but if the rosettes are close together in a pot, they will become more upright in habit. Pistia reproduces by means of offsets: these can be removed to start a new colony elsewhere.

If grown in garden ponds, both these "floaters" provide some shelter for fish, and the capacity to remove some impurities from the water. But they should not be allowed to cover the entire surface: they will need to be periodically culled, and to have their dead leaves removed – before they de-oxygenate the water.

The water chestnut (trapa bicornis) is probably a better choice for the small garden. Another "floater", it looks neat with flat, diamond-shaped, leaves which form an attractive rosette above the submerged fruit. These hard brown fruit, which resemble the horned head of a bull – hence the botanical name – contain a large starchy nut considered a delicacy, especially among the Chinese. Submerged, these fruits can be used to propagate new plants. In the wild, the fine roots may extend for three or four metres, anchored in the mud at the bottom of a pond or slow-moving stream. Trapa is happy in strong sunlight and since it is less invasive than the water lettuce, it looks good in a container.

Straying off a direct line, Ninan collided with Livermore, causing both players to end up sprawled on the ground, negating the possibility of a catch. Immediately, a chorus of appeals went up from the Penguins claiming 'obstructing the field', to which umpire Neil Quail promptly raised his finger to signal a

rienced Quail was unable to confirm which batsman was to be dismissed, but after some heated debate between the two sides, it was decided that an incredulous Ninan, having been the one to obstruct the fielder, would return to the clubhouse.

Once the furore subsided. Livermore took the wicket of Ali Khan in the 11th over, caught behind by Anthony Van Blerk, before Robertson bowled Mushtag for 80 with the score on 131 for 3.

Stuart Hamilton then called on a repertoire of exceptional shots to reach his half century by the 28th over and finished 90 not out.

Chasing a target of 267, Michael Flowers and Saju Abraham opened the batting for the Penguins, hitting a quick-fire 17 off 18, before Pratap bowled Abraham in the 6th over.

Flowers and Paddy Ledeboer then put on a 59-run partnership before the former was dismissed by wicketkeeper Bootsy, shortly followed by his partner (56) with the score at

A 110-run partnership between Swart (82) and Van Blerk (29 not out) in just 11 overs ensured victory for Cows and set up a potentially taught return match on Sunday (Jan 31).

Britons secure America's Cup challenger final place

SAILING

BEN AINSLIE'S INEOS Team UK overcame a prerace gear failure to beat Luna Rossa on the final cross in a thriller on Auckland harbour last Sunday (Jan 23) to qualify unbeaten for the final of the America's Cup challenger series.

The lead changed nine times in the first fully competitive match-race in a series disrupted in the early rounds by weather vagaries and a spectacular crash involving American Magic.

"That was one for the fans," British legend Ainslie said.

Ainslie, the most successful sailor in Olympic history, is on record as saying he would willingly trade his Olympic medals – four gold and one silver – to be the first Briton to win the America's Cup.

But he said there were some tense moments before the Luna Rossa race, which

Double title delight for Thai pair

MIXED DOUBLES STARS Dechapol Puavaranukroh and Sapsiree Taerattanachai claimed their second BWF World Tour Super 1000 titles in a fortnight with a straightgame win last Sunday (Jan 24).

The top-seeded Thais defeated fourth-seeded Seo Seung-Jae and Chae Yu-Jung of South Korea 21-16, 22-20 to win the US\$1 million (B30mn) Toyota Thailand Open at Impact Arena, Muang Thong Thani.

World No.3 pair Dechapol and Sapsiree, who claimed their maiden Super 1000 crown at the Yonex Thailand Open the previous week, took home the \$74,000 (approximately B2 million) winners's cheque.

"We're very happy to win our second tournament in two weeks," said Sapsiree in a post-match interview. "It was our goal from the start to do our best and try to win on our home court."

Dechapol and Sapsiree will hope to make it three in a row as they participate in the Asian leg finale - the HSBC BWF World Tour Finals – which started on Wednesday.

Fourth seed Axelsen 27, Earlier in the day, Spain's ran rings around 35-year-old

Vittinghus throughout the 40-minute match, triumphing in the first set 21-11 and 21-7 in the second game.

The women's doubles was an all Korean affair with sixthranked Kim So-Yeong and Kong Hee-Yong too strong against fourth-ranked Lee So-Hee and Shin Seung-Chan 21-18, 21-19.

In the men's doubles, seventh-ranked Lee Yang and Wang Chi-Lin of Taiwan also made it back-to-back titles in 36 minutes against Malaysia's ninth-ranked Aaron Chia and Soh Wooi Yik 21-13, 21-18.

nlike the previous round of this famous cup competition there were no shock results last weekend as many of the heavyweight Premier League clubs managed to navigate themselves safely through to the next round.


